



CHRISTIANITY VS - COMMUNISM

"Then, and not until then, comes the End when Christ having abolished all other rule, authority and power, hands over the Kingdom to God the Father. Christ's reign will and must continue until every enemy has been conqured. The last enemy of all to be destroyed is death itself.

He hath put all things in subjection under His feet, but in the term "all things" it is quite obvious that God, Who brings them all under subjection to Christ, is Himself excepted. Nevertheless, when everything created has been made obedient to God, then shall the Son ackonwledge Himself subject to God the Father, Who gave the Son power over all things. Thus, in the End, shall God be wholly and absolutely God." -1 Corinthians 15:24-28 (Phillips' Translation)

Two conflicting powers have set out with the avowed purpose of conquering the world. And while their ultimate objective is the same, their inward nature, and their methods of warking are totally different. The two powers of which I speak are Christianity and Communisum. And while each of these opposing powers will win and lose many battles, the ultimate victory is described in the above Scripture. Not just because this statement is in the New Testament. It is in the Bible because it is God-Inspired and utterly true. Nations may rise and fall, the heathen may rage, our human systems will have their day and pass on, but God, all-wise, all-powerful, everlasting will have charge of the final Outcome!

1. Communisum is fighting against God while Christianity is cooperating with God. Communisum is atheistic, anti-God, totally depending upon human wisdom and cunning and the might of man. Christianity is wholly and completely centered in God, depending entirely upon divine wisdom and guidance, while working in full harmony with the nature and will of God. Comunisum may spread itself over the world, but a few dedicated men working with God always makes a majority. "Truth forever on the scaffold, Wrong forever on the Throne, But the scaffold sways the future, And beyond the dim unknown standeth God within the shadows keeping watch over His own."

Communisum advances by outside force and compulsion, while Christanity spreads by inner conviction and transformation.

That which is forced upon people against their will and better judgement is doomed from the beginning to utter failure. Changes brought about by an inner transformation of the human heart are permanent and triuphant. Communisum employs instruments of hate love, the open truth, and prosepective good will. Love is more and deceit. Christianity, when true to its nature, spreads itself by powerful than Hate, and every form of deciet must parade itself in the garments of Truth, else it would never deceive. Deception is a shame—only the truth is real.

3. Communisum enslaves the individual, while Christianity exhalts the worth and dignity of each human being.

Communistum makes the individual subservient to the state, the Communist party. Under their economic and political systems man is virtually a slave. Even in the intimate and personal matters of religion, education, and family life a man's freedom of choice is curtailed and ofttimes completely controlled. On the other hand, Christianity teaches that man was made in the image of God and holds a position just a little lower than the angels, and from the very beginning he was crowned with glory and honor. Man, every man, each separate man is worthy of dignity, honor, integrity, justice, love, respect, equality and freedom of self-determination under the wisdom and the guidance of God!

Some years ago I attended a fiercely contested game of football between Pampa and Amarillo. At the game there were three kinds of people: Some were yelling for Pampa, some for Amarillo, while others were moving through the crows yelling, "PEANUTS, POPCORN, CANDY." They had no interest in the outcome of the game. Well, here in Pampa, Texas, we have three kinds of people in this world-wide struggle.

I venture to say that a city the size of Pampa has a few out and out Communists or fellow-travelers. At the same time, thank God, we have thousands of citizens who are loyal, devoted, consecrated members of the Church who are yelling their hearts out for the world-wide cause of Christ! Then, of course, we have that large group of people who apparently have no interest in the final autcome of this universal struggle—just so long as they are free to sell their "Peanuts, Popcorn and Candy!" Whatever else you can say about them they will not be at church this Sunday! Apparently they have "sold down the river" this One Nation Under God, and the cause for which it stands!




