



WASHINGTON (UPI) - Secreof State Dean Rusk said yesterday the nation must expect ever more dangerous political and military crises to rock the world.

Rusk, testifying before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee after East German Communists sealed escape routes to West Berlin with armed troops, warned: "The possibility exists that some mistake or miscalcuation may create the spark which could plunge the world into a disaster." But recurring global troubles should not prevent the United States from seizing any opportunity to press for disarmament with imagination and patience, he added.

Pegler Says: The Doctor Says: By DR. HAROL

THOMAS HYMAN Q. My baby was a premature and had to be placed in an incubator right after birth. When I first saw her, I was sure she was perfectly normal. I am positive I saw her move both legs as babies do. But when I got her home, she was unable to move her left leg.

I don't know what could have happened to her and I don't care so long as she isn't going to be lame all her life. Is there anything I can do right now to save her from being a cripple? A. Prematures are very suscepti-


