## President Pressed On Arms Need

Kennedy late this morning called his cabinet and congressional leaders to a White House luncheon to discuss the Berlin situation, Pierre Salinger, his press secretary, announced.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Kennedy was reported today under pressure from some top advisers to increase overall U. S. military strength to meet the intensified Soviet threat to Berlin. Official sources said no decision had been made but consideration was being given to stepped-up military mobilization plus a boost in U.S. armed forces in Europel

The idea would be to make it clear to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev that Kennedy means business when he says the United States will resist with force any effort to squeeze the Allies out of Berlin or blockade their

Former Secretary of State Dean Acheson, chosen by Kennedy to conduct a review of crisis plans for Berlin, was said to be the chief exponent of partial mobilization to impress Khrushchev and prepare for a possible showdown over the former German

Steps to build up the nation's military force-in-being could include an increased draft call or calling up some reserve units. It could mean, too, keeping a greater number of strategic bombers in the air at all times.

The President is discussing the situation with all his top military and diplomatic advisers. No final conclusions are expected for some time.

## Latin American Trip A Success, Stevenson Says







THURMAN SENSING

TRACTORS AND DOLLARS FOR

Everything that's wrong with the country today is exemplified in the tractors, for -prisoners deal sponsored by Walter Reuther, Eleanor Roosevelt and Milton Eisenhower and endorsed, in fact, instigated by President Kennedy

First of all, the deal is what Americans refer to as a "gimmick," a catchy publicity stunt. The fund campaign is presented as a humanitarian effort to save the lives of free Cubans seized in the invasion. Actually, it could well have been nothing more than a conscience - salving move in connection with this Cuban de-

But what about the scores of thousands of other Cubans who have been rotting in Castro's jails since 1959? What about their plight, ignored so long by the libberal-left movements in which Reuther and Mrs. Roosevelt and Milton Eisenhower are so active? Why haven't these same individuals been in the forefront of a national protest movement while Dictator Castro has been sending

Cubans to the firmg squad? Let's face it: The tractor deal will help Fidel Castro. In exchange for a few prisoners, he will get badly needed agricultural machinery so that he can create more communist collective farms and force more Cubans into socialist slavery.

And if these "liberals" are so determined to end the evils of Castro communism, why aren't they protesting against the grant of more than \$1 million by the U.N. Special Fund to aid Casagricultural programs? managing director of the Special Funds is Paul Hoffman, another member of the Reuther-Roosevelt-Milton Eisenhower axis. He urged approval of the grant,

The United States will underwrite 40 per cent of this amount. The Soviet Union, in contrast, underwrite only three per cent. Why should the American taxpayers underwrite 40 per cent of a U.N. grant extended a despicable communist dictator on their very doorstep, a dictator who has already stolen a billion dollars worth of their property? Can anyone give a sensible answer? Just bear in mind: The same taxpayers who are being asked to buy tractors to save prisoners will also be handing over money that

This is the kind of outrageous situation in which the American people find themselves today. And instead of endorsing a bribe for Fidel Castro, President Kennedy should be cutting off U.S. funds to the United Nations Special Fund. But President Kennedy hasn't uttered a word of protest about this under-the-table aid for Khrush-



## 330 Producers To Participate In Grain Plan

Some 336 producers have signed intentions to participate in the Department of Agriculture's 1961 feed grain program, according to Mrs. Evelyn Mason, office man Channel 7 ager of the Gray County Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service.

This total, Mrs. Mason stated, is more than 73 per cent of the 450 county farms with feed grain

Performance will be started on the feed grain farms about July 1. The diverted acres and the planted grain sorghum will be measured at that time. If too much grain sorghum has been planted or there is not enough diverted acres, Mrs. Mason said particpants will be allowed to adjust by plowing up the excess. However, she said, a charge will be made to go back to the farm and measure the adjusted acres.

Wheat, \$1.79 per bushel for No. 1 wheat; barley, \$0.97 per bushel for No. 2 or better barley; grain sorghum, \$1.89 per Cwt. for No. 2 or better grain sorghum, and oats, \$0.71 per bushel with 1-cent premium for No. 2 oats or better.

If the grain is stored in a warehouse, storage charges will be deducted. If stored at this time, the storage for barley is about 12 cents and on wheat 10 or 11 cents. Mrs. Mason also announced that






