 President Miguel Ydigoras Fuentes of Guatemala has succeeded in reopening a subject the United States would rather forget and at the same time created some embarrassment for the United States in its relations with Great Britain.

The embarrassment springs from Ydigoras' hint in a New Year's Eve speech that the United States promised to use its good offices in connection with Guatemala's claim on neighboring British Honduras.

The subject the United States would just as soon forget is last spring's abortive attempt to invade Cuba.

Ydigoras is an extreme right-wing nationalist and one-time general who took office in 1955, and who at one time or another since then has feuded with most of his neighbors, including Mexico, Costa Rica and Nicaragua.

Almost at the outset of his administration, he also took on Great Britain with renewal of Guatemala's ancient claims on British Honduras.

That quarrel dates back to 1821 when Guatemala gained independence from Spain and promptly made the first of her claims against the adjoining British crown colony.

Britain rejected the claim on grounds identical to Portugal's recent unsuccessful defense of its rights in Indian Goa, namely, that it was there by treaty with

Spain signed long before Guatemala became a nation.

In 1859 a treaty between Britain and Guatemala established a boundary between Guatemala and the Auantic at a point near Belize, capital of British Honduras.

In 1945, Guatemala renounced the treaty on the grounds the British had not lived up to its provisions, and renewed the earlier claims.

In his New Year's Eve speech, Ydigoras recalled that Guatemala had provided training grounds for the Cuban refugees who later attempted the invasion. For that favor, he said, Guatemala was entitled to a "just price."

The price, he implied, was U. S. intervention in his quarrel with Britain.

No such promise is recalled in Washington.

# Strength Seen In Near Term Market Activity

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—Seasonal and statistical background market factors, together with a forceful reinvestment demand, suggest that further selective near-term strength will take place, says Kenneth Ward.

On the Dow averages, says the Hayden Stone analyst, there is no change in previous opinion that the next important target area is about 760-770 on the industrials, regardless of any early profit-taking setback.

He thinks rails will cross 150 and reach 160 during the year. Other depressed groups favored by the analyst are machine tools, building materials, coppers, coals, papers, motion pictures, textiles, steels and aluminum.

Walter K. Gutman's industry of the month is steel. He says these stocks as a group are good buys for establishing a cushion of

short-term profits in 1962.

Now that 1961 tax selling is over, the Dow theory trader says a sharply higher market hitting new highs is indicated during the coming several months.

Unparalleled business activity and the prospect of record corporate profits are favorable influences to the stock market now, says United Business Service. It sees no threat of anything more than temporary shake-outs in the near future.

Spear & Staff Inc., says recent weakness in the advance-decline ratio indicates that the market may be in for some minor trouble in the period just ahead. It sees no sign, however, that the major upward trend has been halted and it continues to advise the purchase of selected issues.

**AUSTIN (UPI)** — Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth introduced a bill in the legislature's special session today that he said will correct "woefully inadequate" juvenile parole arrangements in Texas.

Kennard's bill calls for a \$106,000 appropriation to the Texas Youth Council for an expanded juvenile parole system. It would create 15 additional state parole officers' positions, and two area supervisors, as recommended by Gov. Price Daniel in his message to the joint session of the legislature Wednesday.

"The present juvenile parole system has five officers, Kennard said, "a mere token plan."

# Nuclear Testing Believed Planned On Johnston Isle

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The Air Force base on tiny Johnston Island in the Pacific will be reconstructed in preparation for possible resumption of atmospheric nuclear testing by the United States.

The Atomic Energy Commission said today the Los Angeles firm of Holmes and Narver had a contract for construction on the island. This followed reports that skilled workmen were being recruited in Hawaii to be sent to Johnston Island within a month.

Defense sources confirmed the work would be part of the Defense Department's preparations for atmospheric testing. The Los Angeles firm did the preliminary construction for previous tests at Eniwetok in the Marshall Islands.

The Defense Department announced Dec. 29 that Maj. Gen. Alfred D. Starbirk had been named to head a task force which would be ready to carry out nuclear tests in the air if President Kennedy orders them.

Johnston Island, only a mile long and a quarter of a mile wide, and only seven feet above sea level—has a 6,000-foot runway and is used by the Military Air Transport Service as a refueling stop.

# Laos Compromise Program Backed

**GENEVA (UPI)** — The United States still hopes to persuade pro-Western Premier Prince Boun Oum to accept a compromise which would break the deadlock on a peace settlement in Laos, it was reported today.

Informed sources close to the 14-nation Laos talks here said U. S. diplomats in Vientiane are trying to persuade Boun and his "strong man" defense minister, Gen. Phoumi Nosavan, to accept a solution proposed a week ago by neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma.

Souvanna suggested that he serve as defense minister and interior minister as well as premier in a proposed coalition government to settle a dispute between the government, and the Communists led by Souvanna's half-brother Prince Souphanouvong.

Both the government and the Reds wanted to control the interior and defense ministries in the new government.

# Water Table Getting Low In Plains Areas, Witnesses Tell Court

LUBBOCK (UPI)—A series of witnesses testified Thursday in a \$300 lawsuit against the federal government that the underground water supply in the High Plains of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico has been constantly dwindling.

The suit, by Marvin Shurbet, a farmer from Petersburg, Tex., seeks to establish the principle of a cost depletion income tax allowance for declining water resources similar to that given to oilmen.

If he wins the suit, it would pave the way for similar suits by as many as 20,000 Texas and New Mexico farmers who irrigate their land from deep wells and result in an income tax saving estimated as high as \$6 million a year.

Dist. Judge Robert H. Bean of Lubbock was one of the last witnesses called for the day. He said the static water level in several wells he has drilled on South Plains property in recent years has dropped.

# U.S. Aides In Berlin Not Involved In Riff, U.S. Department Says

WASHINGTON (UPI)—High U.S. officials denied today there was any basic policy difference between Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Gen. Lucius D. Clay, President Kennedy's special representative in Berlin.

These officials acknowledged that Clay had commented from time to time on some of the Allied contingency plans for handling possible trouble along the Iron Curtain in divided Berlin.

But they denied that Clay had made any specific protest against Washington's tight rein on the U.S. commander in Berlin, Maj. Gen. Albert Watson. Reports said Clay felt Watson should be able to act more on his own in countering Communist moves.

The administration was said to realize that keeping a "short rein" on the Berlin commander has disadvantages. But officials said this was the only way in which the United States could remain in constant control of the potential dangerous situation in Berlin.

# Algerian Terror Wave Continues; Deaths Mounting

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI)—Terrorists killed two and wounded six more persons today to raise the total to 78 dead and 172 wounded in five days of violence throughout Algeria.

The latest attacks came as the rightwing secret army organization (OAS) called for a "general mobilization" against President Charles de Gaulle's policies for Algeria and the government announced the results of a two-month crackdown on the OAS.

The terror incidents involved the slaying of a Moslem in Algiers and the murder of one European and the wounding of another in Oran. Five Moslems were wounded when a hand grenade was tossed into a Moslem cafe in Algiers.

Thursday there were 13 killed and 46 wounded. Jean Sicurani, spokesman for Delegate General Jean Morin, said 237 persons were arrested in the Algeria-wide drive against the OAS.

He said 44 of those seized were charged with murder and 27 with desertion from the French army. He added that the OAS arrests came as a result of 1,650 searches and the confiscation of hundreds of arms and documents.

He also said that, in addition to those charged with murder and desertion, the suspects rounded up include 35 persons charged with bomb attacks, 56 charged with illegally carrying weapons, and the remainder charged with belonging to the OAS network.

Walls and poles in the Bab el Oued district were plastered during the night with secret army "recruiting posters"—careful copies of the real thing—calling for total resistance to De Gaulle's plans to give Algeria back to the Arabs. Troops spent the early hours of the day tearing down the posters.

Elsewhere in Algiers, troops and police used tear gas to put down a riot among Arabs held in Barberousse prison, who slashed gasoline around in an attempt to set a cell block on fire and throw flaming torches out of windows.

French troops traded bullets and bombs with Arab "commandos" in the heart of Oran Thursday; one of the most violent of this week's clashes.

Kansas Boxers And Coach Safe In Pampa Motel  
For awhile Friday morning in Pampa, the destiny of eight boys and their boxing coach was a puzzle to both area police and the head coach of the Liberal, Kans. boxing team.

The boys and their coach, all members of the Liberal boxing team which participated in the first round of the Pee Wee elimination tourney Thursday night in Pampa, were reported missing by head coach Tom Brown in Liberal Friday morning after failing to contact one of the boxing coaches, Jerry Cline.

Area police were notified in Perryton to keep a lookout for the nine "lost" people, but their efforts were of no avail.

Finally, Coach Cline notified local police late Friday morning that he and the boys had stayed over in a Pampa motel for the Friday night fights.

Driveway Thieves In Action Again; Pickup Is Looted  
Pampa's driveway thieves were in action again Thursday night. Police have had numerous reports in recent weeks of stolen articles taken from cars parked in driveways throughout the north section of the city.

Latest report came from Thomas Enright, 2520 Christine, who said a rifle and tools valued at \$80 were taken from a pickup parked in his driveway.

Enright said the thieves searched the truck thoroughly and found the articles under the front seat.

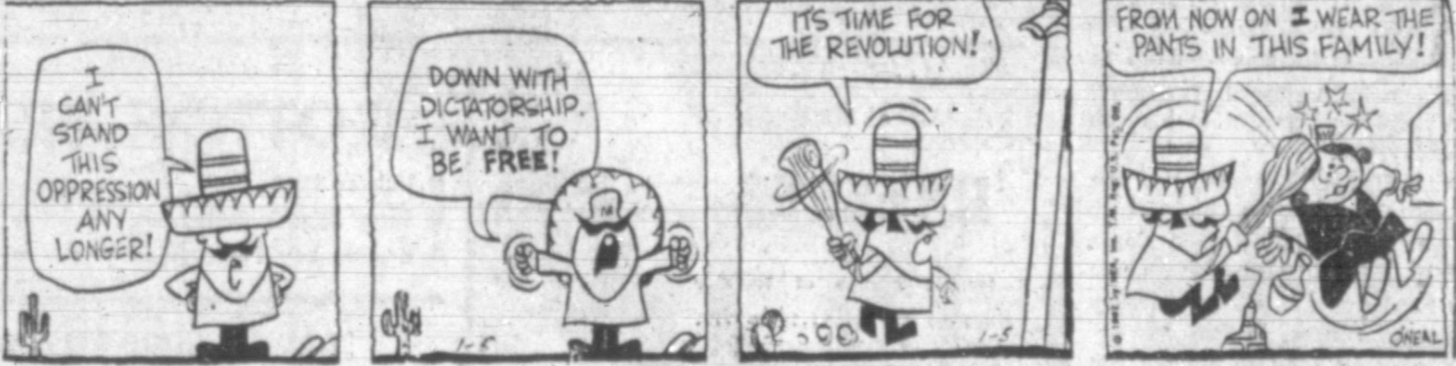

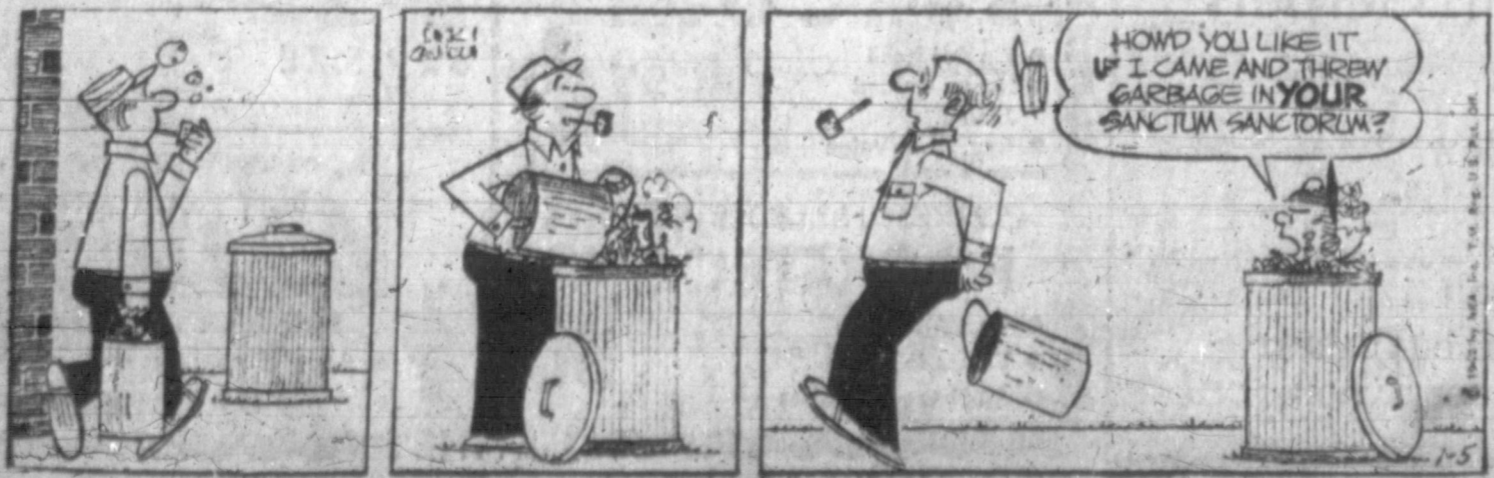

### ASK THE DESIGNER by gail dugas

Dear Gail: I am hoping you will give me some advice in the matter of styles that would flatter my figure. I find that I often buy on impulse something that later makes me unhappy. If I KNEW which style was most becoming (and comfortable), then I could stay with it.

Although I am 49, I have youthful skin, outlook and manner. My hair is silvery gray. My measurements are 38-28-38, which I am hoping to reduce by Christmas! My height is 5 feet 6 1/2 inches, neck short to medium, oval face. I'm trying to arrive at a style that will be smart yet comfortable. I would appreciate any suggestions you can give.—A. R.

Dear A. R.: First, stick with that resolve to trim your figure (basically a good one) by Christmas. Now, as to necklines, advice comes from designer Ben Barrack, who says: "The neckline should never be high but always a V, square or scoop. Any one of these will make your neck appear longer. Your hairdo should always be an off-the-neck style.

"For your work, your very best bet is the dress-and-jacket style. Have it in variations and in col-

ors as well as the basics: black, navy, gray or beige.

"For evening, select colors but avoid two-tone dresses as they tend to emphasize a short waist. Brocades and floaty chiffons are your best fabric choices for evening."

Dear Gail: Next spring, right after Easter, my sister is getting married. I am to be her matron of honor. I would like to select a dress which I can wear for special occasions after the wedding. Would you please give me an idea as to the kind of material and color I should choose? If possible, I would like to wear this dress for special occasions the year-round. Thank you for your help.—Mrs. S. B.

Dear Mrs. S. B.: A good many women feel just as you do these days. They regard the one-occasion dress as wasteful. I took your problem to designer Louise Armour of William Fox, who says: "A jacket dress seems the very best solution to your problem. The dress can be long or short, depending on the degree of formality of the wedding. In either case, the dress should be décolleté with a natural waistline, preferably belted, and with flared or easy sheath skirt.

"The fabric should be fluid—chiffon, a soft crepe or tissue taffeta. A fitted jacket is more attractive for dressy occasions. I suggest one with below the elbow length sleeves. Or perhaps an elbow-length cape in several layers of chiffon in colors that blend with the dress.

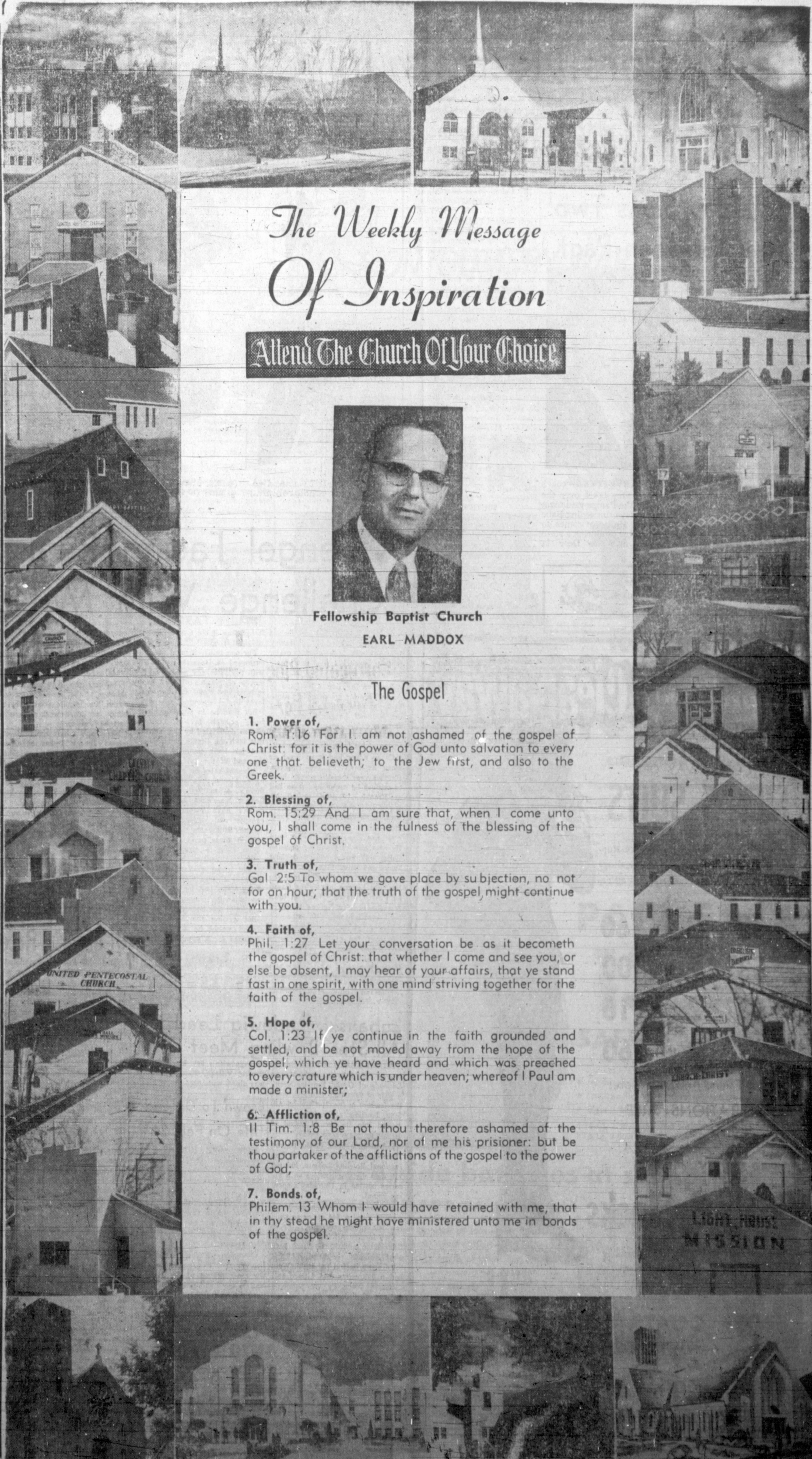

### College Stars In Senior Tilt

MOBILE, Ala. (UPI) — Passing aces Ed Wilson of Arizona and Mike Cotten of Texas square off Saturday in the 13th annual Senior Bowl all-star game as 50 college-gridders get their first taste of "play for pay" football.

Cotten's southerners are favored by six and one-half points to hand the North squad its eighth defeat in the series. Some 37,000 fans, and a national (NBC) television audience, are expected to witness the kickoff.

Baltimore Colt coach Weeb Ewbank, making his third appearance as southern mentor, plans to utilize Cotten's accuracy with a three-end offense — ends Gary Collins of Maryland and Dave Edwards of Auburn on the line and end Bill Miller of Miami as a flanker back.

Along with the aerial attack, the southerners will have the running of halfback Ronnie Bull, the third string All-America from Baylor, and powerhouse Earl Gros, the big LSU fullback.

The Yankees, coached by Tom Landry of the Dallas Cowboys who is making his first appearance here, will be out to avenge last year's closing seconds defeat. In the 1961 edition, South quarterback Norm Snead connected with just 10 seconds left to give the southerners a 33-28 victory.

Landry had one problem most coaches would like to have — an abundance of good quarterbacks. But the Cowboy coach decided to go with Ed Wilson, the flashy little ace from Arizona. And understandably, during the regular season, the 154-pound aerialist completed 79 of 154 for 1,294 yards and 10 touchdowns.

As receivers, Wilson will have ends Larry Vargo of Detroit and Dave Viti of Boston U.

The North's running attack will be centered around halfbacks Jim Dillard of Oklahoma State and Tom Larscheid of Utah State and fullback Steve Simms of unbeaten Rutgers.

### Texans Sign Two To Pro Contracts

"Gary (Player) and I took that tour around the world," said Palmer. "We traveled 60,000 miles and played golf nearly every day. It was very tiring. Since we got home I've been resting for about three weeks. I haven't touched a club."

However, he turned right around and shot a two-under-par 69 in the pro-celebrity prelude to the tournament.

One of the centers of attraction in the tourney is new pro Jack Nicklaus, the National Amateur champion. The husky ex-Ohio State star has been followed by large galleries who like his booming drives. However, he had a bit of trouble in the pro-amateur tourney Thursday.

One under par going into the ninth hole, he hit two balls out of bounds and took a four-over-par nine on the hole. Nicklaus had 39 for the nine holes and 75 for 18.

In Thursday's pro-celebrity, Dave Ragan, from Orlando, Fla., won \$900. He captured the pro division with a six-under-par 65 for a \$500 prize and then picked up \$400 when he and his partners scored a 15-under-par 56 in the best ball division.

### Baylor Might Be Limited In Cage Play

NEW YORK (UPI) — The availability of Los Angeles Laker star Elgin Baylor for the remainder of this season probably will be decided when the National Basketball Association owners meet at St. Louis Jan. 16.

### FIGHTERS MEET AGAIN

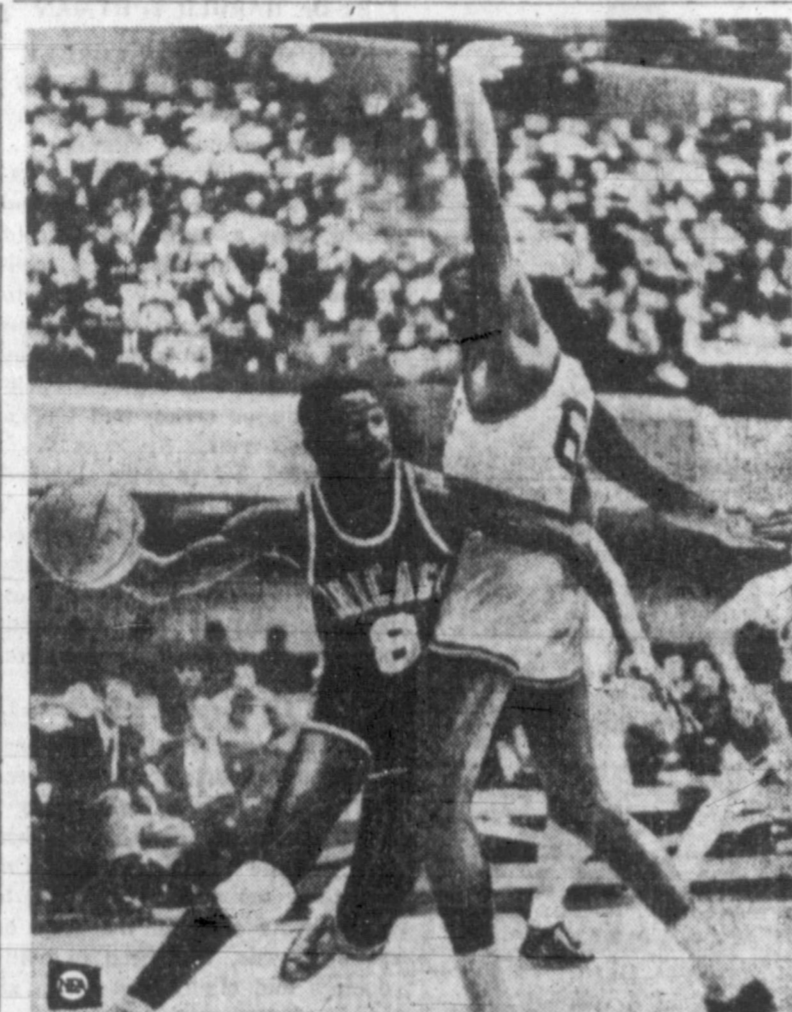

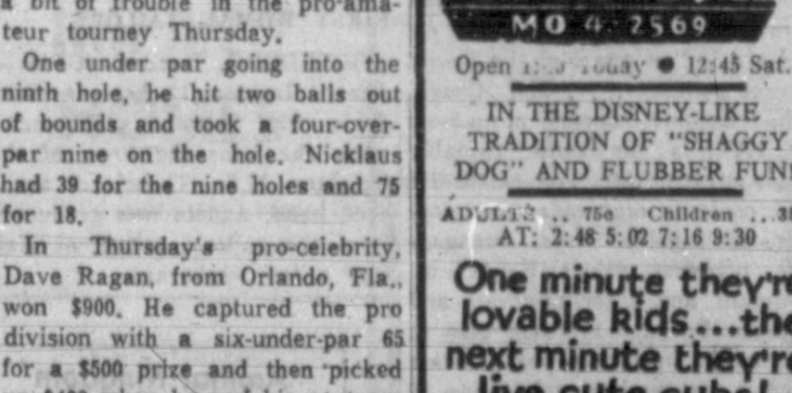

**Office Building To Be Named In Rayburn's Honor**

BONHAM (UPI) — News that Rep. Carl Vinson, D-Ga., will sponsor a resolution to name the third House office building in Washington after the late Speaker Sam Rayburn, was greeted favorably Monday in the town where Rayburn spent most of his life.

"I know we'd be all for it here," said Bonham Mayor J. C. Maguirk, "I think this is a fitting tribute to him in Washington." Rayburn died in Bonham Nov. 16 of cancer at the age of 79.

In Washington, Vinson said he believed the legislation would be approved unanimously in the House. The Georgian succeeded Rayburn as dean of the House.

Rayburn sponsored construction of the new \$60 million building to accommodate expanding activities of House members. Two previous buildings have been known in the past as "new and old." The third structure has been known as the "additional" building.

Attorney Buster Cole, one of the speaker's friends, said "I'm sure it (the tribute) will meet with approval here. We'll appreciate it. The people of Bonham certainly wouldn't have any objection to it if his colleagues wanted to do it."

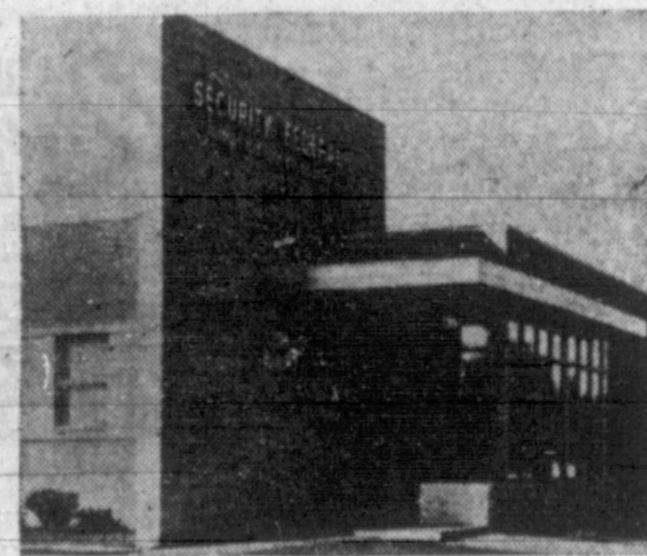
