Government Forces Are Outnumbered

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) - Rebel Army Troops, with the sudden backing of President Jose M. Guido and with ground and air superiority, Saturday crushed troops loyal to the Argentine general staff and ended the shooting in Argentina's short-lived war.

Guido immediately appointed rebel commander Gen. Juan Carlos Ongania iterim commander in chief of the army, replacing the ousted head of the loyalist forces, Gen, Juan Carlos Lorio. Rebel soldiers arrested Lorio's chief of staff, Gen. Bernadino Labayru, and a third loyalist commander surrendered in northern Argentina.

The rebels fought the loyalists in five engagements. They won ail five. At nightfall, Guido's of-fice announced "military operafice announced "military operations in the federal capital and greater Buenos Aires and in the By Ben Bellists greater part of the country have now ceased."

The end of the fighting meant the defeat of the loyalists, who could not counter the crushing attacks of rebel tanks, artillery, and jet planes. Their military defeat came on top of their political defeat. Friday Guido dismissed Lorio in a swing to the rebels, who seek national elections to avert the threat of a military dictatorship by the general staff.

By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst The struggle for power between rival Argentine military groups is a symptom rather than a cause of deep-seated ills besetting a nation which should be the richest in Latin America.

When on Sept. 19, 1955, the armed forces overthrew the dictatorship of Juan D. Peron it was with the announced purpose of eliminating social injustices, halting inflation and restoring the Argentine economy wrecked by years of corruption and fantastic waste.

The upheaval which now threatens Argentina with civil war or military, dictatorship is a ricasure of national failure.

Its outcome could pose grave new problems for the United numbers gained.

Foreign News Analyst Comments On Argentine Crisis

The cost of living had jumped , 30 per cent in the last year, and in terms of what he actually could buy, the worker was worse off now than under Peron. Labor was totally hostile to government. The nationl economy was in a

state of stagnation, with memployment mounting steadily and merchants unable to pay or collect, debts,

The state owed pension funds. well over \$1 billion and could not pay pensions.

In the middle is President Jose Maria Guido, who, since the ouster of President Arturo Frondizi by the military on March 29, has ruled by sufferance of the military but has managed to maintain at least a democratic appearance permitting continued U. S. financial aid.

This aid also figures in the current maneuverings of the two

rival military factions. As disintegration threatens Argentina, this, in broad outline, is how observers inside the country assess the two sides:

Nationalists One Side

On one side are the Nationalists-the rebels-who demand immediate elections and restoration of full constitutional government with free and full presidential powers. The Nationalists' chief strength lies in their hold on Campode Mayo, the big army camp 20 miles · outside Buenos Aires which contains the nation's only armored division.


On the other hand are members of the armed services current high command-the Lovalists popularly called "Democrats."

They want elections and a civil government, they say, but they believe a strong governmental authority must remain in power until Peronism and communism are effectively eradicated, particularly in the big labor unions.

They believe that if elections were held now or in the next few months the results would be not much different than last March when Peronists swept back intomany offices.

They say that chaotic political, economic, social and military conditions would be aggravated rather than reduced by immediate elections.
