NEW YORK (UPI) - Heroes' Canyon turned into Astronaut Alley today, and Lt. Col. John H. Glenn sent millions of New Yorkers' hearts into affectionate orbit.

Under bright sunlight washing through the tickertape storm that descended on the storied threequarter - mile stretch of lower broadway, the astronaut from a small Midwestern town beamed his dimpled smile at the big city crowds. They screamed an openarmed salute.

An hour before Glenn and his six fellow astronauts arrived a LaGuardia Airport, a tragedy struck New York at Idlewild Airport, some 10 miles away, when an American Airlines jet airliner crashed and burned on takeoff

U.S. Army Will Replace Berlin **Battle Group**

BERLIN (UPI) - The U. S. Army announced today it would replace a 1,500-man battle group in the Berlin garrison with a simflar-sized force in the near future, using the autobahn.

The Army said convoys of 3,000 soldiers in 500 vehicles would be traveling along the 110-mile highway between West Berlin and

West Germany. U. S. Army headquarters in Europe said the first convoy would travel along the super high-

way "soon," The latest expression of the Allies' right of access to isolated West Berlin came as the East German Communists rejected any international control of the land and air routes to the divided city.

Editorials in the official Communist press said that in the Moscow talks between U. S. Ambassador Llewllyn Thompson and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko there would be no surrender of East Germany's "sov-

ereign" rights. The mass movement on the Helmstedt - Berlin autobahn through East German territory is. expected to trigger new Communist charges that the United States is misusing the routes to

Headquarters in Heidelberg said the 2nd Battle Group of the 47th Infantry Regiment of the 4th Infantry Division would move here from Augsburg, West Germany, to replace the 1st Battle Group of the 19th Infantry.

JFK Gives Up London Tailor

LONDON (UPI)- The Daily Sketch has reported President Kennedy has been forced to give up his Lon ontailor "to avoid accusations of being un-American."

"An absurd piece of chauvin-Istic pressure," the newspaper's columnist said. "Is the poor man compelled to drink only Californian champagne and eschew Scotch whisky? What about Waterford glass and German liver

"Jacqueline Kennedy has also had to leave Hubert de Givenchy, her Paris dressmaker: though he is supposed to get one or two bootlegged models through to

The Sketch said John King-Wilson, who has made dozens of suits for Kennedy, is "unperturbed by the neglect."

"Since Mr. Kennedy's inauguration, he hasn't ordered any more suits from us." King-Wilson was quoted as saying. "But I quite understand his reasons. Anyway, he will only be President four years. After that he'll be free to have his clothes made where he wants. I expect he will come back

The Sketch reminded King-Wilson that he "plainly has not heard of the second term."







Pre-flight feeding, for 72 hours prior to blast-off, consists of a high-protein, low residue diet. Immediately prior to take-off, the Astronaut ate a high - carbohydrate, moderate - protein, lo wfat meal, consisting of orange juice, scrambled eggs, filet mignon, toast and jelly and decaffeinated coffee.

In - flight feeding presented many new problems for scientists. According to nutritionist Beatrice Finkelstein of the Aero Medical Laboratory at Wright - Patterson Air Force Base in a report in the Journal of the American Dietetic Association, the Astronaut should eat at two to three hour intervals to insure an optimal state of nu-

Foods recommended for consumption while in flight, according to this report, consist of a variety of sandwiches; meat such as beef, turkey and ham; fruit sauces, fruit juice, chocolate drinks, cookies and candy.

Solid foods are provided in bitesize, individually wrapped pieces. Liquids and semi-solids are in collapsible squeeze tubes. Consumption of a multivitamin preparation during flight is recommended, since experimental data indicate beneficial effects from watersoluble vitamins during stress, the report states.

In addition, the Astronaut must be provided with drinking water, approximately 100 ounces for each day of flight.

Evidence that this type of diet is acceptable, and even pleasant, comes from a report by Soviet Cosmonaut Gherman Titov ("Space World," January, 1962) who stated:

"In the main, drinking and eating in space was as easy as on the earth. According to the schedule, I had my dinner and supper, then breakfast the next morning. Apart from the tubed food, I also ate solid kinds of food, biting off small pieces of bread and chewing them. I also swallowed vitamin pills. And, of course, I drank water from a special device."

As for future, long - distance flights, nutritionists now are experimenting with algae which will be carried in the space capsule ot only to provide food but to take carbon dioxide from the air and convert it into life-supporting oxygen.











From recent and extensive field work, here are observations and suggestions which may be helpful to the newcomer. Although brightly-lighted, impersonal looking public laundries appear much the same, they aren't, It pays to size up all coin-ops in your area. They will vary in costs.

Some may be better-managed (albiet invisible so as far as the customer is concerned) with cleaner floors, fewer machie breakdowns and prompt return of coins lost in machines.

In the laundering, remember that the water is usually soft so add detergent carefully to avoid excessive sudsing. Remember, too, that drayer heat may be too high for some garments (knits, wool socks, winter sports underwear, for example) and these should be air - dried at home.



Looking Sideways

NEW YORK, N.Y. - An old man of the theatre, who must have played every place in the United States except Swamp Feet, Ohio, died in New York the other day. He had a distinction - he probably ate more raw turnips than any other human being alive ever did. Jim Barton was a fine actor.

a great raconteur, had a sense of humor eight miles wide and he played Jeeter Lester in "Tobacco Road" 1,899 times. During each performance he ate several "I learned to despise, loathe

and hate turnips," he said once. "But what can a man do when he must earn his daily bread and butter, penthouse rent, not to mention the taxes, devouring a couple of turnips at every performance?"

The fact that he did live in a penthouse and lived well, leaving that lofty retreat eight times a week to put on the tatters and rags of old Jeeter, the unwashed, dreadful cracker of the play. The real fact is he didn't eat quite all those turnips. They began, after awhile, to give him heartburn. The prop man for the show finally found some pale apples, would dig a hole in each one, stick a turnip sprout into the hole and, from the audience, it looked as though Jeeter crunched turnips. The sound was right.

"I got to a point where I wasn't exactly crazy about apples, either," he told me once. "But they did help. For one thing they raised heck with the bicarbonate of soda business. I was supporting the bicarb people because I ate spoonsful of the stuff after every turnip. The apples took me off the bicarb gig but began to taste like paste after awhile.

Had he ever had a doctor during the apple segment of his long performance?

"Dozens," he snapped, "It isn't true that an apple a day keeps the doctor away. But, then, I'd had all those turnips by that time and my system was a wreck. I can't really blame the A trouper to his finger tips, he

could cover any stage mishap. In 1937, while playing Jeeter, his greatest test came. Maude Odell was playing Sister Bessie. She had a heart attack in her dressingroom and died there during the performance She was just getting ready to go on. The news was passed to Barton, who was on stage. He went into a series of comments, such as, "If Sister Bessie was to come along I betch she'd just about say . . and then he mixed ad libs with some of Sister Bessie's actual lines and got through to the end of the performance. Many in the audience never even knew that there was supposed to be a live Sister Bessie in the cast.

He was fully and grandly indignant only once in his life. That was when two women brought charges at Equity, the actors' union, that he cussed backstage in an offensive manner. They didn't mind the cussing on stage, that was part of the show. They did mind the off-stage swearing. He was brought up on charges and reprimanded, the only reprimant in his entire professional life. The incident outraged him, it profanely outraged him and he said so in plain, blunt sulphuric terms,

One time, having some minutes between scenes, he left the theatre in his Jeeter clothes and went across 45th Street to a saloon - only, because of his dirt, horrible makeup and torn clothes, to be thrown out as a worth-

"Best critical notice I ever had," he used to chuckle. "I was playing a verminous old bum and they took me for one." We talked here and there through the years. As a younger man I used to love his bibulous sketches and, in particular, the "mad dog" sketch. This was a great and hilarious bit and knocked me over every time I saw it, no matter how often I'd seen it



It must be kept in mind that all of this transaction took place twelve years subsequent to the declaration of independence by the valiant men of Texas gathered at Washington-on-Brazos on March 2, 1836. It was after the successful conclusion of the revolution as it developed after March 2 that brought complete freedom and independence to Texas and it became a Republic, which it remained until it became annexed as the 28th State of the United

Although independence was not declared until March 2, 1836, it seems to me that the fight for independence by Texas began on February 23 when fewer than 200 men entered the Alamo on February 23 at the approach of a Mexican army numbering 3,000. It was then that the siege began


