On Feb. 1, an 8½ per cent penalty and interest will be added. In other words, you can avoid any penalty whatsoever by paying your 960 taxes this month.

The tax assessor said the 1960 tax levy for Pampa amounted to \$621,127 and \$425,065 of that amount has been collected to date. The uncollected balance as of Jan. 1 was \$196,061. For the same period in 1959 the city had collected only \$370,035.

The percentage of tax collections for 1960 is about six per cent higher than for 1959. City tax officials said 68.3 per cent of city taxes have been paid compared to 62.2 per cent paid in for the same period in 1959.



It assures consideration for the will of the minority, whichever
