

Mongolia Move By Kennedy May Have Hit Block

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Administration plans to establish relations with Communist Outer Mongolia have bogged down in threats of congressional reprisal and Nationalist Chinese protests.

A key congressman who asked to remain unidentified said Democratic leaders have warned President Kennedy that he won't get enough votes for his \$4.8 billion foreign aid bill if he goes ahead with recognition of Mongolia.

The congressman said he was sure the administration would not make any more plans to set up diplomatic relations—at least until action is complete on the aid bill.

A State Department official said no decision has been made yet on whether to recognize the Mongolia peoples republic or support its admission to the United Nations.

American officials in Moscow conferred with the Mongolian ambassador there twice last month on the tentative plan to open an embassy in Ulan Bator, capital of Mongolia, which is sandwiched between Siberia and northern China.

The plan's advocates claim it would give the United States a valuable listening post in central Asia and demonstrate U.S. "reasonableness" in admitting nations to the United Nations.

It also would clear the way for admission of Mauritania to United Nations, sources said.

Border Patrol School Shifted To Port Isabel

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy announced Wednesday location of the Border Patrol academy of the Immigration and Naturalization Service at an abandoned Navy installation at Port Isabel, Tex.

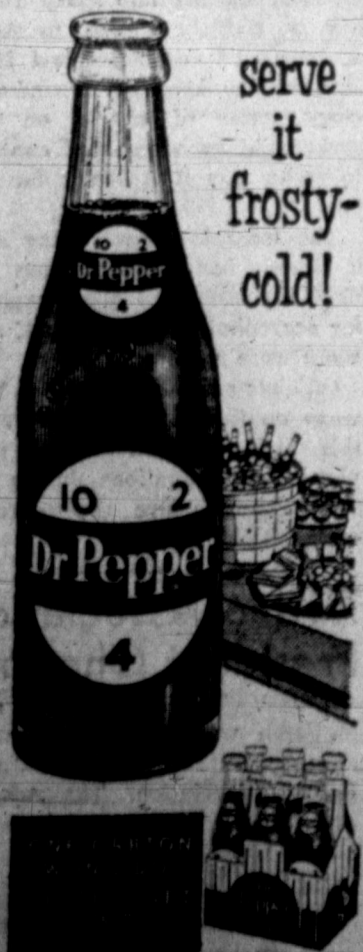
The academy presently is located at Ft. Bliss in El Paso, on a temporary basis.

In a letter to El Paso Mayor Ralph Seitzinger, Kennedy said the move to Port Isabel was in the best interest of the government and the taxpayers.

He said the portion of the Port Isabel base which the academy will use cost \$3.6 million to build, and has a market value of \$462,000. The cost of building a new academy would be at least \$2 million, exclusive of land costs, Kennedy said.

The move of the academy does not imply a curtailment of Immigration and Naturalization Service at El Paso, Kennedy said. Only the school including about 50 students and six training officers will move. The immigration and naturalization service staff of 275 men will remain at El Paso.

Pampa Building Permits Decline

Building permits in Pampa for the first half of this year totaled \$1,372,261, nearly \$700,000 less than the building total of \$2,071,338 for the first six months of 1960.

The figures are taken from records in the office of O. E. Payne, city building inspector.

They show that permits for 92 new residences were issued during the first half of 1960 compared to only 32 new dwelling permits this year. The total for new residences a year ago was \$1,477,270. This year the figure for new residences was \$588,500.

A drop off this year in construction of new homes in Pampa's several new additions was given as the reason for the difference of \$890,770 in the residential building category.

Nine permits were issued for new business buildings in the half of last year and 12 permits for the same period this year.

Largest of the business building permits this year included First Methodist Church remodeling, First Baptist Church educational building and Buddy's Supermarket.

Crowd 'Ordered' For Ayub's Visit To San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI) — Air Force enlisted men and officers said today they have been ordered to put on civilian clothes and be present with their families when Pakistani President Mohammed Ayub Khan arrives Saturday to visit Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The idea, they said, is to insure Ayub a good crowd. He is scheduled to land at Randolph AFB and go to Johnson's ranch at Johnson City for the weekend.

Col. William L. Helmantler, chief of the information office of the Air Force Training Command at Randolph, said the reports are "untrue and it is unpatriotic to use such a story."

Randolph, Kelly, Brooks and Lackland Air Force bases are near San Antonio.

Irv Weinman, civilian public information officer at Kelly, said officers and enlisted men were "encouraged" to attend an air show and ceremonies at Randolph for Ayub.

"It might be interpreted as an order," he said. But he denied that a formal order had been issued. Air Force officers and men said they were ordered to appear in civilian clothes, with their families at a designated place for rollcall and then "proceed to the flight line, Randolph AFB." They said they were also ordered to appear later for Ayub's appearance at the Alamo, shrine of Texas independence.

Filipinos Prove Gen. MacArthur Their Real Hero

For the United States, the war was just a little more than a month old when they arrived at the White House a message that stirred American hearts. It said:

"Today, Jan. 20, the anniversary of your birth, smoke-begrimed men, covered with the marks of battle, rise from the fox-holes of Bataan and the batteries of Corregidor to pray reverently that God may bless immeasurably the President of the United States."

It was Gen. Douglas MacArthur's birthday message to President Franklin D. Roosevelt in the year 1942.

To the north, the Japanese were sweeping through Malaya, Burma, Singapore and Java.

On Bataan Peninsula and the American and Filipino soldiers were fighting side by side a battle which in defeat would take its place in the annals as one of the epics of heroism.

It was from Corregidor that the sick and starving remnants of those forces began their death march to Japanese prisons.

Corregidor's concrete fortifications were crumbling and the jungle was taking over this week when MacArthur, now 81 and bearing the permanent rank of five-star general, completed a sentimental journey.

Among Americans there may be controversy over MacArthur's role in history, but the Filipinos demonstrated that among them there is no question. It was hero worship, unadulterated.

As he addressed a joint session of the Philippines Congress, he joined his former comrades in singing "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" in honor of his wife, Jean, and visited old battle scenes—the flowing prose returned.

The fires, about 40 miles apart on the western slope of the Sierra Nevada range, have already destroyed two towns—roaring through one "like a freight train," and killed an elderly couple trying to escape.

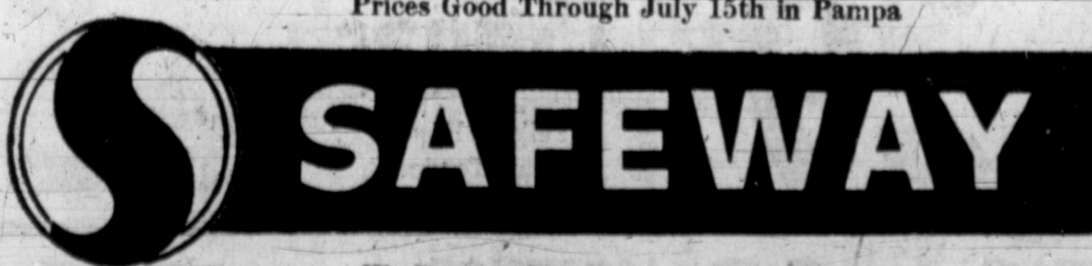

Washington Window

By LYLE C. WILSON

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Treasury is reporting now on the first few days of the new fiscal year. This offers a last-chance opportunity for the average citizen to see and to understand the spending figures which comprise U. S. government.

These figures will be available to be seen during the remaining 51 weeks of the current fiscal year. The average citizen will see them if he is interested. He is not likely, however, to understand the spending figures or the revenue figures, either.

Both sets of figures quickly become too big for the understanding of the common man. The daily Treasury statement herewith under review is for the fiscal year from July 1-5, inclusive. Five days.

You wouldn't expect the first five days of July to rack up any-

thing starting in the way of government business. Of the five, one day was Saturday, another Sunday and another the Fourth of July. Moreover, President Kennedy was out of the city most of the time, resting and working on Cape Cod. The Supreme Court was in recess until autumn. Congress was on a long holiday.

Who was running the store? The store must have been in charge of the spenders and the tax collectors while the tops of the executive, legislative and judicial branches were on the loose. Business as usual means just what it says to the government spenders of the peoples' money and to the government collectors of the peoples' taxes.

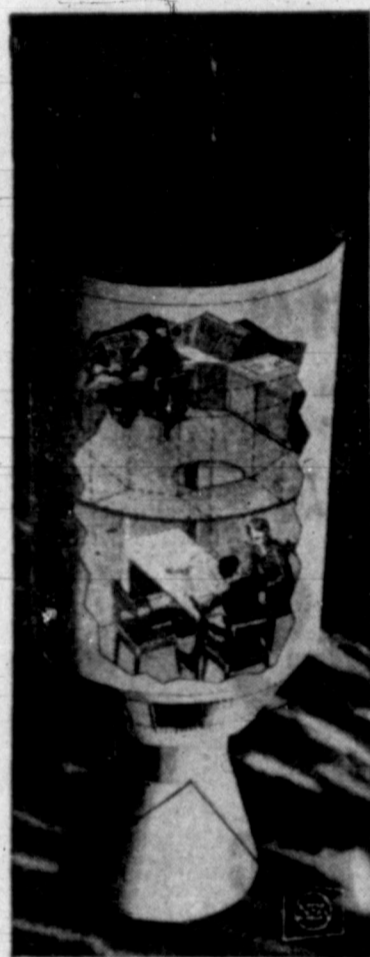
During those first five days of the new fiscal year, the U. S. GOVERNMENT spent roughly \$1 billion. The precise figure listed in the Treasury statement as withdrawals was \$1,044,188,607.20. Deposits in the Treasury, which correspond roughly to tax revenue, totaled \$371,529,481.16. Internal revenue collections, mostly income tax, collected during the business hours of Wednesday July 5 amounted to nearly \$185 million.

So the world's richest government, the servant of the world's best fed, best clothed and best housed citizens, is off to a good start toward another deficit. It will be the 28th such deficit since 1930. The politicians and political parties which operate the U. S. government as the servants of the citizens, do not believe the citizens are willing to pay for the kind of government they demand.

The politicians will not increase taxes to pay the bill. They fear that the citizens would throw them out of office if taxes were raised. The citizens might even do that because the citizens are a dull-witted lot when it comes to taxes, government spending and federal pie in the sky.

This pie in the sky is a kind of political free lunch which is not free at all but a direct charge against the citizen taxpayers, present and future, especially future.

What the dull-witted citizens fail to understand is that supporting the U. S. government with borrowed dollars instead of with tax dollars is more costly for the taxpayers than would be a big, honest increase in taxes. These many years of deficits have imposed a capital levy on the American people. Deficits have rotted the value of the U. S. dollar down to 48 cents—a capital levy of 52 per cent.

At that point, I started to think Candlestick Park had some apologies due it. But in the third inning, Hodges reported, "A bit of a breeze is starting to stir." No further word until the sixth, when Mel Allen said, "the wind is starting to spring up a bit, blowing from left to right."

By the seventh inning, sleeves were flapping on player uniforms and in the ninth, dust, paper cups, newspapers began blowing across the infield and ballplayers began leaning into the wind.

The Americans managed to lose in the 10th, 5-4, but thanks to TV, we all know the truth about Candlestick Park. It's windy and it's fun to see them try to play baseball there.

Kabobs, the meal-on-a-stick, are definitely claiming part of the current spotlight on outdoor cookery. Steaks and hamburgers have long been popular, but the kabob is catching on quickly.

You'll find a world of possibilities when you venture into kabob cookery. Just let your ingenuity go to work. You'll discover many delightful combinations of meat, fruits and vegetables to grill on a skewer.

It's an idea that will appeal to both young and old at any outdoor grill feast. Kabobs are fun to assemble and eat, whether you have a crowd or just the family gathered.

Your picnickers will all enjoy an old favorite, ground beef, when it appears in colorful kabobs, piping hot from the grill. The bite-size meat balls are combined with

red tomato wedges and small cooked onions.

You will want to have the ground meat all ready-made into uniform balls. One and one-half pounds of beef make 16 balls about 1 1/2 inches in diameter.

You can make kabobs practically any length you wish, for skewers range in size from 6 inches to 24 inches. Be sure to have at least one for each person. The metal skewers are best for this type of cooking.

A bowl of melted butter or margarine ought to be handy for your picnickers to brush on the vegetables before grilling. Barbecue sauce would be grilling on the meat or vegetables.

Placing the kabob morsels closer will help if you like the food rare; separate them more if cooking well-done.

For any outdoor grilling, the fire should be started far enough in advance for the charcoal briquets to be covered with a light gray ash when cooking is started. Rub a little fat on the grill before cooking to prevent the food from sticking.

Kabobs make an excellent informal inside meal as well. You can prepare them in your broiler.

Kabobs are tasty when eaten in toasted buns or rolls. Some may prefer to use a knife and push the food from the skewers onto a plate.

Of course, you may want to offer other choices of vegetables to skewer with the meat balls. Green pepper squares, large mushroom caps, cucumber or pickle chunks and olives are a few ideas.

Charcoal Steaks Answer Call Of Out-Of-Doors

Just a few sniffs of the aroma from the outdoor grill and one or two mouthfuls of juicy charcoal broiled steak is enough for Dad to want to try his talent at barbecue cookery. Nowadays it is becoming traditional for the man of the house to reign supreme over this outdoor cooking while Mom gladly takes care of behind-the-scenes details.

What is the meat Dad is most likely to choose for his barbecue? Steak, of course. He can show off

his skill with any of these steaks which are suitable for broiling: rib, club, T-bone, porterhouse or sirloin.

The steaks Dad is grilling for this particular occasion are club steaks. Club as well as rib and T-bone steaks, are ideal for individual servings. The larger porterhouse and sirloin steaks will serve 2 to 6, depending on their thickness.

Here are a few tips for successful barbecuing to pass on to Dad. Steaks for broiling should be at least 1 inch thick. Most people will be hungry enough to eat 3/4 to 1 pound of steak.

The fire should be built far enough in advance for the charcoal briquets to be covered with a light gray ash when cooking is on the grill, separate the coals so they are only one briquet deep and cover an area larger than that of the meat.

Rubbing the grill with fat will prevent the meat from sticking. Fat trimmed from the meat may be used for this purpose.

If you wish, several slits may be

made into the fat edge of the steak to prevent it from curling. However, be careful that you don't cut into the lean. This would cause some of the delicious juices to be lost.

On an outdoor grill, 1-inch thick steaks should be about 5 inches from the coals. Two-inch steaks should be about 3 inches from the coals.

When the steaks are browned on one side, turn them with tongs or a fork inserted in the fat edge. This also preserves the meat juices. Steaks should be turned only once and seasoned after they have browned.

The broiling time will vary due to the wind, size of the fire box, degree of heat from the coals, thickness of the steaks, etc. Therefore, these times for grilling are only approximate.

Thickness	Time in Minutes
1 inch	10-15 15-20
2 inches	30-35 40-45
2 inches	30-35 40-45

The trimmings for this meal are grilled vegetable kabobs. On each small skewer thread 2 small cooked onions, 2 stuffed olives, and 2 cucumber slices. Brush with French dressing and grill over the coals for a few minutes until lightly browned.

For an energy snack, pit dates and prunes and then fill them with creamed honey.

Beef Burgers Supply Quick Answer To Picnic

When the neighborhood folks announce a "come as you are" and "bring your own" supper, beef burgers supply the quick answer. You will be ready as quickly as you can reach your freezer if you keep a good supply of frozen beef burgers on hand. An insulated carrying bag will keep the burgers frozen on the way to your neighbor's yard. While the burgers are grilling the blue cheese mixture is spread on the halves of toasted buns. Sliced tomatoes, relishes and lettuce top off your backyard supper.

BEEF BURGERS ON BLUE CHEESE BUNS
Yield: 6 servings 1 cup spread
6 frozen beef burgers
3 ounce package cream cheese
1 tablespoon milk
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice

1/2 cup crumbled blue cheese
1/4 cup chopped onion
6 toasted sandwich buns
Pan-fry or grill beef burgers being careful not to overcook. Soften cream cheese. Blend with milk. Add mayonnaise and lemon juice. Stir until smooth. Combine blue cheese and onion with mixture. Spread on both halves of toasted buns. Place hot beef burgers in buns.



Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
A. Veal Round Steak or Cutlet.
Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified?
A. It comes from the center portion of the leg (round) of young beef. It contains the same muscle and bone structure as beef round steak, but is smaller and has very little fat or marbling in the lean.
Q. How is it prepared?
A. By broiling or pan-frying. It is not broiled because of the lack of fat. For broiling, the meat is first browned in added fat. The drippings are then poured off, a small amount of liquid added, the pan covered tightly, and the meat cooked over low heat 3/4 to 1 hour.

Weight-watching teenagers should limit between meal snacks to crisp raw vegetables such as celery or carrots, fruit such as oranges or apples, milk — preferably skim milk if a reduction in weight is the goal.

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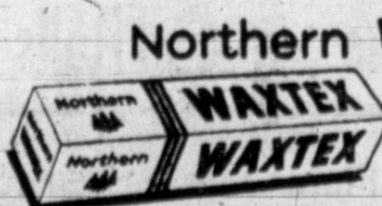

acid, which has been called "fatigue poison," and vitamin B-1 is essential to help break this acid into carbon dioxide and water. When there is a lack of Vitamin B-1 in the diet, it follows that you may show signs of chronic fatigue.

You can't hide fatigue with manufactured beauty. For cosmetics cannot cover up low energy, sagging posture and a lack of vitality. In fact, even the effects of permanent weariness is to increase your intake of vitamin B-1.

The natural food sources of this vitamin are milk, liver and wheat germ.

Milk in all forms — whole milk, buttermilk, skim milk and yogurt — are rich in B-1. And all kinds of liver are equally nutritious.

Wheat germ, according to the Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, may be as much as five times richer in this vitamin than whole wheat.

It's simple to take, too, for it is delicious as a breakfast cereal, or can be sprinkled on other cereals. It makes a fine topping for casseroles and can be used as breadings for meat and fish.

The only way to fight fatigue is from within. And since our bodies store B-1 for a short time only, it is necessary to replenish the supply each day.

If your loss of vitality is due to improper eating, you can put sparkle in your eyes, a glow in your cheeks and a luster in your hair by making certain you get a sufficient daily supply of this energy-giving vitamin in your daily diet.

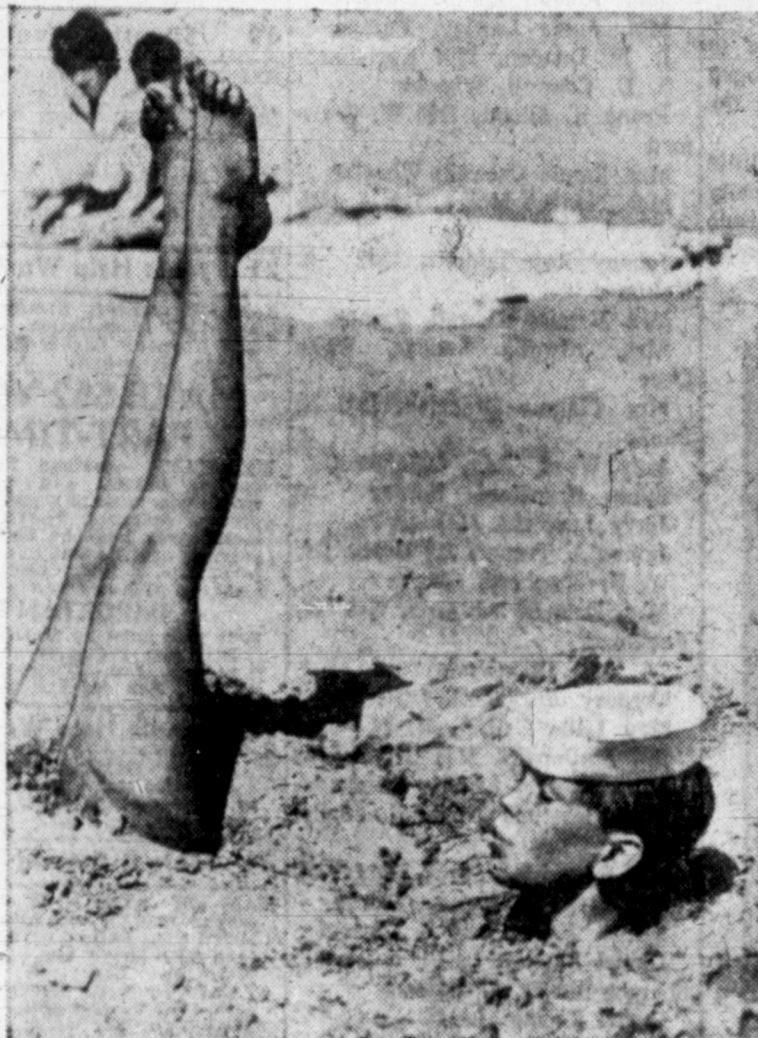

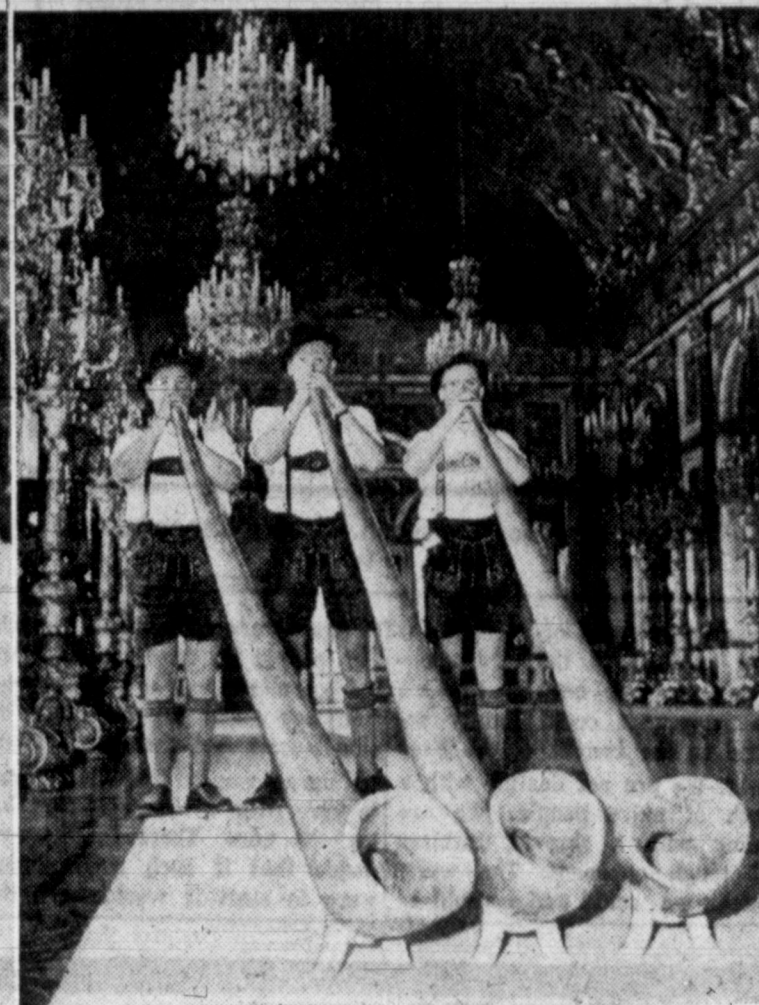

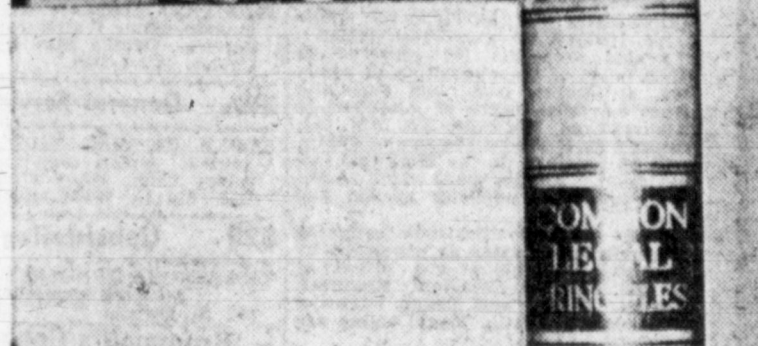

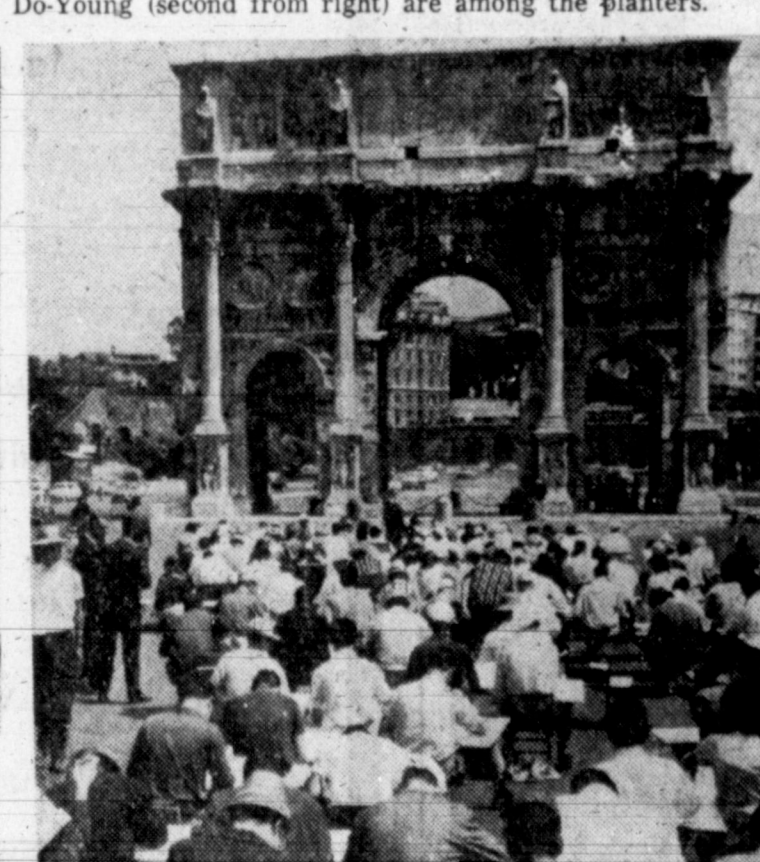

Nation Harvests Less Wheat Than Was Predicted

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—On an average this season, the nation's farmers are harvesting less wheat than was predicted—but the country won't have to give up bread just yet.

The upper midwest wheat production areas have been hit hard by a summer drought which has cut the yield in some areas by as much as 50 per cent.

The drought has mostly hit the important spring wheat area, causing a forecast for 1,259,000 bushels by the Department of Agriculture. This is 7 per cent below last year.

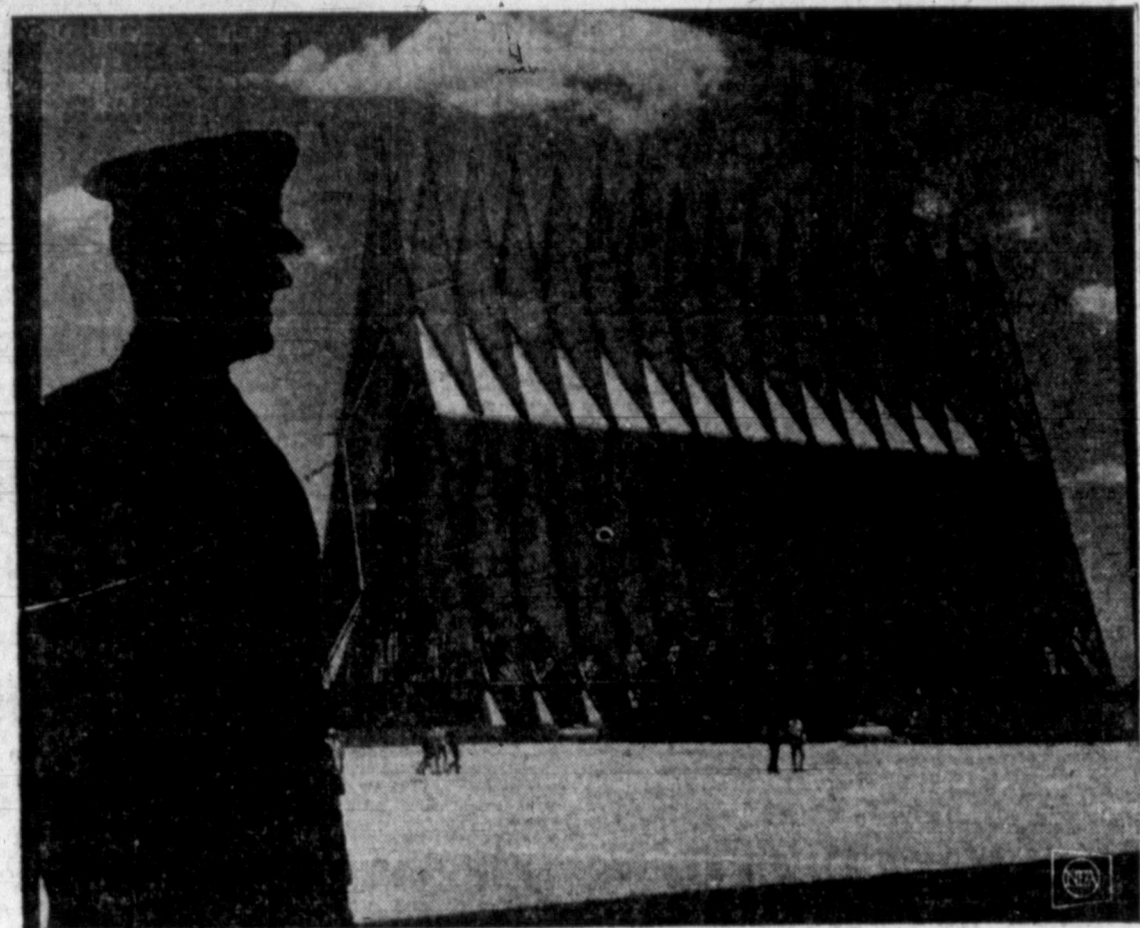

Rains Damaging Crops On Coast

HOUSTON (UPI)—Continuing heavy rains along the Texas Gulf coast today brought new flood threats and caused heavy damage to vegetable crops in some areas.

More than a foot of water stood in downtown streets and over two-thirds of Angleton from rains that have dumped nearly 10 inches on the area since Sunday.

In Houston, Mack McConnell of the U.S. Agriculture Department's Soil Conservation Service warned that above normal rains have created "a major flood threat."

Heavy rains during the past few days have caused an estimated \$750,000 damage to Harris County's vegetable crop.

Sam Dorre, manager of the Farmers Cooperative Marketing Association in Houston, predicted crop losses soon would be felt by the housewife in the form of rising produce prices.

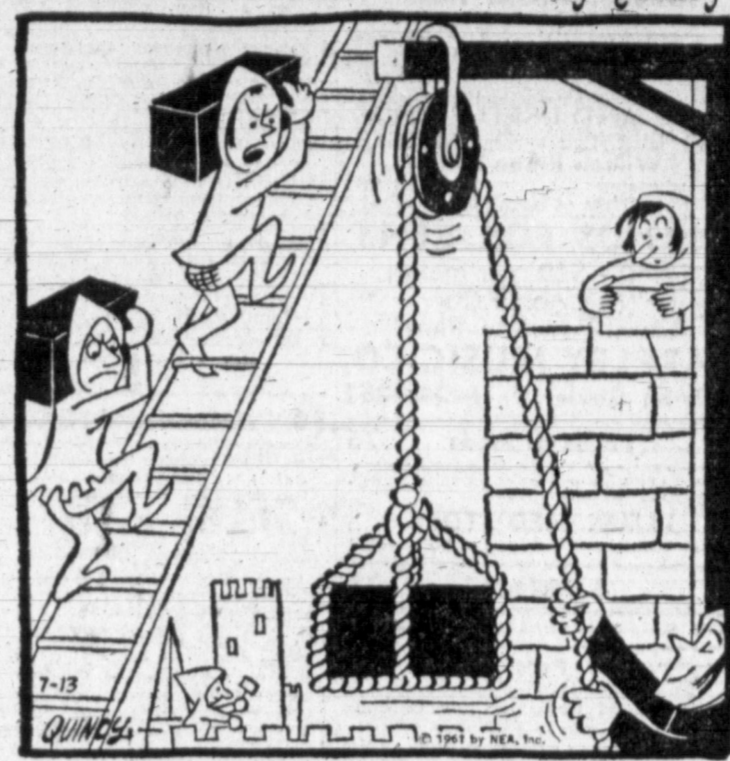
Rains have wiped out the country's tomato, sweet potato, egg plant and sweet pepper crops, and seriously damaged squash, peas, canteloupe and watermelon crops.

In Angleton, long-time residents reported the heaviest flooding there in years. Cars were stalled in streets and workers absent or tardy on arrival at their jobs.

Water sloshed across all downtown streets, up over the curbs and lapped a some business doorways. Water had risen in some homes, but no evacuations were reported.

Foreign Commentary

As the Soviet Union increases its pressure on Berlin, coming more and more to the fore is the question of the true relationship between the Soviet Union and Red China, its largest ally.

Has there been an actual weakening of the alliance between the two largest Communist nations or are the Moscow-encouraged reports of a rift between the two merely a smokescreen?

If a smokescreen, such reports could be used to weaken Western determination and to encourage a hope that to play along with Moscow would be to weaken further an already-ruptured Sino-Soviet alliance.

Then, after having obtained maximum concessions from the West in Berlin and Southeast Asia, the two could drop the pretense and emerge as united as ever before.

Encouraging a belief that there is a deep and widening rift between the two have been these reports:

That the Soviet Union snubbed Red China on the celebration of the 40th anniversary of the Chinese Communist party.

That Russia has withdrawn her submarines from her Adriatic base in Albania, Albania and Red China have been the Communist camp's bitterest foes of President Tito's Yugoslavia, and Albania reportedly sided with Red China in her quarrel with Khrushchev's co-existence policy. As a reward, Red China has shipped food supplies to Albania despite her own severe shortages.

That a just-concluded Soviet defense pact with North Korea is part of an attempt to woo nations considered by Red China to be in her own sphere of influence. Red China signed a similar pact Tuesday.

That Russia disclosed that because of crop failures, Red China ran up a \$300 million debt to Russia last year. The figure previous ran up a \$300 million debt to Russia had been kept secret.

That Russia and Yugoslavia may be on the verge of re-establishing cordial relations. Lending further encouragement China's unceasing propaganda to reports of a rift were Red backs against President Kennedy at the same time the American

president was meeting with Khrushchev in Vienna.

Finally, there was the report first published in London that Moscow had circulated a new letter accusing the Chinese of violating a compromise to accept a policy of co-existence in return for Moscow's promise to continue to encourage local revolutions.

Whether or not a rift exists, there has been no sign that it is anything more than one over methods. The goal of world domination by communism remains the same.

A mutual need for each other would seem to be a dominating factor.

BILL INTRODUCED
WASHINGTON (UPI)—A bill has been introduced in Congress to make it a crime for radio or television broadcasters to exploit sex, crime, horror or violence.

The measure, offered Wednesday by Rep. Harris B. McDowell Jr., D-Del., would provide that violators could be fined up to \$10,000 and imprisoned for two years.

DRAWS LARGEST CROWD
ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI)—The largest night crowd of Billy Graham's upper Midwest crusade heard the evangelist at the Minnesota Fair Grounds Wednesday night.

Graham spoke to 30,000 persons at the grounds. It was the midway point in his eight-day crusade.
