new machinery in an effort to solve this problem. One of them is a new organization specifically charged with coordinating production so there will be fewer automobiles and trucks without tires and smaller stocks of all kinds of equipment lacking some essential part.

A second innovation which abandons one of the cardinal principles of socialism is the inauguration of the practice of charging interest for capital. Heretofore. the government had supplied long-term capital free to new enterprises. It has been shown that plant managers have not utilized capital economically, but have followed wasteful practices because the capital was free. Now they are going to have to pay interest on it and it is hoped they will be less wasteful and more economical in their use of capital. From bitter experience, they have learned the practical value of the bourgeois practice of charging interest for the use of capital.

In these two important respects among many others' socialism in the U.S.S.R. has failed. How curious that while we are moving into more socialism, the U.S.S.R. is adopting more of the techniques of capitalism!


