Shakeup Is In Making

ministration soon will announce plans for a giant shakeup in the Army Department - an undertaking so controversial that a former defense secretary once compared it with the pain of back ing into a buzzsaw.

Daveloped at Defense Secretary Rober: S. McNamara's direction and approved by President Kennedy, the reorganization will deal a blow to long-entrenched Army agencies and set a flock of officers to worrying about old traditions and new assignments.

Kennedy may comment on the long - pending overhaul, at his news conference Monday. Details have been leaking out for weeks. The authoritative Army-Navy-Air Force Journal published more today and commented that the reorganization, "already has drawn sharp protests from a number of senior officers."

How much of the scheme requires congressional approval remains to be seen. That there will be opposition is certain.

Chiefly affected by the recasting of Army administrative machinery will be old-line technical services - ordnance, chemical, quartermaster, signal and transportation corps.

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

"Before his translation he had this testimony that he pleased God." Hebrews 11:5. The record of the life of Enach is brief. It would be mighty hard for me and my family to please God without being loyal and faithful to the church and upholding it with our prayers, our presence, our gifts, and our service."

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

No expert in the nation's capital knows as much about a community's local problems and how to meet them, as its local businessmen and officials. Too much government is just as much a threat to our liberties as too little government."

But since the spenders began their trek toward the new Frontier they picked up 100,000 eager hitch-hikers and added them to the federal payroll. The proposed new bureaucracy would eventually direct everything in the local communities from parenthood to parking spaces. There would be direct lines from the local city mayor's office to the central agency in Washington, on the Moscow pattern. The new department, if created, could nullify local city government.

SAC commander-in-chief Gen. Thomas S. Power, in a message to the eight-man crew of the "Operation Persian Rug" bomber, hailed the flight as "historic."

He underlined its cold war importance by saying the flight proved that SAC aircraft have the capability of reaching target destinations in any area of the

The biggest mark broken today by the bomber from the Minot, N. D., Air Force base, was the previous record for a non-stop, non-refuelled flight by air aircraft. It was set in 1946 by the Navy Neptune bomber Truculent Turtle, which flew from Perth, Australia, to Columbus, Ohio, 11,235.6 miles in 55 hours and 18 minutes.

The plane, tagged a "combat operational B52H jet Stratofortress or missile platform bomber" by the Air Force, made the trip from Okinawa by way of Tokyo, Seattle, Fort Worth, Washington
