## House Ready To Pass Trimmed School Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House prepared to act today on a \$900 million bill to continue two school aid programs.

But the bill probably would bury President Kennedy's education proposals for at least two years.

The bill was brought to the floor under a procedure that makes a two-thirds majority necessary for passage. With all of Kennedy's program eliminated, House leaders expected only scattered protests, most of them from supporters of Kennedy's plan.

The bill would authorize \$400 million to continue the "impacted areas" aid program. This provides help for about 3,800 school districts crowded by children of servicemen; federal employees and defense workers.

The other \$500 million in the bill would extend all existing programs of the National Defense Education Act, including loans to college students, grants to secondary schools to buy technical equipment and other research and improvement programs.

The extension bill, capped Kennedy's most humiliating congressional defeat and was expected to short circuit any attempts to re-

coup next year. The highly popular impacted areas and NDEA programs were supposed to have been "sweeteners" to attract support for Kennedy's general aid proposals.

But the House killed general aid, 242-169, last Wednesday and revived the sweeteners today. In addition, the two-year extension of both programs assured they would not be used next year in any school aid campaign. This indicated that House leaders do not plan a serious effort to pass school aid in 1962.

Other congressional news:

McNamara: The Senate Armed Services Committee called in Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara in an effort to determine whether it should investigate charges the Pentagon is "gagging" the military. The hearing emerged from a controversy over a memorandum by Sen. J. William Fulbright which said military officials were organizing and sponsoring public meetings featuring "extremely radical right-wing speakers." McNamara has ordered military officers to stay out of partisan politics and foreign policy.

## Auto Work Pact Seems To Be Near

DETROIT (UPI) — The United Auto Workers and General Motors, under pressure from President Kennedy to reach a peaceful settlement, early today announced "significant progress" in contract negotiations and postponed until next Monday a strike deadline.

Some 310,000 UAW employees at GM, their picket signs already painted, had been slated to walk out at more than 130 plants around the country at 9 a. m., CST, today. But at 4:20 a. m., after a marathon bargaining session of more than seven hours, the union and company announced the strike deadline was being postponed and the current contract was being extended to 11 a. m. Monday.

Both UAW president Walter P. Reuther and GM vice president, Louis G. Seaton made clear they expected the progress made during the night to wind up in a contract settlement and head off a strike.

"I feel very good. I'm delighted," a beaming Reuther told newsmen.

"We made very substantial progress on the economic issues," Reuther said. He indicated that only non-economic issues and local contract problems remain to be solved.

On the company side, Seaton, when asked if he believed a strike now had been averted, replied, "I'm an optimist." Both Reuther and Seaton refused to reveal details of the progress made on economic issues. When asked if the personal appeal from President Kennedy had helped postpone the strike, Reuther said:

"Well obviously, like any other citizen, we are always impressed with the views of the President."

Reuther also announced that the International Union of Electrical Workers (IUE) had asked him to say it too was postponing its strike deadline until next Monday. The IUE represents about 22,000 GM workers.

Reuther said all GM workers had been notified to report for work on their regular shifts today.

Reuther and Seaton said contract talks would resume today.

## Money Included In Nuclear Test Funds Measure

WASHINGTON (SpI) — The House Appropriations committee today voted a \$4,200,000 appropriation for the beginning of construction of the Canadua River-Dam project known as the Sanford Dam and Reservoir. The appropriation was included in a bill voting \$30 million for resumption of nuclear tests by the United States.

The \$4,200,000 had been requested by Rep. Walter Rogers and, Rep. George Mahon who have been principal backers of the project in Congress.

The overall project is to cost \$92 million when completed and is designed to furnish water to towns from Borger as far south as La Mesa, including Pampa.

The action today was only by the House committee. The recommendations will be acted upon by the House Tuesday or Wednesday.

In its action today the House group approved \$1,000,000 for land acquisition, \$370,000 for field data, pumping plants and pipelines and \$2,830,000 for completion of designs and the start of construction.

Reports are that actual work on the project may begin by January 1, 1962.

In a last-minute change the house group earmarked \$30 million for "weapons testing" as the committee approved a \$3,662,548,500 money bill carrying funds for the Atomic Energy Commission and the government so-called "public works" functions.

## U.S. To Resume Nuclear Testing, President Says

The United States moved today to get back into the nuclear arms race reopened by three Soviet nuclear test explosions.

Under orders from President Kennedy, American scientists and military men started preparing a series of underground tests that will allow development and perfection of new battle weapons without exposing the world to additional radioactive fallout.

The move had been expected despite the fact it dulled the propaganda advantage the United States had been given by the one-sided Russian resumption.

The announcement did not affect the midnight Saturday deadline in an Anglo-American note calling on Russia to join in a moratorium on nuclear tests in the atmosphere that cause radioactive fallout, although it appeared certain Russia would reject the proposal.

But as Kennedy put it in his announcement late Tuesday after Russia had set off its third atmospheric test in five days:

"We must now take those steps which prudent men find essential."

## Brazil's Vice President Prepares For Presidency

BRASILIA (UPI)—Vice President Joao (Jango) Goulart plunged today into preparations for his inauguration as president, apparently determined to make himself a real chief executive rather than a mere figurehead.

Goulart, smiling and triumphant, arrived by chartered jetliner Tuesday night from his stronghold at Porto Alegre where he sat out the crisis that brought Brazil to the brink of civil war.

He sat up much of the night conferring with the congressmen who amended the constitution under army pressure last week to strip the presidency of most of its powers and transfer them to a European-model premier.

Goulart himself would not comment on his plans, but close associates said he would press Congress to repeal the constitutional amendment, restoring his full powers.

The presidential inauguration had been scheduled for Thursday. Goulart told newsmen, however, he would not set a date for his assumption of the presidency until he had finished his talks with the lawmakers.

About 1,500 persons were waiting at the airport to greet Goulart when he arrived at 8:15 p. m. Perhaps another 10,000 lined the roads leading into the city.

Few well-wishers got even a glimpse of the prospective president, however, because he drove directly to a farm on the outskirts of this half-built capital without passing through the city.

The country was quiet, but the war and navy ministries announced their forces would remain on the alert at least until Goulart is inaugurated.

The military leaders who tried to prevent the elevation of Goulart to the presidency because of his alleged Communist leanings did not appear at the airport to welcome him.

Air Minister Grun Moss left for Rio de Janeiro before Goulart arrived. War Minister Odilio Denys complained that a suddenly contracted cold forced him to stay home. Navy Minister Silvio Heck simply didn't show up.

"The military ministers, true to the manifesto we signed (which warned that the inauguration of Goulart could mean 'chaos and civil war') could never pay homage to Goulart by our presence," Heck said.

Goulart's French-built Caravelle jetliner was more than three hours late in reaching Brasilia because of concern over possible efforts by right-wing air force "rebels" to prevent its arrival.

## Reds Claim 'Saboteurs' Wrecked German Train

BERLIN (UPI) — Western directed "saboteurs" derailed an empty 120-car freight train near the Baltic coast of East Germany and tied up local rail traffic for days, according to a Communist newspaper reaching West Berlin today.

The Sept. 1 issue of the newspaper Schweriner Volkszeitung said the derailment, at Sternberg, was caused by a steel bar fastened to tracks over a small bridge outside the station.

The newspaper did not say when the derailment took place, except that it happened since East Germany closed the Berlin frontier Aug. 13.

It said the "bandits" acted on orders from Washington and Bonn as part of a plot to "unleash 'terror' in retaliation for closing of the Berlin border."

"Elements who plotted to begin open terror because of their overpowering hatred of the defeat sustained by the cold war warriors on Aug. 13 will be punished by the full power of our state," the newspaper said.

The Communists called on the West again today to negotiate directly with East Germany on the use of Allied air routes to West Berlin.

The Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland published remarks by East German boss Walter Ulbricht at the Leipzig Fair in which he said flatly that a peace treaty between the Soviet Union and East Germany "will be signed."

"Then we will agree with the West practical questions such as the traffic routes, the air traffic and so on as is customary among friendly nations," he said.

## Racial Barriers Down In Southland Schools

Racial barriers came down today in the nation's largest segregated public school system in Dallas, Tex., while integration in education was pressed at other points in the nation.

Galveston, Tex., public schools also desegregate for the first time today. Areas in Virginia, Louisiana, Florida, Arkansas and Michigan also faced the pressure of Negro demands for removal of the racial bars.

Dallas, with a careful 18-month public preparation campaign behind it, realized its first public education integration as Negro students entered the first grades in eight schools.

Officials expected no trouble, but a specially-trained police detail of 50 men, wearing football helmets and armed with nightsticks, were ordered out to head off possible violence.

Parents of the Negroes were told to bring their youngsters to school "like any other parents, without escort" and through the front doors.

Dallas, which is on the edge of the section of Texas generally considered "Southern" rather than "Western" in its outlook, had integrated its restaurants as a step to prepare the way for school desegregation. The integration move has been spearheaded by 250 prominent businessmen who form the Dallas Citizens Council.

In Galveston 35 Negroes started classes in previously all-white public schools. Six Negroes attended classes at parochial schools without incident Tuesday in accordance with Bishop W. J. Nold's order to integrate schools from kindergarten to the 7th grades in Galveston and in Houston, where desegregation is in its second year in public schools.

## Drug Sale Regulations Tighten Up March 5

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Start-up of the new drug regulations will be required to include in each package of drugs a statement on any harmful side effects.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced the new order Tuesday. The tightening of regulations previously had been opposed by the drug industry and the American Medical Association.

Under the new order, a brochure containing complete information on a drug's qualities will be included in every shipment to doctors, druggists and hospitals. This "package insert" also will include details on any of the drug's side effects that might injure users.

"When this requirement becomes fully effective, it will make the complete information readily available to practitioners at every drug store and hospital pharmacy throughout the country," FDA Commissioner George P. Larrick said.

In addition, he said, the new requirement will call for the drug industry to include full side-effect information on samples they commonly distribute directly to physicians.

Larrick said the drug chloramphenicol figured in the situation leading up to Tuesday's announcement. He said chloramphenicol was "an example" of drugs which have hazardous side effects which should be made fully known.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (UPI) — Fifty-five pretty girls hid their nerves with straight backs and bright smiles today and got down to competing in earnest for the Miss America Crown and \$35,000 in scholarships.

Nineteen of them, in groups of three and four, will have their first crucial meeting with the 11 pageant judges this afternoon and compete tonight in the first Convention Hall evening gown preliminaries. Eighteen will don bathing suits for the be-ribboned runway competition, longest associated with the 40-year-old Atlantic City beauty contest. The remaining 18, including Miss Hawaii, who gamely plans to try her soprano solo despite severe laryngitis, compete in talent preliminaries.

The three groups, dubbed "Rose," "Carnation" and "Chrysanthemum," will alternate these roles Thursday and Friday until all have competed in three categories and had their white-gloves-and-best-manners chats with the three women and five men who will award the crown on Saturday night.

Winners of talent and bathing suit competitions, but not the evening dress parades, will be announced each night. All announced preliminary winners are assured at least \$1,000 scholarship awards, as are six top judged performers in talent categories.

### The Mature Parent Don't Let Obligation Be Hold On Children

Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Home from college for vacation, a friend of Bob's offered to sell him the car he'd been storing in his family's garage. The offer upset Bob. Though he desperately wanted the car he lacked \$52 of its \$100 price.

He was so depressed and jumpy that his father finally gave him the money, and pleased by his son's relieved gratitude said: "It's all right, son. The car's a good buy and I'm glad to let you have the money."

Bob didn't say, "Is this \$52 a gift or a loan, Dad?" Nor did his father clarify the money as a gift or a debt to be paid off by a reduction of Bob's allowance or other arrangements. As a result, the relationship between Bob and his father has grown very sticky.

Oppressed by a sense of obligation to his father, Bob feels compelled to do him favors that he resents doing, such as removing the storm windows and cleaning the family car every Saturday morning.

His father, feeling the irritation behind this helpfulness is hurt by it. Just this morning he said to Bob's mother:

"I tell you, giving to kids is a way street. They'll take and

they'll take — but when it comes to giving back.

With adolescent children it is particularly important to define the money we give them as gifts or loans.

If we don't, they can make our lives miserable. Uneasily conscious of obligation to us, they tend to see exploitation of their indebtedness in everything we ask them to do. Although they'll perform the chores or favors we ask, they'll perform them resentfully out of the sense of coercion created by this same uneasy feeling of indebtedness. Under these circumstances help with the storm windows isn't worth the irritation and hurts it involves.

So, if we are kind enough to haul an adolescent child out of a financial jam, let's also be wise enough to clarify the money we give him as a gift or a loan.

Some unfortunate parents don't want this clarification. They don't want to say, "This money is a gift without strings" or "What plans do you have to repay this loan?" They prefer to maintain the child in a state of unclarified indebtedness to them in order to maintain control of him. It doesn't work. Sooner or later, the child begins to protest his sense of oppressive obligation, not by words but by defiant and hostile behavior.

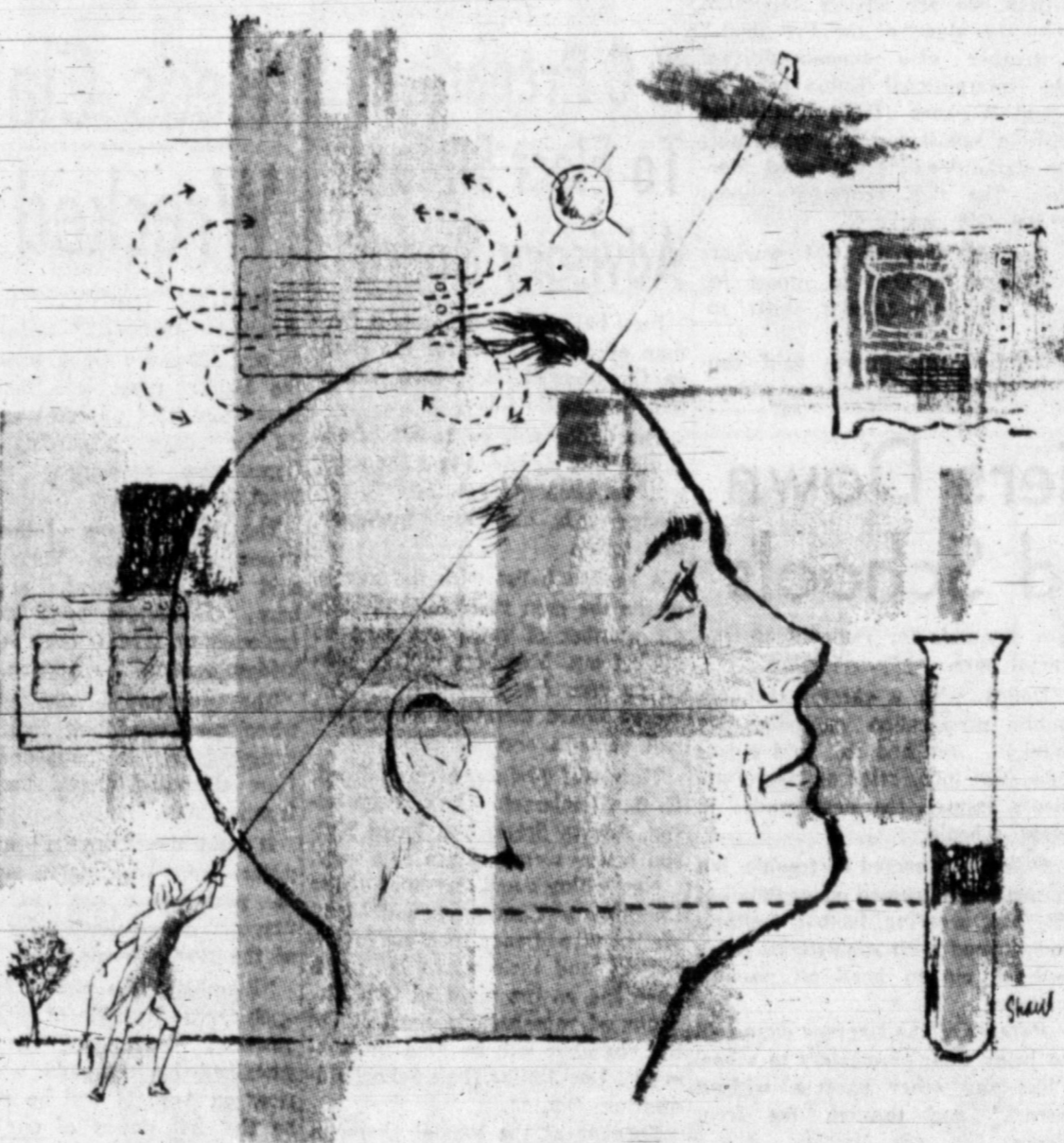

### Foreign Commentary

One week after the Russians announced they were resuming nuclear weapons tests, there was general agreement that they had submitted themselves voluntarily to a tremendous worldwide propaganda setback.

But in that period there has emerged no clear explanation as to why they did it.

Since the Russians themselves were of no particular help, it remained for the West to speculate. Three possibilities received the most attention. They were:

1. A terror tactic designed to frighten the West into capitulation to Soviet demands.

2. Soviet fear that the war talk they themselves had generated over the Berlin crisis was getting out of hand, coupled with a fear that their own weapons were inferior.

3. Some still unexplained crisis within the Communist world which had forced Nikita Khrushchev to renounce his co-existence theme even at the demonstrated cost to Soviet claims as the champion of world peace.

Of these, the first seemed the most logical and the second the least.

As a terror tactic, the development of a nuclear weapon with the blast-effect of 100 million tons of TNT would be directed more against peoples than governments. Military experts agree that such a weapon loses enormously in efficiency as it increases in size. More than the destructive amount of its blast, its danger would come in the increased amount of fallout released upon the world.

Ah, where governments might be expected to stand firm, a frightened people might bring pressure on the government to capitulate in the belief that, to

repeat a phrase, it is better to be Red than dead.

As to point No. 2, tests are not arranged over night, nor are new weapons developed and manufactured over night. Therefore, it appears that for months these Soviet tests, the first of which occurred last Friday, have been under preparation while the Soviets pretended to negotiate at the Geneva nuclear test ban conference.

Purely from a weapons standpoint, it does not seem probable that Berlin alone could be responsible for the Soviet decision to resume testing.

The big red van into which the household goods were loaded in Dallas on Aug. 26 was found Monday parked on a Houston street. It was empty.

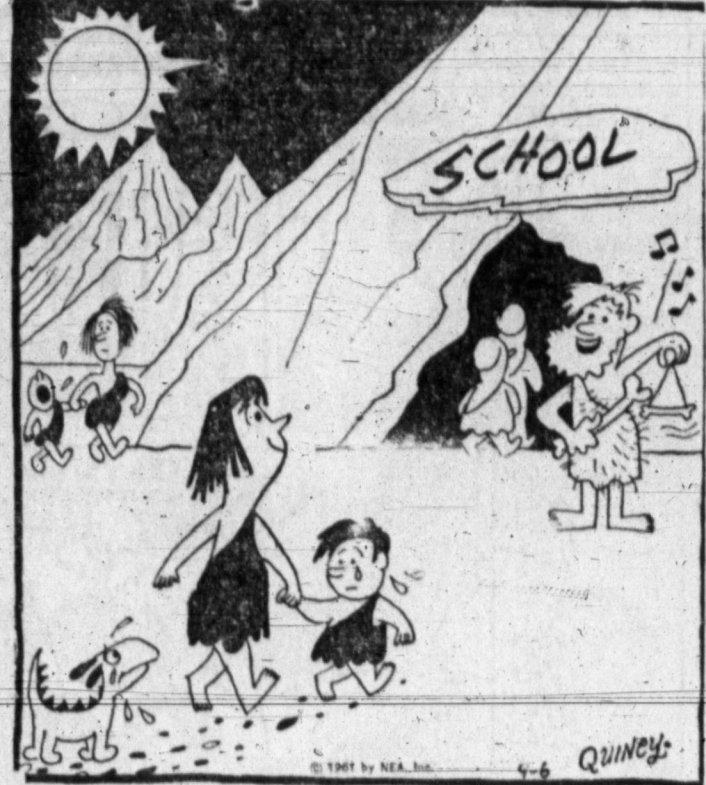

# Calendar Has Faults; Writer Reveals Them

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Stop for a moment and ask yourself what is wrong with the calendar that we use to keep track of the days and months.

Chances are you hadn't noticed anything wrong with it. I hadn't either until I chanced to read a learned dissertation that Sen. Hiram L. Fong had printed in the Congressional Record.

It gave me the impression that the calendar, as a means of measuring time, is not much more reliable than a dollar watch. About the only advantage the calendar offers is that you don't have to wind it as often.

For one thing, the calendar runs too fast. It is gaining time at the rate of .0003066 of a day per year.

This might not seem like much to worry about, but when you consider that in 3,262 years the calendar will have gained a whole day, then you can begin to realize what we are up against.

Secondly, the calendar is rather skitterish. The days shift around so that Christmas comes at different times during the week. Thanksgiving, on the other hand, always comes on the same day of the week but on different days of the month.

This gets confusing, but it is not the calendar's worst fault. The worst fault is that it is only good for one year. Every January, unless the milkman leaves one in the door, you have to go out and get a new one.

It was with an aim of correcting some of these shortcomings that Fong introduced in the Senate a bill to provide for the adoption of a "perpetual calendar" invented by one of his Hawaii constituents, Dr. Willard E. Edwards of Honolulu.

The perpetual calendar, as the name implies, could be used year after year. There would be no need ever to get a new one, unless you got tired of the pictures on the old one.

Under Edwards' plan, the calendar would have 364 days, or

exactly 52 seven-day weeks. The year, however, would still be 365 days long. And this is where things get complicated.

In order to pad out the year to the required length, Edwards would throw in an extra day at the beginning of the year. It would be called "New Year's Day," but it would not be a part of any week or month.

The year would end on the last day of December. Then we would have New Year's Day. And then we would move on to the first day of January.

When I think about this, it sort of gives me the willies. But in other respects, the perpetual calendar would provide numerous improvements.

For instance, Christmas and several other holidays would always fall on a Monday, thus giving us a lot of long weekends. Furthermore, the calendar could be printed so that Sunday would be at the end of the week, thus making it easier to figure weekends.

But what I would like best about the calendar would be an omission. There would never be a Friday-the-13th.

He said he remembered nothing except awaking sometime during the night in the museum and seeing his lady friend with a man calmly collecting the relics reported missing.

Secret Service officials said the woman, originally reported to be an American, was identified by Chirino as a Mexican.

## Yank Sentenced By Soviet Court

MOSCOW (UPI) — A 23-year-old Fulbright scholar from the University of Pennsylvania has pleaded guilty to spying in Russia and was sentenced to eight years in prison, the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia reported today.

Marvin Makinen, a native of Chassel, Mich., whose family now lives at Ashburnham, Mass., was tried Monday by a military court in Kiev, capital of the Ukraine.

Tass news agency disclosed Monday that Makinen, who was attending West Berlin's Free University on a U. S. government scholarship, had been arrested in the Ukraine on July 27.

He was accused of "taking pictures of a military objective" while travelling across Eastern Europe as a tourist.

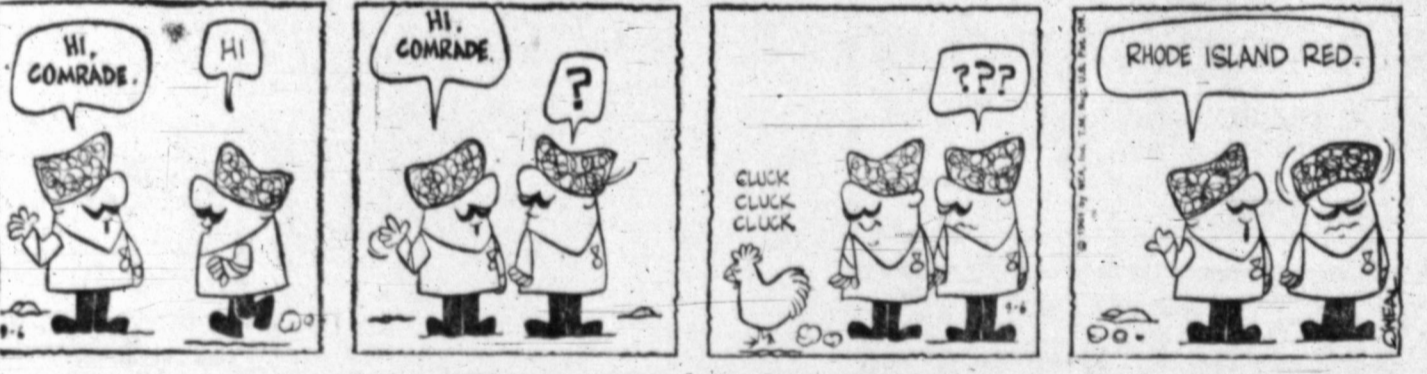

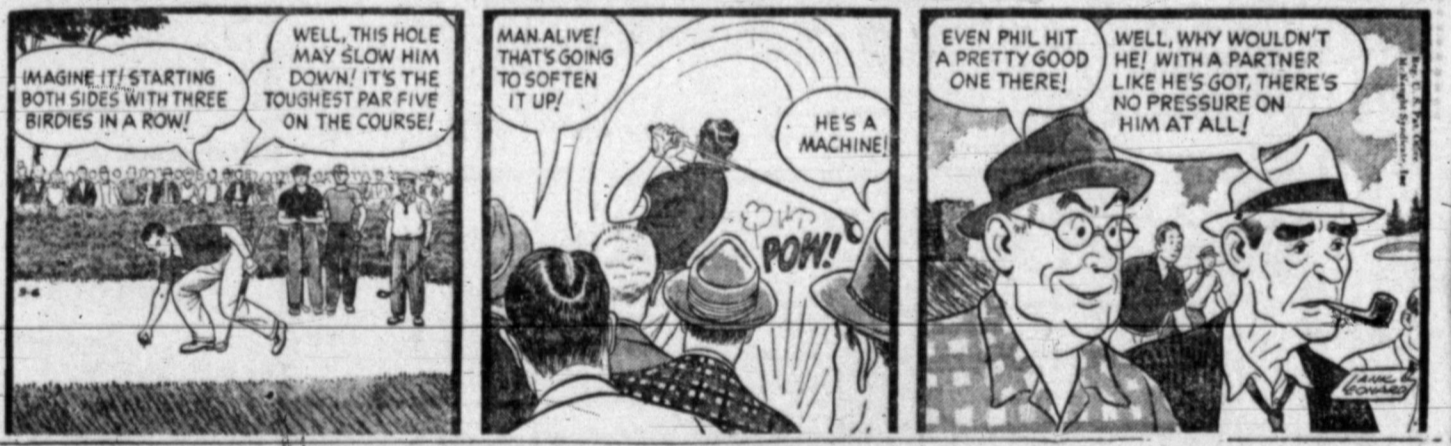

# Orioles Topple Detroit Twice

The "Baltimore Blitz" left the Detroit Tigers stone cold dead in the American League pennant race today.

It's an old-fashioned "Yankee rout" and the only question remaining is whether Ralph Houk's New Yorkers will meet the Cincinnati Reds or the Los Angeles Dodgers in the World Series.

The Reds beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-2, Tuesday night but the Dodgers stayed right with them, two games off the pace, with a 4-2 victory over the San Francisco Giants.

But, first, the obituary from Baltimore:

Hoyt Wilhelm "sprung the trap" in the suspended Labor Day nightcap by retiring the final three Tigers and preserving the Orioles' 4-1 victory. Then Chuck Estrada fired a three-hitter and won, 1-0, on a double by Brooks Robinson and a single by Jackie Brandt in the sixth inning of the regularly scheduled game to stretch the Tigers' losing streak to six games and drop them 7 1/2 games out of first place.

The Yankees could clinch the pennant by winning 17 of their remaining 24 games even if the Tigers won all their remaining 23 games.

The Yankees increased their home record to 55-15 with a 6-1 victory over the Washington Senators, fashioned on the four hit pitching of Jim Coates and aided by Mickey Mantle's 51st homer. Mantle, now one game ahead of the record homer pace set by Babe Ruth in 1927, also singled to start a four-run seventh-inning rally that clinched the victory. Elston Howard also homered for the Yankees. Roger Maris went hitless and now is 0-for-12 in his last three games.

Bob Purkey pitched a six-hitter to win his 15th game behind an eight-hit Cincinnati attack that included two hits each by Don Blasingame and Vada Pinson. Purkey struck out seven and had a three-hit shutout until the ninth in beating the Cardinals for the third time this season.

Duke Snider hit a three-run homer following Orlando Cepeda's miff of a fly with two out for the big blow of the Dodger attack behind the five hit pitching of Stan Williams, who won his 12th game. It was the Dodgers' third straight victory over the Giants.

Lee Thomas tied a major league record of nine hits in a doubleheader although the Los Angeles Angels bowed to the Kansas City A's, 7-3 and 13-12, the Cleveland Indians beat the Boston Red Sox, 9-5, and the Chicago White Sox and Minnesota Twins played a 3-3 nine-inning tie in a game halted by fog in other AL games.

The Milwaukee Braves shamed the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-4, and the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the

Chicago Cubs, 8-3, in other NL action.  
Thomas went 5-for-5 in the first game and had three homers and a single in the second game and the Angels — tying the record of nine hits in a doubleheader — but the A's won the first game behind Jerry Walker's 10-hit pitching and the nightcap with a 14-hit attack that included a homer by Bobby Del Greco.

# Dallas Texans Eye Grid Championship

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI) — Coach Henry Stram of the Dallas Texans thinks his club "has the makings" of an American Football League champion. And a look at the club's paper potential bears out his belief.

Stram, who kicked around for years as a top-grade assistant coach until wealthy Texan owner Lamar Hunt picked him for his first head coaching challenge, says the 1961 Texans "have a goodshare of talent, a world of enthusiasm and a fine mental attitude."

"In any championship race, you need all three of these ingredients plus a good share of the breaks," he says. "With a few good breaks the Texans can be champions." The breaks went the other way last season, the infant league's first sortie against the rival National Football League, and the Texans wound up no better than second to the Los Angeles (now San Diego) Chargers, although blanking the last three teams on the schedule.

Stram is high on his top draft choice rookies — E. J. (The Beast) Holub of Texas Tech, who already has proven ability at offensive center or linebacker; offensive end Fred Arbanas of Michigan State; offensive tackle Jim Tyrer of Ohio State, and defensive end-tackle Jerry Mays of Southern Methodist.

Add these ingredients to a mixture that includes such carryovers as Abner Haynes, the league's "most exciting player" who led the circuit in rushing and punt

returns, ranked high in pass receiving and kickoff runbacks; his halfback teammate, Johnny Robinson, who is equally adept in these departments; agile fullback Jack Spikes, whose place-kicking made him the No. 3 loop scorer; and two fine quarterbacks, Cotton Davidson and Hunter Enis, and it's easy to share Stram's optimism.

Texas quality doesn't stop there, either. For, returning is virtually the same defense that turned in five whitewash jobs on league foes a year ago — ends Paul Miller and Mel Branch; middle linemen Hay Collins, Paul Rochester and Buffalo Napier; linebackers Sherrill Hendrick, Smokey Stover and Ted Greene; and deep backs David Webster, Don Flynn and Duane Wood.

Holub, Mays and halfbacks Cedric Price of Kansas State and Ed Kelley of Texas seem destined to force their way into this defensive alignment. Price is a real surprise since he gained fame mostly as a basketball player in college.

The shock troops in front of Davidson, Haynes, Robinson and Spikes include Steller returning guards Bill Krieger and Sid Fournet and a sophomore fill-in Marvin Terrell; tackles Jerry Cornelison and Charley Diamond, and center Jim Barton.

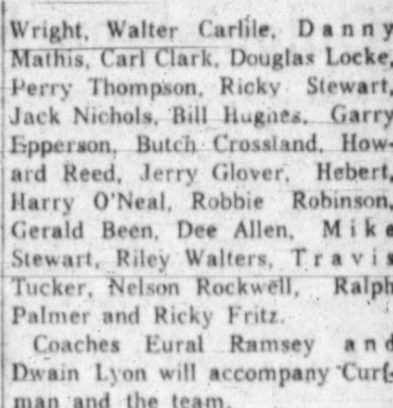

### Race Ban Eased By Two Theaters Near University

AUSTIN (UPI)—Two motion picture theater chains have partially integrated motion picture houses near the University of Texas campus, United Press International learned today.

Integration of the theater facilities, however, will be extended only to college students of all races.

Earl Podolnik, president of Trans-Texas Theaters, Inc., operators of the Texas Theater, confirmed the integration. Trans-Texas Texas Theater was one of the key targets during the stand-in demonstrations.

### Jury Opens Probe Of Four Slayings

BIG SPRING (UPI)—The Howard County grand jury Wednesday is taking a long, hard look into the case of John Edwin Myers, 32, three married fathers of five children and ex-convict, and his teen-aged girl friend, who have admitted slaying four persons.

Texas and Illinois authorities have agreed to await the grand jury's action.

Donna Marie Stone is the girl friend. The 13-year-old girl cannot be tried under Texas law until she is 17. There is a chance she could be returned to Illinois and tried.

The pair was being held in the Howard County jail at Big Spring. The victims of their cross-country crime spree were George Ballard, 47, and his 11-year-old daughter, Carole, shot to death in Belleville, Ill.; Margaret Wernicker, 39, a St. Louis department store employe, killed near Thayer, Mo.; and Lee DeKraai, 30, shot near Big Spring.

### Peace Appeal Issued By Neutral Nations

BELGRADE (UPI)—The conference of non-aligned nations ended its five-day "summit" conference last night with an urgent peace appeal to Soviet and American leaders and a plea for the end of colonialism.

The peace appeal called directly on Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and President Kennedy to meet and negotiate before a nuclear war breaks out.

Heads of 25 "non-committed" nations met this afternoon in final secret session to dispatch the message to the big powers.

### Rangers To Get Ten New Men This Week

AUSTIN (UPI)—Ten new Texas Rangers will be named this week to bring the elite law enforcement organization to its highest modern strength of 62 men, Col. Homer P. Garrison has announced.

Garrison, chief of the Rangers since 1935, said more than 500 applicants are being considered for the posts. The additional men were authorized last month by the state legislature.

Minimum qualifications for Texas Rangers include an age of 27 years and five years of experience as peace officers. The new men chosen by Garrison, who is also director of the Department of Public Safety, will receive a week of training in Austin.

Then Garrison said at least one man would be assigned to each of the six Ranger companies. The field units have headquarters in Dallas, Houston, Corpus Christi, Midland, Lubbock and Waco.

"About 99 per cent of the work done by the Rangers now is on request of local authorities," Garrison said. "The new men will put us in a position to render more service than in the past."

Several of the new Ranger privates, whose pay scale goes up to \$6,000 a year, are expected to come from the ranks of the Department of Public Safety. The DPS includes the highway patrol, an intelligence section, and crime laboratories.

### Mexican Aqueduct Work Begins Soon

NUEVO LAREDO, Mexico (UPI)—Construction will soon begin on a 20-mile long aqueduct to bring water from Laj Boca Djam to this city, industrial sources reported today.

The multi-million dollar project will be undertaken by the Monterrey firm of Aguas Industriales. Work is scheduled to begin this month.

### Doubt Expressed Solons Will Pass Loan Shark Bill

AUSTIN (UPI)—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson predicted yesterday loan shark legislation will bog down in a special session if Gov. Price Daniel insists on pressing for stricter abandoned property legislation at the same time.

Daniel has said he will call a special session of the legislature later this year or early next year at which time the two issues would be foremost for consideration.

Wilson said in a letter today to E. L. R. Wroe Jr. of the American National Bank in Austin, "if he (Daniel) persists in calling a special session on escheating bank accounts and combines with this a loan shark bill, the special session may very well be deadlocked and frustrated."

Wilson said the loan shark legislation should be considered alone, to fill "a pressing need."

Wilson accused the governor of attacking bankers needlessly on the abandoned property issue. The attorney general praised the banks "for carrying the Daniel deficit without discounting state salary warrants."
