### Court Told Eichmann Worried About Death Of Jews To Kill

JERUSALEM (UPI)—The Nazis invented a special ordeal—"the spinning top" torture—for Jews in French concentration camps, a witness testified at the Adolf Eichmann trial yesterday.  
Dr. Georges Wellers, professor of physiology at the Sorbonne in Paris, said he saw this special torture while he was in a camp at Drancy, near Paris. Rene Blum, brother of former French Premier Leon Blum, was a fellow inmate.  
The plight of the captives became much worse when a new Nazi commander, Alois Brunner, arrived at the camp, Wellers said.  
"They left no stone unturned to terrorize the inmates," he said. "They invented the spinning top torture. A short stake would be driven into the ground. The Jews would be forced to put their right hand on the stake and hold their

left hand before them. Then they were ordered to run around the stake as fast as they could while the Germans beat them with truncheons.  
"About three times around the stake was about all a man could endure, but the Germans made them go around ten times if they had not fainted first."  
The Nazis were constantly worried and irritated because they could not find enough Jews in France to fill up the trains to the extermination camps, Wellers said. They sometimes cleared people out from homes for the aged and hospitals to make up the quota, he testified.  
This shortage of Jews worried Eichmann because he regarded it as a blow to his prestige, according to a document introduced by the prosecution. It told how he turned pressure on his subordinates to fill up the trains as quickly as possible.  
Another document told how Eichmann was confronted with the problem of a group of Iranian citizens who claimed they were not Jews but Iranians of the Moslem faith. The document said Eichmann ruled that for the purpose of deportation they were Jews.

"But," said Mrs. Taylor, "an adequate auditorium is worth everything spent on it — not only for a concert series but for the many other things that can be accommodated in it."  
Mrs. Taylor pointed to Vernon and McAllen as two Texas cities which have wonderful municipal auditoriums.  
"If you ever decide to build an auditorium here," she said, "I hope your building committee will

### France, Shipping Line Cleared Of Texas City Disaster Blame

HOUSTON (UPI)—France and a French shipping line have been officially cleared of any responsibility in 1947 Texas City disaster that killed 570 persons, injured over 3,000 and caused millions of dollars worth of damage.  
The tragedy was triggered when the SS Grandcamp, a ship owned by the French Line which was loaded with ammonium nitrate, blew up and started a chain reaction of blasts.  
In 1959, Federal Dist. Judge Ben C. Connally ruled that the French Line was negligent.  
The U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans reversed Connally's decision in an order that was received in Houston Monday.

preme Court overruled a lower court decision which held the United States government liable for the disaster.  
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"It would be ironic indeed if the United States were permitted to impose liability for these claims on (France) by claiming that unlike (the United States) the officials and employees of the Grandcamp should have known that FGAN was dangerous," the appeals court said.  
FGAN was the commercial name for the ammonium nitrate fertilizer which exploded on the Grandcamp.

### Police Expect Arrest Of White Youths Who Lassoed Negro Girl

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)—Police said today they expect to make several arrests following an incident in which a white youth lassoed a 9-year-old Negro girl from a car and dragged her along a paved street, severely injuring her.  
Chief of Detectives M. B. Pierce said police were investigating the Sunday incident and said the youth who threw the rope from an open convertible and several other passengers "would have to be rounded up."  
The girl, Gloria Laverne Floyd, suffered a deep gash in her head which required three stitches, severe cheek bruises, a laceration on her right shoulder and burn marks on the neck from the rope.  
Her grandmother, Mrs. Braxton Floyd, said Gloria was walking home from church with her sisters and friends when a carload of white youths passed.  
She said one of them threw what appeared to be a rope around the girl's neck and dragged her. "They were waving it like a lasso," she said, "and one stood up and threw it over her head."

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### Foreign News Commentary

In Oslo this week, at the NATO foreign ministers' conference, the United States undertook a two-fold task:  
First, it sought to erase doubts about U. S. leadership aroused by serious setbacks in Cuba and Laos, and doubts about its intentions in Europe.  
Second, it sought to mend cracks in NATO's own defensive armor.  
On Secretary of State Dean Rusk's side as he addressed the ministers was the first U. S. astronaut's flight into space.  
Also reassuring was his promise that U. S. troops would not be withdrawn from Europe and that the U. S. maintained its strong position against any Communist attempt to take over West Berlin.  
Not so easily glossed over were the differences within NATO itself.  
They included:  
The economic split between the "inner six" led by France and West Germany on the one hand and the "outer seven" led by Britain on the other. Between the two groups there still exists the possibility of a disastrous, throat-cutting economic war.  
President Charles de Gaulle's demand that NATO policy-making be left to a triumvirate composed of a France, Britain and the United States.  
Resistance, especially among the small NATO nations, not only to De Gaulle's plan but to demands that they further burden their own economies with increased contributions to NATO.  
Demands for increased economic aid to under-developed nations.  
Portugal has made no attempt to conceal her indignation over United States' refusal to support her position in Portuguese Africa.  
Among all nations in NATO are doubts about the United States' atomic policy.  
Last year, NATO Supreme Commander Lauris Norstad suggested that NATO become a nuclear power in its own right. Later, then-Secretary of State Christian Herter repeated the proposal and seemingly made it official U. S. policy.  
The Kennedy administration has not repeated the offer, although taking the position that NATO should have nuclear weapons.  
NATO is Western Europe's defensive arm. Yet, as repeated by Dirk Stikker, NATO's new secretary general this week, it is dependent on U. S. leadership. There is no room for vacillation.

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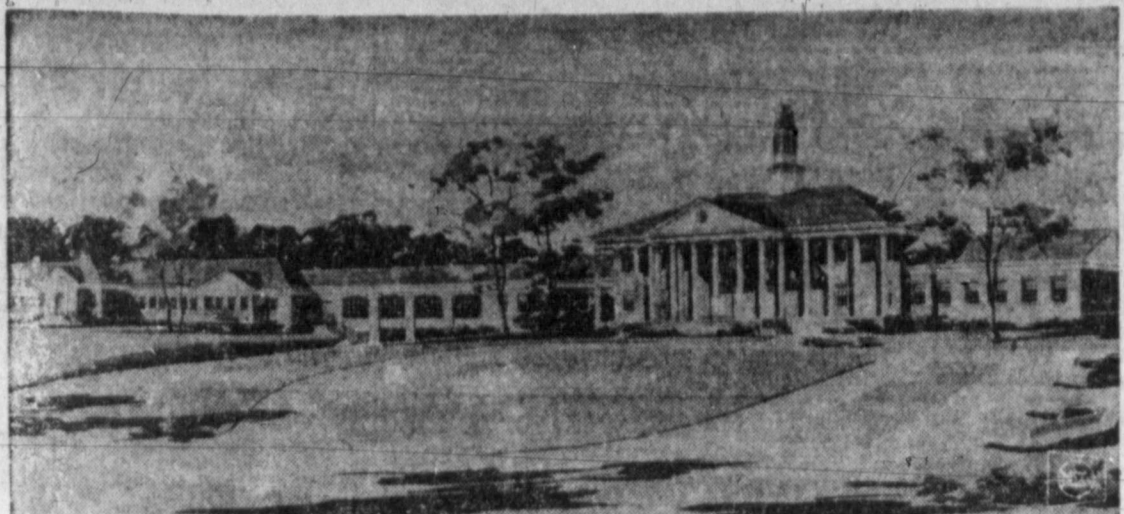

### Military Building Fund Authorized

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate has voted to authorize an \$879,684,750 military construction program for the next fiscal year. Nearly one-third would go to build sites for nine Minuteman missile squadrons.

### Johnson Enroute To Viet Nam For Anti-Red Parley

HONOLULU (UPI)—Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, ready for the long hop to Red-threatened Viet Nam, called on Americans today to answer communism's "deviousness" with free world determination.

The vice president ended his 17-hour stopover in Hawaii with an 8 a.m. HST (12 noon CST) takeoff for Saigon, where tonight he will open discussions with President Ngo Dinh Diem on how far the United States will go to beef up that government's resistance to communism.

His Viet Nam visit will be the second stop of a two-week, 28,500-mile journey which probably will take him around the world.

Johnson's Honolulu welcome was enough to warm the heart of any Texan. The former Texas senator basked in Hawaiian sunshine and choruses of "aloha" as he sped through two formal speeches, two receptions, a dinner and scores of conversations.

It reminded newsmen traveling with Johnson of his grueling 1960 campaign — and of former Vice President Richard Nixon's own goodwill mission to Hawaii and the Far East in 1953.

Johnson kept his silence on the

specifics of the message he is taking to Diem from President Kennedy. He firmly refused to comment on a report he was carrying an offer of \$40 million to Saigon — the amount Diem is said to seek. But other sources here tagged this as sheer speculation.

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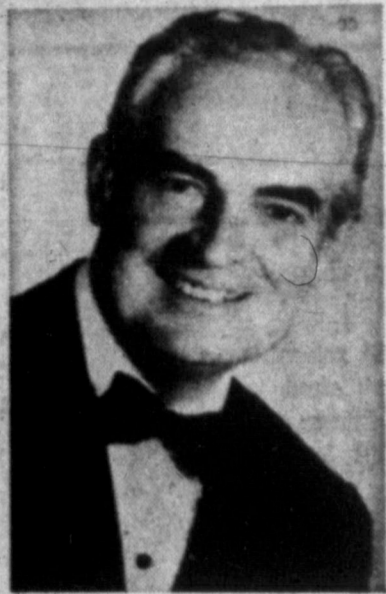

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# Non-intervention Policy Of Mexico Unheld By Envoy

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — The U.S. wants to see Western Hemisphere countries free of intervention from this hemisphere as well as any other, U.S. Ambassador Thomas C. Mann told local newsmen in an interview.

Mann was questioned about "non-intervention," Mexico's foreign policy theme for the hemisphere, as opposed to the Monroe Doctrine, after he delivered his credentials to President Adolfo Lopez Mateos at the National Palace here.

Mann said he held no discussion with the Mexican president and said there was no talk of a possible meeting between Lopez Mateos and President Kennedy.

"History shows that the U.S. with Mexico, has been a champion of non-intervention," Mann told newsmen.

"We only want to see that sister nations of America prosper, that they are free and sovereign—and this includes freedom from any foreign force, either from this continent or from afar."

The Monroe Doctrine has come under heavy press attack here in recent days as an instrument of "North American imperialism."

Touching on economic problems Mann said the U.S. has tried to stabilize a "just price" for coffee, a key export for many Latin American countries, and has treated other Mexican exports with a view of maintaining an equal balance of trade.

The U.S. envoy declined to discuss Cuban developments, stating that Cuba is not his mission.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D-Okla., has revealed that President Kennedy gave a go-ahead on last Friday's manned Mercury shot despite advice of his scientific advisers that the effort required could be spent more profitably in other areas of space development.

Kerr is chairman of the Senate Aeronautical and Space Committee. He made the remark to a meeting of Oklahoma broadcasters attending the national radio and television convention here.

The senator disclosed that Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, himself, and James Webb, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, advised Kennedy that the space shot should be taken as fast as safety permitted.

Kerr said the burden of his argument was that the free world needed a spectacular achievement in space to counter the widely held, if erroneous, belief that the Russians were ahead of the United States.

"People in the free world were angry, discouraged and resentful about the widely publicized Russian achievement, Kerr said."

Kerr said all future shots would be made with as much publicity as possible.

"And when we put a man in orbit, he'll be talking to the world from space," he said.

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Further Federal Folly

We've heard it said in jest from time to time. "Don't bother me with the facts. My mind is made up." In all seriousness this seems to be the case of the Kennedy administration as it views its own program for massive federal aid to education.

In essence, Kennedy appears to be saying that he wants the federal government to get more deeply involved in the American educational picture. If there is no reason for this involvement, never mind. He still wants it to be done, so it will be done.

This strange persistence toward an unwanted program which would be productive of an undesirable end is revealed rather well in a recent national Chamber study, a copy of which has been sent to the President without any noticeable effect resulting therefrom.

The Chamber study begins by showing that it has never been demonstrated that a single American young person of high ability who had a sincere desire to acquire higher learning, has been prevented from doing so because of a lack of funds. For many years now, there has been an abundance of money available in scholarship and loan programs all across the nation, insofar as our colleges and universities are concerned. There simply is no lack.

There is a second assumption buried in the Kennedy program which is contrary to the facts. This second idea has it that there just aren't enough colleges and universities, and that even if the money were available for students, there just aren't enough facilities in existence to take care of present and future needs. This, too, is totally false, and refuted by the facts.

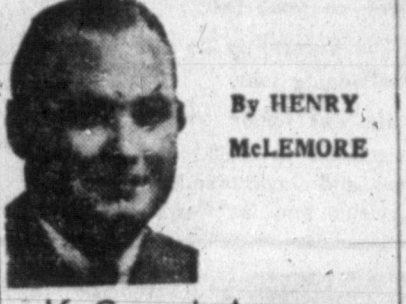
It is true, of course, that in recent years with present emphasis upon higher education, certain desirable colleges and universities, such as the Ivy League or Big Ten institutions, have been turning down applicants. No only are they filled to capacity, but they have tightened their requirements and made it more difficult for the mediocre student to matriculate.

If Crowd Answers Telephone, Hang Up ROME, Italy — Until I came to Italy to live for a while, I had always ranked the telephones of France as the most eccentric in the world, a rating far from original with me.

Millions of words have been written about French telephones over the years, every word deserved. They have been described as much less dependable than the smoke signals of Indians, much slower for the transportation of messages than a bottle thrown in the sea, and much more exasperating than either hives or shingles.

I haven't changed my mind about French telephones, but I do want to warn the French that they cannot afford to improve their telephones even the slightest bit if they want to keep first place out of the hands of the Italian telephone.

The Italians, it appears, are dissatisfied with second place and are making valiant efforts to make their telephones the most contrary to be found everywhere.

In France you get no one when you use the telephone. In Italy you get everyone. Dial a number, in France and a silence as deep as that of the desert greets you. The longer you wait, the deeper the silence.

How different in Italy! Dial a number — any number — and you are immediately connected with what seems to be half the population. Voices pour into the receiver. The only hope of carrying on a conversation with the person you dialed lies on recognizing his voice, and then out shouting hundreds of competitors for the use of the line.

The Italian phone company advertises party and private lines, and charges more for the latter, but a man who pays extra for a private line is just throwing away his money. He, too, is connected to every phone within a radius of 100 miles, and he, too, must lift his voice above that of the multitude to get his message across.

In fairness, it must be pointed out that the phone company is most helpful when you report trouble with your phone. Repairmen must cruise the streets in drives, and in cars equipped with two way radios, for no sooner is trouble reported than one pops in. One repairman has been to see us so often that we have given him a key and told him where we keep the coffee, so he can get in when we're out, and make himself at home. And you'd never want to meet a more sympathetic chap. Or a more thorough workman.

Federal Grand Jury Probing Congressman On Ship Repair Contract; Goldfine Case Reopened

Into Oblivion



WASHINGTON — A veteran Southern congressman is being investigated by a federal grand jury here.

Impeached on orders of Attorney General Robert Kennedy, the jury is probing charges of kickbacks and bribery in a Defense Department ship repair contract in New York.

The alleged payments amounted to around \$25,000. A number of individuals are involved in this affair. The congressman has been interrogated at least once by the jury and is slated for further questioning.

Attorney General Kennedy also has reopened the grand jury investigation of the sensational Bernard Goldfine case that rocked the Eisenhower Administration and led to the resignation of Sherman Adams as The Assistant to the President.

Basis of this new probe is information provided by Mildred Paperman secretary of the Boston textile manufacturer.

The Justice Department has written statements by Miss Paperman enumerating expensive gifts parties and other gratuities that Goldfine reputedly gave members of Congress and Eisenhower officials.

The grand jury was directed to determine the reliability of these charges and whether any federal laws were violated.

Looking Sideways

NEW YORK — It is a fascinating thing to have a relatively early morning news broadcast from New York. For one thing, it gets you out of the traffic.

You get up at an hour that is quiet in the huge city and by the time you are flagging down a cab the morning's first true light is bathing the buildings. You ride down with no more hindrance than traffic lights. No trucks, no private cars, only occasional cabs.

### Former Officer Free Of Bribery Attempt Charge

CLEBURNE (UPI)—A district court jury returned an instructed verdict of innocent today in the attempted bribery trial of G. R. (Dick) Bufkin, a former Potter County (Amarillo) deputy sheriff. Judge Penn Jackson instructed the jury to return the innocent verdict. He agreed with Bufkin's lawyer, G. R. Shuford, that the indictment should have charged Bufkin with bribery, not attempted bribery.

Shuford cited the testimony Monday night captain in the Potter County sheriff's office. Petropoulos said he took a \$100 gift from Bufkin but later gave it back. Shuford contended that, according to past legal decisions, whether or not Petropoulos kept the money was beside the point. He said it became a bribe when it went into Petropoulos' pocket. "Evidence has showing that money actually changed hands, Jackson said, agreeing with the lawyer. "It cannot be considered an offer of a bribe if the money is actually taken."

### Probate Allowed Convicted Killer

MARSHALL, Tex. (UPI)—Robert Bell, 62, was convicted of murder Monday but authorities aren't holding it against him. In effect, he has their thanks. Bell was found guilty of murder with malice. He shot and killed James Brooks, a man who had been in numerous scrapes with police, in May 1960 when Brooks came to his home drunk and refused to leave. District Judge Sam B. Hall Sr. sentenced Bell to 10 years in prison, then noting that Bell had never before been in trouble, probated the sentence. "And besides," Hall commented, "the county is better off with the deceased no longer among us."

### Estimated 800 Yanks Reported Seeking Way To Abandon Cuba

HAVANA (UPI)—About half of the estimated 800 U. S. nationals in Cuba who want to go home have applied for repatriation and are awaiting special transportation to the United States, pending Cuban government approval. (In Washington the State Department said an "undetermined number" of Americans are being detained in Cuba and some 300 are having trouble getting exit permits to leave. One official said possibly 20 or 30 Americans rounded up in the mass arrests that followed the recent invasion attempt, may still be under arrest.)

The applications were submitted through the Swiss embassy which has been handling United States interests in Cuba since the break in diplomatic relations last year. A new law requires all persons who have been in Cuba for 29 days or more to obtain an exit permit from the department of technical investigations of the national police. Many cannot apply for an exit permit because passports, Cuban residence and other documents were confiscated by Cuban agents during and after the abortive invasion last month.

### Radio, TV Warned To Improve Program

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The chairman of the Federal Communications Commission told broadcasters yesterday they would have to improve the quality of programming if they expect to stay on the air. FCC Chairman Newton N. Minow said in a speech to the National Association of Broadcasters convention that radio and TV have failed to meet the standards of newspapers and magazines. He described the majority of TV shows as "a vast wasteland."

### Nixon Criticizes JFK For Press Censorship Plan

DETROIT (UPI)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon yesterday criticized President Kennedy's recent appeal for "self-censorship" by the press and said "the plea of security could well become a cloak for errors and failures by the administration." Nixon said "the kindest judgment that can be made about this scheme" is that it was obviously "not thought through by the White House staff." He spoke at a Detroit Press Club lunch. He charged that the whole idea of a return to secrecy in peacetime "demonstrates a profound misunderstanding of the role of a free press as opposed to that of a controlled press." The former vice president, who lost to Kennedy by an eyelash in last November's presidential election, also criticized administration officials for contradicting themselves about the causes of the unsuccessful Cuban invasion. He said that Kennedy, in calling for self-restraint by the press, "appeared to blame the press for recent Cuban events. But would the results have been very much different had the press failed to perform its traditional role?"

### Court Resumes Virginia School Dispute Hearing

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI)—A federal district judge resumed hearings yesterday on the closing of Prince Edward County public schools and the question which he said should have been decided "long ago" in state courts. The question: When Prince Edward closed its public schools in 1959 to avoid court-ordered desegregation did it violate Virginia's Constitution? Judge Oren R. Lewis spent more than six hours Monday hearing arguments on tangled legal issues by counsel for the state and county, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the United States Department of Justice. Lewis indicated his feelings on the case several times during the day and capsuled them in one statement. "If possible, I'm going to give the Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals the opportunity" to decide the main issue of this case, he said.

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# Many Placards Show The Trend In Cuba

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—The socialist republic of Cuba is a land of slogans.

Signs abound. On buildings, on trucks and buses, on taxicabs, on television screens. On the radio, rallying mottoes are infinitely more numerous than spot advertisements.

And after making several visits to Cuba, an observer can tell from the placards how things are going in the country, and, indeed, can sometimes foretell coming events.

Fidel Castro's May Day declaration that Cuba was henceforth to consider itself a Democratic socialist republic, after the fashion of the Iron Curtain nations, was foretold in banners hung throughout Havana more than a week before his speech.

"Via Cuba Socialista," the placards proclaimed. And from the moment the banners went up, the capital buzzed with the word that Castro was going to officially proclaim Cuba a socialist nation. This slogan was even dinned into the ears of people telephoning, while they waited for the party on the other end of the line to answer.

The day after Castro and President Osvaldo Dorticos signed a message to the diplomatic corps in Havana indicating that Cuba was prepared to negotiate its differences with the United States, there wasn't an anti-Yankee slogan to be seen in the downtown section of the capital.

May of the placards are designed for the problems of the moment. But many are standard. "Fatherland or Death" is one of the favorites, together with "Long Live the Revolution."

On another front Cuban girls are being urged to marry iron curtain technicians.

The urging came from no less a person than Industries Minister Ernesto (Che) Guevara, number two man in the Castro regime, in a recent marathon television address.

## Troops Are Sent To Congo Zone Massacre Scene

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—The United Nations dispatched troop reinforcements yesterday to the South Kasai Province rail center of Port Francqui where Ghanaians U. N. troops were reported massacred 12 days ago.

The survivors of the April 27 clash with Congolese soldiers already have been flown to the South Kasai capital of Lubumbourg.

The exact toll at Port Francqui is not known, but at least 42 U. N. personnel are reported missing, including two British and two Swedish officers.

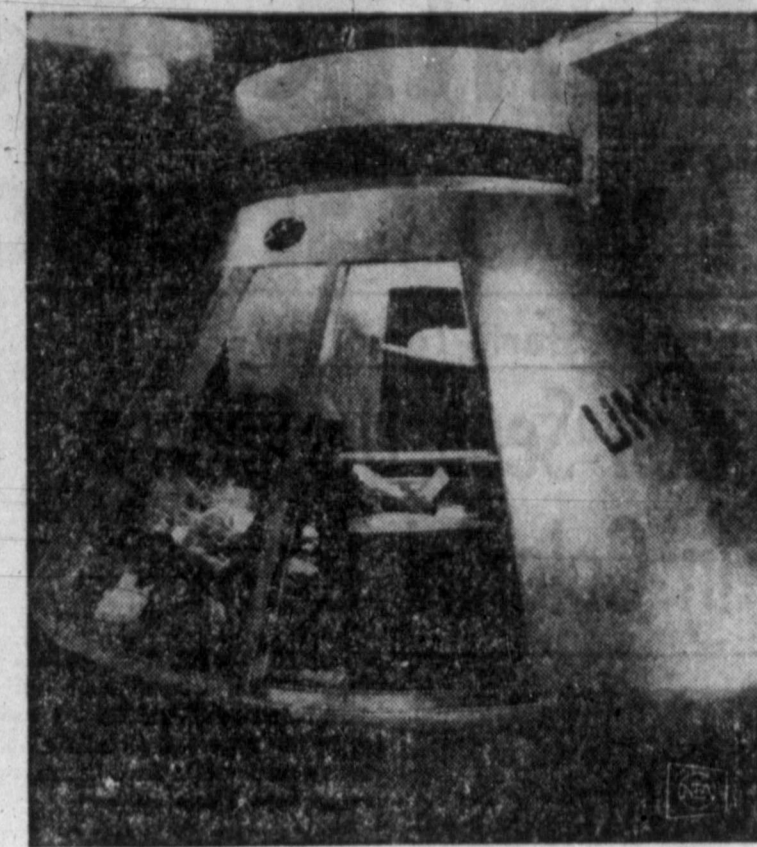
C. De Graft Dickson, Ghana's minister of defense, gave detailed account of the incident in Accra Monday.

Dickson said the 90-man Ghanaians garrison had gotten along very well with the 190 Congolese soldiers stationed at Port Francqui until 200 Congolese reinforcements arrived and started stirring up trouble.

The Ghanaians, under orders not to shoot unless attacked, tried to negotiate with the Congolese but were caught in a surprise attack, Dickson said.

He said more than 30 Ghanaians were murdered on the spot when they surrendered their weapons.

The United Nations demanded that the Congolese government prosecute the soldiers guilty of the massacre.

## Dallas Social Group Organizes 'Bookathon'

DALLAS (UPI)—If one of your social or civic groups wants advice on collecting books, talk with the local chapter of the Women's Council of B'nai B'rith.

These women are well on their way to a goal of 10,000 books collected for Dallas public libraries. And, at a cost to the council, of only \$10.

This is the third year that the council has conducted what it calls a "Bookathon" to get volumes for the libraries that they can't afford to buy.

The first two years, Bookathons collected a total of 8,000 books. This year, Mrs. Lillian M. Bradshaw, assistant director of the libraries, asked if the council could gather 10,000 books because of the needs of two new branch libraries.

The council allotted \$10 to the project, of which it had made Mrs. David Siegel chairman, and Mrs. Sid Grossblatt, co-chairman.

Mrs. Siegel and Mrs. Grossblatt called on everybody they thought could help them, from Mayor R. L. Thornton to editors of newspapers and managers of television and radio stations and presidents of stores who could lend them trucks to haul the books.

"We started seeing these people in fear and trembling, trying to convince them they could do something for us," Mrs. Grossblatt said. "They ended up not only doing what we asked but suggesting additional things we could do. It looks like everybody wants to help a project that has to do with books."

When they called on City Manager Elgin Crull and told him how far they'd gotten on their \$10, he suggested that it might be a good idea for his own budget makers to consult them.

They organized a "Bookathon Hop" in the ballroom of the Dallas Merchandise Mart. Local bands, singers and disc jockeys all performed free. The only paying was done by the dancers and they each contributed one hard back book.

Then they staged a review of "The Queen's Necklace," and the author, Mrs. Frances Sanger Mossiker, of Dallas, was present. The admission was two books.

They would up the special events section of their Bookathon with a Saturday "Kiddie Show" at three moving picture theaters. The children didn't get in unless they paid the regular admission to their theaters, but if they brought along a hard back book, they got a chance on a drawing for two radios.

Mrs. Siegel and Mrs. Grossblatt had wheeled the radios out of a jewelry store. In the meantime, mention of the project on television and radio stations and stories in the newspapers and pictures in the newspapers brought in thousands of books from individuals.

## Chemically-Treated Dart Causes Georgia Officer To Black Out

ATLANTA (UPI)—A speeding motorist tossed a chemically treated dart into the cheek of an Atlanta patrolman who pulled alongside him last night and the officer lost consciousness.

Police said the dart was tipped with nicotine alkaloid, an extremely dangerous drug which is sometimes used in small amounts for stunning animals. The chemical and a number of darts and syringes were stolen Friday night from the Palmer Chemical and equipment Co.

Patrolman E. A. Clements said he pulled up on the right side of an automobile at an intersection after he clocked the motorist at speeds up to 60 miles per hour in downtown Atlanta.

"He raised his right hand and I felt a sting in my left cheek," Clements said. "Something hit me like a ton of bricks and I blacked out."

Clements regained consciousness a short time later. He was slumped over in the front seat of his patrol car, which had run onto the curb.

Frank Brickley, an official of the chemical company from which the drug was apparently stolen, said the motorist either had an expert knowledge of the drug or was extremely lucky.

"The drug could be fatal if it is not administered in proper amounts," Brickley said. "This man must either be an expert on the drug or he is extremely lucky not to have done much worse damage."

## Editors, After Talk With JFK, Say No News Censorship Needed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Eight newspaper and press association executives conferred for 30 minutes yesterday with President Kennedy and later announced arrangements for continuing consultation with the government on national security news.

A spokesman for the group said, however, that there was no need at present for any machinery, voluntary or otherwise, to screen news stories in the national security field.

The conference stemmed from Kennedy's April 27 speech before the American Newspaper Publishers Association in New York. In that speech he called for a new measure of self-restraint in printing stories involving national security. Kennedy's speech came shortly after the ill-fated invasion of Cuba.

The meeting was requested by the officers of the ANPA, the American Society of Newspaper Editors. Frank H. Bartholomew, president of United Press International, and Benjamin McKelway, president of the Associated Press, and White House press secretary Pierre Salinger, Felix McKnight, executive editor of the Dallas Times Herald and president of the ASNE, and Mark Ferree of the Scripps-Howard newspapers and president of the ANPA, issued this statement in behalf of all eight news executives.

## Wiretapping Not Yet Wiped Out, Senator Asserts

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N. C., says that federal prohibitions against wiretapping have failed to wipe out the practice.

Ervin made the statement as the Senate constitutional rights subcommittee opened hearings on bills designed to clarify conflicting laws and court rulings on various kinds of eavesdropping.

The first witness, Brooklyn, N. Y., Dist. Atty. Edward S. Silver, argued the necessity of tapping telephones to fight organized crime.

Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., has said no American citizen is safe from the devious techniques of illegal tappers.

One of the proposals up for consideration by Ervin's subcommittee is a bill by Dodd to impose stiff curbs on tapping by federal and local officials and by private detectives.

In theory, federal law makes it a crime for anyone to intercept a telephone conversation and disclose the contents. But this 1935 law has been interpreted through the years to ban disclosure, not the tapping itself.

In some states, particularly New York, the police tap wires under state statutes. Massachusetts, Maryland, Nevada and Oregon also permit tapping under court order.

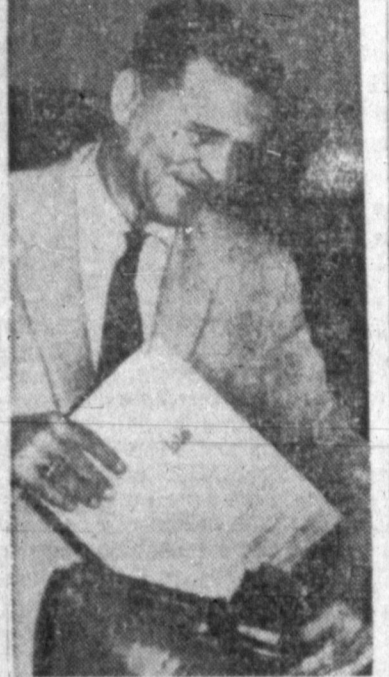

'Poll' Fires  
Up 3-4A Pens

Although discussion of District 3-4A baseball should be a dead subject with the exception of Lubbock Monterey, outcries from at least two sports editors of conference towns promise to make the post-season activity more interesting than the league play itself.

The latest sore spot is the all-district selections, announced earlier this week. For the first time in history of the five-year-old District 3-4A, the team was selected on “recommendations of coaches and sports writers,” rather than by vote in the past.

The recommendations placed three men each from Lubbock and Monterey, two from Borger, and one each from Plainview, Pampa and Tascosa on the first team.

But, on the second team, the “recommendations” went haywire and seven boys from Amarillo — two from Tascosa and Amarillo and three from Palo Duro were named — seven boys who were on teams that finished in sixth, seventh and eighth place.

Who “recommended” these Amarillo boys? Bob Hilburn, sports editor of the Plainview paper, said that Jim Sims of the Amarillo daily told him that “he (Sims) followed the voting on all positions on the first team, but substituted his choice in some places on the second team.” Evidently, here was a lot of “substituting.”

So, what you have is an Amarillo paper all-district team, rather than a true consensus. With that in mind, what's to prevent all the other papers in the district from printing their own all-district selections? As for the case of the missing votes, we'll admit gladly to the fact that we returned our all-district blank unanswered. So did Ted Leach at Borger, but for different reasons.

We did not vote for the simple fact that we saw only two teams play twice: Amarillo and Lubbock. Monterey did not play here (or anywhere else in this area for that matter this season) and we were out of town the weekend that Plainview and Tascosa were here. Add to that the fact that the ballot was to be sent in with two weeks left to go in the season, which would have made us vote with games still remaining with Borger, Tascosa and Palo Duro.

Leach did not vote for several reasons. He has long maintained that something shady happened to all-district tabulations once they reached Amarillo for counting, basing his assumption on past football selections. Also, he has still not forgiven Monterey and Lubbock for skipping out on the Borger series, although the blame must be shared by the Borger official.

After Leach and I sent back our blanks, Sims sent this paper's blank to Warren Hasse, who had seen all the games prior to the ballot. Hasse filled it in and sent it back so actually, Pampa did vote on the all-district team.

Borger's empty card was sent back to Borger where Toby Druin, now city editor but a former sports editor there, also returned it unsigned because of the Lubbock fiasco.

Now, who gets hurt in this over-use of the U.S. mail? The Therefore, use of the U.S. mails? The players themselves? Therefore, we feel that the only solution to the problem is to let the players vote, similar to the way the major league all star teams are now selected. (See GALLERY, Page 11)

That leaves the field wide open and there's no one on the tour, aside from Player and Palmer, who rank one-two in money winnings and two-one in number of tournament titles, who have been more consistently banging away at the front runners.

Bolt and all but two of the remaining 56 golfers in the select field got a chance to test their games against Colonial's grudging par 70 today in a \$4,500 pro-amateur — a warmup for the real thing which starts Thursday, when \$7,000 will be at stake for the champion.

Palmer and Dow Finsterwald could not make it here in time for the pro-am because of television commitments while Hogan — perhaps in deference to the strain of tourney competition — decided to pass it up.

## Breaks Three Marks, Orioles Bury Twins

No matter who you like for the triple-crown—Mickey Mantle or Carry Back — it might be a wise idea to keep your eye on a dark horse named Jim Gentile.

Baseball's "railbirds" gradually are becoming convinced the broad-backed Baltimore Oriole first baseman can do it. Gentile gave them added food for thought by setting three major league records with a pair of grand slam homers in consecutive innings during a 13-5 victory over Minnesota that led Baltimore into sole possession of third place in the American League.

The 26-year-old Gentile — all his friends call him "Diamond Jim" — drove in nine runs with his two homers and a sacrifice fly so that he now leads the league with 30 RBIs. That gives him six more than Mantle has and his season total of nine home runs is the same as Mantle's.

Given to brooding when he's not hitting, Gentile has been known to moan, "Maybe I should have been a truck driver like my father," but the fact of the matting average of .333 (at the sophomore jinx with a current batting average of .353 that is third best in the league).

Gentile's first homer Tuesday came off loser Pedro Ramos (2-2) in the first-inning and his second one was hit at the expense of Paul Giel in the second inning. The Orioles' slugger thus became the first man in major league history ever to hit grand slam homers in consecutive times at bat and in consecutive innings. The eight runs he drove in with those two blows earned him another record — most runs driven in over two innings.

Ron Hansen also homered for the Orioles to help Chuck Estrada to his second victory. Bob Allison hit a pair of homers for the Twins and Hal Naragon and Harmon Killebrew hit one apiece.

Elsewhere in the AL, the Chicago White Sox snapped a seven game losing streak with a 4-2 victory over the Cleveland Indians; Kansas City beat New York, 5-4; first-place Detroit ran its winning streak to six games with a 7-2 win over Washington in the opener of a two-night double-header, but lost the nightcap, 5-4, and Los Angeles beat Boston, 8-7.

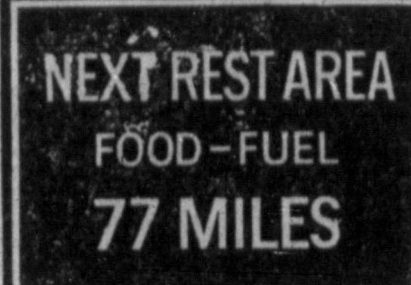

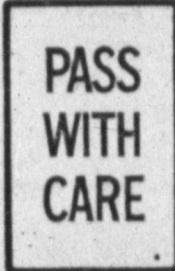

Tiny Connector Does Big Job In Electronics

NEW YORK (UPI)—Connectors are getting smaller all the time, but the industry they make up is growing by leaps and bounds.

These smaller but more efficient and powerful electronic components are called micro-miniature electronics.

Connectors are the "make or break" points within any electronic circuit—much the same as a plug to which an electric appliance is attached.
