Oil Tanker Breaks Up In Wake Of Vicious Storm

The 501-foot Liberian oil tanker Gem which normally carries a crew of 36 was snapped in two today in the storm-tossed Atlantic 100 miles southeast of Morehead, N.C.

The breakup occurred in the wake of a vicious East Coast storm that left at least 40 dead and damage estimated at \$100 million.

A Danish motor vessel, the Jyttes - Kou, radioed the Coast Guard at Portsmouth, Va., it was standing by the wrecked tanker but that only three crewmen could be spotted on the ship's floating bow.

Two other vessels fighting 25-

foot waves told the Coast Guard they were in no danger of sinking.

From sunny Florida to New York, thousands of persons were driven inland by the erupting sea which sent mountainous, gale-whipped waves pouring over beaches and into towns.

The Coast Guard reported two merchant ships were drifting helplessly off the coast of Virginia today. Storm-tossed seas threatened the freighter A. H. Dumont, without power 300 miles off Cape Charles, and the Chinese freighter Chung Lee, last reported without a rudder and with its hold flooded.

Two Coast Guard cutters and a Navy destroyer were attempting to reach the ships. The Coast Guard said it did not have late word from either vessel and did not know the exact location of the Chung Lee.

The erratic storm was expected to move harmlessly out to sea following its initial assault on Tuesday, but instead it swerved back for another lethal, day-long attack on coastal dwellers Wednesday. And in some areas more punishment was predicted for today.

The death toll from this and other storms raging across the nation since Tuesday has climbed to at least 40.

Authorities said they would be unable to get a clear, over-all picture of the damage until floodwaters recede, but preliminary estimates indicated destruction figures would be well over \$100 million.

H. Matt Adams, New Jersey commissioner of conservation and economic development, placed damage in his state at \$30 million but added "I think we're low in that estimate."

Douglas Moore Jr., a Virginia civil defense official, estimated that Virginia Beach alone suffered a "conservative \$15 million in damage." Damage to North Carolina's Outer Banks and the Maryland coast also was heavy.

While their homes and property were being lashed by the savage winds and floods, thousands of persons were forced to leave behind most of their possessions.

The Red Cross set up 37 shelters in 28 towns in New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia, providing for 5,350 persons. Between 5,000 and 7,000 persons were rescued from Virginia beaches, around 1,000 from the island community of Chincoteague, Va., where many residents were lifted off rooftops by amphibious vehicles.

About 1,500 persons escaped from the summer resort of Long Beach Island, N.J., but by late Wednesday night officials said about 300 residents still were marooned on the storm-wrecked island, a thin strip of sand which is less than a mile wide. Officials said the stranded victims were in serious need of medical supplies.

The 1,200 residents of another resort community, Ocean City, Md., were ordered to leave Wednesday, but some of them refused. State police field commander Maj. George E. Davidson said the entire area "looks like a lumber yard. It's utterly shocking," he declared.

The high winds and waves ripped a gash in the side of the 133-foot Chesapeake light ship at the mouth of Chesapeake Bay and the Navy rushed four vessels to aid the ship's 16 crewmen. The Coast Guard said early today the anchored ship "appeared to be

JFK And Khrushchev Postpone Planned Television Exchange

Press Secretary Says 'Atmosphere' Wrong

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev have mutually agreed to postpone their planned exchange of television speeches because the "right atmosphere" does not exist at present.

The White House said it was hoped that the exchange could be carried out later this year.

Press secretary Pierre Salinger, in a brief statement, announced the change of plans late Wednesday night. He would not discuss the origin of the mutual agreement to put off the exchange, which for the first time would have presented an American president to the Russian public. The plan also called for Khrushchev to appear on U.S. television screens.

Receipts totaled \$56,896.88 for the two sales held yesterday at Recreation Park on the closing day of the Top O' Texas Livestock Show.

Eighty-one fat calves in the Junior Livestock Sale held yesterday forenoon sold for a total of \$26,487.46, for an average price of \$327 per calf and 38 and one-half cents per pound.

Total sales for the hogs in the sale was \$8,218.42 for an average of \$79.25 per pig and 34 cents per pound.

Total receipts for the Junior Livestock Sale was \$34,706.88.

In the Hereford Breeders' sale yesterday afternoon, Wayne Maddox, Miami, sold the Grand Champion bull to Ellis Locke, Miami, for \$835.

The Reserve Champion bull, owned by J. P. Calliham, Conway, was sold to Robert Newton, Lark, for \$1,500.10.

Tomnie Potts, Memphis, sold the Grand Champion female to John A. Baggerman and Sons, Groom, for \$550.

The 50 head of bulls showed here yesterday brought a total of \$22,190, an average of \$443.80 per head. The only female in the show was the Potts entry.

Top price paid for a single bull in the Hereford Breeders' sale was \$1,500.10 paid to Calliham for his Reserve Champion. This was more than was paid for the Grand Champion of the show.

Up until noon today there had been no announcement by Junior Chamber of Commerce officials on the progress of the petitions seeking a recall election on Mayor E. C. Sidwell and Commissioners Lloyd Simpson and Newt Secrest in Wards 1 and 2.

Weed Control Firm Will Move Home Office Here

Pampa will become the headquarters for the administrative staff and operational control division of "Dick Evans, Inc.," a specialized service for weed control, it was announced today by Dick Evans, company president.

Moving of the home offices from Wichita, Kan., is expected to be completed by July 1. The company will direct its operations from a new steel building to be erected in the 2700-block of W. Alcock St.

Branch offices of the company are located in Odessa, Texas; Oklahoma City, Okla., and Great Bend, Kan.

Evans said Pampa was selected for location of the home offices after officials of the company had analyzed operational opportunities and community vigor of several potential locations.

He said attention first was called to Pampa by a former resident, Charles Powell, now district superintendent for Cities Service Gasoline Plant Division in Wichita. Later contacts, he said, were made by Ed Myatt, representing the Industrial Division of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce, and E. O. Wedgeworth, chamber manager.

"Research statistics," Evans said, "indicate the city is destined for economic growth and the obvious interest of the individual citizen in community problems is indicative of a healthy community spirit."

The company is recognized throughout the oil industry for its specialized service of weed control. It was organized by Evans in 1946 and was the original company to contract applications of chemicals for weed control in the oil patches.

Before forming the company Evans was active in the chemical and drug fields. He has also served as administrative assistant to the regional director of the Farm Credit Administration in Amarillo.

Evans stated that the move to Pampa would involve ten families of the administrative staff. He added that additional office and field help will be employed locally. He said the company's services cover an area bounded by South Dakota, the Gulf of Mexico, Kansas and the Rocky Mountains. A great percentage of the company's activities, Evans stated,

She went to National Airport about noon EST.

Mrs. Kennedy will go to New York aboard the family's private plane, the Caroline, where she will remain overnight and depart Friday at 7:30 p.m. EST for Rome.

The First Lady has been boning up with great interest on India and Pakistan, where she has never traveled before. All of her past good will visits—to Canada, to Europe and to Latin America—have been in the company of her husband.

200 Protest Active Duty Status

FT. POLK, La. (UPI)—At least 200 off-duty soldiers in civilian clothes gathered Wednesday night in front of the Ft. Polk Enlisted Men's Club to protest being held on active duty.

"They were just a bunch of boys who want to go home," he said.

"Maybe as many as 200 soldiers gathered in front of the service club. Some of them were there for normal purposes. Others undoubtedly came to have a meeting," West said.

Satellite Said Doing Good Job In Sun Studies

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — Reports indicate a complex new satellite fired into orbit around the earth Wednesday to conduct man's first direct studies of the sun from a platform in space is functioning well.

"It's working like a jewel," said one elated scientist of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Another reported the 458-pound satellite was "sending back information like crazy."

Scientists hope this study will produce a method for predicting solar flares. They believe these eruptions would make manned flight through space a lethal proposition on the average of one day out of 45.

POINT ARGUELLO, Calif. (UPI) — A top secret satellite, believed to be a Midas or Samos "sky spy," was successfully launched here Wednesday by the Air Force.

The Air Force said the satellite employed an Atlas-Agena B booster-rocket and carried "a number of classified components." Spokesmen would neither confirm nor deny that the shot was part of the "sky spy" program.

Previously, Midas and Samos vehicles have been fired from this Pacific missile range base.

A Samos carries extremely secret.

Argument Over Ordinance Flares In Perryton

PERRYTON (Sp) — A heated argument over the wording on a zoning referendum ballot occupied much of the time of the City Council at its regular meeting here Tuesday night.

The controversy stemmed from the ballot to be submitted to the voters at the regular city election on April 3.

The ballot reads: "FOR — Reasonable Zoning Regulation." "AGAINST — Reasonable Zoning Regulation."

The ballot also carries this statement: "If you desire to do so you may express any idea you may have on zoning in the space below."

Most of the objections raised were over the word "reasonable" in the statement of the proposition on the ballot.

Several visitors present at the meeting expressed the opinion the ballot should just read: "For or Against Zoning."

City Attorney Bob Lemon said a suggestion of Councilman Walter Lemaster to have the people vote on a zoning ordinance drawn by the zoning commission would not be legal.

When a vote was called for on the "For and Against Reasonable Zoning" wording on the ballot, Councilmen Travis Baker and Charlie Taylor voted "yes" and Councilmen Lemaster and George Clennan voted "no."

Councilman Homer Gruley, in the absence of Mayor Drew Ellis, broke the tie with a "yes" vote.

Sidney Jines, a citizen, arose after the vote and stated he had asked to be recognized before the vote was taken but his request apparently had not been heard by the chairman.

"I only wanted to say," Jines added, "that in my opinion the word 'reasonable' qualifies and confuses the ballot and I don't think it is right."

The council then voted to hold the referendum vote on the zoning matter in conjunction with the regular city election April 3 as a means of obtaining views of the citizens on zoning in Perryton.

Russian Church Heads To Host Archbishop

LONDON (UPI) — The Archbishop of Canterbury, head of the Church of England, has accepted an invitation to meet heads of the Russian-Orthodox Church in Moscow later this year, it was announced Tuesday. No date has been set.

The archbishop, the Rev. Dr. Michael Ramsey, also is scheduled to go to Istanbul May 2 as the guest of the Orthodox Patriarch of Constantinople and to stop at Athens for a call on the Greek Orthodox archbishop on his return trip, a Church of England spokesman said.

The Coast Guard in Charleston, S.C., Wednesday night abandoned the search for the 40-foot yawl Opinevere which was reported sinking Tuesday about 100 miles off the Georgia coast.

An English couple, Rodney and Heather Straulo, and an unidentified seaman aboard the vessel were presumed drowned. The roaring sea made search operations for the storm-tossed vessel all but impossible.

National Guard units were dispatched to devastated areas of New Jersey, Virginia and North Carolina to prevent looting.

New Jersey Gov. Richard J. Hughes wired the White House asking President Kennedy "as a matter of extreme urgency" to declare disaster areas in those regions where the state was most severely struck.

Other pleas for federal assistance were expected to pour into Washington from officials elsewhere along the battered coastline.

Some observers felt the shroud of secrecy surrounding the firings indicated that "sky spy" satellites have gone over Russia in polar orbits.



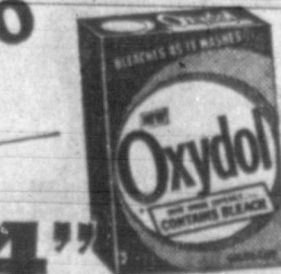

Net Income Of Farmers Is Up

WASHINGTON (UPI)— The Agriculture Department reports that realized net income of farmers in 1961 rose \$1 billion over 1960 because of a whopping increase in government payments and a substantial hike in cash receipts from farm marketings.

The net farm income of \$12.7 billion last year was 8 per cent above the \$11.7 billion realized in 1960. The 1961 net was the highest

since 1953 and well above the 1954-60 average. Federal payments by farms with the percentage change from 1960 showed: Arizona \$9,477, up 17 per cent. Arkansas \$3,321, up 23 per cent. Colorado \$4,479, down 2 per cent. Kansas \$4,400, up 28 per cent. Louisiana \$2,298, up 16 per cent. Missouri \$3,014, up 25 per cent. Montana \$4,303, down 16 per cent. New Mexico \$5,866, up 23 per cent. Oklahoma \$2,381, up 2 per cent. Texas \$43,360, up 9 per cent.

Amarillo Man Named Head Of Foundation

CANYON (Spl) — Wales Madden Jr. of Amarillo has been appointed chairman of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation Development Campaign, as announced by Mrs. Ples Harper, president of the foundation.

Upon accepting the chairmanship, Madden stated: "Pioneers, moving into the Panhandle of Texas following the Battle of San Jacinto, brought with them the revolutionary spirit of free men. I am flattered to have a part in an endeavor designed to preserve the heritage and tradition of this dedicated America."

The campaign will be for \$350,000.00, which will be used to build an amphitheater in Palo Duro Canyon State Park.

Set within the outdoors of the land and using a 600 foot bluff for a backdrop, the open-air stage and surrounding buildings will be carefully camouflaged to give spectators an impression that the project was a work of nature.

Plans call for a seating capacity of 1,000. Seats will be set on a concrete base, with all concrete to be earth-colored.

Large boulders will outline the stage, while buildings containing dressing rooms, workshops, and other buildings will be hidden by gentle hills on either side of the stage.

Landscaping will be planned to blend with the natural vegetation of the canyon. A large stone tablet will be erected at the entrance of the seating area. The tablet will be in the form of a map of the Texas Panhandle and will contain early landmarks, drawings of the canyon and the Canadian River, along with famous brands of the ranches of the area etched in stone.

Memorial plaques will be displayed at the entrance of the theater. Portrayed on the stage will be the history of the Panhandle of Texas. Paul Green, Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright who composed North Caro-

Firm To Build Generator For Moon Trip

NEW YORK (UPI) — A small nuclear generator for the moon exploration ship surveyor will be built by the Martin Co. of Baltimore.

The generator will weigh about 30 pounds and provide up to 7.6 watts of power continuous for 90-day lunar missions.

Temperatures will dip to 235 degrees below zero during alternate two-week periods when the moon landing site is in total darkness and the generator's heat will keep survivor's instruments and electronic components from freezing.

The Atomic Energy Commission announced construction of the generator Tuesday. Surveyor is a National Aeronautics and Space Administration project.

Here's a holiday story and it's all tied up with a big green bow. St. Patrick's Day is not far off. It's a bit o' plannin' you should do, too, for a St. Pat's Day dinner. If menu planning is a major problem at your home, here's a real Irish treat revolving around one of the Emerald Isle's favorite entrees - Lamb Stew.

This Irish Lamb Stew is easy to prepare. It takes just a little cooking know-how.

Here's the best way to prepare the lamb cubes for stew. Dredge the cubes of lamb in seasoned flour. This is easily accomplished. Simply shake the lamb cubes in a bag with the seasoned flour. This evenly coats the meat cubes. The lamb cubes are then browned in a small amount of lard or drippings.

The next step is to add enough liquid to cover the meat. The pan is covered and the meat cubes are simmered (not boiled) over low heat. If boiled, the meat will become dry and stringy.

Vegetables are added just long

enough before the meat is done for them to become tender. Remember when selecting vegetables for a stew to think not only of color but also texture, shape and flavor. Leave some of the vegetables whole and cut others in half.

- IRISH STEW**
 2 pounds boneless lamb for stew, cut in 1-inch cubes
 3 tablespoons flour
 1½ teaspoons salt
 ¼ teaspoon pepper
 3 tablespoons lard or drippings
 ¼ teaspoon marjoram
 1 bay leaf
 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
 Water to cover
 12 small white onions
 4 white turnips, quartered
 4 carrots, cut in 2-inch pieces
 3 celery stalks, cut in 2-inch pieces

Combine flour, salt and pepper. Dredge the lamb cubes with seasoned flour. Brown meat slowly on all sides in lard or drippings. Pour off drippings. Add marjoram, bay leaf, parsley and enough water to cover the meat. Cover tightly and simmer for 1½ hours. Add onions, turnips, carrots and celery and continue cooking about 30 minutes or until meat is tender and vegetables are done. Thicken cooking liquid for gravy, if desired. 4 to 6 servings.

SHAMROCK BISCUITS

2 cups sifted enriched flour
 1 tablespoon baking powder
 ¼ teaspoon salt
 4 to 6 tablespoons lard
 1 tablespoon baking powder
 1-3 to ½ cup milk

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in lard until mixture has fine even crumbs. Mix in parsley. Add enough milk to make a soft dough. Turn onto a lightly floured board and knead gently for ½ minute. Pat or roll ½ inch thick and cut into shamrock-shaped biscuits. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 12 to 15 minutes. Yield: 10 to 12 biscuits.

Acadian Roast Beef Is Sunday Favorite

Here's something different-but good, too. A new way to cook the Sunday roast beef. It is a southern Louisiana recipe, from the bayou country.

- ACADIAN ROAST BEEF**
 (About 12 servings)
 4 tablespoons instant minced onion
 ½ teaspoon instant minced garlic
 3 tablespoons water
 ¼ cup cider vinegar
 2½ teaspoons salt
 1½ teaspoons ground black pepper
 ½ teaspoon ground red pepper
 5 lbs. roast beef
 1 teaspoon water

Combine instant minced onion and garlic, the 3 tablespoons water, vinegar, salt, black pepper and red pepper. Let stand 5 minutes to soften onions. With a paring knife, cut 1-inch slits about 1½ inches apart in all sides of the roast, sticking the knife to the middle of the roast. Open slits with the index finger and fill each with about ½ teaspoon of the onion mixture, using the point of a teaspoon. Cover and marinate for 4 to 5 hours or overnight.

Place roast on a rack in a baking pan. Cover with aluminum foil. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 3 hours or until tender, removing the aluminum foil 40 minutes before cooking time is up to brown roast. Remove roast and rack from pan. Skim excess fat from pan drippings with a large spoon. Mix cornstarch with the 1 teaspoon water and add to drippings. Stir and cook until gravy is slightly thickened. Serve meat with rice or potatoes and gravy.

Chips And Cheese Cook-Off Winner

- Here is Mr. Allbritton's **CHIP & CHEESE CASSEROLE**
 4 ounces potato chips
 6 slices bacon
 4 slices Swiss Cheese
 ½ teaspoon salt
 dash of black pepper
 dash of rosemary
 1½ cups milk
 6 eggs
 ¼ cup chopped parsley
 4 tablespoons onion soup mix
 ¾ pound ground chuck beef

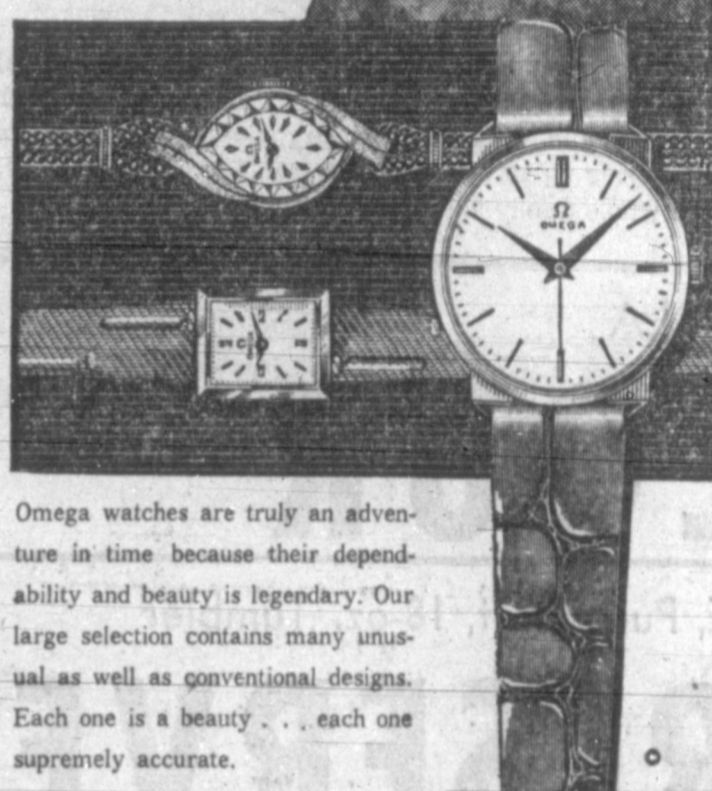
Fry bacon until crisp; drain on paper and crumble. Brown beef in skillet until crumbly as in making a meat sauce; salt and season with a generous pinch of rosemary and black pepper. Partially drain.

In a medium size casserole dish, or dry skillet, cover the bottom generously with potato chips and mash them so as to build a one-half inch layer. Sprinkle bacon (or bits of cold cuts or what - have - you) and cover with a layer of Swiss Cheese. Spoon in the browned beef.

Beat together the eggs, milk, salt, pepper and dry onion soup mix (just as it comes from the envelope). Pour over the chips and cheese and beef. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Bake at about 375 degrees for twenty minutes. Makes four generous servings.

hair and don the accessories you've brought along for the occasion.

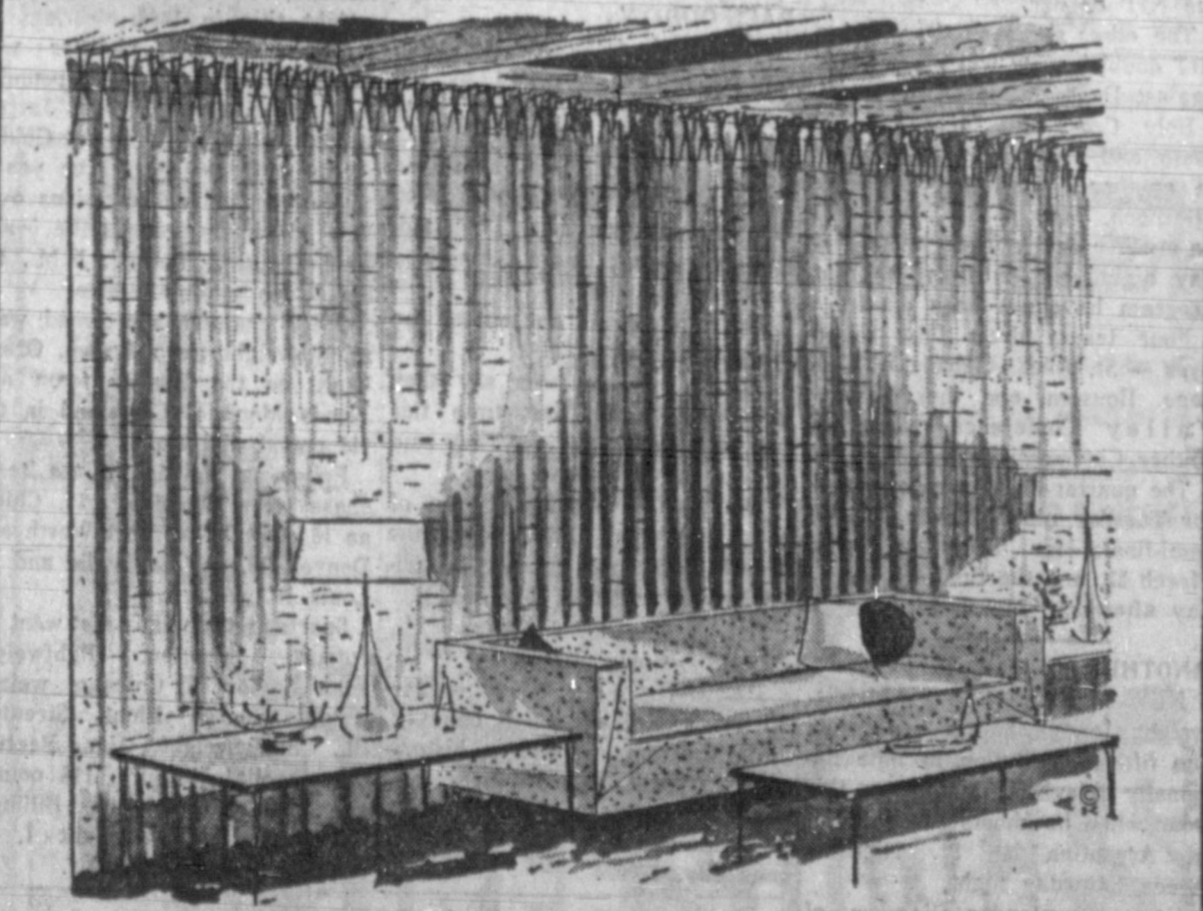

In the spring of baseball manager's fancy turns to rookies—and right now there are three mighty fancy ones strutting their stuff.

They're outfielder Don Clendenon of the Pittsburgh Pirates, catcher-first baseman Gene Oliver of the St. Louis Cardinals and infielder Jake Gibbs of the New York Yankees.

There may be many a called third strike between now and opening day but as of the moment big things are being planned for each of the trio.

Clendenon, who hit .290 for Columbus last season, drove in seven runs with a three-run homer and a grand slam Wednesday and may win a regular berth in the Pirates' outfield.

Oliver, who hit 38 homers and batted .302 for Portland in 1961, was named to start behind the plate when the Cardinals open their exhibition schedule Saturday against the New York Mets. Oliver also is being considered as a sub for lefty-hitting first baseman Bill White when the Cardinals face left-handed pitching.

Gibbs, a .270-hitter at Richmond and one of the Yankees' leading candidates to replace shortstop Tony Kubek, hammered out a long homer in the world champions' intra-squad game. The former University of Mississippi All-America's drive shared the spotlight with Roger Maris' first "homer" of the spring.

Veterans Joe Adcock and Eddie Mathews of the Milwaukee Braves and Brooks Robinson and Jim Gentile of the Baltimore Orioles also showed that their batting

eyes are sharp for the exhibition openers.

Adcock, pinch-hitting for both teams in an intra-squad game, hit a homer and three singles while Mathews, also pinch-hitting in the informal game, had three singles. Robinson had a single and a double and Gentile a two-run single in the Orioles' intra-squad game.

Joe Cunningham, acquired from the Cardinals in a winter deal, delivered two hits to highlight the Chicago White Sox' camp game. Rookie Joe Horlen, 13-9 for San Diego last season, pitched two hitless innings.

Other camp news: Rookie third baseman Don Wert suffered a black eye when hit by a bad-hop grounder during the Detroit Tigers' workout. Chris Short, Dennis Bennett and Eddie Keegan will pitch for the Philadelphia Phillies in their exhibition opener against the Minnesota Twins.

Aubrey Gatewood, Bob Botz and Howie Nunn held the regulars to three singles in the Mets' six-inning camp game. Manager Alvin Dark announced that Willie McCovey will play left field in the San Francisco Giants' first two exhibition games. Don Schwall, American League rookie of the year in 1961, missed the Boston Red Sox workout because of a virus infection.

Fast-ballers Don Drysdale, Sandy Koufax and Joe Moeller were named to pitch for the Los Angeles Dodgers in Saturday's Grapefruit League opener with the Kansas City Athletics. Catcher Earl Battey homered in Minnesota's intra-squad game but there's still no word from holdout pitcher Camilo Pascual, 15-16 with eight shutouts last season.

Six Top Golfers Head Pensacola Open Field

PENSACOLA, Fla. (UPI)—Six of the world's leading money winners head a field of 138 pros and 18 amateurs scheduled to tee off today in the opening round of the \$20,000 Pensacola Open golf tournament.

Defending champion Tommy Bolt is back to try to become the first man to win the seventh annual tournament twice in a row. Palmer, won a Palm Springs and Phoenix, Ariz., with his famous last-day eclipses of par. Sanders, who has picked up \$5,069 so far this year and was tied at third at Baton Rouge last week, fired three birdies, an eagle and a bogie in a practice round Wednesday for a 68.

But it was jutjawned Rudolph who tore the par-72, 6,700-yard Country Club apart. The Tennessee swinger aced the par-3, 170-

yard seventh hole with a 5-iron and added six birdies for a sparkling 64 — just two shots off the course record.

Other good practice rounds were turned in by Palmer and Billy Maxwell of Abilene, Tex., both with 67s. Bob Rosburg, the man with the baseball grip from Portland, Ore., with a 68 and Dow Finsterwald of Tequesta, Fla., with a 71.

Joe Campbell of Pendleton, Ind., who won at Baton Rouge with a record 274, was banking on his hot putter to keep him in the winning bracket as the pros began looking toward the Masters, just five weeks off.

Whitt Leading Jamaica Golf Meet In Opening Round Of Play For Trophy

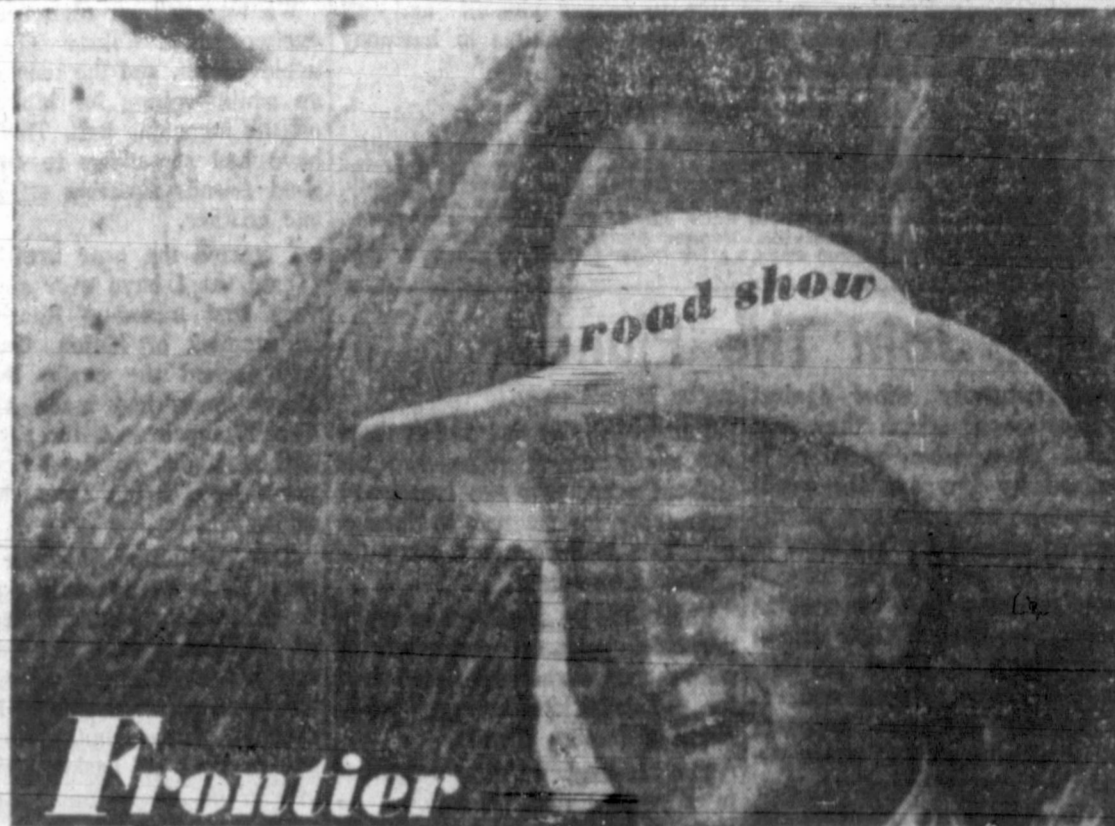

the third round of the Panama Open for inadvertently turning in a wrong score.

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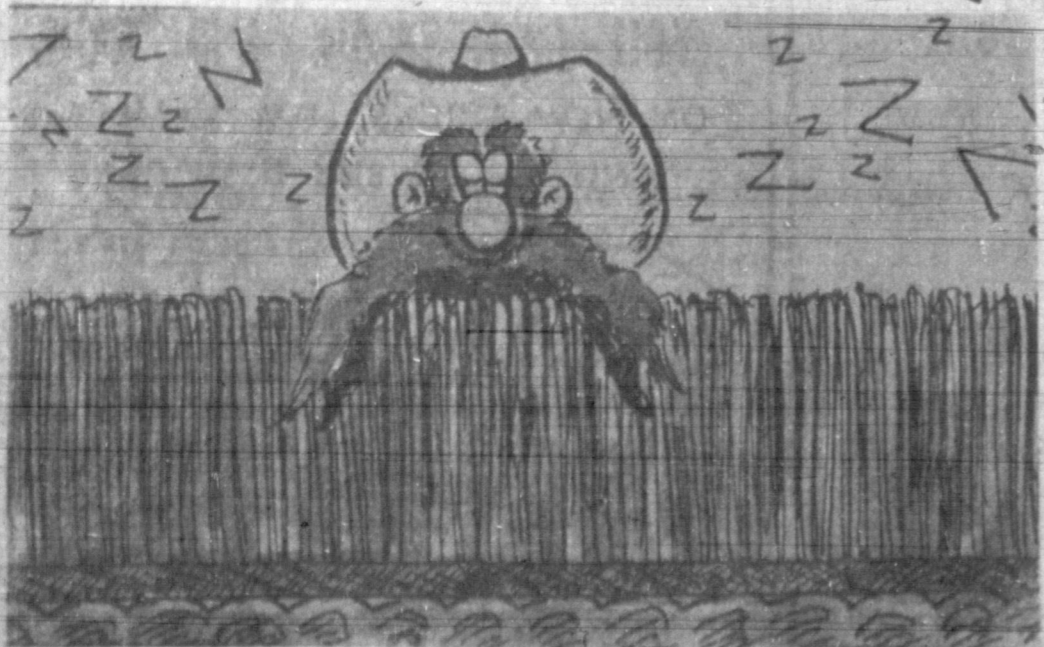
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
