### Bombs Are discovered Basilica

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Papal gendarmes Saturday night discovered a number of bombs in St. Peter's Basilica, Vatican sources said. They were removed before they could explode.  
Sources said the bombs discovered near the Chapel of the Holy Sacrament shortly after the Basilica was closed for night.  
Details about the number, type and power of the bombs were not immediately known.  
The bombs were found 19 days before the scheduled opening in St. Peter's of the Second Vatican Council and two days after another time bomb exploded in the Basilica.  
An explosion came on the night of July 14—also a Saturday—slightly damaged the tomb of Pope Clement X. No one was killed.  
The person or persons who placed the bomb July 14 have not been identified.

### Judge Learned To 'Tell A Tort From Tail Light'

TYLER (UPI) — Dist. Judge Otis T. Dunagan, who will be on the bench Monday when Billie Sol Estes goes on trial for theft, learned to "tell a tort from a tail light" the hard way.  
The 53-year-old Dunagan was a poor country boy who came to love the law during the depression, reading in the State Supreme Court library at night, and making law as a state representative by day.  
That "tort from a tail light" expression is a Texas lawyer's measure of how well a colleague knows his profession.  
Dunagan does—he has won fame in Texas as a judge who has presided over some of the state's toughest cases.  
He has been on the bench since 1942, and his home folks appreciate him. Dunagan, who was first appointed as a state district judge, has never had an opponent at the polls.  
Dunagan's court has become a popular place to move a trial on change of venue—especially if it is a tough one.  
In 1955, he presided over one of the first cases moved from Duval County—a case that stemmed from the scandals created by political boss George Parr.

### Government Forces Are Outnumbered

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Rebel Army Troops, with the sudden backing of President Jose M. Guido and with ground and air superiority, Saturday crushed troops loyal to the Argentine general staff and ended the shooting in Argentina's short-lived war.  
Guido immediately appointed rebel commander Gen. Juan Carlos Ongania interim commander in chief of the army, replacing the ousted head of the loyalist forces, Gen. Juan Carlos Lorio. Rebel soldiers arrested Lorio's chief of staff, Gen. Bernardino Labayru, and a third loyalist commander surrendered in northern Argentina.

### Algiers 'Rat Hunt' By Ben Bellists Gets Underway

ALGIERS (UPI) — Troop trains rolled in from Western Algeria Saturday with reinforcements for Algerian army forces engaged in a massive "rat hunt" for guerrilla opposition to strongman Ahmed Ben Bella around Algiers.  
Even as the military sweep through the surrounding Mitidja plain was kicked off, new charges of "dictatorship" were fired at Ben Bella and his political bureau. The accusations made in leaflets distributed here charged the political bureau was preparing the road to a "police state" with support from abroad.  
The political bureau Friday ordered regular Algerian troops to clean out all anti-Ben Bellist forces in a 25-mile arc around Algiers. The bureau described the action as a "rat hunt" for remnants of the dissident Willaya (military district), who it charged were looting, killing and kidnapping in the region.  
Army Chief of Staff Col. Houari Boumediene assumed personal command of the operations and warned all necessary measures will be taken to carry out the political bureau's orders.  
Ben Bella apparently hoped to have a 25-mile area east, west and south of Algiers cleared of dissidents before the country's first National Assembly meets for the first time Tuesday. The assembly, elected Thursday, is to write the constitution and form the first government for independent Algeria.  
The candidates for the assembly were hand-picked by the political bureau and are predominantly pro-Ben Bella, making his choice as premier almost a foregone conclusion.  
As smoke and flame billowed over Buenos Aires from buildings pitted by bullets and holed with tank shells, rebel headquarters announced that at least three persons were killed and as many as 122 injured in the fighting.

### Billie Sol Empire Sold For \$7-Million

EL PASO (UPI) — Creditors of Billie Sol Estes sold the collapsed agriculture empire of the bankrupt West Texas farm tycoon Saturday to Morris D. Jaffe, a San Antonio, Tex., discount store chain executive, for \$7 million.

Miss Moore said someone rattled the front screen door and tried to get it open. The door was locked, she stated.  
Patrolman J. E. Britton investigated the call and said he could find no trace of anyone in the neighborhood.

## Foreign News Analyst Comments On Argentine Crisis Power Struggle Is Symptom Of Deep-Seated Ills

The struggle for power between rival Argentine military groups is a symptom rather than a cause of deep-seated ills besetting a nation which should be the richest in Latin America.  
When on Sept. 19, 1955, the armed forces overthrew the dictatorship of Juan D. Peron it was with the announced purpose of eliminating social injustices, halting inflation and restoring the Argentine economy wrecked by years of corruption and fantastic waste.  
The upheaval which now threatens Argentina with civil war or military dictatorship is a measure of national failure.  
Its outcome could pose grave new problems for the United States and seriously endanger President Kennedy's Alliance for Progress program in which Argentina, like Brazil, is a key.  
Despite massive injections of U. S. aid, which amounted to more than \$1 billion in the last four years, this was the inermat situation as of the beginning of the current crisis.  
**Trade Deficit**  
The country suffered under a \$500 million trade deficit.  
Peronism had been outlawed but it was impossible to legislate more than two million Peronists out of existence. As the economic situation worsened, their numbers gained.  
The cost of living had jumped 30 per cent in the last year, and in terms of what he actually could buy, the worker was worse off now than under Peron. Labor was totally hostile to government.  
The national economy was in a state of stagnation, with employment mounting steadily and merchants unable to pay or collect debts.  
The state owed pension funds well over \$1 billion and could not pay pensions.  
In the middle is President Jose Maria Guido, who, since the ouster of President Arturo Frondizi by the military on March 29, has ruled by sufferance of the military but has managed to maintain at least a democratic appearance permitting continued U. S. financial aid.  
This aid also figures in the current maneuverings of the two rival military factions.  
As disintegration threatens Argentina, this, in broad outline, is how observers inside the country assess the two sides:  
**Nationalists One Side**  
On one side are the Nationalists—the rebels—who demand immediate elections and restoration of full constitutional government with free and full presidential powers. The Nationalists' chief strength lies in their hold on Campese Mayo, the big army camp 29 miles outside Buenos Aires which contains the nation's only armored division.  
On the other hand are members of the armed services' current high command—the Loyalists—popularly called "Democrats."  
They want elections and a civil government, they say, but they believe a strong governmental authority must remain in power until Peronism and communism are effectively eradicated, particularly in the big labor unions.  
They believe that if elections were held now or in the next few months the results would be not much different than last March when Peronists swept back into many offices.  
They say that chaotic political, economic, social and military conditions would be aggravated rather than reduced by immediate elections.

**War On Pesky Bindweed Is Launched Anew In County**

A war on the pesky bindweed was launched anew in Pampa and Gray County at a meeting Friday afternoon in the Gray County Courthouse Annex, east of the city.

Dr. Allen Wiese, agronomist from Bushland, Texas, Experiment Station, addressed members of the Gray County Commission, representatives of park and highway maintenance departments, soil conservation district supervisors and dealers in chemical weed killers.

The meeting was set up by the County Program Building Committee of the Extension Service, of which J. D. Skaggs is chairman.

Dr. Wiese showed slides of bindweeds and gave results of research in controlling them under various conditions.

He stated that soil sterilants are excellent for use on patches of weeds in wheat fields, and 2-4-D, used properly, is excellent in row crops, but a special form of 2-4-D that has a low volatility is best for use in town near trees and shrubs.

This latter form of 2-4-D, Dr. Wiese stated, is labeled "Amine" on the container. It should be put on with a coarse sprinkler and low pressure, and it affects only the leaves on which it is poured. It also is important, he stated, to have the soil wet and the weeds growing at the time of the application to get best results.

Dr. Wiese also pointed out that weekly hoeing of bindweeds over the entire growing season for a period of two years will eradicate them.

According to Lou Ella Patterson, Gray County Home Demonstration Agent, the County Program Building Committee hopes

to get all groups cooperating on the community-wide bindweed problem and also hopes to enlist the aid of residents of Pampa and Gray County in the project.

It was announced that Dr. Wiese will return to Pampa late in the Fall for a further discussion of the bindweed menace.

### Pampa Real Estate Board Hears Address By President Of TREA

"Realtors must keep pace with rapid-moving technological developments" advised the President of the Texas Real Estate Association, speaking here Thursday.

"The next 25 years will see a college degree as essential in real estate as it now is in medicine or law," declared E. T. Compere Jr. of Abilene, 1962 leader of the statewide Realtor organization, who addressed a luncheon meeting of the Pampa Real Estate Board at Coronado Inn.

For 30 centuries the real estate field — like the technological field

— changed very little, he related. "But the past 50 years have brought tremendous changes in both fields," he declared, emphasizing that "the Realtor is as responsible for keeping up with the new methods in his field as is the technician."

Citing examples of advancement realized in the United States during the short span of the past 50 years, Mr. Compere pointed out that "today 185 million Americans thrive on the same land where one million Indians starved."

### Hail Damage And Drought Hurts Crops

COLLEGE STATION (UPI) — Showers with damaging hail in some sections, held up field work in many sections of Texas last week, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said today.

On the other hand, near drought conditions exist in parts of South Texas.

Hail damage was limited mostly to the South Plains and favorable weather helped dry out fields in large areas.

More drying weather is needed for small grain planting and some kinds of harvesting.

The overall moisture situation for this season is good, said the service. The driest and most critical areas are now limited to South Texas and Edwards Plateau; however, limited areas in other parts of the state also need more moisture. The stock water situation in the McCulloch County area was described as critical.

But generally, ranges have been revived and grazing prospects for the fall greatly improved. Livestock are generally in good condition. The seeding of wheat and other small grains is well along and except for a shortage of surface moisture in the mid and lower southwestern counties of the Panhandle, the planting is being done under favorable conditions.

Army worms were reported damaging pastures in Northeast Texas. Oats for grazing are being dry planted in the dry northern counties of the South Texas district.

Grain sorghum harvesting has now reached the mid-Panhandle area and is generally over the South and Rolling Plains.

"Under all is God, and in between are you and me. What kind of job are we doing?"

He defined a Realtor as a "creator of homes, a builder of cities, a developer of industries and productive farms."

Compere concluded by challenging his audience to meet their responsibility by living "for freedom, for knowledge, for understanding, for integrity."

### Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — There still seems to be no valid basis for an opinion that the overall technical price pattern is necessarily weak, or that new lows, or a further serious setback, are a virtual certainty, says Kenneth Ward.

The Hayden, Stone & Co. market analyst thinks the overall market's action "has been rather creditable" that the Dow-Jones industrials have steadied and been able to withstand all selling pressure around the 590 to 600 support area for the better part of three weeks.

Joseph E. Granville, says which ever way the break out comes from the market's recent narrow trading range, this will probably have much to do with setting the trend for the balance of 1962. The E. F. Hutton Co. analyst says probably the most important technical requirement for impressive forward action would be strength in the rails which is yet to materialize.

L. O. Hooper of W. E. Hutton & Co. says there are more stocks "acting well" than there are issues "acting badly." In other words, he says, the tone, if anything, is improving a little. But to get a large trading following "it is essential that a larger number of issues should develop follow-through."

Benson B. Sloan Jr. says the action of the market continues to suggest that it will remain in a relatively narrow trading range for some time to come. Furthermore, says the Harris, Upham & Co. analyst, at the year-end, those who bought near the June 28th lows will be in a position to book long-term profits. "All in all is uninspiring."

# Tough Guy Liston Apologizes For His Acts Of Kindness

AURORA, Ill. (NEA)—The door of the quarters used for sleeping, eating and lounging at Sonny Liston's training camp at the old Aurora Downs race track bears a crudely lettered sign.

It reads:  
PRIVATE  
PLEASE KEEP OUT  
SONNY LISTON'S  
TRAINING QUARTER  
THANK YOU

The bottom line is in different lettering.

"Sonny didn't think the sign was polite enough, so he added it," explained Willie Reddish, who is training Liston for his heavyweight championship fight with Floyd Patterson at Comiskey Park in Chicago Sept. 25.

That's the same Liston who has been a rough, tough thug with a jail and arrest record.

One sparring partner who simply wore out from constant pommeling was dressed in a white coat and personally trained to wait on tables by Liston, who had learned to serve in the penitentiary. Sonny wanted the boy to stay on the payroll because he needed the money.

Another sparring partner got fresh with Liston and the next day was sent home with a broken rib, methodically inflicted by a coldly freite Sonny.

That's the same Liston who settled a squabble about a stray kid who hitch-hiked from Chicago looking for work as a sparring partner. You just don't take strangers into camp when you're getting ready for something as big as the heavyweight title. The kid was refused admittance until Sonny came along.

Liston sized up the kid, who bore a striking resemblance to light-heavyweight champion Harold Johnson, and asked: "When was the last time you had something 'feast'?"

"Yesterday," the kid said.

"Feed him," Liston ordered.

While the boy was wolfing a meal, Liston and a big Chicago detective assigned to him as a bodyguard examined the kid's baggage — one scuffed-up bag which contained only a pair of

worn boxing shoes and a pair of trunks.

"Give the boy a place to sleep," Liston instructed after the examination.

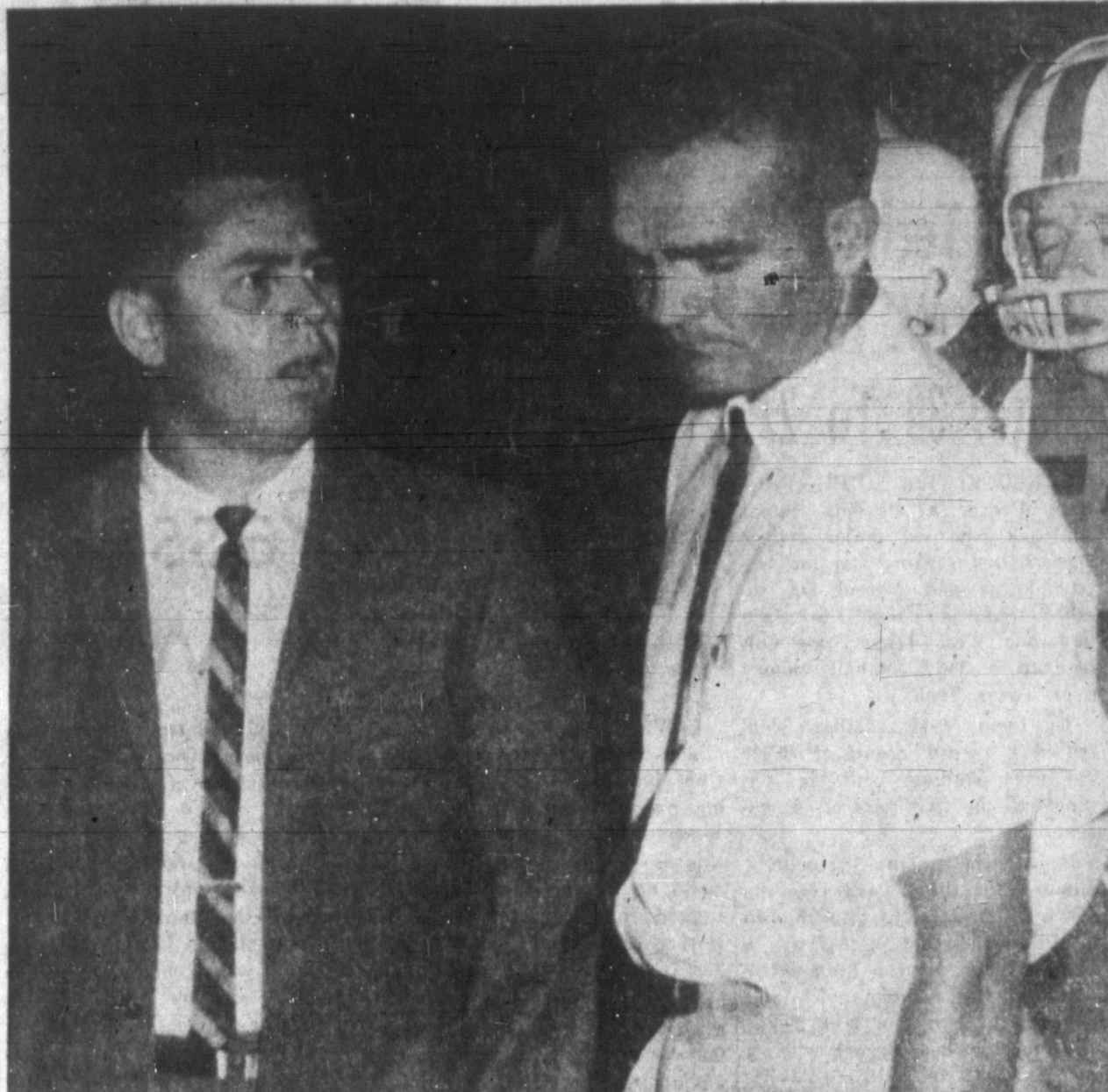
"He might do anything — even stick a knife in you," one trainer suggested.

Liston glared at the speaker for a few seconds, then snorted "Huh!" at the mere idea of any fighter being able to hurt him, even with a knife. Especially one who looked like Harold Johnson.

"I know how he feel," Liston explained. "I hitch-hiked plenty an' I been broke.

"Besides," he added as though he believed it necessary to apologize for a show of softness. "A guy walked in just like that when I was trainin' for Zora Folley an' he bring me good luck. Maybe this one do, too."

There's a lot of good in the man, according to Father Ed Murphy, the Denver priest who took over the rehabilitation of Sonny Liston after his most recent scrape with the law.

### Aggie Exes To Meet Tuesday

The federal authorities have as much interest in proper management and utilization of wildlife as we do.

Congress approved Sept. 18 a bill to make a federal seashore area out of 80.5 miles of the island.

The bill must be signed by the President and then the state legislature must give permission to sell any state land involved, before the island formally becomes a seashore.

Dodge said whatever restrictions the federal government may put on the recreation offerings, he does not believe it will restrict outdoorsmen more than good conservation practices would.

The upland game on the island is insignificant, Dodge said, so far as opportunities to hunt are concerned.

The island supports some quail-rabbits, and coyotes. But the fishery is rich and active most of the year, and camping and swimming are year-around activities.

Studies of fishing on several central, west - central and south Texas bodies of water shows channel cats to be the prevailing species, although game biologists recommended restocking channel cats in the Frio River.

Largemouth bass vied with channel cats for prevalence in the rivers and lakes studied. The report said channel cats, white crappie and largemouth bass made up most of the game fish of the Pedernales River.

On the Guadalupe, a few largemouth bass were noted, but most game fish were channel catfish. The story was the same for the Nueces, but biologists said the game fish total was low.

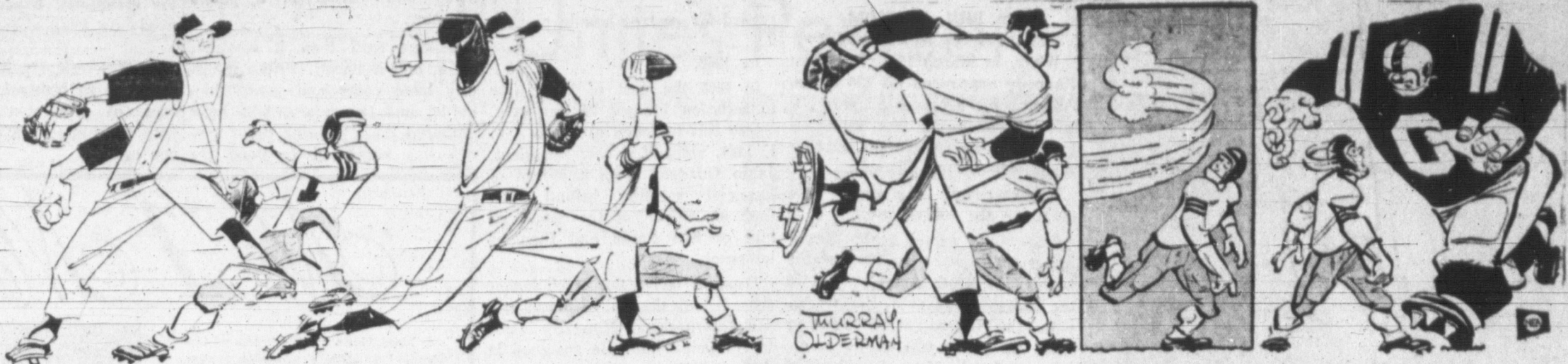

# Washington Window

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The effort continues to organize for their own protection the 17 million Americans who supply the capital for the U. S. economy.

These citizens are stockholders in American enterprise. They own the corporations, great and small. But they are a shiftless lot in their own self-defense. Also, they are not organized. They are disorganized. They do not know their own strength.

These prudent citizens, savers all, are politically dull: even stupid. They dumbly submit when the politicians kick them around, bending low so that the politicians' heavy boot will have most impact on their exposed backsides.

Sen. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., gave these 17 million citizens their most recent kick in the pants. Cooper was assisted by 39 fellow members of the U. S. Senate, the so-called liberal bloc consisting of New Frontiersmen with a frosting of modern Republicans. The 40 senators composed the majority by which was added to the recently pending tax bill an amendment. This amendment disallowed as a tax deductible business expense the cost of informing stockholders on legislative matters affecting their invest-

ments. Cooper proposed that amendment. Twenty-nine senators voted against.

The Investors League, Inc., 234 Fifth Ave., New York City, will challenge the amendment's constitutionality. The case will go to the Supreme Court where the Investors League should win it if the courts find that 17 million U. S. share holders are as equal under the law as are the 15 million dues-paying members of labor unions.

Long since, the court held that labor unions could use dues money to educate their members and the public on political matters. There was some doubt of this because of federal law. The law forbids unions equally with corporations to spend for political purposes. But the courts have held that the unions may make maximum political medicine through their publications and, for example, on television.

**Union Clearance**  
The United Automobile Workers in 1954 was indicted on charges of political spending after UAW paid for a television appearance of Patrick V. McNamara, then a Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate. The court held that this was okay, mere education. McNamara was elected. This decision was interpreted by the Eisenhower Justice De-

# Foreign Commentary

When, in March 1961, President Kennedy announced his \$20 billion Alliance for Progress program, it was acknowledged that much, if not all, of its chance for success would depend upon Brazil.

Recent events have shown how long are the odds.

Size alone would make Brazil important. She is the largest country in South America and is the fourth largest in the world, with the United States ranking fifth. As a key test of U. S. efforts to head off communism in Latin America, it also is worthy noting that she borders on every South American country except Chile and Ecuador.

As a grand plan, the Alliance for Progress looked toward a total of about \$10 billion in U. S. aid to Latin America over a 10-year period, with an equal amount to come from the better-off countries of Europe and from private investment.

**Millions for Brazil**  
Of this, Brazil would receive about \$700 million per year.

In Brazil there is a saying that "God must have been a Brazilian, because he loves them so."

This was the light-hearted approach that permitted Brazil in succeeding years to build up a debt of around \$3 billion in a headlong rush toward industrialization and construction of a new capital in the hinterland without

regard for cost or how to pay for it.

In 1960, the cost of living due to inflation jumped 35 per cent. Into this financial mess on Jan. 1, 1961, stepped a new president, Janio Quadros, with a record of financial stability behind him—first as mayor of the industrial city of Sao Paulo and then as governor.

Quadros lasted not much longer than it took the United States and the International Monetary Fund to refinance him. He resigned in August 1961.

Then came Joao Goulart, the present office-holder.

**Admitted to Club**  
A ticker tape parade in New York and a cordial reception at the White House signaled Goulart's acceptance into the club of hemispheric chief executives eligible to ask and receive continued U. S. aid.

At this point it is impossible to say whether Goulart would have

carried out the promises he made in Washington. Army opposition forced Goulart to take an office whose powers had been taken away and vested in a prime minister.

Goulart said then it wouldn't work, and it hasn't. Prime ministers have come and gone. Education and tax reform bills have gathered dust, printing press money has continued to flood the

country and inflation has jumped another 50 per cent.

Goulart has won a fight for plebiscite which he hopes will restore the power of his office. The meantime, Brazil indeed would need love from above.

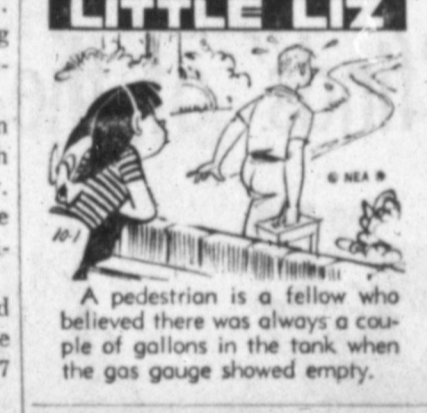

**POLLY'S POINTERS**  
Helpful Tips Make One Equal To Two  
By POLLY CRAMER

DEAR POLLY — This is the first letter I ever wrote to a newspaper. I am just a home-body spending my time trying to make one dollar do the work of two and to do two hours of work in one. Just try that! Maybe some of my tricks will help other readers as I like to do unto others as they have done unto me:

1. Instead of buying distilled water to use in my steam iron, I save the defrost water from the refrigerator and keep it in quart jars.
2. When the budget won't stretch enough for rug pads, I make my own by using several layers of evenly spread out newspapers.
3. Clothes sprinkled with warm water can be ironed sooner than those dampened with cold water.
4. Old baby diapers make good lint-free dusting cloths.
5. I not only rotate the use of my sheets, but I often make up the beds with the narrow, bottom hems at the top to distribute the wear. When they begin to go, the worn parts are torn out for cleaning rags. I save the sturdy lengths, usually along the sides, to make dust ruffles or café curtains. A dyeing job, in the washing machine, will make them any color I want.
6. My children get an extra season's wear out of tight galoshes by wearing sneakers under them rather than regular shoes.
