Too many Americans now find it hard to answer these ouestions. The infiltration of statist collectivism into our thought and policy has taught them to look to government as the "fount of every blessing." They do not stop to think that government can give to one person what he has not produced or earned only as it takes from another and thereby shrinks the area of private property, freedom and prosperity,

Dr. Charles Malik of Lebanon, Chairman of the UN Commission on Human Rights, a man well versed in the American philosophy of government, saw the sinister forces and sad weakness responsible for the UN covenants. In the United Nations Bulletin September 1, 1952, he wrote:

"I think a study of our proceedings will reveal that the amendments we adopted to the old texts under examination responded for the most part more to Soviet than to Western promptings . . ."




GOOD INTENTIONS ARE NOT ENOUGH

Little Tommy may nail together a few scraps of lumber and announce that he is going to the moon in his new "rocket ship." But no matter how good his imagination or how great his hopes, we don't expect him to get his

contraption off the ground. For the same reasons we ought

to look further than the announced aims, however lofty, of the founders and admirers of the United Nations. What Americans want most from their government's foreign policy is peace and they know that freedom and prosperity are also good, and that in some way they are related to peace. Therefore, peace, with freedom and prosperity for all, is what Washington promises the UN shall produce. But did the builders of that Organization know any more about this goal and how to get there than a small boy knows about rocket ships and interplanetary travel? First, we should remember that the founders of the UN were government officials. Some were Communists (e.g., from Russia), who know less than nothing about freedom, prosperity and peace. Others were socialists and mar - socialists (e.g., from the Scandinavian countries and New Zealand) who were only somewhat less ignorant of mo: l principles, freedom and good government.

Second, these officials put together an organization of governments. True, they called it a union of "nations," perhaps because it sounded better than "United Governments," or perhaps because, like most uninformed persons, they did not know the difference between * envernment and a nation. They may have felt (not thought) they were speaking a certain kind of truth when they said that the United Nations was a union of peoples not of governments. "The people are the government, and the government is the people. What represents a thing is the same as the thing, so it is the thing. The UN delegates will be the same as the people. Therefore, they will be the people." states, or governments, not of peoples or of nations. Third, we should realize that
