Speculation On Trade Bill In **Economic Circles**

NEW YORK (UPI)-While hearings on the foreign trade bill have been in progress before the House Ways and Means committee, there has been lively speculation in economic circles on how business and labor as a whole feel about proposals which in effect will launch the nation on a new approach to international com-

Ultimately, the votes of congressmen and possibly the results of the fall elections may give the answers, but efforts to determine how the country feels have gone on since before the public testimony before the House committee

The bill would bestow presidential power to cut tariffs, to reduce or eliminate tariffs on goods with which the United States and the European Common Market countries have a dominant role in world trade; at home, to protect some industries by temporary tariffs, or to impose such tariffs in the name of national security; to give assistance to workers thrown out of employment by dislocations caused by workings of the act.

In one of those efforts to determine how the public feels on what all agree is a major national issue, Elmo Roper and Associates sent a mail questionnaire, on the provisions of the act, to a group of corporation executives and to executives of all national and international labor unions.

The conclusion was that "contary to many expectations," business and labor leaders were not at odds on propositions of the act and that the answers indicated both groups "are strongly convinced that trade expansion is desirable and that traditional American protectionism has come to the end of the road."

Low Draft Rate Seen

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Defense officials have predicted the draft rate would remain low for the next few years because of increasing enlistments.

Men now are being drafted at a rate of 6,000 a month and will climb to 6,500 in June, As late as 1957, the average was more than

The draft brought in 60,293 men during the year ended last July 1, and 90,344 in 1960, A sharply increased draft call last fall because of the Berlin crisis will push for the current fiscal 'year' to 148,000.

Defense officials said the current draft figures were likely to be typical of the next few years because of the higher birthrate and the accompanying increase

The number of American youths reaching military age now is running between 1.4 million and 1.5 million a year, compared to 1.1 million before 1958.

SALES TAX

am a Democratic Candidate for State Representative from the 87th District. This is the sixth in my series of newspaper columns and radio speeches.

On February 5, 1962, when I announced for the office of State Representative, my statement read in part, "Relief from the complexity of the State Sales Tax by applying tax on and across-the-board basis." We have a Sales Tax, therefore, the issue in this campaign is the method to be used in amending this Tax Law in order to arrive at a just and equitable Sales Tax Law.

Our present Sales Tax Law is based on Pennsylvania Sales Tax which went into effect in 1956 at 3 % and is now 4%. Pennsylvania Sales Tax Law is a model of complexities and is not working now, nor has it ever worked. The tre mendous State Bureaucracy set up to administer this law merely puts an additional burden upon the people of Pennsylvania. Texas said they could solve this problem of administration. In Texas its complexities have been transfered to the small business man and the individual. I do not call that a solution. It is merely passing the buck on an unworkable Sales Tax Law.

Our four neighboring States of Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico have an across-theboard Sales Tax. These taxes and 1937 as a 2% Sales Tax and are now operating at 2% except Kansas which has increased to 21/2%. They are a proven workable Sales Tax, and my solution to our tax problem would be along the lines of the Sales Tax in these States using the form of a Retail Sales Tax in preference to a Gross Receipts Tax. I will favor a 1% Tax provided it will pay the State's Bills; if not, I will favor a 2% Tax, but absolutely no more. Details on exemptions and retentions I will favor are covered in my radio address this Friday

Our sales Tax Law provides for raising the fee for Driver's License. This item should be removed from our Sales Tax Law and returned to its former fee. This item is a Highway Safety regulation and should not be used as a Tax source.

dentist. He was disturbed by the angry condition of the lesion and its change in shape, but there was no infection and actually no indication that a malignancy existed. He prescribed a dosage of antibiotic lozenges.

We could tell the lesion was not dwindling. We went back to the dentist and discussed taking a sample of the tissue and sending it to a pathologist. The dentist took a biopsy, an ordinary amount of tissue and sent it to the pathologist. The next day the pathologist sent his report, be he called first and asked for another biopsy, explaining that there was a certain amount of squamous cell activity in the tissue and asking that more tissue be removed on the next biopsy.
