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
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

Quite obviously, if profit there may also be loss if minds a bit too sharp pursue thought upon gifts and giving too eagerly. The ancient error of looking the gift-horse in the mouth is one pitfall. Doubtless giftees did that to see how old the horses were and why the givers were giving them away. All the analyses of giving demand, as a duty,

Away with the thought, too, that Christmas giving is a game of trading blind. Gifts and giving have been a stimulant of thought among the poets and the thinkers since the beginning of literature. A modern writer who appropriates philosophy as his particular dish declares that a death in the family is a "provocation to philosophy." Little less than that is a gift, whether from a member of the family or from someone else.

THE BENEVOLENT SEASON

During the Christmas season, citizens of Pampa are called on to give generously to charity.

The Christmas spirit which prompts such generous activities is said to bring more happiness to the giver than to those who receive. But this does not mean that gifts should be planned to please the giver with little reference to the needs and hopes of the benificiary.

Children look to their parents first for gifts at Christmas. For this reason it is usually best to give to needy children through their parents.
