Mexico Fears Tourist Spending Proposal Will Impair Economy

GUADALAJARA, Mexico (UPI) — President John F. Kennedy's proposal to limit U.S. tourist spending abroad to \$100 a person would cause "serious damage" to Mexico's economy, Mexico's foreign minister said today. He said the proposal would "seriously impair" Mexico's economy and "will be heard" at Tuesday's session of the first U.S.-Mexico Interparliamentary Meeting.

He suggested U.S. delegates this restriction "not be applied to Canada and Mexico, which are border countries with the U.S." Rep. D. S. Saund, D-Calif., promised that President Kennedy and the U.S. Congress "will hear" of Mexico's proposal.

Income Or Payroll Tax Issue Nearer Voters

Child's First Visit To Dentist Should Come At Ages 2 1/2 And Three

(This is the second in a series of questions and answers on dental health published by The Pampa News, in cooperation with the Anahand District Dental Society in observance of National Children's Dental Health Week February 5 through 11.)

When should my child be taken to the dentist for the first time? As soon as he has all of his primary teeth, between the ages of 2 1/2 and 3. On this first visit the child has a chance to become acquainted with the dentist, his office and his equipment. Usually the dentist will clean and X-ray the child's teeth. Since half of all 2-year-olds have one or more decayed teeth, it may also be necessary for the dentist to restore a tooth. The dentist will suggest how often the child should return for subsequent check-ups.

Why should my child's baby teeth be taken care of? He'll lose them anyhow. One reason is that a child's first teeth are not really "baby" teeth, since some of them remain in his mouth until he is 11 or 12 years old. At least they will if his teeth are properly taken care of. Primary teeth are needed for exactly the same reasons permanent teeth are needed — for chewing, for appearance and for speaking. In addition, the primary teeth hold the spaces for the permanent teeth.

My 8-year-old is going to have to have a molar removed. My nephew had a space maintainer put in when he lost a back tooth. Will my daughter need a space maintainer too? Yes, a space maintainer should be inserted when a primary molar is lost prematurely. One of the functions of the first teeth is to hold the space for the permanent teeth. If a molar is lost prematurely and not replaced with a space maintainer, the other teeth drift into the empty space. Then there is not sufficient space for the permanent tooth to erupt in the proper position. The permanent teeth are crowded, irregular, "crooked." Premature loss of primary molars is not the only cause of this condition, but it is the most easily prevented cause.

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Fidel's Brother Hurls New Catholic Attack

HAVANA (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro's brother, Raul, in a bitter new attack on the Roman Catholic Church, charged today night that Cuban priests were planting or transporting bombs and concealing dynamite.

Castro said he would be sent to church authorities on their promise that he would be sent to Spain, but that "nothing happened."

Castro said "our generosity has reached its incalculable limits," but added that the revolutionary regime would "seek more patience."

"Time and time again, we've learned that priest so - and - so planted bombs or transported bombs, or that this church had dynamite deposits while that one was printing counter-revolutionary propaganda."

"Tell me of one single case when we have acted (against the church). More than once, members of the armed forces have had to intervene, not to persecute priests but to protect them from justified popular ire."

JFK Pledges U.S. To Stay With NATO

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy pledged today that the United States will continue as "a full and energetic partner" in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and will maintain its military strength in Europe.

The President, in an announcement opening his news conference, said NATO is "our central and most important defensive alliance."

He said NATO must continue economic leadership in such "great causes" as the integration of Europe and development of less developed countries.

"We for our part mean to go on as full and energetic partners in NATO," Kennedy said.

Kennedy also announced he has appointed former Secretary of State Dean Acheson to head an advisory group which will work with Secretary of State Dean Rusk in determining this country's future course in NATO.

The President said: "The members of NATO must be leaders also in and out of NATO itself, in such great causes as the integration of Europe and the cooperative development of new nations. We for our part mean to go on as full and energetic partners in NATO and in particular we wish to maintain our military strength in Europe."

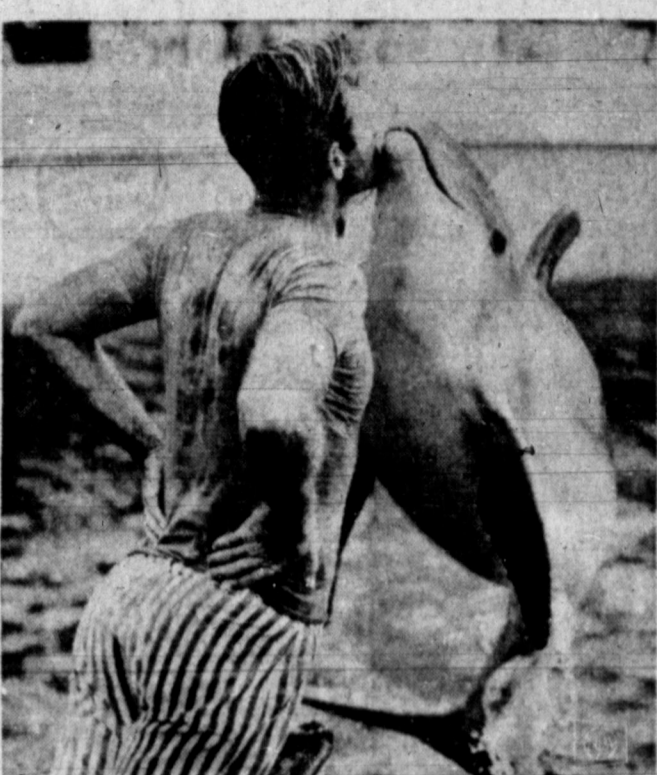

The White House Tuesday denied stories saying a study group in the Pentagon had found no missile gap to exist. The New York Herald Tribune said that the stories came after a briefing by Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara.

Touching on the international situation, Kennedy said he hopes some concrete solutions can be worked out concerning relations with Russia, including the problem of Laos and the Congo.

He said he was meeting this week with Llewellyn Thompson, U.S. ambassador to Russia, "to chart our future relations with the Soviet Union."

He said he has no information that the Russians have a man in space. He said the United States does not consider itself in a race to put a man in space just for prestige, and "we're going to be extremely careful (even) if we're going to come in second."

In Japan, any man who is a heavy drinker and can hold his liquor is a "real man" and very highly respected man.

This common admiration probably started from an expression coined by someone many, many years ago when he said, "Heroes love women and liquor."

There is, for instance, Masanori Fukushima who probably is better known today because he was a strong drinker than because he was one of the leading lords under Hideyoshi Toyotomi in medieval Japan.

Just recently a television master of ceremonies wrote an article about Shinichi Yanagisawa, popular young singer and television actor. He devoted considerable space telling how Yanagisawa could drink beer, whisky and what not at one sitting and out-drink most anybody.

The writer, Teiho Ichiryusai, probably would be sued for libel if he were in some other country than Japan. But it is quite possible that Yanagisawa felt very flattered and thanked the author for the publicity given him.

Roundtable television and radio interviews by reporters and commentators with personalities in politics, the business world or the theater, inevitably mention the "drinking ability" of their subjects.

Envy and admiration of the men who can hold their liquor may very likely stem from the fact that there are so many drunkards in this country. You see them sleeping on the benches at railway stations when they should be home in bed.

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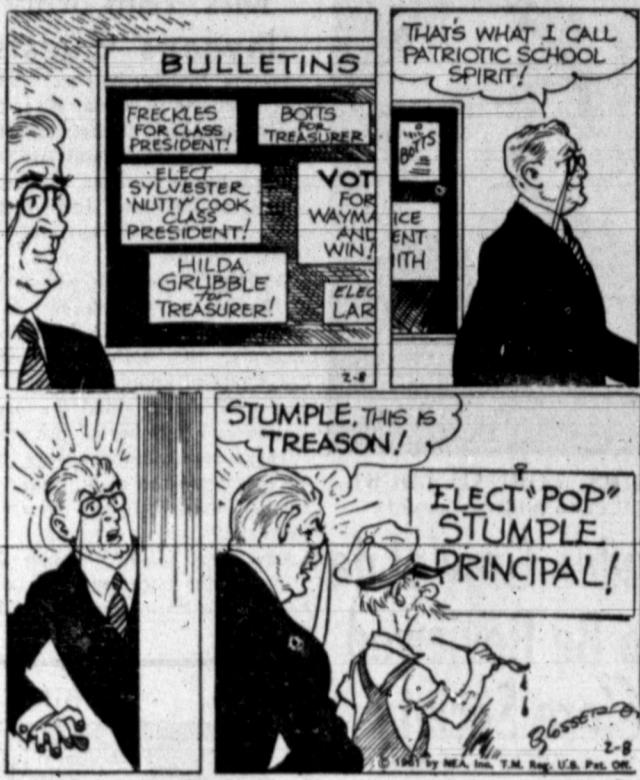
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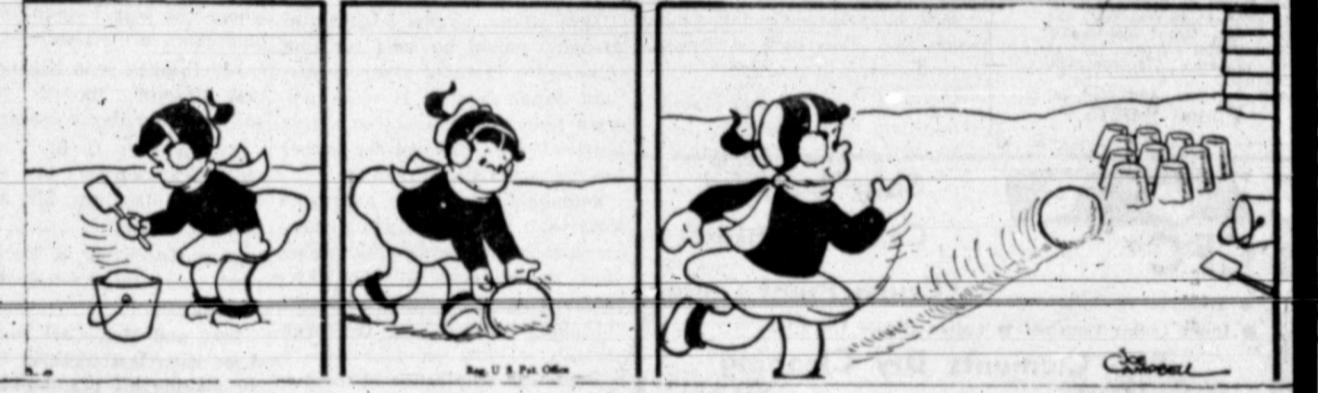
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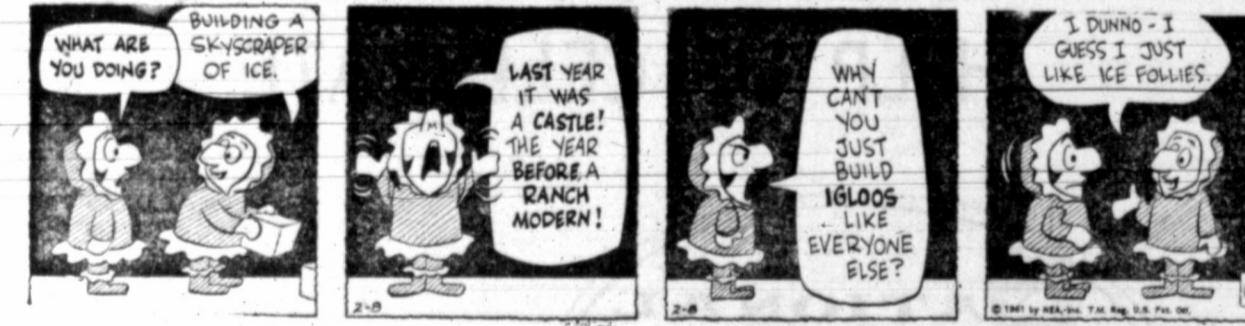
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Borger Stuns Pampa In Overtime, 51-50

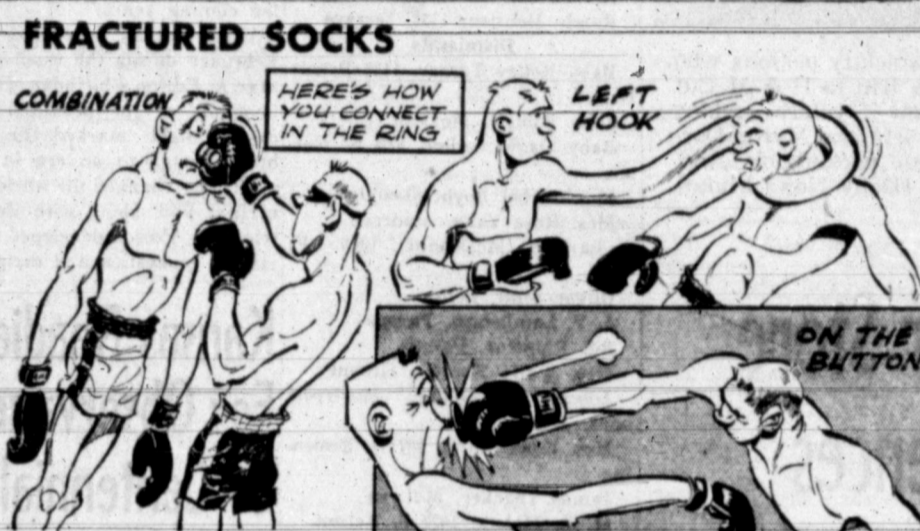

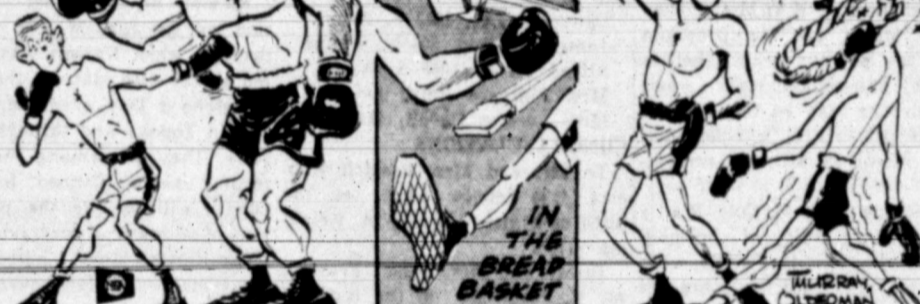

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Says He Was Karloff's Double

Secrecy Blankets Weird Acts Of Burglar, Killer

SANTIAGO, Chile (UPI) — Official secrecy today veiled the case of one of the weirdest criminals in Chilean police annals — a confessed burglar and murderer who says he was once a double for actor Boris Karloff.

Neither police nor Judge Maria O'Neill, the woman in charge of the investigation, would comment officially on the possibility that Benjamin Haebig Torrealba is mentally unbalanced, or on newspaper speculation that he may be covering up for "somebody rich and powerful."

It was reliably reported, however, that police have ordered systematic excavation of the carefully tended garden where Haebig has admitted burying two men in graves he said he dug before murdering them.

A third body, of which Haebig disclaims knowledge, also has been unearthed, and it is uncertain what further investigation

may reveal. Haebig, a handsome 64-year-old man of commanding 4-foot-5-inch height, had been regarded as a "model citizen" and a leading executive in this South American capital.

Since returning here in 1949 after nearly 40 years abroad, Haebig has been manager of one leading hotel and assistant manager of another. During the same years, he told police this week, he committed at least 200 burglaries and two murders and organized a jewel-theft ring.

Among those Haebig says he robbed was Helen Lee Lassen, described as "an American multimillionaire." He says he stole a valuable diamond ring from Mrs. Lassen while she was staying in a hotel where he worked.

His story of his foreign experiences was even more fantastic. He said he had been a dancer, a white slaver, a Hollywood dou-

ble and the friend of a number of stars, and for three years an inmate of Sing Sing.

(U.S. authorities have no record of Haebig as a serviceman, a criminal or an actor. They did not exclude the possibility, however, that he used an alias.)

At least eight jewelers and an antique dealer here have been arrested since Haebig was taken into custody, apparently in connection with his alleged activities.

The men Haebig says he killed were an antique dealer named Leonidas Valencia Chacana and Milo Montenegro, a 35-year-old servant. Haebig described them as homosexuals whom he had been blackmailing.

The third man whose body was found in Haebig's garden has not been identified.

The motives for the murders were obscure.
