### Precautions For Defense At Home

Mrs. J. A. Watson of Amarillo, instructor for study courses on Civil Defense being sponsored by the PTA City Council, instructed "Personal Survival Actions" at a session held Thursday morning in Horace Mann School.

Mrs. Watson said, "Civil defense and defense mobilization is the responsibility of every citizen. The individual must be capable of caring for himself in an emergency."

"If an attack should come, take cover in a basement or shelter. If you cannot reach a shelter, lie flat on the ground face down or crouch on the floor of the car."

"For your shelter, select foods that store easily, keep for months without refrigeration; are easily prepared and require little or no cooking. Foods canned in metal and glass will stay in good condition for six or more months if kept in a dry place, protected from sun and dust and kept at a fairly cool temperature."

"To keep food in paper boxes for as long as six months, place them in tightly closed metal cans or cabinets and store them under the dry, cool, clean conditions specified for canned foods so that rodents and insects are not likely to attack them," Mrs. Watson explained.

"It is a good practice to rotate foods in cans at least once or twice a year and food in paper boxes at least every three months. This will insure having a reserve supply of food that is good-tasting."

"For your shelter," Mrs. Watson outlined, "have cooking pans, paper cups, paper plates, napkins, measuring cups, can and bottle opener, pocket knife, silverware, 20-gallon covered can for garbage, water-proof gloves, toilet tissue, detergent, DDT 5 per cent, clean rags, grocery bags, newspapers, battery radio, flash-light, clock calendar, first aid kit, pads for radiation burns, canned heat, medicines, games for children, reading material, household tools, extra clothing and bedding."

Approximately 97 study course members attended the Thursday morning session.

The next course will be given in Baker School on "Planning Exercises" Nov. 18 beginning at 9:30 a.m.

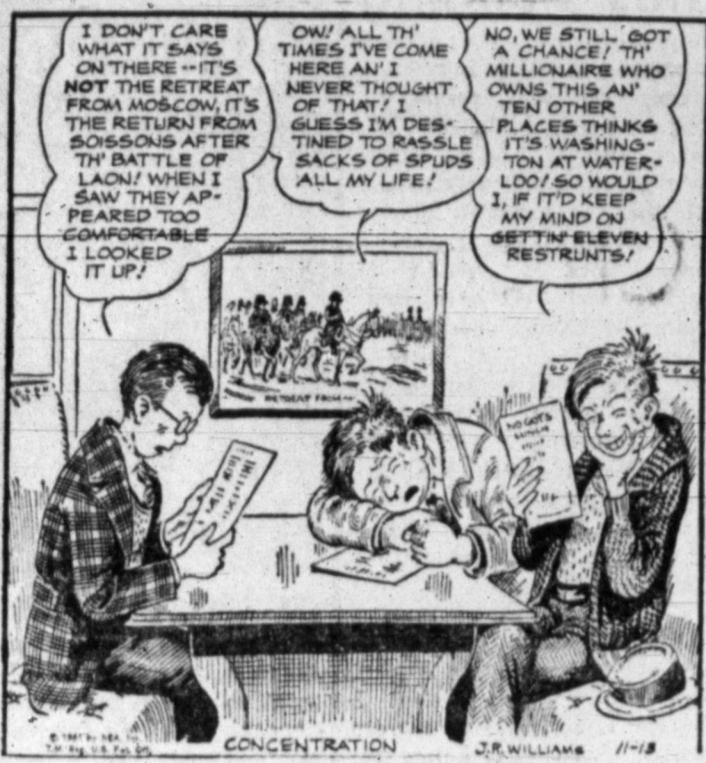
