LAWRENCEVILLE, Va. (UPI) — Police searched today for the four children of an Riberan carnival couple held in connection with the death of their 7-year-old daughter. Officials found the body of Carol Anne Dudley wrapped in a blanket at the edge of a busy highway near South Hill, Va. Her death was attributed to "malnutrition, neglect and exposure," complicated by a broken leg. Kennedy Edwin Dudley, 47, and his wife, Irene, 44, were arrested as they drove their 20-year-old jalopy equipped with a two-burner stove through Fuquay Springs, N.C. They were returned here for a neglect hearing Tuesday.

Castro Says He'll Back Revolutions

HAVANA (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro affirmed his determination to export revolution to Latin America in a weekend challenge to the inter-American system which appeared to dash hopes of a reconciliation between Cuba and the new U.S. administration. In a speech early Sunday to a group of factory workers, Castro also hinted his regime is preparing to take over Cuba's Roman Catholic schools and cemeteries. Rumors circulating here today said the government may be preparing to follow up Castro's new declaration of hostility to the United States by cutting off the water supply of the U.S. Navy's big Guantanamo base.

Election Set For Two School Board Members

The election will be held Saturday April 1. Two trustees will be elected to fill the vacancies left by expiration of the terms of E. L. Green Jr. and D. E. Holt, both of whom are finishing out three-year terms. The school board also decided to give individual attention to a questionnaire on school legislation now before the state legislature.

Ed Counterfeiters, Forgers Join Commie 'Cold War' Against West

RLIN (UPI) — The Communists have recruited forgers and counterfeiters to aid their cold campaign against the West.

Content merely to spread stories, they have "documents" to back them up.

Documents range from love letters to alleged "secret" orders from the U.S. secretary of state.

The main Communist forger factory was set up in the East in a suburb of Hohenschonhausen. Here Soviet East German and other Soviet bloc professionals together to tell lies.

Nelson Rockefeller turned up Rockefeller discussed at length American difficulties in South America.

The U.S. State Department said the Dulles memorandum and the Rockefeller report were "crude" forgeries. It said no such memorandum or report ever existed.

But other forgeries were not so crude.

Identity papers for example, given to Communist secret agents by the East Berlin center are said to be expert. The Hohenschon-

hausen operation provides spies with birth certificates, passports and other papers they use to mask their identity.

Nothing appears to be too small to counterfeit if it causes trouble in the West.

The Communist even turn out false love letters. Two years ago the West German army discovered that the East Berlin forger factory was sending faked love letters to married soldiers. The idea was that the wives would open them and start trouble.

Civil Rights Plan Insufficient, Republican Says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. J. Lee Rankin, R-N.Y., has criticized President Kennedy's approach to civil rights "insufficient" and urged a broad federal program to assure all Americans of equal opportunities.

Rankin Sunday night advocated legislation to give technical aid money to public schools trying to desegregate.

Rankin said in an interview over the New York State radio and television stations that the civil rights bill of the Justice Department will be "beefed up" with more money and "to enforce the laws in relation to it."

Scientists Say U.S. 3 Years Behind In Space

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States is about three years away from matching Russia's feat of launching a spacecraft toward Venus.

Scientists said it would take this country that long to achieve the necessary rocket power to send a space probe to Venus or other planets.

President Kennedy was informed Saturday night of the Soviet launching, before it was officially announced by Moscow, and the United States has been tracking the Russian craft.

However, White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said Kennedy would have no comment. This country maintained a news blackout on tracking information about the Venus shot and the 7.1-ton sputnik launched Feb. 4.

The target year for sending a U.S. rocket to the vicinity of Venus or Mars is 1964. The next ideal launching period for a shot to Venus will come late in 1962 but the United States apparently won't have sufficient rocket power for the attempt by then.

American hopes for firing a reconnaissance rocket to Venus rest with the Saturn "super-boosters," a rocket with 1.5 million pounds of thrust. The Saturn's first stage is scheduled for a test flight later this year.

Attempts by United Nations representatives to see or interview Lumumba or his companions were denied repeatedly by the Katangese authorities, who insisted the three men were in good condition.

The Katangese government said Lumumba and his two supporters had overpowered their guards at the farmhouse jail and fled in an ancient car with two rifles and enough gasoline to last 60 miles.

The Katangese government said the car was found wrecked in a ditch last Friday.

Lumumba's death was expected to set off new violence in the Congo.

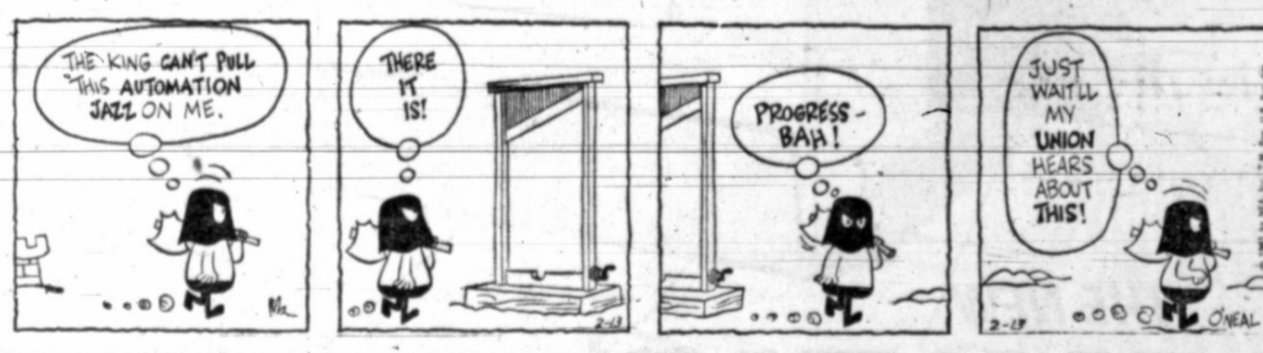

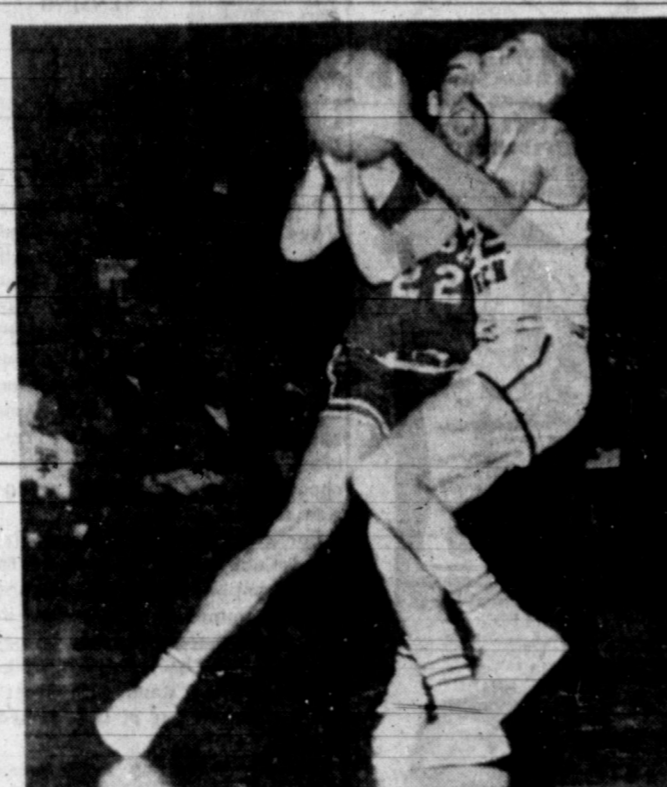

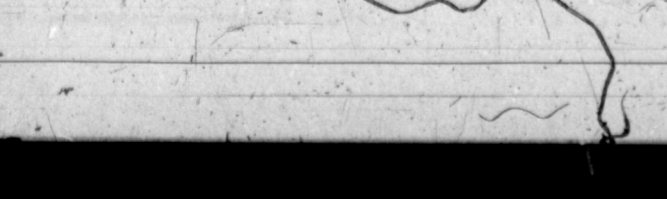

New Guide For Status Seekers

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Worried about your "status"? Then take care: the food you eat may give you away.

Army scientists have found the more education a man has, the better he tends to like grapefruit, stuffed olives, raw celery, cranberry sauce, cherry cobbler and mushroom soup.

The less education a man has, the better he tends to like black pepper, bean soup, turnip greens, bacon, salmon salad, chipped beef on toast and corn fritters.

The men with education go more for glazed doughnuts, apricots, iced tea and grated carrot and pineapple salad. They tend to avoid ham loaf and sardines.

The best-liked male food, regardless of age or education is fresh milk. Even the oldest, who tend more to hot coffee the older they get, like milk best.

With meat and like concoctions, liver, baked sweet potatoes, eggs, sausage links, lima beans, carrot strips and soup goes up.

But as men get older, they like cake, jelly, shredded wheat, ice cream, watermelon and frankfurters less.

The Army found that as the men get older they tend to like sliced raw onions more. Their taste for...

Though milk is the best-liked male food at all ages, hot biscuits, grilled steak, ice cream, strawberry shortcake, fresh chicken and roast turkey come right after milk in popularity.

Least liked food? Candied parsnips. But mashed turnips, broccoli, squash and creamed asparagus are close runners up.

One surprise: iced coffee is one of the 10 least-liked foods.

Vegetables as a class are at the bottom of the liked list. Marked exceptions: buttered corn - on the cob and fresh sliced tomatoes.

Though Army men in general like fruit, with fresh peaches and watermelon right at the top of the list, they don't like stewed prunes or rhubarb.

The men from larger towns tend more to like rye bread with butter. The bigger the town or city they're from, the more they tend to like chow mein.

As they get older, men get more fond of hot coffee and brown gravy. But they like pie, hamburgers, pineapple and spaghetti less.

So far the Army has no theory as to why all these things are so.

Foreign Commentary

From the foreign news cables: Algerian war: Diplomats in Paris doubt the forthcoming meeting between French President Charles de Gaulle and Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba will lead to early negotiations between French and rebel leaders on the end of the civil war there. Rebel leaders have made it clear they are cool to the Bourguiba mission. They are friendly with him but fear his attempt to "explain" the rebel stand to De Gaulle may weaken the position of strength the rebels consider necessary to get the best terms.

Space ships: Look for West German scientists to step up space attempts of their own with German-developed two-stage rockets reaching heights of 100,000 feet. Germans expect to attain this goal by the spring of 1962 at the latest. Their next step is about three times as high.



Berlin peace: The Soviets have cautioned East German Communists against provoking any serious incidents in Berlin. The Kremlin is said to want to avoid trouble in Berlin while Premier Nikita Khrushchev seeks face-to-face talks with President Kennedy, probably at the United Nations spring meeting in New York.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — Current prospects do not favor early improvement for heavy electrical equipment shares which have been suffering from unsatisfactory demand and considerable price weakness, according to Standard & Poor's.

In its business highlights publication, S&P says the dollar value of 1961 shipments are expected to be about 3.5 per cent below 1959, and overshadowing this unimpressive outlook is uncertainty concerning the series of antitrust suits brought by the Justice Department.

These factors, coupled with the fact that the industry is currently operating well below capacity, argue against rapid improvement in prices for many types of heavy electrical equipment, the agency concludes.

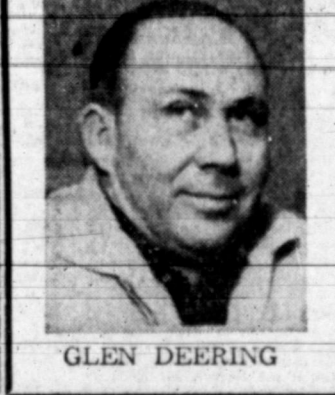
