VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI) - A top aide of Deputy Premier Phoumi Novasan was assassinated early today as he drove in a car through the downtown area of Vientiane. Unconfirmed reports said the killing was staged by the Communist Pathet Lao.

The dead man was Maj. Caho Ekarat, a Laotion prince and nephew of neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma. The assassins escaped.

He was murdered as the government continued to hold off naming a delegation to the Geneva conference on Laos until the international control commission verifies that the pro-Commu-) nist rebels are respecting the cease-fire.

One report said Ekarat was hit three times by bullets. Another version said he was riddled by at least 11 bullets. Police confirmed

### Two States Show Television Programs

### 'Loss' In Varied **U.S.** Aid Grants

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Only two Southern states -- Virginia and Florida-pay more in federal taxes than they get back in the government's myriad grant program's.

Virginia and Florida are among the elite 15 states in the nation which can claim that in 1960 they poured enough money into the federal treasury to help support federal aid programs for t'e other 35 states.

Figures compiled by the Tax Fund, Inc., show that the other nine Southern states pay less than a dollar in taxes for every dollar of federal help they receive.

The rating did not include socalled "hidden taxes" but only direct taxes. The fund's compila-Channel tions included all federal aid programs.

New Jersey ranked first with \$2.14 cents for each dollar it received. Alaska was last with payments of 16 cents for each dollar. Florida paid \$1.05 and Virginia \$1.04 for each dollar received.

The other southern states, all on the profitable side of the dollar Channel mark were Texas 87 cents; North 11:00 Morni Carolina 80-cents; Tennessee 67 cents: Georgia 67 cents; South 12:30 Carolina 66 cents; Alabama 57 cents; Arkansas 54 cents; Missis-1:30 Our 2:00 Day sippi 48 cents and Louisiana 45 Channel cents.

Texas, much larger than the other states of the old Confederacy, received the most aid, \$415,300,000, and also paid the most in taxes, \$361,700,000.




