

"The people of this state should realize that once the appropriations bill was approved, additional taxes had to come from somewhere. The issue, it seems to me, is to cut expenditures-not constanly seek money to pay for expenditures already voted upon."

Wills also voiced a protest against the Safe Driving Plan. which he called "totally inequitable." This is the plan which penalizes drivers on their insurance premiums for moving traffic violations and accidents.

"The very idea of penalizing a man for three years on his insurance premiums for a very. minor moving traffic violation is preposterous on the face of it." he said. He called for a complete revision of the plan which would penalize drivers for only one year-and then only in the case of more serious driving offenses or accidents.

Wills said he would add a new innovation if voters send him to Austin. He stated that he would report at least twice month! to his constituents on major is sues before and after they are acted upon by the House.
