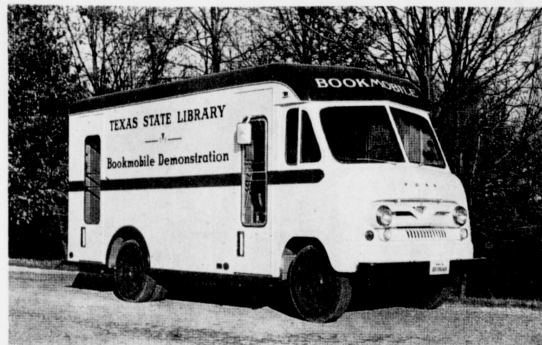

Library Theme - - Explore Inner Space By Reading

Schools Slate Library Week

"Explore Inner Space-Read and Reading Is What's Happening" are the dual themes of the 1967 Library Week in Texas, scheduled to observe its tenth anniversary "week" from April 16-22.

The Library Week in Texas program is a part of the annual program, observed in all fifty states. It is traditionally held in April, culminating a year's activity planned and carried out by local and state leaders drawn from the community and the library profession.

The two themes were developed by the steering committee for the nationwide reading and library development campaign. The themes point out the personal renewal that can be obtained by reading. In addition, the themes reflect the conviction that much is happening in libraries, both public and private.

As Governor John Connally proclaimed Library Week in Texas, he urged all Texans to read more and to accept

the responsibility for making reading opportunities more available to others.

"Education for the many and not for only the few began with the printing of books and libraries make up the very core of education."

Since the inception of the National Library development in Texas had doubled.

"Because the demand for books and readers, new libraries have sprung up where none existed before."

Today, Texas has approximately 350 public libraries not including the many special libraries and those of colleges and universities.

The tremendous public response to the National Library program in Texas from its inception in 1957 gives a clear evidence of a widespread belief in its objectives and a general concern for the quality of intellectual life in the state.

The Muleshoe School Libraries are observing the Tenth

Anniversary of National Library Week April 16-22. The dual themes are "Explore Inner Space-Read" and "Reading Is What's Happening."

The libraries in each of the Muleshoe Schools are truly the centers of learning as shown by the monthly circulation reports from each of the librarians.

Mrs. Jesse Stovall, high school librarian, reports a total of 11,587 books have been checked out for the first seven months of this school year. This averages 1655 books that were checked out each month by the students. The budget for the High School Library which included both local funds and Title II, E.S.E.A. funds was \$3,000. This means that approximately \$5.76 was spent per student for library materials.

Over 7000 biography, reference, and action books are available to the students and faculty of Muleshoe High School.

In the Muleshoe Junior High Library Mrs. Pauline Griffin, librarian, has a total of 14,416 books checked out for the first seven months making a monthly average of 2059. A budget of \$2000 was allowed, thus \$3.65 was spent per pupil.

The inventory shows 5613 books in the Junior High Library. In the Richland Hills Elementary Library, Mrs. Judith Harlin, librarian, reported 12,669 books had been circulated this school year, averaging 1810 monthly. There are 3318 volumes on the shelves.

At the Mary DeShazo Elementary Library, Mrs. Mazine Carter, librarian, checked out 9274 for this school year which averaged 1311 per month. Over 4105 volumes are available in this library. The budget was \$1750 for each elementary library which allowed approximately \$4.25 to be spent per child.

The overall budget for the libraries was approximately \$8500. With an approximate enrollment of 2000 students, the average spent per pupil was \$4.25 for the year 1966-67.

In all the school libraries, the faculty has access not only to books, but also filmstrips, transparencies, pictures, and records. Newspapers and magazines are also available to students.

In Texas more than half a million public school students have no centralized library. Muleshoe Schools have four centralized libraries and four full time qualified librarians.

A Professional Library for teachers and all professional personnel has been set up in the Curriculum Center in the Muleshoe Junior High Building. Over 250 books, numerous catalogs and some 15 monthly and by-monthly periodicals, and other materials are available to the faculty in enriching the curriculum are available.

A total of \$617.70 was spent for professional materials this year.

Everyone is invited to visit the libraries during this special week and "Explore Inner Space-Read."

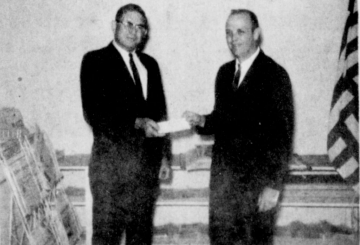

Since the death count of 2,

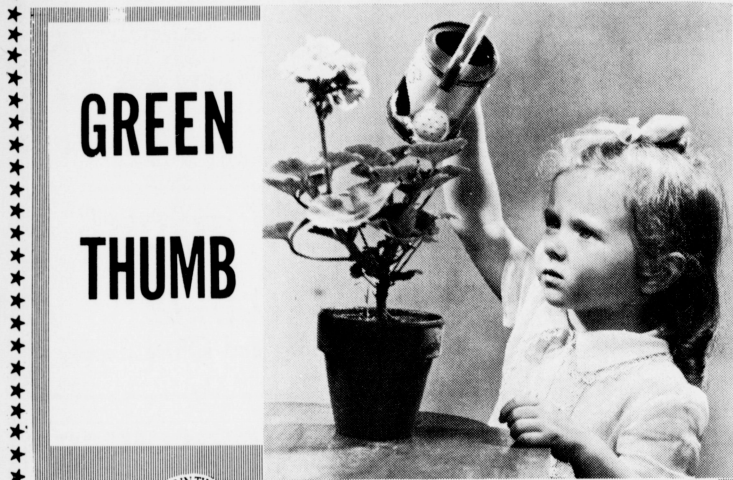

Curriculum Guide

GENERAL BUSINESS
Ninth and tenth grade level

The major purpose of a course in General Business is to contribute to improved economic citizenship through a study of business. This is accomplished through the achievement of two major outcomes:

1. To provide an understanding of business practices and procedures that are important to everyone as a citizen and consumer through the study of banking services, budgeting, credit spending and its cost, insurance, savings, travel and communication services, transportation and shipping services, and selecting an occupation.
2. To provide background information that is essential to those who plan to concentrate their efforts in the study of a vocational business curriculum.

BOOKKEEPING
Eleventh and twelfth grade level

The purpose of any bookkeeping system is to supply necessary information for operating a business intelligently. Our objectives in this bookkeeping course are to provide the student with:

1. An understanding of business practices and procedures
2. How to interpret business data from bookkeeping records
3. Information concerning good management
4. An understanding that emphasis is placed upon developing understanding as opposed to memorization.
5. A knowledge that the on-the-job bookkeeper uses a number of arithmetic devices and accounting practices which make the work easier, more accurate and acceptable.
6. Frequent opportunities to apply the learning by working meaningful exercises and problems.
7. An understanding that a background of bookkeeping information is needed by individuals as well as business.
8. An appreciation for habits of accuracy, neatness, and organization in all work.
9. A foresight that bookkeeping helps to prepare him for a position in the business world or for advanced study in accounting.

BUSINESS LAW
(course description)

The day you were born, the law stepped into your life. As long as you live the law will be important to you. Therefore, students need to know something about law. The ordinary businessman and the average citizen can hope to learn only the basic rules of law. A knowledge of these basic laws, as taught in Business Law, will help the individual over many rough spots when he steps out in life.

Emphasis on the personal-use of business law as it relates to the lives of the student, their parents, and their associates is presented in the course. Material and information is provided for the student on the law in relation to (1) one's day-to-day activities, (2) the classification of law, (3) how the law protects the individual (4) how one's legal rights are enforced, (5) the detailed steps followed in the trial of a lawsuit, and (6) the difference between civil and criminal court trials.

TYPING I--
Offered to Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors. Fees--\$8 per year.

Objectives:
To develop skill and correct techniques in the use of the typewriter. To build speed and accuracy. To learn basic skills in preparing business letters and business forms. To develop self-confidence in the use of the typewriter with maximum speed and minimum errors.

TYPING II
Offered to Juniors and Seniors who have a credit in Typing I. Fees--\$8 per year.

Objectives:
The content of this course is designed to acquaint the prospective office worker with an over-all survey of office procedures, as: Office orientation, indexing and filing, general clerical information, transcribing machines, and duplicating methods.

SHORTHAND
Offered to Juniors and Seniors (preferably Seniors, because there should be no lapse of time between the period of training and the time when the

student begins using the shorthand.)

PREREQUISITE: TYPING I
The student should, if possible, be enrolled in Typing II.

Objectives:
To develop a mastery of the theory of Gregg Shorthand. To develop fluency in reading shorthand. To automatize frequently used words and phrases. To develop the ability to construct new shorthand outlines. To build skill in sustained shorthand writing. To build skills of spelling, punctuation, capitalization, work division, proofreading and paraphrasing, and to develop vocabulary and acceptable English usage. To develop the ability to transcribe shorthand notes quickly and accurately at the typewriter. To develop the ability to produce readable letters in time production.

Student To See False Impression in Driving

Students of Muleshoe school will have an opportunity at 2:45, Friday, April 18 to see for themselves how the false impression and sense of security that a driver of a modern automobile gets, can and does, often lead into the danger zone and trouble, when they participate in a series of driving tests Tom Jinks, principal, announced today.

The tests, which will be in two parts, will be given under the direction of Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau.

The first section will be a short talk and film on traffic safety, while the second will be a demonstration on 3rd street East of the school.

High point of the demonstration will come when driving tests are made with various students and faculty members in the specially equipped car. An electric detonator which is mounted on the front bumper of the car will fire yellow paint bullets to indicate the distance required to stop the car in an emergency.

The driver being tested will be signalled to stop by the report of the first shell. The second will be fired automatically when the brake is applied and the third when the car halts. Distance between the spots of paint will then be measured to determine the reaction, braking, and total stopping distances.

Tests will be limited to 20-, 30-, and 40 mile per hour speeds because of the danger of making emergency stops at higher speeds. Police officers will be used as drivers in the high speed tests.

As part of a program for safety on the highway, the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department has presented this driving demonstration and test before the high schools of this state since 1957. The program is being brought to Muleshoe under the sponsorship of Bailey County Farm Bureau. The public is invited to attend.

Appraisal On Kennedy

The United States has now had the time to assimilate the implications of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's address on Vietnam. The result is a bitterer political situation, a momentarily heightened debate, but no real change in American policy.

Nor does there seem to be much likelihood that the New York Senator's words will bring about such a change. His supporters claim that, given the political rivalry and the personal animosity which exists between the Senator and President Johnson, the former is the last person from whom the latter would take advice. Senator Kennedy's critics say, however, that the lack of anything basically new in the speech is what dooms it to ineffectuality, despite the publicity surrounding it.

In substance, the Senator based his three-part proposals on his belief that a "moment of promise" for peace talks may have come. In this he stands in direct opposition to the administration which holds that there is no real sign that such a moment has come. Unhappily for the Senator, Hanoi's refusal to make any meaningful gesture during the Vietnamese New Year hostilities standstill has led many foreign observers—who are no happier over the North's bombing that is he—to conclude that North Vietnam is not yet ready to negotiate seriously. Furthermore, it is almost certain that the Kennedy attack upon the Johnson position will make Hanoi less, rather than more inclined to talk.

Whereas the Kennedy speech seems unlikely to affect American policy on Vietnam, it can have greater effect at home. For when Sen. Robert F. Kennedy breaks with President Johnson, the country knows that there is far more in the offing than merely the conduct of the war.

There is, first, Senator Kennedy's unceasing and purposeful determination to sieze upon every issue which he believes can bring him nearer the White House. There is, second, the never-healed animosity of the Kennedy group for the man who succeeded John F. Kennedy in the presidency. There is, third, the continuing effort of the Senator's campaign managers to invest everything he says with double importance regardless of the subject or whether others have said it earlier.

Thus among the certain effects of the Kennedy speech will be to heighten domestic tension over the war and to deepen political cleavages as the 1968 presidential campaign approaches.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Tex.--A \$170,000-000 pay raise bill for Texas school teachers now is in its final stage through legislative thunderclouds.

Sen. A. M. Alkin Jr. of Paris, sponsor of the legislation, steered it through the Senate Education Committee with ease. Alkin indicated he will move for Senate passage after the general appropriations bill is passed. He has sufficient votes to send it to the House.

Texas State Teachers Association President Sam M. Anderson of Big Spring told the Committee that this school year opened with an actual shortage of 1,200 teachers. Furthermore, some 5,000 of those now employed would not be working if capable replacements were available. By fall the teacher shortage is expected to grow worse unless salaries are improved.

TSTA says Alkin's bill -- which provides raises of \$61 to \$100 a month with the biggest going to teachers with less experience -- still would leave Texas teachers \$4 below the national average.

Raises would necessitate a state appropriation of \$170,000,000 for the next two years. Local school districts would add about \$17,000,000 a year more, as their share. Additional state money involved is almost as much as Gov. John Connally's entire \$187,300,000 tax program. For that reason this bill will play a significant part in the overall financial complexion of this legislative session.

Connally's spending and revenue plans include \$30,000,000 for teachers -- or a total raise of five per cent across the board. This is about one-third of what TSTA wants.

While there is general feeling that teachers will get more money again this session, House sentiment appears to lean toward a lower figure than that covered by TSTA's bill, but a higher one than recommended by the governor.

COMMITTEES GO TO WORK
Quick action by various committees of the House and Senate in reporting out notable bills

will keep Senators and Representatives busy during the coming weeks. Bills coming out: Senate Constitutional Amendments reported favorably without debate or controversy the proposed constitutional amendment by Sen. Joe Bernal of San Antonio to lower the state voting age to 18. Bernal didn't even get to present his testimony or the numerous witnesses from all over the state. Same committee favorably reported a proposed constitutional amendment by Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville to gradually do away with ad valorem taxes.

Rep. Temple Dickson of Sweetwater pushed through the House Judiciary Committee his Tort Claims Act, which would do away with the doctrine that prohibits suits against the state and local governments without permission of the Legislature. Senate Education Committee recommended passage of Sen. Wayne Connally's bill to exempt students from low-income families from having to pay tuition and fees at state-supported colleges and universities.

Enabling bill to allow the Parks and Wildlife Department to issue \$75,000,000 in bonds to finance the purchase and development of parks around the state was reported favorably by the House Committee on Parks and Wildlife. Its companion constitutional amendment to authorize the bonds has been passed by both houses, but in different forms so it, too, is pending.

BILLS SIGNED

Governor Connally has signed two of this session's major bills into law: (1) Local option authority for cities to levy one per cent sales taxes and (2) Strengthening of the Sunday closing law. Sales taxation at local level will be delayed until after August.

Under Sunday Closing law amendments, merchants cannot sell 42 names items -- including clothing, toys, furniture and hardware -- on consecutive Saturdays and Sundays. Old "emergency purchase" certificate is out.

Two lesser bills also got Connally's signature. One establishes the Texas Fine Arts Commission on a permanent

basis. Other allows the Parks and Wildlife Department to acquire, restore and maintain historical structures and sites and those relating to prehistoric animal or plant life.

OLD-AGE BENEFITS

Awaiting the governor's signature is a bill by Senator Bernal to make eligible for old age assistance payments 10,000 persons who have lived in Texas 25 years or longer, . . . but who are not U. S. citizens. Bernal said that no one knows how many elderly non-citizens there are in Texas, though the figure may run as high as 12-130. However, State Department of Public Welfare figures that 5,000 will sign up the first year and 10,000 the second.

Estimated cost to the state is approximately \$1,000,000 the first year and \$2,000,000 the second.

"CIVIL RIGHTS" BILL PASSED

First state "civil rights" bill in recent history has been passed by the Legislature.

Measure by Sen. Don Kennard of Fort Worth prohibits discrimination because of race, religion, color or national origin in employment with all branches of state and local gov-

ernment in Texas. It also forbids discrimination in agency-dealing with people. Provisions extend to hiring employees, issuing permits, awarding contracts, use of facilities or participation in government programs. Violations are punishable by fines up to \$1,000 and a year in jail. Bill supplements the 1964 federal civil rights act and all-lows complaints of discriminatory practices to be filed first in state courts rather than federal courts.

LONG TERMS DELAYED

Proposed Constitutional amendment to provide four-year terms for governor and other statewide officials is bogged down in the Senate after booming through the House. Senate placed the proposal table subject to call after motion to kill it failed 8-19. Sponsor, Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, will need two-thirds vote to call it off the skirt. . . . and so on. They even borrow her shoes.

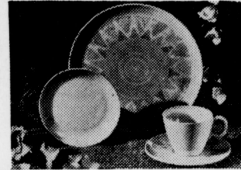
