Senate Vote On Highway Bill Delayed

portant amendments stood in the way of a Senate vote today on a bill to pay for completion of the 41,000-mile interstate superhighway system by 1972.

The Senate was close to a vote on the House-passed bill to authorize \$11.5 billion in new outlays for the road program. Efforts to pad the measure with provisions requested by President Kennedy were delaying action. They were:

-A move by Sens. Paul H. Douglas, D-III., and Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, to amend the bill to provide all or most of the \$300 million in new revenues sought by Kennedy to keep the program on a pay-as-you-go basis. The measure now includes only \$126 million of the higher taxes Kennedy asked for on big trucks, tires, inner tubes and diesel fuels.

-A bipartisan amendment sponsored by 10 senators to extend for two years bonus payments to states which agree to ban billboards along rural portions of interstate routes.

Under the bilt passed by the House and approved by the Senate Public Works Committee, the bonus payments would cease

Comedy Sketches Featured Video Awards Showing

NE W YORK (UPI) - Raymond Burr's favorite TV special went on a cheerful carousel ride Tuesday night before getting around again to handing him the brass ring as "favorite male performer."

The second annual "TV Guide Award Show" on NBC-TV consisted chiefly of sponge - wrapped comedy sketches which prodded such institutions as TV ratings, commercials, loud music, "idiot cards," agents, violence and carbon copy scripts. Jackie Cooper and Nanette Fabray were the amiable, capable stars and Efrem Zimbalist Jr. displayed charm and good sportsmanship as the host. The sportsmanship came when Efrem was called upon to needle his meal ticket, Warner Bros. TV series.


The sketches all began crisply but tended to stay on for a few too many beats. Exceptions: Cooper as a double-dealing agent and an orchestra leader, Miss Fabray as a singer whose house of cue-cards came tumbling down in the middle of her big number.

The eight award categories that finished up the hour were evenly divided. Four awards went to shows that were voted "best" in their respective fields and four awards went to "favorite" performers and programs. There's a difference and it makes the whole thing hard to pin down. Anyhow, readers or TV Guide voted Burr their "favorite male performer" this year. Last year he was voted "most popular male personality." I haven't figured out who is making progress on that one. Burr's show, "Perry Mason" repeated as "favorite series," other winners were "Andy Griffith" a "favorite new series," Mitch Miller's sing along as "best single musical," "Macbeth" as "best single dramatic program" and NBC-TV won awards for its election night coverage and Huntley - Brinkley newscasts. The last award, and to me, went to Carol Burnett as "favorite female performer. She's also the best.

"The Troubled Land," Tuesday night's "Bell & Howell CLOSE Up" on ABC-TV, impressed me as the best production in the en-







In short, Cabot pointed out, optimism that all will turn out well if we give the Communists enough time and enough rope to hang themselves, just won't work.

Cabot stated that it is his belief that all would agree that to have and at the same time a degree of freedom as we know it, the orientation of a society must be heavily industrialized, and be based on

"And it must include," he said "much, but not unlimited, personal freedom."

Discussing this further with its application to underdeveloped nations, Cabot said:

"I don't for a minute claim that overseas American private investment is the solution to all the world's problems. In fact it is uite clear we couldn't even be considering Argentina or India were it not for the vast public programs that have been launched in these countries. And these programs may have to be expanded further before their economies will be capable of keeping private enterprise such as ours healthy."

Cabot made the further and concluding statement in his address to the Boston World Affairs Council:

"The economic success of communism is based on one thing: the power of the state to channel whatever portion of its output it chooses nto creation of new capital. We business are engaged in doing the same thing for the free world. Our challenge is to do it better than the Communists can, and to do it not just in the things that make statistics but in the things that really matter."






