



By DR. HAROLD T. HYMAN Each of us gets a bellvache at some time or other. With some it's only an occasional complaint, Others of us are chronic belly-

Most often the cause for the bellyache is obvious: a dietary indiscretion, an attack of the trots, an incomplete bowel evacuation, menstrual cramps, irritation from a powerful carthartic that appears "mild" because it's dispensed in a tiny pill or as candy medication, or an emotional reaction to strain, such as an upcoming examination, wedding or operation. Now it would be unrealistic to

consult your doctor each time you have a bellyache despite the fact that what appears to be a likely explanation for distress may be merely a coincidental happening. Thus, you might have an attack of acute appendicitis while you were constipated, menstructing or under emotional strain. Or after an unrelated dietary indiscretion, a thorough "cleaning out" or an episode of diarrhea. Despite these reservations, you





### Half Million In Jewels Taken In **Newark Robbery** By EDWARD H. SPENCER

NEWARK, N.J. (UIP) - Three stocking-masked gunmen smashed through the front door of a downtown jewelry store Wednesday night and escaped with diamonds valued at up to half a million

Police called it the biggest jewelry holdup in Newark's his-

The bandits, wearing multicolored stocking masks, broke Z into the Busch & Sons Jewelry Store just as three employes were placing two trays of diamond rings into a safe.

One of the gunmen stood at the door and shouted, "This is a holdup." The two others swiftly grabbed the trays and all three dashed to a car parked at the curb and escaped.

"They moved so fast, we hardly had time to think," said Charles Adams of Brooklyn, N.Y., the store's accountant,

Police Capt. James T. Waldron estimated the take at between on \$400,000 and \$500,000 in diamond rings. He said to his knowledge it was "the largest jewelry rob-

bery" in the city's history. George J. Busch Jr. of Llewelyn Park, N.J., the store's president and owner, estimated that as many as 500 diamond rings may have been taken. Some of the rings were worth several thousand dollars each, he said. Busch said the holdup was the first at the store since it opened 87 years

An 11-state alarm was broadcast for the bandits who police said escaped in a car stolen earlier from a Union, N.J., man. The car was found shortly after the holdup abandoned five blocks from the store.
