Geneva Meet Puzzles U. S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. diplomats brought back as much puzzlement as anything else from Geneva.

For example, they are asking themselves, what was the real reason for Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko's flat declaration that Russia would accept no international test ban inspections on her soil?

Gromyko's public reason was

that this would permit "espionage." But the American delegation had a hard time swallowing the idea that Gromyko really believed this.

Western proposals for test ban inspections within the Soviet Union, they said, actually would involve less than one-two-thirds of Soviet territory, leaving considerable room for a closed society.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk publicly suggested at Geneva that a more true reason might be a basic Kremlin decision to conduct more nuclear tests and therefore to oppose any test ban. But many U.S. officials believe the answer may be more complicated. Even that, involving internal Kremlin politics and cold war maneuvering still to be fathomed.

On general disarmament, Gromyko raised a similar inspection objection. Russia, as in the past would accept international inspection of troops and arms taken out of service, but no inspection of the number that remain. Under this system, Russia could demobilize several divisions with international verification and then could recruit the same number of divisions secretly.

Western disarmament proposals called for inspected, step-by-step disarmament over many years, planned so that at no time would either side have an advantage or the balance of power be upset.

Teddie Cheated On Test?

BOSTON (UPI) — Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy admitted today that in 1951 he withdrew from Harvard University at the request of school officials who found he arranged with a fellow freshman to take a test for him.

Kennedy disclosed details of the incident to Robert Healy, Washington correspondent for the Boston Globe.

The incident has been the subject of rumors for some time in Massachusetts where Kennedy is a candidate for the U.S. Senate seat vacated by his brother, the President, after he went to the White House.

Kennedy, 30, told Healy this story: "I entered Harvard in 1950 at the age of 18. During the second semester of my freshman year I made a mistake. I was having difficulty in one course, a foreign language."

"I became so apprehensive about it that I arranged for a fellow freshman friend of mine to take the examination for me in that course."

Statement Issued

Tooley Heads Recall Group

Citizens for Better Government, a heretofore informal organization, today issued a statement in which Joe Tooley, Pampa district, was named as acting chairman.

The group, according to the statement, has taken over in Pampa's City Hall controversy at the point where the Pampa Junior Chamber of Commerce left off.

The Jaycees said their job was completed with the filing of petitions asking for the recall of the mayor and four city commissioners.

Acting Chairman Tooley of the Citizens for Better Government

today issued this statement — its first and last statement — "until an election is held."

"Citizens for Better Government wishes everyone to know the full story about this group. This group is made up of citizens who came together to carry on when the Jaycees had finished circulating and filed the petitions for the recall election. Joe Tooley is acting chairman of this group.

There are over 100 people coming from all four of the wards and all walks of life who have attended these open meetings. Each person who has attended these meetings resides inside the city limits of Pampa and their names are on the tax rolls. They have the interest of the city at heart. The purpose of these citizens was to comply with that portion of Pampa City Charter which reads as follows:

"If it is proposed and submitted to recall all elective officers, then there shall be placed on said ballot under the question of recall the names of candidates to fill the vacancies proposed to be created by such election, but the names of such officers proposed to be recalled shall not appear on the ballot as candidates."

"Candidates have filed for mayor and each of the commissioner posts. Each of the persons have volunteered their services after being asked by a number of citizens living in their respective ward. There will be no further statement from this group until an election is called."

Pampa's City Commission tentatively has set a meeting for Monday morning in City Hall to make known its decision on action to be taken on petitions seeking the recall election.

Mayor E. C. Sidwell said today the petitions still were in the process of being collected. (See COMMISSION, Page 3)

Havana Radio Says Overthrow Effort Was At Instigation Of U.S.

HAVANA (UPI) — The 1,182 captured veterans of last year's abortive Cuban invasion pleaded guilty at the start of their trial Thursday, it was reported today.

All Havana morning newspapers said "the mercenaries admitted their crimes."

The Havana radio said in a broadcast heard in Miami that the prisoners were accused of having carried out a "treacherous attack" against the Cuban people at the "direct instigation of the imperialistic government of the United States."

(In another broadcast heard this morning, Havana said the first session of the trial was taken up mostly with a recitation of the charges against the prisoners.

(It said the captured men "confessed their crime and announced they wished to make no further statements."

(The broadcast said the first witness called to the stand was Capt. Pedro Luis Rodriguez, who was in charge of the prisoners after their capture at the Pigs' Bay landing point in Las Villas Province.

(He testified that he conducted an investigation of how the invasion brigade was trained and prepared for its landing on the Cuban south coast.

(Rodriguez produced two letters allegedly written by Capt. Jose A. San Roman, one of the top commanders of the invasion force. One of the letters was addressed to Premier Fidel Castro, asking him to publish the contents of the second letter "so as many of my friends as possible, here in Cuba as well as abroad, can read it and know the truth."

The second letter was an appeal by San Roman to his friends to abandon their fight against the Cuban government.

(One paragraph in the letter, according to the broadcast, said that "Yankee propaganda distorted the truth about Cuba and the unity and enthusiasm of all the Cuban people behind their revolutionary government.")

Western newsmen were barred from the military trial, which apparently is being held in a court yard of Havana's heavily-guarded Principe prison.

OAS Commandos Escape Maneuver By French Army

ALGERS, Algeria (UPI) — Hundreds of Secret Army Organization (OAS) commandos were reported today to have evaded a French army cordon around their stronghold in suburban Babel Oued.

Reliable sources said 450 OAS fighters escaped under cover of night through sewers, and are hiding with European sympathizers in other parts of Algiers. They were said to have fled in 150 groups of three men each.

The army lifted the curfew and opened the barriers around Babel Oued Thursday after nearly a week of house-to-house searching for OAS members. The area was cordoned off last Saturday after a siege of fierce fighting between European civilian extremists and French troops.

The OAS wants to keep Algeria French and is trying to sabotage the cease-fire between France and Moslem nationalists. Authorities fear the OAS is organizing a plan among its 6,000 commandos to obstruct the work of the provisional executive that will govern Algeria until full independence is achieved in six months.

Police said Thursday night that large quantities of guns, ammunition and explosives were confiscated.

The OAS-called strikes that have plagued Algiers all week were dying out and commercial life was returning to normal.

It was also announced that the Amarillo Air Force Band will be in Pampa to march and play in the rodeo parade.

Supreme Court Tip To Left Is Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy's choice to replace physically exhausted Justice Charles Evans Whittaker is expected to tip the balance of a liberal-conservative conflict on the Supreme Court.

Whittaker's resignation, submitted on his doctor's orders, stirred the flurry of Washington speculation which inevitably precedes the selection of a Supreme Court justice.

Kennedy, who will be filling his first vacancy on the high bench, told his news conference Thursday he would announce his choice "shortly." But he refused to be

drawn out publicly on Whittaker's successor.

Among the names which cropped up immediately, however, were two cabinet members, Abraham Ribicoff, secretary of health, education and welfare and Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg; United Nations official Ralph Bunche, a Negro; Harvard law school professor Paul A. Freund, a noted authority on constitutional law; Solicitor General Archibald Cox, and Deputy Atty. Gen. Byron White.

There also was some talk of two prominent federal appeals judges—Henry J. Friendly of the

2nd Circuit which has jurisdiction in New York and New England, and David L. Bazelon of the District of Columbia bench.

Since Kennedy took office, Sens. Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., and J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., have been mentioned as potential Supreme Court timbers.

Kennedy's nomination of Whittaker's successor — who will be subject to Senate confirmation — may well determine the course of the court during the remainder of his stay in the White House and beyond.

In recent terms, there has been an almost even balance between a so-called conservative wing of four members led by Justice Felix Frankfurter and a liberal bloc of four with Justice Hugo Black as chief spokesman. Justice Potter Stewart, the newest member of the court, has played the role of swing man in a number of 5-4 decisions.

Whittaker, whose resignation becomes effective Monday, was considered a member of the conservative group. It believes the court and the federal government should be restrained in the role they play in American life. The liberal four feel that the courts and the executive branch of the government have authority to play greater role in safeguarding civil rights and other individual liberties.

The general belief was that Kennedy would lean toward naming a new justice who would fit in with the liberal philosophy and nail down five-vote control for that side of the bench.

Whittaker's resignation came after five years on the high court. He had entered Walter Reed Army Medical Center March 6 physically exhausted. He advised the President several days ago that physicians said a return to the bench would jeopardize his health.

His forced resignation at age 61 underscored the heavy workload which has piled up on judges at every level in recent years.

Turndown Of 'Deke' Upset The Astronauts

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The seven Mercury astronauts now are beginning to "simmer down a little."

But the fact is, a source close to them said today, that "they were damned upset" about the abrupt withdrawal a couple of weeks ago of Donald K. Slayton as prime astronaut for the next orbital flight in the Mercury man-in-space series.

They were sufficiently upset, it was learned, to enter a plea in Slayton's behalf with President Kennedy. No longer, apparently, came it, because Slayton still is grounded.

Slayton, a 38-year-old Air Force major, was picked last year to follow Marine Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr. into orbit. Glenn flew three times around the earth

Feb. 20. Another three-orbit flight is scheduled for May.

Some time in the first two weeks of March Slayton was told by his superiors in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) that he was being "re-evaluated." On March 15 he was summoned to Washington.

He, and the public, learned that day that he had been disqualified for the second orbital flight because of an intermittent heart flutter NASA had known about since November, 1959.

Slayton himself feels he was the victim of a ruling that should not have been made. He disclosed this Thursday in a letter to Mayor Ralph Osborne of Sparta, Wis., his home town, he said: "I feel the situation developed through ignorance of the problem and resulting panic, and can therefore best be resolved through education of responsible personnel."

He made it clear, however, that he would stay with the manned space-flight program. NASA officials have said he will get a later orbital mission if stress tests prove it would not endanger him.

Slayton was stunned by his disqualification — "damned disappointed," as he put it. A lot of other people were surprised, to say the least. Among these was Dr. Hugh L. Dryden, deputy director of NASA.

Pampan Admits Long Series Of Local Burglaries

Solution to a score of Pampa burglaries since last October came late yesterday after the day-long questioning of a prime suspect by Patrolman Don Aycock of the Pampa police department and Texas Ranger Bill Henslee.

The announcement was made today by Police Chief Jim Conner who said Patrolman Aycock and Ranger Henslee had obtained a confession from 18-year-old Robert Eugene Mitchell, 812 Octavius, who already is charged with burglary of the Pampa Concrete Co. offices on March 8 this year.

Chief Conner said Mitchell implicated another man in all but two of the 20 burglaries in which he admitted taking part. Mitchell and the suspects were expected to be questioned further today about the 20 burglaries and other still unsolved burglary cases. Chief Conner stated.

FBI Charges Estes With Fraud

Pecos, Tex. (UPI)—Billie Sol Estes, a young West Texas agricultural tycoon, whose businesses may be worth \$150 million, tried to raise \$500,000 bond today to get out of jail on a federal fraud charge.

West Texas businessmen said the arrest of Estes and three associates by FBI men could affect the economy of West Texas and hurt the credit standing of thousands of farmers. A wave of public sympathy developed for Estes.

Estes refused to make any public statement after his arrest.

Estes, 37, promised to raise the money today.

FBI agents arrested him at his Pecos mansion Thursday, shortly after he returned from a three-day conference with representa-

tives of 12 finance and insurance companies in Dallas.

FBI agents arrested three of Estes' associates in Amarillo and Lubbock. Their bonds were set at \$250,000 each. At last report they still were in jail.

The 12 finance and insurance companies hold an estimated \$22 million worth of chattel mortgages signed by West Texas farmers for anhydrous ammonia fertilizer tanks sold by Estes and his associates.

The government charged that Estes, Coleman McSpadden, 47, of Hereford, Tex., and Harold Orr and Rual Alexander of Amarillo, conspired to transport an altered, forged or falsely made chattel mortgage from Hudspeth County.

in West Texas to Los Angeles, last Oct. 15.

Four Texas assistant attorneys general arrived today with court authority to inspect Estes' books and records.

Estes recently estimated his personal worth at \$6 million. He made his first million when he was 30. He recently told a Pecos businessman that he owns 40 companies.

J. C. Wilson, president of Texas Cotton Industries of Pecos, said the economic effects of the arrest of Estes and his associates could be far-reaching, touching many with the incident.

"This will affect the credit of farmers of the whole community," Wilson said.

Arriving from Dallas Thursday, Estes said: "They (loan compa-

nies) have what is supposed to be one of the best public relations men in the country to do the talking. Legally or technically it would be foolish for me to say anything." That was before his arrest.

The Pecos Daily News, which Estes owns, reported his arrest in today's edition under a three-column headline, giving it equal display with the weather.

The semi-weekly Pecos Independent, which bitterly opposes him, printed an extra and reported his arrest under a banner headline. Afraid of what Estes sympathizers might do, employees of the paper printed the extra with a shotgun and two other guns handy.

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Television's never-ending search for subjects that will offend no one hit a new high Thursday night on NBC. A fearless portrait of U.S. Highway No. 1.

Apparently the idea behind this one-hour special, narrated by Van Heflin, is that if it is a success, there are endless sequel possibilities, such as Highway No. 2, No. 3, ad infinitum, not to mention fa-

mous side roads and alleys of our time.

The show, "U.S. No. 1: American Profile," had its moments—but hardly any of them were due to the script or Heflin, both childishly sentimental about the 2,400-mile Eastern Seaboard route.

The saving graces were the interesting ordinary people who were interviewed—a lobster fisherman in Maine, a swamp boatman in Georgia—and camera work that savored the flavor of the states along the way.

Heflin was concerned that U.S. 1 soon will be replaced by a new road full of interchanges, and that people might not see as much, He thought of the show as a "requiem" to a highway. That's a noble thought, but I do trust that those involved with the program have heard of the airplane, which ac-

The "U.S. 1" peg was really weak. The show strayed to anything interesting within reasonable distance of the highway—Yale University and midtown Manhattan, where a cab driver noted, "These parking lots is (sic) a menace to our city."

At the end, Heflin told us that Highway 1 cannot, will not, be replaced in most hearts. Really—that's what he said. He also said, "We've seen much — perhaps learned even more." Well, we saw much, but the following sample should indicate how much we learned:

At Key West, Fla., we were shown a few street signs, the house where Ernest Hemingway wrote "For Whom the Bell Tolls," and were informed that the city is south of Cairo, Egypt.

"This, then, is Key West," said Heflin. Really? All of it? These ridiculous touches detracted from an often lovely portrait of Americana. And, amazingly enough, in its entire study of U.S. 1, the show somehow managed to overlook such cursory details as when it was built, why, by whom and other minor matters.

Ruling Appealed In Haley Case

DALLAS (UPI) — U.S. Atty. Barefoot Sanders has ap-pealed a ruling in which U.S. Dist. Judge T. Whitfield David-son, 85, held that the U.S. Su-preme Court had no jurisdiction in the J. Evetts Haley Jr., wheat allotment case.

Davidson favored Haley, of Amarillo, Tex., in his Feb. 2 ruling, saying the highest court did not have jurisdiction in over-riding him. Davidson said the case should have gone through the 5th Circuit Court in New Orleans.

Sanders appealed again directly to the Supreme Court.

Davidson ruled that the farmer had a constitutional right to feed his cattle grain that the farmer raised himself.

In 1956 Haley raised 43 acres of wheat on his farm in Sequoyah County, Okla. The government said he harvested 473 bushels of wheat, despite the fact that he did not have a single acre of wheat allotment.

Haley fed the wheat to his cat-tle. The government filed suit, seeking to collect a penalty of \$1.07 per bushel, a total of \$506.11, on a charge Haley violated the national wheat allotment act.

The case has been under appeal since that time.

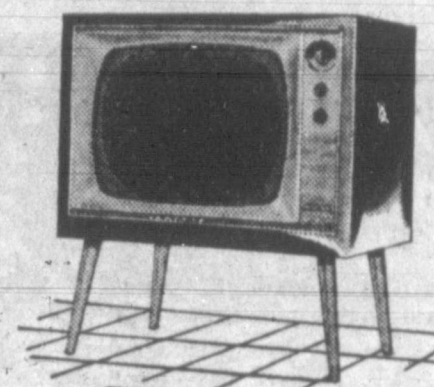

Solons To See JFK On Federal Aid Irregularities

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two congressional investigators today planned to talk over with President Kennedy the question of how much information they should have on alleged foreign aid irregularities.

Chairman Porter Hardy Jr. of a House watchdog committee, and Rep. John S. Monagan, D. Conn., one of his fellow investigators, were prompted to see Kennedy today by an incident that arose over the air program in Cambodia.

Hardy complained that the State Department and the foreign aid agency held back vital information during an inquiry into the use of American supplies to help build a Russian-sponsored hospital in the southeast Asian country.

Hardy's subcommittee wanted documents from official files dealing with the problem. The State Department and the aid agency agreed to make the files available, but without the names of the foreign service officers who wrote and signed the papers.

Hardy refused to accept them that way and was finally given the documents complete with the names.

Other congressional news: Bonds: Congressional leaders were near agreement with the White House on a compromise United Nations bond proposal. Reports indicated the compromise would involve some form of short-term financing, as proposed by the Republicans, in an effort to avoid a 25-year bond plan.

Trade: Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., said in a statement that "it is time for a complete review of our strategic export policies." He said testimony before a subcommittee studying trade with the Soviet bloc shows "we have been helping the Kremlin to overcome many of its most critical weaknesses in the field of military-industrial technology."

Even Corpses Are Subject To Red Control

BERLIN (UPI)—Even corpses are subject to Communist controls when they cross through the Communist-built wall dividing the city. West Berlin customs authorities said Thursday their East Berlin counterparts now demand a customs certificate for bodies from East Germany destined for burial in West Berlin and vice-versa.

The certificate requires inspection of the coffin to make sure the contents fit the certificate—that is, that the coffin does not contain a live person trying to cross the border illegally.

\$500 Bond Set On 2 Charges

Bond was set at \$500 on two separate charges against Freddie Pierce, 743 Brunson, yesterday when he pleaded not guilty to each charge before County Judge Bill Craig.

The complaints were signed by his wife, Diane, for aggravated assault and wife desertion.

DECATUR, Ga. (UPI)—Otto Orkin, who made millions killing household pests, has sued his bride of 17 months for divorce.

In a suit filed in DeKalb Superior Court Thursday, the 73-year-old former pest-control king claimed his wife "nagged and fussed continuously," hit him and "embarrassed and humiliated him otherwise by her conduct."

Mrs. Eve Tanner Claxton Orkin, 40, a secretary who married her boss in November 1960, was given 30 days in which to answer the suit.

Orkin, a Latvian immigrant, began his career at the age of 14 as a "rat killer." The business expanded rapidly, and shortly before his marriage he sold his interest in the firm for more than \$5 million.

Thursday was devoted to the reading of the indictment against the prisoners. They are being tried in a body rather than individually.

Havana radio said the defendants were accused of launching a "treacherous attack" on Cuba at the "direct instigation of the imperialistic U. S. government."

About 1,000 anxious relatives and friends of the prisoners milled outside the prison gates all day and far into the night, ignoring repeated pleas from the warden to leave the area. The crowd finally broke up about midnight. Hundreds of others went to church to pray for the prisoners.

The defendants, all Cuban, comprise the bulk of the force that surrendered after 72 hours when their food and ammunition ran out. Five of their number were executed for "common crimes" in September and nine were sentenced to 30-year prison terms.

Sadlers' Tax Claims Reported

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. S. Tax Court records revealed Thursday that the government has back income tax claims totalling \$89,147.55 against Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler and his wife, Laura.

In addition, the records showed that the Internal Revenue Service is trying to collect \$36,111.38 in penalties for 1956.

Sadler, from Percilla, Tex., says the government claim is false and, in reality, he is due a refund because he paid more than he owed.

The IRS billed the Sadlers last July 5 for the tax deficiencies and penalties. The Sadlers contested the IRS findings and petitioned for a determination in the tax court Sept. 29, 1961. The IRS in turn answered the petition on Nov. 7, 1961, and the Sadlers responded to the answer Dec. 18.

The government contended the Sadlers underpaid their 1954 income taxes by \$14,995.41; their 1955 taxes by \$126.42; their 1956 taxes by \$72,222.76 and their 1957 taxes by \$1,802.96.

Woman Walks 25 Miles To Get Help For Child

HOUSTON (UPI) — Mrs. Jane Massey, her face flushed and her feet and legs grey with dust, could hardly climb the steps of the wooden barracks that serve as Jefferson Davis Hospital's pediatric clinic.

Her rough, red hands trembled from muscle fatigue when she handed Van Arnold Massey, her blond, blue-eyed one-year-old son, to an intern for examination.

The boy, his face reddened and his lips festered with blisters, weighed 25 pounds. The doctor at first found it hard to believe that Mrs. Massey had carried the child to an intern for examination.

"He had an awful temperature," she said, blinking back tears. "It was 102 degrees yesterday before I broke the thermometer."

"We looked all day the day before trying to find someone to drive us to the hospital. No one would help us."

"I just couldn't help it. I just had to come down here to the hospital."

The doctors said the little boy has measles and complications. Neurologists were called to make tests because it was feared that uremia might have set in.

Mrs. Massey, 26, who has five other children, said she lives near Humble, 25 miles east of Houston.

News about the marathon mercy walk spread around the city-county hospital clinic late Wednesday when she and the boy arrived.

A receptionist brought a sandwich and coffee for dinner. A nurse dug into her purse and gave Mrs. Massey some change, and added, "that's all I've got, but it might help."

Mrs. Massey lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Manning, and two sisters, in a one-story frame house on a wooded acreage off old River Road one and a half miles "the other side" of Humble.

She said her husband, an insulator workman, deserted her for the fifth and last time a year ago. They had married when she was 17, she said.

the Christmas lamb when he was 13 years old, he had made \$38,000 at farming by the time he was 18, and was a millionaire at 30. In 1953 he was honored by the National Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of the 10 outstanding young men in America.

Estimates of the gross worth of his enterprises run as high as \$150 million. Should they collapse, the consequences would be felt from coast to coast, and most heavily in West Texas.

When he left Dallas after his long, closed-door conference with the finance companies, Estes said:

"Legally or technically, it would be foolish for me to say anything."

U.S. Commissioner Richard Toll arraigned Estes shortly after his arrest and set his bond at \$500,000. Estes remained at the Reeves County courthouse for three hours, trying to raise his bond. He talked with several friends, but none provided the \$500,000 and he was taken to the county jail.

McSpadden was taken into custody at Lubbock, and jailed in lieu of \$250,000 bond. He is president of Consolidated Grain Co. at Amarillo, the key firm in Estes' \$5 - million - bushel, federally-licensed grain storage business.

Orr and Alexander were jailed at Amarillo in lieu of \$250,000 bond each. Bishop said the mortgages "are bona fide contracts. Nearly every one of them is being paid as agreed."

Walter E. Heller & Co. of Chicago holds at least \$7 million worth of the mortgages; CIT, New York, holds \$5 million; Pacific Finance, \$3 million; Commercial Credit Corp., Baltimore, \$1.5 million; Associate Investments, South Bend, Ind., \$1.5 million; First Acceptance Corp., Minneapolis, \$1.5 million; Kuykendall Investment, West Texas, \$1.5 million.

Other firms holding anhydrous ammonia tank mortgages include Pioneer Finance, Detroit, Mich., \$500,000 or more; Caprock Investments, West Texas, \$500,000 or more; D&M Investments, West Texas, \$500,000 or more; Southwest Investments, Amarillo, Tex., \$250,000 or more, and Humphries Investment, West Texas, \$250,000 or more.

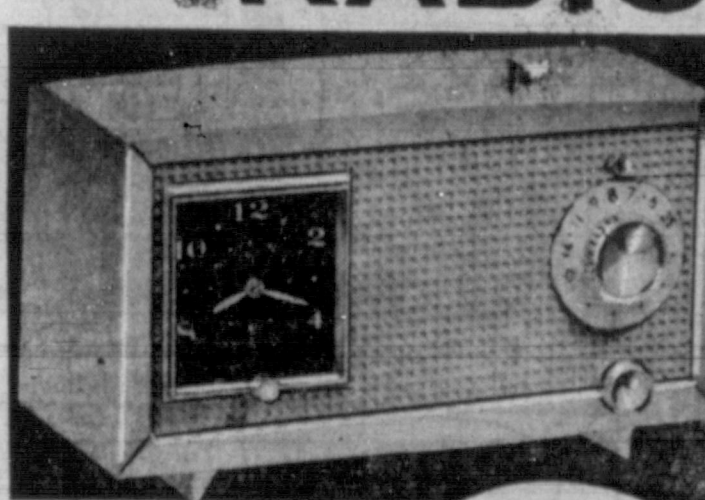

Miracle Diets Useless For Thickening Writer

By PATRICIA McCormack NEW YORK (UPI) — I'm fed with diets that don't work.

Included are the low-fat, the high-fat, the prune-grapefruit diet, the all-banana diet, a calorie-counting diet, the no-forie counting diet — ad nauseum.

What we hefty females need is pill that fattens the will — pow!

If the men of science can give that, they can leave the dieting to us.

For nearly two years now, I've tried a day or two at a time actually every diet that's recommended. My blubber remains denied. I'm still flabby because I will power's still flabby.

Oh, I can push myself away from the table, eat smaller portions and skip desserts. What happens before I get to the table next time is the main trouble.

I've tried all sorts of psychological tricks — including tricking myself into believing I'm saving.

Two days in a row I tried my miracle two-jelly bean breakfast — and managed to last unlunch.

On this diet you have two jelly beans with your fruit juice and coffee. Or two peanuts. Or two something a person on a diet is supposed to eat. This gives a psychological lift. Having two of the touchables demonstrates will power.

The lift broke down the third day. I had four jelly beans. But that didn't matter. By then, I was trying out a new diet.

Some trickery, practiced frequently enough, probably would work — provided that will-power pill came along.

Before the two jelly bean breakfast diet, I was on a tomato juice supper diet. What you do is sip juice — a quart or more — while the rest of the family eats supper. This fills the stomach.

The trick is to get to bed and go to sleep before the tummy becomes empty again. This is easy if you are tired.

It's easy also if the house is very cold by the time hunger pangs awaken you in the middle of the night. You just stay in bed and starve rather than make the trip to the kitchen and refrigerator, risking the chance of catching the death of cold.

Mentally, I've also found that a female on a crash diet can get a lift if she uses a scale that doesn't work too well. You know, the kind that can't be used where legal weights matter.

I once found I could lose two pounds a day just by standing on such a scale a different way. If I stood on it with heels rather than toes pointed to the dial, I lost just one pound. But by standing on old unreliable on tip-toe I shed all of two pounds in a wink.

WHAT IS GOD?

Recently on a coast-to-coast television network, one of the nation's leading, present-day philosophers gave his personal views about God. The man said that he believed God to be a supreme being, but not the creator of the universe. He stated further that God had no regard or thought about man. This poor, deceived man is leaning on the fickle arm of natural rationalism to formulate his doctrine rather than leaning on the immutable, omnipotent Word of God. This is understandable because the Bible states, "The natural (ie. unsaved) man received not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them because they are spiritually discerned." (1 Cor. 2:14).

To ascertain what God is let us turn to the time-honored Book of God. 1 John 4:8 reads "... God is love." Of course, volumes have been written to define God, but for our purposes this divinely inspired, one word definition will suffice.

Love is the very essence of God. Now for love to exist, there must be two factors involved; the lover and the object of the lover's affection. If God is the lover, what is the object of His love? Other Refs Might Be In Game-Fixing

AUSTIN (UPI)—The head of a state legislative investigating committee said Thursday night that officials from states neighboring Texas as well as Southwest Conference basketball referees may be involved in game-fixing scandals.

State Rep. Charles Ballman, chairman of the Texas House General Investigating Committee, made the statement at the end of an all-day, closed door meeting of the group.

He would not elaborate, but said the committee instructed the Texas Department of Public Safety to "proceed immediately with a full-scale investigation."

The DPS has been investigating the situation for some time. Appearing before the committee Thursday were conference executive secretary Howard Grubbs and supervisor of officials Ab Curtis.

Also testifying were basketball coaches Johnnie Frankie of Rice, Buster Brannon of Texas Chris-

tian, and Harold Bradley of Texas, and former Texas Tech coach Polk Robison. Robison is now athletic director at Tech.

Ballman said none of the referees was asked to testify at this time.

The committee will continue to look into the matter, Ballman said. He said another hearing will be held "as soon as additional information is obtained and constructive results can be obtained."

He said the next hearing may be called before May 5, the date of the first primary elections in the state.

A spokesman for the Browns said Ninowski's refusal to join the team may have been his first reaction. Brown was scheduled to meet with Ninowski at a Detroit airport later today.

Ninowski said, "I owe him the courtesy of meeting him." Plum and Brown had been at odds since he criticized the Cleveland coach's system of sending in plays from the bench. Some observers felt that was one of the reasons he was put on the trading block.

Ferrier was a little wild on the front side having three birdies and two bogeys. But he settled down on the backside and went four under par.

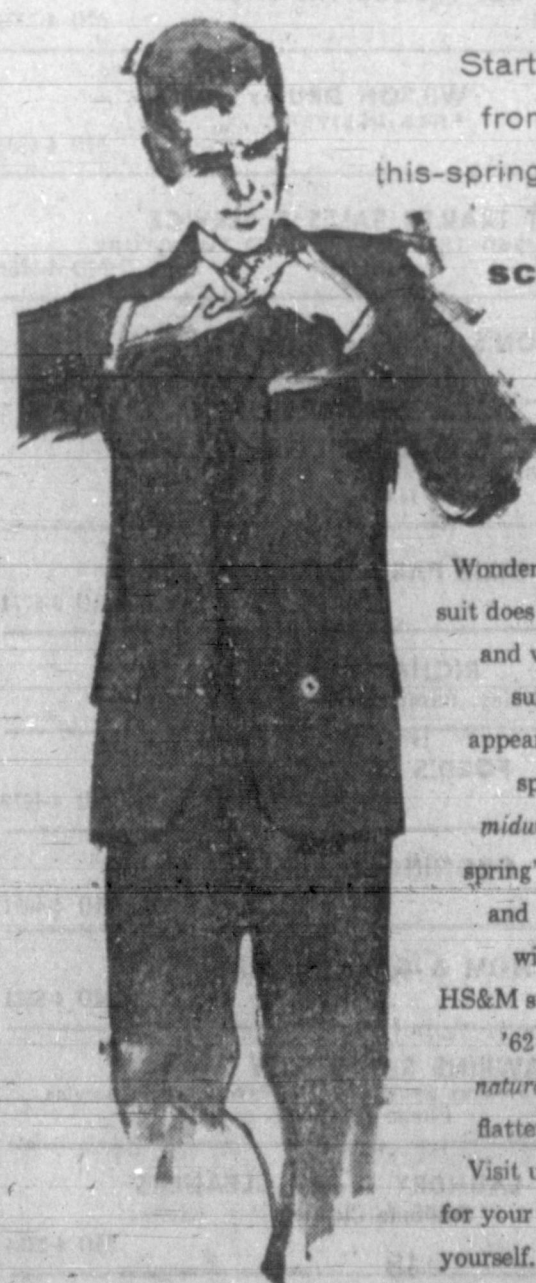

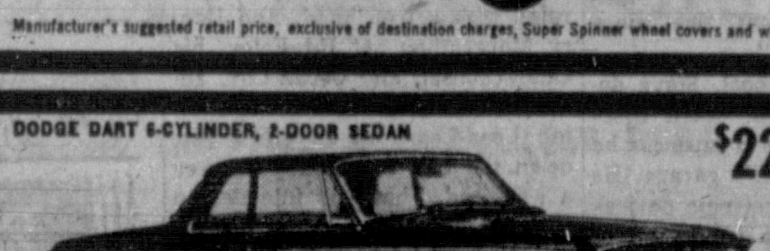

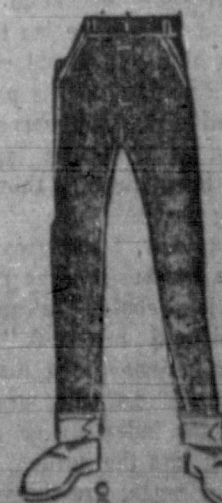

Truck Driver Helped In Escapes

BERLIN (UPI) — West Berlin honored this week a truck driver who was reported to have helped more Germans escape to the West than any other individual in East Germany.

The driver, Heinz Jercha, 28, was shot to death Tuesday night by Communist police in the tunnel that he and a tiny band of West Berlin workers dug under the dividing wall the Communists put up across the city Aug. 13.

An informed source told United Press International that Jercha was a hero who helped more East Germans escape to the West than any other single man.

The source said Jercha, who drove a meat truck and his friends brought more than 35 refugees to West Berlin through their tunnel under the wall in about a month.

Until now, the largest known number of refugees escaping to West Berlin via a single route was last Jan. 24 when 28 persons crawled through a tunnel from East Germany.

Jercha was gunned down after he and a partner led one East

Northern Plains Getting Plenty Of Wind Damage

WASHINGTON, (UPI) — The USDA's current report of the 1961-62 blow season in the Great Plains shows 618,420 acres of land damaged so far this season. The blow season runs from Nov. 1 through May 31.

Of the total land damaged, 412,345 acres, or 67 per cent, were in the northern great plains, and 206,075 acres in the southern great plains.

Texas reported 131,025 acres, or 64 per cent, of the land damaged in the Southern Plains. Montana reported 144,190 acres and North Dakota 114,600 acres damaged in the Northern Plains. The total for Montana and North Dakota was 63 per cent of the land damaged in the Northern Plains.

Other damage was in Colorado, 18,000 acres; Kansas, 37,760 acres; New Mexico, 6,590 acres; and Oklahoma, 14,700 acres in the Southern Plains; and Nebraska, 33,550 acres; South Dakota, 99,440 acres; and Wyoming, 20,565 acres in the Northern Plains.

Land in condition to blow was estimated at 4,632,820 acres.

The Easter season should bring joy and hopefulness, but in the Lenten period it is also appropriate for the believer to contemplate the significance of suffering and to interpret in adequate terms this universal experience.

This is particularly true in times of tension and crisis. Certainly the extent of human suffering is such as to sensitize us to

the need for greater faith and faithfulness. The world is in transition. The individual Christian must relate himself in one way or another to the mighty forces that influence our times. His faith must be more than personal. It should reflect a consciousness that the world's life as a whole is affected by this faith.

When applied to the national responsibilities which the United States is carrying, a robust faith will produce unity and power. We must accept our share of the world's suffering in fellowship and love. Unity will grow out of such

attitudes. Concern for others who suffer will thus bring strength and eventual oneness to the human family.

Paradoxically, the Lenten lessons for the individual produce on his part a greater degree of sympathy for others and a greater awareness of suffering by others. As Emil Brunner put it, "Suffering that is of destiny unites us."

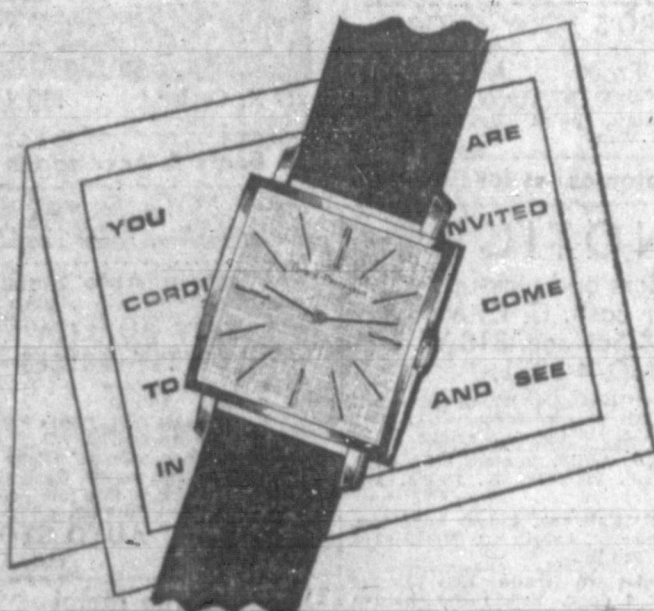
