

Khrushchev Claims We Will Hoist The Red Flag Over Our Own Heads

BUCHAREST, Romania (UPI) Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev said Tuesday the Soviet Union sees no reason to go to war over Berlin.

In a wide-ranging speech here, the visiting Soviet leader also said the Red flag will fly over the United States and added, "the American people will hoist it; themselves

Khrushchev, discussing the Berlin issue, declared that Russia has set no deadline for signing a separate peace treaty with Commu-East Germany.

After predicting the Red flag would be hoisted over the United States, the Soviet premier said: However, we do not want war

with the United States and to drop

our bombs over America." Khrushchev appeared supremely confident as he spoke to workers at the Grivita Rosie Railroad workshop-a Communist stronghold through World Wars I and II -in the first address of his eight-

day tour of Romania.


