Second Session of 87th Congress

Term of Congress lasts two years. This term is divided into regular sessions. The first session is held during that year which the Congress is convened for the general elections. The second session is actually a continuation of the first in most things except name. All bills introduced after the beginning of the first session of the term of Congress remain on the calendar the full two years unless otherwise disposed of by defeat, passage, or other action. At the end of the second session, all bills pending are re-introduced at the following session of the Congress, they are not before the Congress.

are now in the second session of the 87th Congress, which convened on January 10. From that time through the 30th, the Senate had been in session 99 days, the House of Representatives 94. The Senate had 555 hours, 43 minutes in session; while the House spent 517 hours, 24 minutes. This differential in time is no doubt due to the fact that in the House the day is limited. In the Senate the day is not. In the House, it is very common that a Member is allowed to speak for more than 10 or 15 minutes during any session while in the Senate the House is limited. The rules followed in the House are different from those followed in the Senate. The Members of the Senate are not limited in debate, and they have set some records in recent years.

There are many, many times when I wish the House had unlimited debate, because things should be said are blocked by the limitation rules. The pages in the Congressional Record reflect the difference in the time in session. The Senate had placed 105 pages in the Record as of the 30th, while the House had placed 4,456.

During this time, 109 public bills had been enacted into law, 70 of which were House bills while 39 were Senate bills. And, 161 private bills had been enacted into law, 105 of these being House bills and 56 being Senate bills. All these bills had to be passed by both houses and signed by the President. This does not mean that these were the only bills that were passed by either house. The fact is that the House had passed 3,444 bills and the Senate had passed 21. The committees in the House had reported to the Senate 625 measures had been reported by House committee to the House of Representatives.

On January 10th and through the 30th, 1,069 measures were introduced in the Senate. During that same time, 3,444 measures were introduced in the House. These include bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions, and simple resolutions. If you will compare this figure with the number of bills that have been enacted into law, you can see that very few of the bills introduced ever become law. Parliamentary procedure is one of the safeguards under the democratic form of government. Once a bill is introduced, the gamut through which it must travel before it finally reaches the President's desk is quite formidable. If it is first introduced, it is assigned to a committee by the Speaker of the House. Usually it is then assigned by the Chairman of that committee to a subcommittee. Public hearings are then scheduled by the subcommittee during which testimony is taken from both proponents and opponents. When this is completed, the bill is considered in executive session, during which amendments may be offered and acted upon. When this procedure has been completed, the bill is reported to the full House for further action. It is

Foreign Commentary

HELSINKI (UPI)—Just across from Finland's Parliament building stands a statue erected to the memory of Field Marshal Carol Gustaf Mannerheim, the national hero who assured Finland's independence from Russia. A street and a museum have been named after him. The state-owned Marski Hotel takes its name from the affectionate nickname grateful Finns bestowed upon him.

A few blocks to the east is the domed magnificence of the Lutheran Cathedral, one of the imposing buildings of Europe. Together, the cathedral and the memory of Mannerheim may be taken as symbols of today's Finland which is religious, conservative and with a fierce pride in independence.

Strict Neutrality
To these qualities harsh reality also has dictated the necessity of firm neutrality.

It is ironic that in the last days, by ship and by plane, have been arriving delegates to a festival which most Finns heartily wish were being held somewhere else and which many feel is a violation not only of Finnish hospitality but also of Finnish neutrality.

Although some of the delegates are remarkably elderly this is to be the 8th international youth festival which last was held in Vienna, also a neutral capital, and which is another of those fronts common to the infiltration tactics of world communism.

The Finnish National Union of Students served notice in advance that its 12,000 members would refuse to participate. The Finnish government also made clear it had no wish to host an event of solely political orientation, organized principally by foreign authorities.

Unwanted Guests
So it was with obvious contempt of Finnish wishes, duly noted by Finnish students, that the Iron Curtain organizers of the festival formally announced that it would be held in Helsinki.

The advance program advertisement sporting events, concerts and discussion groups, the latter being most important to the organizers who push a line ranging from peaceful coexistence to better Red than dead.

Finnish authorities hope eventually that the next week will pass peacefully and then go with as little notice as possible into history.

But with turbulent events of the Vienna festival in mind, they also have cancelled all police leaves.

Danger Rides In Small Boats

With 37 million Americans now in families with boats and these increasing in number by 300,000 a year, individual and community safety measures are imperative if water-borne catastrophes are to be avoided. So warns Alfred Balk in an August Reader's Digest article, "Danger Rides in Small Boats."

"Half of all boating deaths," he writes, "are due to incompetence or simple carelessness. In one state on one holiday, ten deaths resulted from such things as standing up in a boat, towing a water skier without a companion in the boat as observer, starting an outboard with the gears engaged, cramming ten persons into an 11-foot boat, and a collision at night with no one at the wheel."

The most common reasons for tragedy are overcrowding, lack of life preservers, and changing positions needlessly. So far only New Jersey requires an operator's license but the 1958 federal boating law, the Bonner Act, calls for the numbering of all boats over 10 horsepower, nationwide reporting of accidents and personal liability for negligent operation. In 24 states if you're reckless you're liable even for damages resulting from your craft's wake.

In Wisconsin, warden-pilots use loudspeakers to warn boaters below of danger and remind them of safety procedures. Volunteer groups from Maricopa County, Ariz., to Hamilton, Mass., maintain water patrols. The Oakland County, Mich., patrol has 40 new motorboats. The article is condensed from Suburbia Today.

Berra Is Added To AL Roster

BOSTON (UPI) — Yogi Berra, whose 1959 homer helped the American League to its last All-Star game victory, heads for additional players named for next Monday's second 1962 All-Star game.

American All-Star Manager Ralph Houk of New York made Berra one of his choices while planning a breakthrough of National League domination in recent All-Star competition. The Nationals, once far in arrears of the American Leaguers in the All-Star won-lost records, have won four and tied one in the last five meetings.

Joining Berra, named for the 14th successive season, were Boston first baseman Pete Runnels, the current American League batting leader, and pitchers Jim Kaat of Los Angeles.

Houk also repeated a first game move in which Baltimore pitcher Milt Pappas replaced ailing teammate Hoyt Wilhelm on the American League pitching staff.

To make room for the fourth additional player, Houk was forced to drop Boston pitcher Bill Monbouquette from his first game mound staff. Under the rules, the All-Star manager may add only three players for the second game but is permitted to make changes in his pitching and reserve choices.

The remainder of the American League squad will be the same which lost a 3-1 decision to the Nationals two weeks ago at Washington. The National win pulled the league to within one victory of tying the American League's once-dominant 16 victories in All-Star competition.

McMahon Takes Pessimistic Viewpoint Toward New Job

CHICAGO (UPI) — Jack McMahon, a refugee from the tottering American Basketball League, took the job as coach of the Chicago Zephyrs in the rival National Basketball Association with the expectation of losing it, he suggested today.

"I played at St. Louis five years," he said, "and we had five coaches. Andy Phillip had a 6-4 record and they fired him because they said we weren't looking good winning. I know I'm not in the safest job in the world."

McMahon said he was interested in the job, for which he signed a two year contract, after a "half hearted ABL defunct notice."

"All of a sudden I was unemployed," he said.

McMahon, whose Steers won 58 and lost 28 games in the ABL last year to lead the league in both halves of the season, said he had turned down an offer to coach the Cleveland Pipers, who transferred from the ABL to the NBA last month.

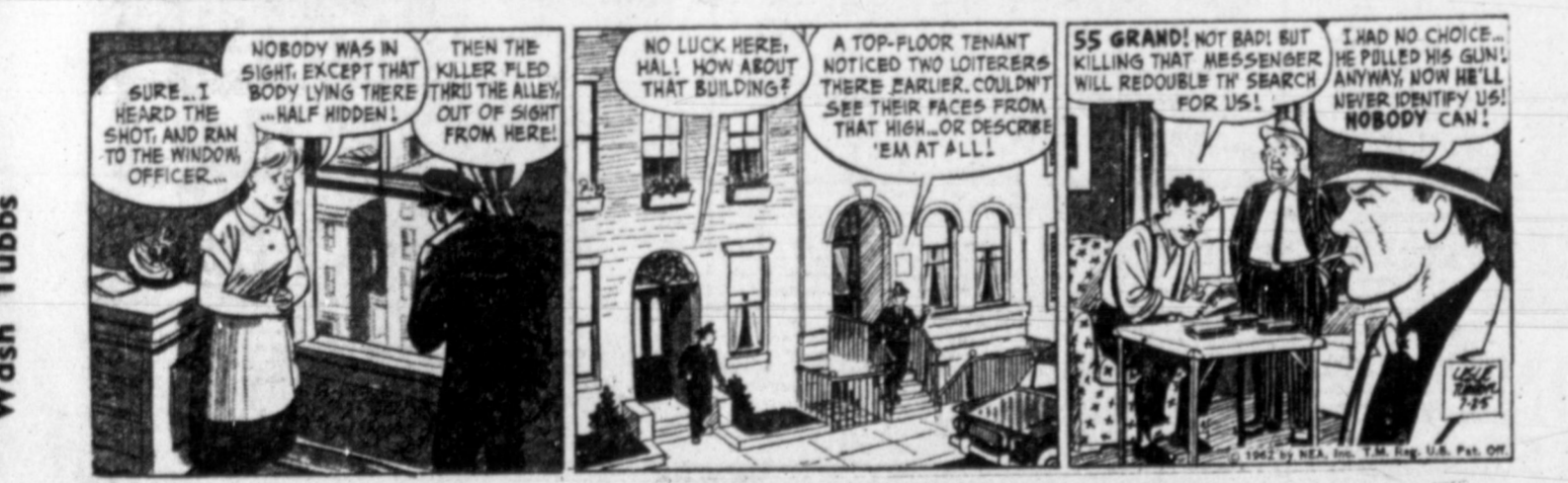


