# SPEAKER SAYS

PRESIDENT WORKING ON REVENUE MESSAGE OF TUESDAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29 (AP) Increasing talk of a tax on undistributed corporation profits was heard today above the clamor of a growing congressional dispute over President Roosevelt's million dollar revenue estimates. Adding his voice to those of administration leaders in the senate, Speaker Byrns endorsed such a profits levy as "just and equitable." He reported that many members of the house ways and means committee, which will draft the tax bill, were in agreement

with with him.

Meanwhile, Senator Byrd, (D., Va.), a critic of some of the new deal's spending, expressed approval of the tax program but called for a constitutional amendment to make federal, state, and municipal bonds subject to taxation.



The value of any public enerprise should be reckoned in proportion to its need. If this premise be true, then, Gray county, as well as meny other Texas counties, would the climax. With such limited public library facilities as are maintained in this county at present a pathetic situation exists. It requires climb a tree. It should be a sobering fact to every intelligent and aspiring citizen of this state to realize that our state ranks among the best in material things, natural resources and production, but that it ranks low in respect to education, cultural means, public health, public order, and many of the more enduring values. The county library greatly reinforces the educational system of the county and carries it into the adult field where it is needed desperately today with the increasing complexities of our modern civilization and demand for sound citizenship. During an effort to establish county library systems in each county in North Carolina, the governor, O. Max Gardner, stated; "I regard the citizens' library movement to provide a good countywide library service for every county as one of the most profoundly important and far-reaching developments in public education in this state since the introduction of the compulsory school law."

Further enforcing a sense of our need for adequate public library facilities is a statement from Harold L. Ickes, secretary of the interior: "An intelligent government and an intelligent citizenship do not grow spontaneously. They must be fashioned by carefully fabricated, highly tempered intellectual tools. An unwise economy that will cut at the roots of our American system of free schools and libraries may prove to be a fatal economy. To be great and free, America must be educated.'

We face the reality of changed educational methods by which students are taught to do research work and constructive thinking. They are taught to search for truth with an open mind wherever truth is to be found. This means that they must have access to the abundance of literature in the form of books which is flowing from the minds and pens of specialists in every field of modern endeavor. Free access to the necessary books is a decided aid to educators in their effort to teach those who come to them for instruction. It is an invaluable aid in preparing BOOTS AND HER BUDDIES the individual for life. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt expresses her views on the subject in these words: "There is no question in my mind but that the public library is esential to the growth of the people in any community. Unone can read and find the answers to the numerius ions which come up in everyday life, the opportunity





world's fair at Dallas this summer Ceremonies marking the hun-dredth anniversary of the state's declaration of independence Mexico will be held March 2 at old Washington-on-the-Brazos, first capital of the republic of Texas where the declaration was signed On the same day will be observed the birthday of Sam Houston, leader of the state's successful bid

Honor Houston Four days later, the state will honor the 181 defenders of the Alamo, massive mansion-fortress at San Antonio, who died to the last man after an 11-day siege by a Mexican army.

Houston, former governor was instrumental in proclaiming freedom, commanded Texans in the decisive battle of the resultant Mexican war, that of San Jacinto, was the first president of the republic of Texas, and was the first senator the state ent to Washington,

Years later, when Texas secedfrom the union to join the confederacy, Houston was governor. He resigned, however rather than tu'n against the United States.

March 2 also will bring massed singing by school children at Hous-ton's old home at Huntsville, and pilgrimage to his grave. The city Houston, named in his honor has planned an elaborate program commemorative of the dual significance of the day.

DALLAS, Feb. 29. (P) — Texas history under six flags will be por-trayed at the Texas Centennia music hall, the biggest in any theater in the world.

The average legitimate theater, including stage, auditorium and foyer, could be superimposed upon it, and there would be room

This outdoor spectacle, called the 'Cavalcade of Texas,' will dramatize Texas' past from the landing of the first Spanish Conquistador in 1915 to the present on a stage 350 feet across and more than 200 feet deep. There will be three levels, each 60 feet deep. Spanish galleons and the pirates ship of Jean Lafitte will sail along a stream 12-feet wide dividing first and second levels, and longhorned cattle, cowboys and prairie schooners will wind along a road dividing the second and third.

A water curtain, shooting 100 feet into the air, will hide the changes of scenery and permit parts of the second and third levels to be masked when only a small snace is needed. Colored lights will play on this curtain. "Three hundred persons will en-

act the 600 or 700 roles,"" said William Mark Hamilton, the director, who also is writing the continuity. Jan Isbelle Fortune is doing the dialogue. Both are native Texans. Hamilton wrote and produced his first play before he 20. In recent years he has directed a number of operettas on the west coast. Mrs. Fortune has written 50 historical radio plays since 1924, all of which have been produced.




