So, if Monday's big blast was 30 megatons, Khrushchev may unleash an even bigger explosion -and a bigger dose of falloutwithin the next week

Object Of U.S. **Justice Campaign**

WASHINGTON (NEA) - Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy's new nationwide drive on crime is centered on 40 "Crime Kings" whose names the Justice Department warily refuses to announce until the men are "roped and tied."

Kennedy's aides believe these unnamed men are bankrollers for a good share of the organized crime in the United States.

The drive on these "crime kings' is under way now, say Justice Department deputies. Most of the impetus comes from four anti - crime laws Congress passed shortly before adjourn-

These laws give the federal government power to act when: Men cross state lines to commit crime.

Money or information is sent across state lines in connection with crime or for criminal pay-

Criminals of any type flee across state lines. Betting paraphernalia crosses state lines-

The Justice Department men say the bankrolls of these 40 men buy public officials and police. They bankroll narcotics, prostitution and extortion-

These men provide the funds for taking over labor unions and for supporting "favorable" canditates in political elections. They bankroll strongarm men. They provide the lawyers and the protection for a wide array of crim-

Their bankrolls stretch across the United States. They operate in big cities and in small. Say's one official:

"If there are spots in your town or county where you can place numbers bets - even penny and five cent bests - there's a chance these men operate in your town.

"For the numbers racket usually needs organization and protection. Where organization and protection are needs, the big boys may come in, sooner or later."







Should We Strengthen The U.N.?

INSTALLMENT NO. 3 THE RISING COSTS OF UN "LEADERSHIP"

As native politicians in Asia and Africa take control from the European governments, they form new administrations eager to seat delegates in the UN as proof of their newly won "freedom." There these delegates vote on terms of equality with those from the United States, Britain and other great powers. As a result, the UN now has

double the number of Members it started with in 1945, and before long it will have double the 60 Members it had during the Korean "Police Action." From Africa in 1960 came delegations from Cameroon, Chad, Congo (Belg.), Congo (Fr.), Dahomey, Gabon (with less than 500,000 inhabitants), Ivory Coast, Malagasy, Mali, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, Somalia, Togo, Volta. These, with delegates from another dozen new governments forming in Africa, will join Afgianistan. Ghana, Guinea, Libya, Morocee, Tunisia, Iraq, Indonesia, Egypt, and other Afro-Asian-Arab States to form a UN bloc generally hostile to "the West" (capitalism), and with more votes than Washington has ever been able to control. They will hold the balance of power in the UN Assembly, and with the Communist regimes, and the socialist neutrals they will command a majority, possibly a two-thirds majority. How would a practical politician

or the noblest statesman obtain votes in such an organization? Merely by advancing far-sighted proposals for the common good? How well do the most learned men agree on such proposals? Or politicians? Will the scores of delegations sent by feudal princes, tribal chieftains, petty despots or politicians elected from the most remote parts of the world welcome and accept Washington's "leadership"?

Some Americans, of course, hope that the billions of dollars Washington pours out in "foreign aid" to foreign politicians will buy the political support we want, both in and out of the UTs. Looked at in this way these subsidies constitute the biggest slush fund in all human history.

But can money buy the understanding and character needed for loyal support of moral principles in politics? Does not the attempt to buy votes foster corruption, blackmail and conflict?

Fortunately for those who can read the lessons of history we need not wait for the answers to such question. So far Washington has had more influence in the UN than it is likely to enjoy in any foreseeable future. It has used both moral suasion and many billions of dollars to maintain and tighten this control. And with what results?

No brief article can adequately review the record, but two facts stand out,

First, ruthless tyrants, openly bent on world conquest, have taken over, partly by military means but mainly by subversion and treachery, a score of formerly independent nations, comprising one fourth to one third of the world's population

in Europe, Asia and Africa: Yet the United Nations has done nothing to punish these criminal aggressors, but instead continues to give their agents key posts in its owncouncils, departments and agencies. When Soviet tanks were crushing the efforts of the Hungarian people to oust the invaders, the UN Assembly voted to "deplore" Soviet action in crushing the revolt, but not to "condemn" it. Going

patriots. Second, after 15 years of disarmament discussions, the UN's "peace loving nations" are still engaged in history's most costly and nerve - racking armament race, and the danger and fear of war among them are greater than ever.

"But what about Korea?" someone asks. "Didn't the UN help us to stop Communist aggression there?" Because this Korean "police

action" is so often cited as an outstanding UN achievement, * deserves our special attention. "YIELDING TO THE COUNSELS OF NATIONS"

Not in any foreseeable future is the United States likely to possess the influence and prestige in the United Nations that it enjoyed in 1950. For resolutions endorsing its intervention in Korea. it obtained more than two thirds of the Assembly votes. More than two thirds of the Members gave tangible tokens of support, including 15 who contributed military aid. Yet the same UN Members

who sent companies or regiments of soldiers to fight and die with ours in that war insisted that we must not win it.

In deference to "UN policies and directives," Washington never gave its armed forces in Korea its best weapons or permission to make full use of the second-rate weapons it doled out so belatedly and stingily. In the first few weeks, United States troops were overwhelmed by superior numbers and equipment, were cornered in the tiny Pusan pocket, and were in imminent danger of being pushed into the sea. Yet American airmen were not allowed to bomb the power plants of North Korea, nor to pursue the enemy's planes to their bases in Manchuria, nor to bomb these bases, nor even to bomb within 5 miles of the Yalu river. And, of course, they were denied all use of atomic weapons, of which this country had a monopoly and with which the enemy's bases and sources of supply could have been wiped out in a few hours.

On nearby Formosa were thousands of well-trained troops eager to fight the Communist forces. They were probably the only soldiers in the world who really wanted to get into that war on either side, except for the South Koreans themselves. But, although Washington grabbed at the slightest token of aid from every other nation, often paying for it out of its own treasury, it refused the aid of the anti-Communist Chinese. In fact, because they were obviously so ready and willing, the United States Navy patrolled the Straits to make sure these eager troops stayed home.

Despite these restraints -"without precedent in history"-

America's Navy Set For Action If War Occurs

the Berlin crisis began to warm up some five months ago, the Navy has increased its active forces by 57 warships and 18 air squadrons.

Stepped up shipyard production rushed out the new carrier Kitty Hawk, the nuclear - powered, missile cruiser I. ong Beach, two guided missile _destroyers, one Polaris sub and four nuclear - powered attack submarines

Ready soon will be two additional carriers - Constellation, to be commissioned Oct. 27, and Enterprise, to be commissioned Nov. 25. The Enterprise will be the first nuclear - powered carrier in 7 the world.

Of the other ships, 47 were > reserve destroyers and destroyer escorts. Another was the attack carrier Antietam, which had been scheduled for lay-up.

By the law of numbers, the Navy is far more prepared for action today than at any comparable stage before the Korean and Second World Wars.

The line being taken by the top Navy brass is that the Berlin crisis won't trigger a general nuclear war. They say the Navy's new nuclear capabilities guarantee inevitable retaliation against any surprise attack - and they're sure the Soviet Union understands

Polaris subs, attack carriers, Z and missile-firing crusiers and destroyers give the Navy a nuclear > arm which has the ability to survive an attack. Mobile, dispersed and, in the case of submarines, concealed, these vessels are unsuitable as targets for ballistic missiles.

Present naval strength includes an active fleet of 900 ships, composed of 422 warships and 478 support ships. On June 30, 1950, five days after the invasion of South Korea, the Navy's active fleet numbered 598, with only 237 warships.

When Pearl Harbor was bombed Dec. 7, 1941, the Navy had 345 warships in a fleet of 657. At this time, World War II had already been in progress for more than two years.

Navy manpower, which totaled about 631,500 Sept, 1, will soon be increased to 657,000, according to

Naval sources. Navy brass feel that the fleet can do more than hold its own in event of limited war, as well as provide a deterrent to total
