

Record Infestation

Wheat farmers of Grav County are staging an all-out battle against record-breaking infestation of green bugs, Foster Whaley; county agricultural agent, disclosed Saturday. Unless the green bug is stopped from sucking the wheat plants to death, farmers of the county could lose hundreds of thousands of dollars, Whaley said.

Whaley said wheat plants indicated a bumper crop if the green bug can be stopped. Another 30-bushel per acre wheat yield in Gray County would bring in an estimated \$4,250,-000. What the damage from the green bugs could be, or will be, cannot, of course, be estimated at this time. If weather permits and the spraying program can be carried out the crop will be saved, Whaley said. An unidentified farmer called the situation a new disaster.

The battle against the green bug is being waged by low-flying planes which are dusting thousands of acres. In a detailed statement on the green bug situation, Whaley said: "Operations green bugs control Kennedy Foresee Whaley said:







New Radiation Garden Basis Of Misgivings

By DICK WEST WASHINGTON (UPI)-For several years, scientists at the Brookhaven National Laboratory have been studying the effects of atomic radiation on various forms of plant life.

This has led to the development of what I shall describe, with no particular pride of authorship, as the "hot thumb" technique of gardening.

What the scientists do is plant flowers, vegetables and other flora in a 10-acre field that is in a sense, fertilized by gamma rays from Cobalt-60.

Then they go back to the laboratory, hang up their trowels and pruning shears, and wait to see what happens.

Persons who have seen the radiation garden described it as a fantastic sight. Under the rays from the radioisotope, many familiar household plants assume grotesque sizes and shapes.

This, however, is nothing much to brag about. Some of the things I grow in my garden look rather weird, and I don't have the advantages of Cobalt-60.

On the other hand, the scientists also have found that certain plants respond favorably to the radiation treatment. They have produced new and better varieties of such things as oats, beans, peanuts and carnations.

Palmer Blows Chance With Bogey Shooting

AGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) - Little Gary Player of South Africa, buckling momentarily but never cracking under pressure, charged back after three straight bogeys to shoot a three under par 69 Saturday and take a four-stroke lead over Arnold Palmer in the third round of the Masters golf championship.

The 25-year-old Player promised he wouldn't "choke up" when he started Saturday round tied for the lead with defending champion Palmer and he made good his vow with a 32-37 that gave him a 54-hole total of 206.

Palmer, bidding for his third Masters' title, had a 36-37-73 for a total of 210 that included five bogeys and four birdies. His oneover par round still left him two strokes ahead of Paul Harney of Worcester, Mass., and amateur Charles Coe of Oklahoma City, who were tled for third place with 212.

AS EXECUTIVE SECRETARY, for the Pampa Chapter of the American Red Cross, which office she has had for eight years, Mrs. Shotwell goes well beyond the duties required of her office. Under her supervision, there is an active Gray Lady and Staff Aides organization; a fine summer recreation and water safety program; home nursing program, First Aid Classes, Red Cross nursing courses to be used in time of disaster; an active Junior Red Cross organization; a blood-typing program; service to active and veteran service men pertaining to leaves, financial aid, counseling, transfers, health and welfare. She works with all Welfare Agencies including the County Welfare, Welfare Index, Salvation Army; as well as gives individual counseling and help. She assists with assignment of baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas and serves as a legal guardian for several families. She has office hours of nine to five, but will go anywhere, anytime of the day or night to help someone in need. Her newest activity is setting up swimming courses tobe offered in Pampa's new Youth and Community Center.

cases two years. In its investigation of federal medical activities, the first Hoover Commission cited these two samples of what the commission found: To have his tonsils removed, a patient was staying an average of 16:1 days in an Army hospital; 15.1 days in a veterans hospital; 6.8 days in a Public Health - Service hospital - but only 1.4 days in a private hospital.

The average stay for an appendectomy ranged from 20.3 days in a Navy hospital to 7.8 days in a private hospital.

This report was made more than 12 years ago, and the government, still has not overhauled its hospital systems or instituted other basic reforms that the Hoover Commission recommended.

These are examples of what happens when, the government is in charge of medical programs. Independent insurance programs cannot afford to operate a medical program in such an excessively wasteful manner. They cannot afford large staffs that do little or nothing. They are competing - to give the best service for the least money, and there isn't any organization that can do it at less expense, including, most certainly, the federal government.

People complain about the high cost of med cal care. But what price can be placed on a child's arm, for instance? Is a refrigerator, for example, worth more to a parent than that his child have a straight, healthy limb? Is his washing machine worth more? How much is a child's health worth compared to the living room carpet?

> My correspondent's confusion is easily understood. What we call Rocky Mountain spotted fever is discoverer, Dr. H. T. Ricketts of the U.S. Public Health Service. Rickettsia are about the size of viruses, that is to say they have to be magnified some 40,

000 times before they can be seen in the electron microscope. Fortunately for us, they can not ooze through our covering membranes, as do viruses. They're unable to infect us, in fact, unless they're injected into our tissues by a biting insect like a louse, mite, tick or fly. And the biting insect carried can't transmit a rickettsial disease unless it has first dined on the blood of an infected human patient or, more often, a sick rat,

mouse, rabbit or deer. Now, what's called Rocky Mountain spotted fever was first observed in the Snake River and Bitter Root Valleys of Montana. Here it was originally called tick fever because it occurred only during seasons when ticks are prevalent and, most often, in persons who'd suffered tick bites. Since its discovery the disease has been observed in eastern states and in distant countries such as South Africa, Italy and

France Spotted fever, as it's more correctly called, used to be a serious disease. It's featured by chills, high fever and the rash to which

it owes its name. Before its cause was known and isolated and prior to the development of protective vaccines and effective drugs for treatment, it claimed one patient in five. With present methods of treatment, recovery can -almost be assured.
