Quarrels Said To Keep Some Couples Married

CHICAGO (UPI) - Two psychiatrists said today that seemingly incompatible husbands and wives may stay married to have someone to fight with.

Drs. Marietta Houston and R. B. Forman of Topeka, Kan., said there seemed to be a tacit agreement in such turbulent marriages that "threats of divorce and separations were not to be taken liter-

The two Menninger Foundation staff psychiatrists made their observations in a paper delivered at

the 117th annual meeting of the American Psychiatric Association

Forman told a United Press International reporter that many of the most seemingly incompatible marriages he studied appeared to be "made in heaven." He said that "to suggest these couples would be better off apart would be like saying a person with an obsession would be happier without it."

Many such couples try to give the impression they are staying children, Forman said, "but there is no such thing as a marriage held together by the children." He contended that many couples made this claim only because it was more socially acceptable than saying they needed "sparring

partners." Forman and Miss Houston based their conclusions upon a study of 12 married couples over 45 years of age. They described the wives as either the "shrew type" or the "long suffering, good,

obedient type of wife," while the husbands appeared to fit either the popular stereotype of the "bully" or the "hen-pecked hus-

Forman suggested that the relationship between these husbands, and wives was not "a case of misery likes company," but rather "a case of I'm not miser-

able - you are." Socially, most of these marriages were considered "desireable and frequently ideal," the two psychiatrists reported. The

husbands were generally prominent professional or business men, while the wives tended to be welleducated, attractive and intelli-

All the couples persisted in irritating each other for 20 and 30 years before seeking psychiatric help. In no case did they really want to sever their embattled re-

lationship, Forman said. "They finally sought psychiatric help only because one of them had somehow stepped over the line or pushed the other too far."





MEXICO CITY (UPI) - The U.S. wants to see Western Hemisphere countries free of intervention from this hemisphere as well as any other, U.S. Ambassador Thomas C. Mann told local newsmen in an interview.

Mann was questioned about "non-intervention," Mexico's foreign policy theme for the hemisphere as opposed to the Monroe Doctrine, after he delivered his credentials to President Adolfo Lopez Mateos at the National Palace here.

Mann said he held no discussion with the Mexican president and said there was no talk of a possible meeting between Lopez Mateos and President Kennedy.

"History shows that the U.S. with Mexico, has been a cham-

pion of non-intervention," Mann told newsmen.

from afar." The Monroe Doctrine has come under heavy press attack here in recent days as an instrument of "North American imperialism."

Touching on economic problems Mann said the U.S. has tried to stabilize a "just price" for coffee, a key export for many Latin American countries, and has treated other Mexican exports with a view of maintaining an equal balance of trade.

The U.S. envoy declined to discuss Cuban developments, stating that Cuba is not his mission.

President Gave Space Shot OK, Senator Reveals

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D.Okla., has revealed that President Kennedy gave a go-ahead on last Friday's manned Mercury shot despite advice of his scientific advisers that the effort required could be spen more profitably in other areas of space development.

Kerr is chairman of the Senate Aeronautical and Space Committee. He made the remark to a meeting of Oklahoma broadcasters attending the national radio and television convention

The senator disclosed that Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, himself, and James Webb, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, advised Kennedy that the space shot should be taken as fast as safety

permitted. Kerr said the burden of his argument was that the free world needed a spectacular achievement in space to counter the widely held, if erroneous, belief that the Russians were ahead of the United States.

"People in the free world were angry, discouraged and resentful about the widely publicized Russian achievement, Kerr said.

Kerr said all future shots would be made with as much publicity as possible.

"And when we put a man in orbit, he'll be talking to the world from space," he said.



Looking Sideways

By WHITNEY BOLTON NEW YORK - It is a fascinat-

ing thing to have a relatively early morning news broadcast from New York. For one thing, it gets you out of the traffic. You get up at an hour that is quiet in the huge city and by the time you are flagging down a cab the morning's first true light is bathing the buildings. You ride down with no more hindrance than traffic lights. No trucks, no private cars, only occasional cabs, The city has a fresh, clean feel. You get into an elevator and go up 25 floors and there, on your desk, are all the stories since midnight - cut from the news machines, stapled together by categories. You read them through, check the machines for last - minute developments and start putting the newscast togeth-

As you work, that electronic marvel, the overseas telephone, its fingers reaching far and deep, begins to ring. A man calls from Leopoldville in the Congo and says that it is relatively quiet, no disorders right now, the Congolese seem to be working out their governmental problems. In earlier days, he was more urgent. Crises were every hour on the hour, people were being murdered, houses burned, Belgians harassed. Later it was UN troops who were harassed.

It rings and West Berlin calls to report on rumors that the Soviet Union, having stirred up Laos and having roiled Cuba, will make Berlin a spring issue of critical tension.

Again it rings and a man in Jerusalem reports the morning session of the trial of Adolf Eichmann. Time differences allow this reportage when it is still early in New York. He lets you hear, over a clear connection, the actual tape Eichmann made when he was interrogated after his arrest. He was always a gentle and kind man, afraid to look at blood, says Eichmann's odd, rasping voice. It prevented him from be coming a doctor. He felt revulsion for the sights and horrors of the concentration camps, but Adolf Hitler had ordered extermination of the Jews and he, Eichmann, had perforce to follow orders. He describes how he tried to to suggest less rigorous torments. He concludes by saying he expects the death penalty and will not ask for clemency. An odd, strange recital by a caged man.

You start to write and put the newscast together and the telephone rings again. It is Miami, with a report on what it has been able to monitor from shut-in. ports caught from a constantly fading reception from rebel radio.

The telephones lie still at last

and you finish and go to a studio, face the microphone, get out a stop watch and watch a monitor clock's hands race around to the appointed time. You start the stop watch and begin talking and as you do another part of your mind dwells briefly on the fact that, again due to time differences, some people are up across a wide nation, some just getting up, some are still asleep. You worder, idly, never letting your mind wander off too far from what you are saying, how many are listening, how sleepy they are and if they care very much about all this news that has happened since midnight. You hope they do, because the world as you see it is at one more crossroads in a series of such. You know it isn't the final one and you hope it never comes. You keep your tone impersonal, avoid giving emphasis to words that otherwise might seem to give the newscast a slanted, editorial tone. For example "Badgered Fidel Castro, on his tight little island, rounded up 20 Americans overnight and two of them already have been shot." It would be easy to color that with

You have learned in a few months of this kind of work to strive for the impersonal note yet retaining urgency and the note that this is important.

When it is all done, the next man is ready for the next newscast and nonetheless, you look at the news machines, study it and try to find the pattern of reality as opposed to the thin fabric of mere conjecture.

It is fascinating to you, a job in which not one morning is a You like it.

A number of senior citizens have inquired about osteoarthritis with particular reference to its relationship to rheumatoid arthri-

The two diseases are entirely different. Rheumatoid arthritis: for example, begins at a very early age, is probably of allergic origin, is often accompanied by fever and considerable weight loss, and produces crippling deformities of the joints, including those of the spine.

By contrast, most of us de not regard osteoarthritis as a disease. In point of fact, I refer to it as osteoarthrosis since the "-itis" ending means the disease is a type of inflammation.

Osteoarthrosis is often referred to as "the grey hair" in joints. In other words, it's a manifestation of aging rather than disease. It rarely begins before the middle years. When it occurs at the time of the "change," it sometimes is called ritis, although most of us are

convinced that neither condition has anything to do with the other Osteoarthrosis usually affects persons who are overweight. There seems to be a hereditary factor especially with hand involvements. The nubbins that ap. pear on the finger (Heberden's nodes) are often a family trade

There's not a thing to do, and nothing that need be done, in the case of an osteoarthrosis. Weight reduction takes a lot of the strain off the involved joints. Proper postural exercises, shoeing and corseting add to comfort, Doses of aspirin relieve pain.

The application of heat may

be very helpte. But there's little, if anything, to be gained by faddist dlets, vitamin supplements, gland treatments, vaccine injections, prescriptions for cortico - steroids and other expensive drugs, exposure to violet or X-rays, visits to spas, baths in mud or "radioactive" waters, diathermy or applications of electrical current.

I trust no one will interpret what I have written as an indication that I think osteoarthrosis is "hopeless." Quite the contrary. Not being a disease, it will

not shorten life by so much as an hour. Not being "curable," it must be endured. Not being remediable, there's no sense spending a lot of money "chasing a cure.

Indeed, if you'll take example from the apple tree, you'll realize that you can get delicious fruit from many a gnarled branch.


