The special election call put almost all parties in a difficult position. Social Democrats, Liberals, and Conservatives had hammered tion backing retired Chancellor of Justice Olavi Honka, and all members of the coalition took pains to go on record as backing the current foreign policy. The anti-Kekkonen stand of the three parties was based purely on domestic issues.

Then as Kekkonen went to Siberia to confer with Premier Nikita Khrushchev, a legislator recommended that the president be re-elected for another six years through parliamentary vote to pomote national unity at a critical time. Honka said the proposal was worth studying, and on the day that Kekkonen saw Khrushchev the coalition candidate withdrew from the presidential campaign. Honka said he was taking the action "in the interests of the

country. Honka's withdrawal was preceded by new pressures on Finland by the Soviet Union. Russia announced on Nov. 16 that since sending the note on Oct. 30 the situation in northern Europe had "deteriorated" The Soviets asked Finland to send a delegation to Russia to talk about joint defense matters.
