Reds Claim New Victories By The Rebels In Laos

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)-Com-Weekdays 50 Sundays 150 munist victories over Laotian government forces in the northwest brought widespread criticism today of U.S. policies in Laos.

While there was no official comment, both Laotian and American sources privately questioned U.S. attempts to force the' royal government into a coalition with pro-Communist rebels who have revived the civil war.

(Communists claimed new victories for the Laotian rebels. A Peiping radio broadcast heard in Tokyo said rebels in the Sam Neua area in the north had "routed" and "inflicted heavy casualties" on royal forces airdropped in rebel-held territory. The radio said two clashes took place near Sam Neua and Muong Boun on May 3 and May 4.

There was no confirmation of these small-scale clashes from the roval government.)





If you are adding ruffles to a

plain garment, and the fabric is a lightweight one such as lawn or voile use twice as much ruffle as the sleeves, skirt, etc. measure. If the fabric is a drip - dry or gingham, use one and on ehalf to one and three - quarters. Sketches show several details of ruffles to help you in making attractive ones. Top one shows a long machine stitch bobbin thread drawn up to obtain the desired fullness. Ruffle is then stitched to place. Second sketch shows how a ruffle is held in a French seam. First seam is cut close to the stitching line to avoid bulk.

Many skirts have 3 rows of a double ruffle. This is usually cut on a true bias, both edges hemmed narrowest possible hem and then gathered through the center. (Always practice with your machine hemmer and get so you can handle the fabric perfectly before you begin to hem the ruffles you will use.) Some designers are using cir-






