## McFarland to Talk At C-C Banquet

Plans are nearing completion for the annual Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce banquet to be held in junior-senior high cafeteria scheduled for Monday night, Jan. 17, Roy Davis, C-C manager, said Saturday.

Speaker will be the nation's "top after-dinner speaker," Dr. Kenneth McFarland, Topeka, Kan., who was booked in mid-summer. Dr. McFarland confirmed the date this past week.

A feature of the banquet also will include the installing of new officers and directors, and the naming of the outstanding conservation farmer. Members are now voting for four new directors.

Dr. McFarland has been recognized as the nation's most eloquent and effective exponent of what is commonly known as the "American system." To his concept of basic Americanism he has given the label of progressive conservation with these basic ideas: "To conserve constitutional government, to conserve free competitive enterprise and to conserve individual freedom under both."

Dr. McFarland holds degrees from Pittsburg State Teachers and Stanford University. For 24 years he was a school executive, serving for the last nine years of that time as superintendent of schools in Topeka. The modern McFarland Trade School which he designed and built at Coffeyville, Kans., is named in his honor.

The McFarlands live on a beautiful horse farm at Topeka. A daughter, Kay, is a practicing attorney in Topeka and their son, Jim, is a salesman.

Because of his extensive traveling to fill speaking engagements, Dr. McFarland is the No. 1 flight passenger of America and has been so recognized by receiving the Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker flying award.

Among his publications is the popular book, "Eloqua nec a Public Speaking."

Davis and Chamber President Charles L. Lewis said Saturday that the Muleshoe chamber "feels extremely fortunate to secure the services of such an outstanding speaker — the nation's top, to be exact."

# If He Breathes, He Can Work - That's Cotton Man's Guide

"It seems like everybody is trying to keep Cotton Farmer Joe Blue from getting his cotton crop out of the field and onto the gin's parking lot."

That was the opinion expressed Saturday by a south Bailey county farmer who said that "even the government won't let me get that crop out of the field, so it seems."

He explained it like this: "They even sent in the Border Patrol to pick up a few of the fellows who were working in our area. Got a whole busload of them. I undisturbed, and shipped them right back to Mexico. One of those fellows was a right smart worker, too."

"Oh, well," he added as he picked a flock of grasshoppers off "maybe he'll be back in a couple of weeks, and if he does, I still can use him."

And there was the ginmer who said that the bracero program had "made it very difficult to get somebody to work at the gins."

"You see we're working 50

men at the gin now that we are smack in the middle of our busy season. Well, they are hard to come by, so when somebody comes by and wants a job, I don't ask any questions."

"I just look them over somewhat. If they got fuzz on their faces, I figure they are old enough to work, and if they are breathing I figure they are healthy enough to work."

There was the very fine helper he hired last week. "He pitched right in," said the gin operator, "and learned the bus-

ness in no time at all. In fact, he was one of the smartest workers we had."

"I didn't know where he came from, and I didn't care. When they stopped the bracero program I figured the labor shortage would filter right off the farm and down to the gin stand. Well, it did."

"Now when somebody comes along who acts like he might sort of be interested in a job well, I hire him up and if he works well, I don't bother to ask any embarrassing questions."

"That's the fellow I was talking about. He asked ME for a job and that's unusual; these days I do the asking — I say, 'Buddy, would you like a job?' and if he doesn't watch out, I'll steer him right into a place in the gin."

"Well, this fellow was not like that; he walked up and asked me if I could hire him. I gave him the fuzz and breathing test, and he passed and I hired him, just like that."

"And boy, was he ever a good worker! He worked hard and he worked well, and I was aw-

## Cotton Yield Pushing Far Ahead of '64

### Year's Total Now Stands at 41,000 Bales; Maple Crop at Half-Way Point

Cotton is moving to the gins in a great-busy way. Warm sunny days which followed several below-freezing nights early this month, are popping bolls right and left.

And for the most part, farmers, bankers and merchants are happy.

Only one little fly in the ointment: Mercurial readings could be better. That pesky little word, unheard of by most folk two decades ago, wiggled right into the cotton pricing structure, and it does things to the old cotton pay check if the reading is too low.

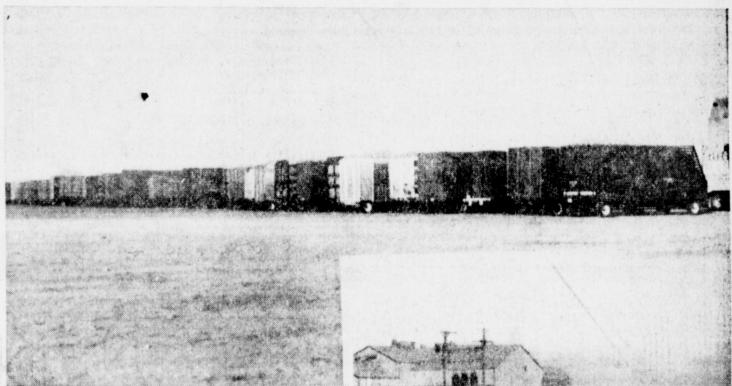
Greatest activity still centers around the Maple area but cotton harvest is busy throughout the county. Maple always gets off to an earlier start, and this year has been no exception. Gins are buzzing around the clock, and the gin lots are full of load-trailers awaiting their turns at the suction pipe.

But it will be late in January before many of them are even tractor-drawn into place for ginning.

John Shepard, manager of the Maple Co-op gin — a twin system — checked over his last gin record late in the week and announced the total at 10,750, but he admitted that the figure would be absolute even before the writer could get back to Muleshoe to put his story in to print.

"Good crop!" that was the general summary of King Cotton, 1965. Bailey county version.

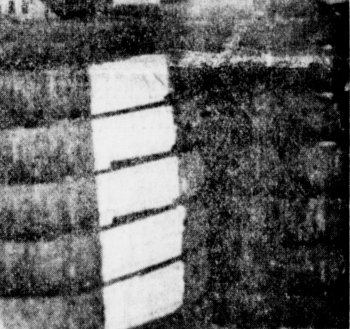

## Senior Citizens To Hear Social Security Expert

Senior citizens who attend their second monthly Bailey county get-together tomorrow afternoon in Fellowship Hall of First Methodist Church will hear a Social Security expert from Lubbock discuss new social security features, the chairman, the Rev. J. Frank Peery said Saturday.

The group also will hear the Gospelaires, a local men's quartet, sing a group of selections.

These two features will highlight the Monday afternoon gathering.

Speaking for Social Security will be Jim Latimer, field representative of the Social Security office, Lubbock. Latimer told the Journal Saturday that he will discuss the government's new medicare program, adding: "I feel certain that these senior citizens will be interested in learning all about this program of hospital and medical insurance for those who are 65 or older."

He said anyone 65 or older will be eligible for the new program if he will file a claim with the Social Security Administration before March 31, 1966.

Mr. Peery said it may be determined Monday whether an organization will be formed for the senior group. Also the format for the organization may be decided after tomorrow's meeting. So far the organization has been strictly an embryo type and no officers have been elected. The organization is operated by a "Committee of 16" named by Mr. Peery after he had been selected by Governor Connally to head the Bailey county senior citizens' group.

## Revised List Boosts Mules' Final Rating

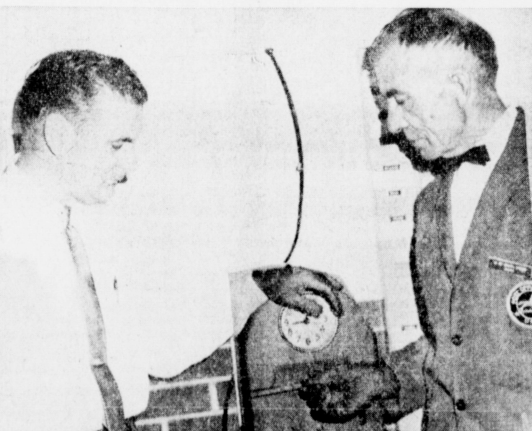
Coaches of District 1-AAA (which includes Muleshoe) got together this past week for their annual powwow, and they came up with their picks of offensive and defensive teams.

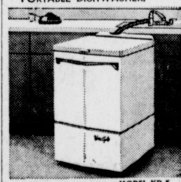

can't grumble at that kind of production figure." Labor continues to be scarce, both for the farmer and the gin, he said.

Meantime here in Bailey county, Bailey County Electric Cooperative made its usual weekly check of the 16 gins served with power from its lines, and came up with the figure 30,888 bales. That's one-sixth more than a year ago when the same

16 gins had turned out 24,633 bales up to Dec. 9.

The Bailey County Electric Cooperative check does not include Muleshoe Coop gin, Purdy & Son, B. L. Purdy Gin, Paymaster and the gin at Progress, all of which have reported increased activity. The reports from those gins brought the county total to 41,163 at the Dec. 9 mark in the ginning year.
