U.S. Gains Support For Ousting Cuba Without Economic Sanction

PUNTA DEL ESTE, Uruguay (UPI)—Columbia called today, on hemisphere nations for a collective break with Fidel Castro's Cuba and new measures of vigilance to preserve other countries from the spread of the Cuban socialist revolution.

PUNTA DEL ESTE, Uruguay (UPI) — The stage appeared to be set today for the suspension of Fidel Castro's Cuban regime from the Organization of American States without the diplomatic and economic sanctions desired by the United States.

The United States and Argentina agreed Tuesday on a plan calling for suspension of the Castro regime from the inter-American system, increased precautions against Communist infiltration of the Western Hemisphere, and economic and social development through President Kennedy's "Alliance for Progress."

Other nations previously regarded as "holdouts" at the foreign ministers conference here appeared ready to support the U.S.-Argentine proposals, and it seemed certain that a resolution along those lines could win the 14 votes needed for approval.

Early today, representatives of Argentina, Brazil, Bolivia, Chile, Ecuador, Haiti and Mexico drafted a memorandum declaring the Castro regime "incompatible with the inter-American system."

All of these nations except Haiti had been regarded as members

Battle Due On Merger Of Airlines

NEW YORK (UPI)—The plans of American and Eastern airlines to merge into the world's largest air carrier were expected today to draw sharp opposition from some competitors, and possibly from unions and in Congress.

Already the president of Trans World Airlines has indicated TWA might fight the proposal made late Tuesday to join the second and fourth ranking U.S. domestic airlines into a nation-spanning passenger and cargo network with \$902 million in assets and 35,194 route miles.

United Air Lines, which merged with financially ailing Capital last year, ranks first in assets and revenue. TWA is in third place.

The Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) must approve the merger, ruling whether it would be in the public interest and would not destroy competition. The CAB gave no hint of its intentions. The 76,000 stockholders of the two lines also must approve the merger during a vote in April, but that is expected without trouble. Name of the surviving company would be American Airlines.

The merger announcement came only 10 days after plans were announced to unite two other transportation giants, the Pennsylvania and New York Central railroads, whose \$5.5 billion in assets are six times the combined assets of American and Eastern.

The American-Eastern merger was the third major airline consolidation announced within a year. All were generally motivated by the financial plight of the industry as a whole, which suffered an estimated \$30 million in losses last year and is plagued by more seats on the big, costly jets than there are passengers to fill them. Besides the already completed United-Capital union, National and Continental airlines said late last year they plan to merge, given CAB approval.

American, whose routes are mainly east-west, has run against the industry's tide of red ink, turning a \$6.8 million profit last year and \$11.7 million in 1960.

Eastern, built from a fledgling line to a major north-south carrier in the eastern half of the nation by famed World War I ace Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker, lost it in 1960. It lost \$3.6 million consistently turned a profit until two years ago. It lost \$3.6 million in 1960 and showed a deficit of \$5 million in the first nine months of last year. The two lines' combined operated revenues of \$722 million in 1960 would have ranked them 77th among sales of American corporations.

Fight On Loan Shark Is Moved To Senate

8-Story Building Crumbles When Struck By Crane

PINEDA DEL MAR, Spain (UPI)—A giant crane crashed into the top floor of an eight-story luxury hotel under construction Tuesday and sent the structure crumbling to the ground in a mass of plaster and steel girders.

Authorities said at least seven persons died and more than 80 were injured.

The crane caved in the hotel's top floor and set off a chain reaction that sent the structure down in a choking cloud of dust.

Postal Hike Bill Ready For Passage

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House today was ready to pass a \$709 million postal rate-raising bill.

House approval was assured after lawmakers late Tuesday tentatively approved a bill that would increase first class letters to five cents, post cards to four cents and airmail to eight cents an ounce beginning July 1.

It would also bar free delivery of foreign mail found by the Justice Department to be Communist propaganda, and would raise rates for widely circulated magazines and newspapers and for advertising circulars and other commercial mail posted in bulk lots.

The bill would bring in about \$79 million more in postal revenues than the administration hoped for, and it would be only slightly less than what President Kennedy asked Congress to provide last spring.

A smaller increase is likely to emerge later in the session as a House-Senate compromise.

Other congressional news:

TV: The Senate juvenile delinquency subcommittee summoned three witnesses, including president Oliver Treys of the American Broadcasting Co., to testify about violence on TV shows. Chairman Thomas J. Dodd's investigators promised proof that network officials ordered sex and violence worked into TV productions.

Vote Expected To Be Called On Compromise

AUSTIN (UPI) — The State Senate agreed unanimously this afternoon to delay floor action until Thursday at 10:30 a.m. on a bill designed to drive loan sharks out of Texas.

Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi said the extra day is needed for "everybody to know what they are doing."

AUSTIN (UPI) — The fight to eliminate loan sharks in Texas was expected to move to the floor of the Texas Senate today.

Sen. Martin Dies Jr. of Lufkin was expected to call for a vote on a "compromise" small loan regulatory act approved by the Senate State Affairs Committee.

The bill incorporates features contained in a measure passed by the House and recommendations made by Dies, Sen. Hubert Hudson of Brownsville and other senators.

House members were set to vote on a bill by Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress to permit the Railroad Commission to regulate the sale of natural gas used for irrigation purposes.

As approved by the Senate State Affairs Committee the small loan measure has three basic parts:

—A consumer finance commissioner would regulate the industry. License holders would have to be Texans and the corporations would have to be 51 per cent Texas-owned. Chain operations would be limited to 50 branch offices.

—Interest rates would start at 3 per cent per month on loans up to \$100. It would be 2.5 per cent on loans \$100-\$200, and 1 per cent on loans \$200-\$500.

The constitutional 10 per cent limit would apply to larger loans.

—Credit life, health and accident insurance could be required on loans of more than \$200, and insurance on tangible property offered as security on loans more than \$200.

Dies originally recommended a flat 3 per cent per month interest on loans up to \$300. The House bill, by Rep. Criss Cole, featured a sliding scale of rates on loans up to \$1,500.

Pending committee action in the House is a resolution asking State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert to reverse his interpretation of one part of the sales tax law passed last year.

The resolution, by Cole and other representatives, pointed out merchants must pay the 2 per cent tax to the state on sales of taxable items or tangible persons.

Five Satellite Multiple Orbit Attempt Fails

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—The United States failed today in an attempt to orbit a record five satellites in one shot when the upper stage of the rocket launcher mis-fired.

An 80-foot Thor-Able-Star rocket was sent into the sky at 4:30 a.m. EST, with the five satellites attached like Christmas tree ornaments to a rack inside its nose.

But about 25 minutes later, the Air Force said the upper stage of the gleaming white missile failed to build up thrust after it ignited.

The rockets and the little moonlets, which weighed a total of 219 pounds, plunged into the Atlantic Ocean a few hundred miles southeast of Cape Canaveral.

Navy and Air Force officials said the debris landed in the ocean "well south of Cuba."

In a previous multiple satellite launching 14 months ago, the wreckage of a similar Thor-Able-Star landed in eastern Cuba.

There was no indication immediately as to what had gone wrong with today's rocket.

The shot, called "Composite 1," was the fourth failure in six attempts by the United States to put multiple satellites into orbit with a single rocket.

Today's satellites were to have been hurled into separate but similar orbits—thus the nickname of "Project Buckshot" for the launching.

Airman Brutally Slain In Attack At Wichita Falls

WICHITA FALLS, Tex. (UPI)—Robert Richard Reed, 32, an Oklahoma airman, fought savagely for his life today but was overwhelmed, beaten, slashed and stomped to death in a roadside park.

The Clay County sheriff's office said his throat was slashed with a "knife or a razor" and his killers kicked his face until it was unrecognizable.

"There was so much blood that he probably injured one of his attackers," a deputy said.

Reed, stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base, was from Spavinaw, Okla., a small town near Tulsa. He was attached to the 63rd School Squadron.

Hazel Irwin of Henrietta, Tex., discovered the body in the park, five miles east of Wichita Falls. The headlights of her car silhouetted Reed on the ground, and she stopped to see if he needed help.

Investigators said that tracks in the mud beside U. S. Highway 287 indicated that at least two persons and perhaps more took part in the attack on Reed.

A small foreign car with a Sheppard windshield sticker on it was parked near the body. Police believed it belonged to Reed.

The body was still warm when it was discovered.

"From the looks of the scene, Reed sure put up a whale of a battle," a deputy said.

Racketeer Stock Deals Checked By Government

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said today the Justice Department was investigating stock deals made by major racketeers to see if they violated federal laws.

Kennedy said in an interview that big-time gangsters have been involved recently in suspicious stock transactions in several areas of the country.

This seems to be part of long-range efforts by racketeers figures, more pronounced in recent years, to channel profits from illicit activities into legitimate businesses, Kennedy said.

"We are making some progress in this investigation," the attorney general said. He declined to give details or locations of the inquiry but emphasized there was no evidence to show that the major stock exchanges in New York City were under any racketeer influence or control.

Justice Department sources said that investigators had found "some manipulation" of stock prices by underworld figures.

This involved artificially induced buying and selling of a stock, either through an exchange or over the counter, to push up the price, the sources said.

Other findings have shown that racketeers have bought control of some companies by stock acquisition, according to these sources.

The FBI, Security & Exchange Commission (SEC) and the Justice Department's organized crime and racketeering section have been alerted to watch how known gangsters invest their money.

28 East Germans Escape To West

BERLIN (UPI) — Twenty-eight East Germans staged a mass escape to West Berlin only a few hours before the Communist parliament met today to pass a compulsory draft law.

West Berlin police said the escapees, including men, women and children, slipped through the barbed wire Tuesday night in an isolated area where the northwest corner of Berlin juts into fields, swamps and ponds of East Germany.

That Little Black Dress Smart Women's Standby

The little black dress is every smart woman's standby for her wardrobe.
When you make a "little black dress," buy good fabric, the most pleasing and best you can afford. Choose a smart pattern and sew it into every line.
Press each seam carefully—use your hand stitches and sew with the idea that the dress will be your best dress for two years or more.
The designs shown here are simple and easy to make. Both come in sizes 10 to 40.
Use jersey, silk, mohair, heavy crepe—even satin for the straight dress on the left. Wear with or without a belt, or make a belt at the side seam—belt dress in front and let back hang straight.
What is there to such a dress? Four seams, two darts, a hem and three facings. You can make it in an afternoon.
Buy two or three stoles to wear with it. Each can fit a mood—a sheer, or fabric of the dress, a nylon, a velvet, a lovely brocade.
Stoles can serve as sleeves, yet save you in fashion with a sleeveless dress.
Stoles are so easy to make. Just turn right-side-out, slip stitch the open end together, through which you turned the stole. Press, and the stole is finished; or if the fabric is wool, self-fringe the ends.
The strap dress is another big fashion. For the skirt can be full or straight as you like. The fitted bodice in front and the little jacket all add to the fashion rightness.
Make it of taffeta, satin, brocade, lace, heavy crepe or velvet, and use jeweled buttons on the jacket or omit them altogether—omit the collar and tie if you like.
It's a truly beautiful costume—one that will serve you for little or big occasions.
Dear Miss Picken: My aunt gave me a large, heavy, velvet coat fabric. I'd like to rip it and make myself a coat. Some one has told me that velvet is only good for formal wear.—M. A. D.
Dear M. A. D.: Bosh. Velvet is lovely for a coat. They even make raincoats of velvet and velveteen.
Just chose a simple pattern: one with a flare back would be good. Make sleeves just below elbow—make and enjoy your coat.
