Up In Mexico **Border Cities**


MEXICO ČITY (UPI) - Tourup \$22 million during the first three months of this year compared with the same period of 1961, the government tourism department said Monday.

However, spending by Mexican border residents in U.S. border communities increased by almost the same amount, the department noted. The increase was \$19 milon, from \$62 million spent in the U.S. during the first quarter of last year, to \$81 million during the same period this year.

The department called the U.S. spending increase a "recuperaof border tourist income, and credited the National Tourism Council, created slightly more than six months ago, with the increase. The council is headed by former President Miguel Aleman, who has toured the country and foreign areas extensively since assuming the post.

The department gave the 1962 border tourist income figure as \$190,720,000 (U.S.). Last year's figure for the period was slightly more than \$167 million, the department added.

(Continued From Page 1) would delay a welfare reform bill to which it was attached. In all, 31 Republicans and 21 Democrats voted to table, five Republicans and 43 Democrats

opposed the tabling motion. The Anderson-Javits proposal would have provided hospital and nursing home care, among other things, for all persons aged 65. starting in 1964. The benefits did not include doctors' fees.

The financing features of the plan drew the most fire, and possibly was the major factor leading to its defeat.

Say Benefits Tee Limited Critics also argued it provided too limited a package of benefits. In addition the bill was opposed on the ground that it was compulsory and would lead to federalization of medicine in the United States.

Supporters countered that it was the best and cheapest plan yet devised to provide some payas-you-go system of health protection against costly illnesses in old age.

The health plan was offered as a rider to a \$325 million Housepassed welfare reform bill. After disposing of the medicare proposal, the Senate passed the "selfhelp" welfare measure by voice

vote. House-Senate conference group was expected to meet this week to approve a compromise welfare bill. Some states have complained that they are running out of federal funds for welfare clients' checks.

In general, the welfare bill carries out reforms requested by Kennedy in the federally fi nanced, state-administered programs of aid to dependent children, and assistance for 2.8 million needy aged, blind and disabled persons on relief.

It places the accent on getting welfare recipients off the relief rolls and on to payrolls.



Any Number Play

Any number of trucks can play and a driver may "capture" cars either as a solitary player or while playing in partnership with another truck. At times, a partnership offers certain advantages.

For example, if one truck takes a position immediately behind another truck at, the bottom of a hill or the beginning of a curve, they are said to be "tailgated." Passing becomes twice as difficult and the scores of both drivers are doubled.

If, however, the second truck cannot maintain the "tailgate" position and drops back in the procession, then each driver only gets credit for half of the automobiles "captured" on that particular hill 'or curve.

All drivers, whether playing alone or in tandem, lose five points for every car that "escapes," or manages to pass, on a straightaway. Here again, partnership, or 'team' play, can be

advantageous.

Employ Pass Play When a straightaway is sighted, strategy is for the "lead" truck to signal to the second truck to attempt to pass. This blocks both lanes of the highway and prevents the "captured" automobiles



"program," moreover, is really the crystallization of our policy that from time to time has been discernible and which is regularly the subject of this column.

Two good reporters, Willard Edwards and Edith Kermit Roosevelt; recently brought out details of the report of George Ball, Undersecretary of State on Military Censorship, that further reflects this policy. This report reveals that our policy is not "victory over Communist aggression," but 'accommodation" with the Soviet Union. Edith Roosevelt went on to quote a policy planner as fol-

'The purpose of American policy is to work for a merger of East and West. It is believed accommodation can be reached as l alike politically and economically: As the United States adopts a more collectivist pattern of federal control, while at the same time a consolidation of Soviet rule makes genocide, purges and other less-pleasant attributes of the police state unnecessary."

This sounds extreme but it dovetails with not only the "disarmament program." but it repeatedly finds expression in the otherwise unexplainable actions of our policy planners with respect to the various countries around the world.

But if "merger" is our goal, I keen wondering why our planners seem to be further reducing our already-minority position within the framework. They are doing this by reducing the status and the strength of our Western allies while preparing for this merger.

Our planners, for instance, have renewed their campaign against Spain and Portugal. Even the language of the reporters attached to our government agencies is billion. He adds: "In the period Just why Congress tolerates revealing. The heads of state in Spain and Portugal are "Dictator Franco" and "Dictator or Strong Man Salazar." At the same time we read of polite references to "Marshal Tito, Chairman Khrushchev or Prime Minister Gomulka." (In Laos General Nosavan, because he resists a minority role in a Communist-ruled coalition government, was openly referred to as "strong man" and "right

> wing extremist.") In Angola, a Province of Portugal, the Communist-led terrorists struck on May 15, 1961, in a carefully organized series of raids. They killed and grotesquely disfigured the bodies of more than 5,000 Angolans, white and colored. Since then the terrorists have killed over 8,000 more peo-

ple and boast about it. Nevertheless we do not read a word about these killings in our press. Our State Department is silent on these atrocities. When the terrorists in Algeria kill 30, it is front page news; but the Communist murders in Angoia, involving thousands or human be-
