

Troubled Finns Again Hold World Interest; Former Days Recalled

EDITOR'S NOTE: "Little Finland" holds a special place in the hearts of Americans. A whole generation remembers that when other and larger nations were stalling or wailing on their World War I debts to the United States, Finland paid up on the barrelhead every year. And in 1939 the Finns won the admiration and sympathy of the world when they resisted Russian aggression in the "winter war" they never had a chance of winning. In this dispatch, United Press International puts a mirror to the face of Finland.

By A. E. PEDERSEN JR. HELSINKI (UPI) — For the past two weeks it's been like old times in Helsinki. Trouble has been in the air, and in the bar at the old Kaemp Hotel the reporters who make international news their business were gathering again. Just as they did 22 years ago.

Then it was the Russo-Finnish "winter war" that brought the out of town and overseas reporters to the Kaemp. This time it was just a sniff of trouble — no one being quite sure just how tough the trouble might prove to be.

On Oct. 30, after 12 years of peace and progress in Finland, Soviet Russia suddenly in a formal note demanded that Finland consult with the Kremlin, under terms of a 1948 "mutual friendship and assistance" pact between the two countries, on steps of joint defense. The U.S.S.R. was worried about growing Allied — specifically NATO — strength in the north, and the Baltic region.

The timing seemed odd. The president of Finland, Urho Kekkonen, was in Hawaii as part of an American visit. With him was his foreign minister, Aht Karjalainen.

The people of Finland, not unnaturally, were worried. Two things were apparent: —The Soviet Union's concern over growing Allied military strength in Europe, a military buildup hastened by the Berlin crisis, with West Germany in a major role.

—The Soviet Union's overt attempt to put pressure on the other Nordic countries — to make Norway and Denmark think twice about their roles in NATO planning, to instill in Sweden second thoughts about her real "neutrality."

To the newcomers as well as the old familiars at the Kaemp Hotel, hardly changed from 1939 with its ancient reading room chairs and turn-of-the-century scenes hung on its dining room walls, it seemed plain enough what the Soviets were doing but not so plain what she wanted.

"We will just have to wait and see," one wise old diplomat counseled the curious men at the Kaemp.

The situation inevitably brought memories of 1939, but there were differences. That time, Moscow demanded the right to take over and build bases on the Finnish Peninsula. The Finns said no and went to war. This time there was no talk of bases or territory. The Russians remained at least outwardly friendly in their approaches.

And there was another, big, difference. The Finland of 1961 could

not, would not, even entertain the idea of war as an alternative to maintenance of peaceful relations.

In the atomic era, the science of war has passed Finland by.

So the diplomatic back and forth began. On Oct. 31, while he continued his American tour, President Kekkonen sent Foreign Minister Karjalainen back to Helsinki. In Los Angeles, Kekkonen told newsmen that as he saw it the Russian note had introduced "no new elements" in Finnish-Soviet relations. The Soviets still recognized Finland's neutrality among the big powers.

President Kekkonen arrived home on schedule Nov. 3. Wryly, he remarked at the airport, "Is the republic still standing?" It was, but Acting President Martti Miettunen, the prime minister, was happy to return the presidential reins to Kekkonen.

Two days later, on Nov. 5, the president went on the radio to reassure his countrymen. The fears that Finland's independence was threatened and that the Soviets would demand bases on Finnish soil were "entirely unjustified," Kekkonen said.

On Nov. 6 Foreign Minister Karjalainen was going to Moscow for A. V. Zakharov, and the next day the government announced Karjalainen was going into Moscow to talk there with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko. They met Nov. 11.

"You have only a minority government at home," Gromyko told the Finn. "It could be toppled any day. Then what would happen to your neutral foreign policy?"

Karjalainen tried to reassure Gromyko that all parties in Finland stood behind the neutrality policy and it would continue regardless of domestic political events; but Gromyko insisted that the Soviets needed assurances this was really so.

On Nov. 14, President Kekkonen, in a move that rocked the country, announced he was ordering new elections for Feb. 4-5, 1962. The new elections would provide the assurances the Soviets wanted.

"We were also trying to win time," the president said later. The special election call put almost all parties in a difficult position. Social Democrats, Liberals, and Conservatives had hammered together an anti-Kekkonen coalition backing retired Chancellor of Justice Olavi Honka, and all members of the coalition took pains to go on record as backing the current foreign policy. The anti-Kekkonen stand of the three parties was based purely on domestic issues.

Then as Kekkonen went to Siberia to confer with Premier Nikita Khrushchev, a legislator recommended that the president be re-elected for another six years through parliamentary vote to promote national unity at a critical time. Honka said the proposal was worth studying, and on the day that Kekkonen saw Khrushchev the coalition candidate withdrew from the presidential campaign. Honka said he was taking the action "in the interests of the country."

Honka's withdrawal was preceded by new pressures on Finland by the Soviet Union. Russia announced on Nov. 16 that since sending the note on Oct. 30 the situation in northern Europe had "deteriorated." The Soviets asked Finland to send a delegation to Russia to talk about joint defense matters.

On Nov. 22, early on a pleasant late autumn morning, President

Kekkonen left for a meeting with Khrushchev. He had little room for maneuvering. He had gone on record as vowing to defend Finnish neutrality until his last breath. He had also stated publicly that the Russians did not want bases in Finland, and were not seeking a change in the makeup of the government. Further, he had — and this was not something to be taken lightly — stated that he would resign if he could no longer see any chance of continuing his own policies.

The two leaders met at the Siberian capital of Novosibirsk on Nov. 24. At a luncheon for the Finnish president that day Khrushchev said the Soviet Union no longer regards northern Europe as "an area of peace and tranquility." He said the Soviets wanted to curb what he called the West German revenge-seekers and called on Finland to continue its neutrality. Finnish sources said the meeting was held in a spirit of "frankness, collaboration and sincere confidence."

Kennedy Pleased Reds Published Views On Peace

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy calls Russia's publication of his Izvestia interview "a marked step forward in American-Soviet understanding."

Kennedy, after hearing from the U. S. embassy in Moscow that the interview had been published in full, issued this statement through his press secretary, Pierre Salinger: "I consider the publication of the interview in the Soviet Union a marked step forward in American-Soviet understanding. I hope it will lead to further intensification of free communication between our two countries at all levels."

The press secretary was asked by newsmen if he thought Kennedy's points had been diluted by long statements by the interviewer, Izvestia editor Alexei I. Adzhubei.

"I don't believe it's diluted and I believe he (Kennedy) got his points across very clearly to the Soviet people," Salinger said. Salinger said the original tran-

script, agreed to by Adzhubei as accurate, quoted the editor as saying the results of Nikita Khrushchev's 1959 visit to the United States "were not completely satisfactory."

As the interview was published in Moscow, however, this sentence was rewritten to say: "But the positive results of that trip were wrecked and brought to nothing by the well-known actions of the then American administration."

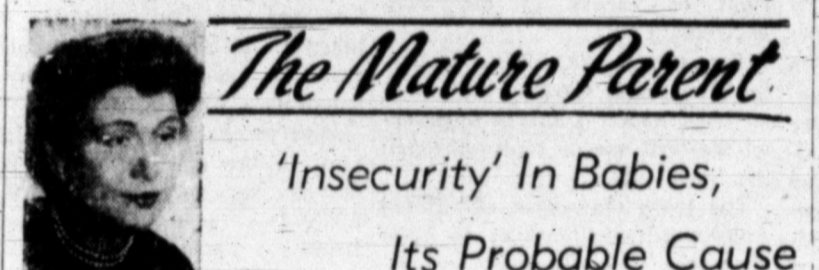

She'll have her hair beautifully styled, choose her prettiest evening costume, and be sure that her make-up is carefully applied.

Wake Forest Cagers Favored In South

RALEIGH, N.C. (UPI)—1961-62 basketball prospects at Wake Forest are so rosy the biggest concern appears to be how to keep excited Horace (Bones) McKinney on the bench.

McKinney already is in the hospital, nursing skinned shins "suffered when he slipped through the bleachers at the practice gym last week."

This year, his Demon Deacons have the talent, experience and depth along with a Big star, 6-8 Len Chappell, and they're odds-on favorites in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Wake Forest lost only one man from the ACC championship team of last year, and there is substantial bench strength. The Deacons reached the NCAA regional finals last year, and could go all the way in 1962.

Packer and Dave Wiedeman are the playmakers along with Chappell. The Deacons open this Saturday night against Davidson and a week later play host to the nation's top-ranked team, Ohio State.

Top challengers in the Atlantic Coast Conference apparently will be Duke's young, talented Blue Devils and an experienced, bench-strong Maryland team.

Duke features high-scoring Art Heyman, last year's sophomore star from Rockville Centre, N.Y., and coach Vic Bubas has a highly touted pair of sophomores in Jeff Mullins from Lexington, Ky., and 6-10 center Jay Buckley from Cheverly, Md.

"Acknowledging that the squad's youth may cause early season trouble, Bubas points out that there are nine sophomores on the 13-man roster.

"But we'll do all right if we don't make the early season mistakes a young team can make," Bubas said.

Maryland coach Bud Millikan moans the lack of a big man, or better still two big men—6-6 or better — among the experienced personnel on hand at College Park. But Millikan does have five regulars led by Bob Eicher, Paul Jelus and 6-7 Jerry Greenspan. He has two 6-8 sophomores, Scott Ferguson, and Joe Barton.

Adequate manpower presents problems at North Carolina and North Carolina State, hard hit by last spring's college basketball bribe scandals and under a de-emphasis program. North Carolina has a new coach, Dean Smith, replacing Frank McGuire who resigned to go to the pro-ranks. Veteran Everett Case is still at N.C. State and is hopeful of a representative team built around two surviving lettermen, forward John Pungler and guard Jon Speaks, and a holdout, Pete Aukst.

Virginia, South Carolina and Clemson hope for improvement, but all lack the manpower of the ACC's top three.

Pre-season figuring in the Southern Conference is difficult, but West Virginia, The Citadel, Furman and George Washington appear the most solid of the regular leaders.

VMI coach Weenie Miller predicts better things for his Keydets with 6-7 sophomore Bob Watson at center, Virginia Tech also has promising sophomores in 6-6 Howard Pardue and 6-8 Barry Benfield.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—They said he could not survive in the graveyard of coaches but he is the dean of coaches in one of the country's toughest football leagues.

He puts on one of the greatest sideline shows in football.

He says what he thinks, often to the embarrassment of his friends. But politicians would envy his eloquence and English professors his fine choice of words.

He is a great defender of college football as an important part of the American way of life.

He is Wayne Woodrow Hayes, known to millions as the ringmaster of Ohio State's devastating football offense which has powered his team into top national rating by the United Press International Board of Coaches.

For a fine display of that offense last Saturday when his unbeaten team humbled arch-rival Michigan, 50-20, Woody Hayes today was named the UPI Coach of the Week.

Hayes is a study in contrasts, leading some people to believe that in his bag of tricks he has the formula for Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde.

Hayes came to Ohio State from Miami of Ohio 11 years ago when the university wanted somebody who could take the gaff from the downtown quarterbacks Ohio had had a big turnover of coaches and the university was embarrassed.

The going was tough for awhile, as the fans chanted "Bring back Paul Brown" at times.

But now Hayes has the last laugh. His team has finished its second unbeaten season, it has won four Big Ten championships, and Hayes is the dean of Big Ten football coaches.

Crimson Tide Nixes Rose Bowl Contest

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (UPI)—Alabama officially withdrew from any consideration of a Rose Bowl bid Tuesday and reaffirmed the intention of playing in the Sugar Bowl if an invitation is extended.

Game officials called a roughness penalty against Syracuse and gave Notre Dame an extra play after time had run out. Joe Perkowski kicked a 41-yard field goal to give the Irish the extra edge.

Nayland said that "in my opinion and in the opinion of several other members of the NCAA rules committee, the officials made a mistake in awarding Notre Dame an extra down."

But he added that it was "now purely an institutional matter" and he knew of no machinery to reverse the decision and the outcome of the game.
