Nation Must Step Up Fight On Cancer, Heart Disease WASHINGTON (UPI) - Some

of the top U.S. specialists on cancer and heart disease told President Kennedy today that the nation must step up its attack on both ailments or face further increases in their huge toll of death and disability.

President Kennedy Told-

The President's Conference on Heart Disease and Cancer, composed of 22 leading experts, said the two maladies are the combined cause of two out of every three American deaths today.

cer, they said in a report to the President, stems from "environmental hazards" including radiation and cancer-producing substances which "can be isolated from air and from water pollutants to which large populations .. are exposed."

"Tobacco smoke is an individual form of such pollution, and a particular cancer hazard," the report said.

The conference was headed by Boisfeuillet Jones, special assistant to the secretary of health, education and welfare.

Its members included Dr. I. S. Ravdin, prominent cancer surgeon from the University of Pennsylvania, and Dr. Paul Dudley White, famed heart specialist from Boston who treated former President Dwight . "Eisenhower after his 1955 coronary attack. The report, presented to Ken-

nedy at the White House, called for "a much higher level of federal appropriations in support of medical research" on the two diseases. It also urged big boosts in voluntary contributions.

The specialists strongly endorsed the President's recommendation for federal scholarships for talented but needy medical students. Its major proposals centered upon a need for expanded research.



Telephone researchers probe for new electronic aids

to serve you better

When I asked him to describe tomorrow's communications services, Dick Goodson, who heads up Southwestern Bell's Texas operations, smiled and said, "The only definite answer I can give you is that they won't be like today's."

DIAL-IN-HAND PHONE is a new instrument undergoing tests. New telephone's dial, complete with night light, is easier to see and operate. When handset is placed in its cradle or mounting, the phone looks smooth, oval.



ECHO SATELLITE, still orbiting the earth, proved itself as a space communications vehicle when scientists successfully bounced phone calls off its surface. Bell System plans a satellite relay system for world-wide communications, including television. First station of system is expected to be in space this year.

PICTUREPHONE, which relays image of telephone callers when they activate set by pushing a button, is an amazing technical breakthrough. Looking Sideways By WHITNEY BOLTON

NEW YORK - A man I know is a salesman for children's hats. He works for the manufacturer, traveling to other cities and selling to department stores and children's wear stores. He weighs about 180 pounds, is tall, rugged. But on his arm are the tattooed numbers that tell his story. He is a survivor of Buchenwald. When he was rescued, in the waning days of World War II, he weighed 90 pounds. He was a rack of bones with hot, fevered eyes and a deep cough.

""Next Tuesday," he said the other night, "is a day I long have waited for, a day that has haunted my dreams. Adolf Eichmann goes on trial in Israel for his infamies - the deaths of and brutalities against hundreds of thousands of my people. That I lived is a miracle, that I am not maimed or diseased is another miracle. I know this man to be at best a sadist because with these two eyes I saw him at Buchenwald and heard him issue death orders as casually as you might ask one of your children to run to the corner store for a loaf of bread. There was no tension in him, no deliberateness, no directness. He flicked a swagger stick and said. 'A thousand today, yes? Positively?' He might have been speaking of almost anything, except the command extinction of a thousand human beings.

I asked him what the terror was like.

"Are there words?" he said. "Let me see. One bitterly cold morning I stood by a wooden cart, immobile, trying desperately not to be noticed, as some men came along pulling a hand cart filled with potatoes for the officers' mess. The cart lurched slightly in a frozen rut and one potato fell. I kept my eves on it as one would keep his eyes on a great treasure, a Kohinoor suddenly found. I dared not move, lest I be caught picking it up and be killed for it. One potato. To be killed for that. In time they turned the corner of a building and I started a carefully casual walk to the potato lying in the rut. Now I did not fear guards. I feared starving men and women who might, in their personal desperation, have killed me for it. But I got to it, looked around, then bent and picked it up and huddled it in my shabby clothing. I kept it next to me all day. When night came, I found a heating stove that was working and held the potato against it. I did not dare just put it on top of it to heat through. I had to keep my hand on it. In time, a long time, it heated, through. It was not really cooked, you know. Just heated through. The freeze was out of it. The frost. When it was almost too hot any longer to bear my. holding of it, I again huddled it next to me, walked quickly out of the building and stood out in the crippling cold of the night wolfing it down, bite by bite. I think that describes terror, if that kind of terror can be described. This one potato could doom me either to the guards or my poor fellow inmates, each starving and no longer capable of disciplined behav-

I was advised to take cod liver oil and after forcing down nearly a bottle the cracking seems even worse." And a nother correspondent, with a related problem, writes: "when I lift heavy things out of the washer, something in my chest has begun to crack. My husband can hear it crack. An

recently, my chest has started to hurt just where you hear the crack. Is this serious? The place is just below my breast. Could it turn to cancer?'

Cracking joints, as described by the first letter-writter, are of no medical importance. I've been a knuckle-cracker all my life. When I was young, I was warned that knuckle-cracking would lead to enlargements and deformities of the joints. It hasn't, but these morsels of misinformation have more lives than the proverbial cat.

NEW YORK (UPI) - The old image of small business as an abused doormat of industrial giants is being erased thanks to national defense and space exploration.

More than half of the funds Uncle Sam spends developing its military strength ends up in the coffers of firms employing less than 500 persons.

And the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has been allocating nearly half of its project dollars to small firms, including 16 per cent of its prime contract expenditures during the second half of 1960.
