NEVER accept rides from anyone you don't know. Many children ignoring this rule have been kidnapped by strangers. Many have been abused or even killed after accepting rides from unknown auto drivers.

NEVER stand around or play near toilets. Always leave immediately.

NEVER accept candy, gum, money, or treats from a stranger. Never let him touch you.

NEVER go with strangers who ask directions. Never go with strangers who offer you a job.



Get The License Number of Car!

NEVER play alone in alleys or empty buildings. You are much safer if you take along a neighbor kid, or several of your young playmates, whenever you go to the playgrounds, movies, stores or on any errand.

Parents Should Read This, Too!

Parents! - It would be wise to learn these rules, too.

Boys and Girls! Ask your mothers and fathers to read these rules with you, and then see how many you can remember.

1. Never take rides from strangers.
2. Never take candy or other gifts from strangers.
3. Always report to your teacher, policeman, mailman, bus driver, or parents whenever you see any stranger hanging around on foot or in a car near your school, playground, or other places where you play.
4. Always get the license number of the car. Scratch it with a stick in the dirt or with a stone on the sidewalk if

you don't have pencil or paper.

5. Always try to remember who the stranger looked like.
6. The policeman is your friend. Go to him anytime you are in trouble.

It boils down to this: Don't trust or believe strangers. If a stranger says he'll show you something, like a puppy or a kitten or something that seems interesting, don't believe him. He may say your parents are sick or injured. Don't believe him. He may even pose as a policeman, with a uniform cap. Don't believe him. Run to a neighbor's door right away, knock loudly, scream for help, and report the incident to whoever answers.

Foreign Commentary

The Indian-Red Chinese border dispute has been bubbling along now for about three years.

Most of the action has been confined to occasional hot words exchanged between the two antagonists, and here and there a patrol clash.

Involved is an area of some 51,000 square miles along the Himalaya spine separating India and China. It is an inhospitable area of towering mountains, deep gorges, murderous winters and of communications such that months may go by before either side may know of a border violation.

It is not on tourist maps and most Westerners would be hard put to locate Ladakh (which is in the border area of northeast Kashmir on the western end of the Indo-Chinese border) or to describe the habits of the Monba,

Aka, Dafla or Apa Tarange tribes (who live along the border in the northeast).

Clash on Border
Occasionally it bobs back into the news, as it did a few days ago when it was announced that Indian Defense Minister Krishna Menon's departure for the United Nations General Assembly had been delayed by new Red Chinese incursions.

The forces involved were men of an Indian "post and" an undetermined number of troops at that point "several hundred yards away."

On the basis of the foregoing, the dispute would seem to be isolated and not one at the moment to intrude itself upon other world problems. Such is not the case. For example:

Test Ban Tops Agenda Of U.N.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Disarmament, the nuclear test ban, peaceful use of outer space, colonialism and United Nations financing are considered the five most important issues before the General Assembly which opened Tuesday in New York. The Cuban situation, the Congo, admission of Red China and possibly the Berlin and the U-2 flights may be noisier issues during general debate. But only the Congo issue in this second five is on the agenda this year and the U.N. will do little of nothing about others. Admission of Red China is again expected to be defeated. The issues with top priority are probably the nuclear test ban and disarmament. There isn't anything the U.N. can do about disarmament except recommend that the major powers keep on negotiating and come up with an agreement. But another resolution of this kind is needed by U.S. chief negotiator Arthur Dean before the recessed Geneva Disarmament Conference reconvenes Nov. 8. The test ban is a more immediate question. Only four of the 104 U.N. members have nuclear weapons. Theoretically, India should have no difficulty getting nearly 100 votes for its resolution for an uninspected test ban. U.N. Secretary General U Thant reports the members about evenly divided on this issue, however. The United States must oppose this resolution or stop testing to support it. Russia may support the resolution but go right on testing whenever it pleases. The U.S. must therefore work for another resolution calling for an inspected test ban. Since Americans, British and Russians will be continuing test ban talks at Geneva while the General Assembly is in session, an inspected test ban resolution will be extensively debated this year in getting the General Assembly to implement the World Court's recent opinion that U.N. special assessments must be paid, the same as regular contributions, by all members. The General Assembly must approve this by a two-thirds majority. There are still half-a-dozen big-country members including Soviet Russia, the Ukraine, Byelorussia, Nationalist China, France and Italy who are more than a year behind in their special assessments. But countries must be two years in arrears on regular assessments to be subject to loss of membership privilege. Hungary and Cuba recently paid up to less than two years deficiency—probably at Soviet insistence in anticipation of the World Court opinion. Guatemala and Yemen also paid up — the latter in ancient Maria Theresa gold sovereigns. Only Paraguay and Bolivia are now more than two years in debt. There will be no attempt to deny membership privileges to countries in arrears this year. But if the World Court opinion is upheld by the General Assembly, enforcement action could be initiated next year.



Allen-Scott Report

Senate Public Works Committee Takes Care of Self in Apportioning Federal Highway Funds

WASHINGTON — In these days of the "great leap forward" in highway construction, it really pays for the less populated states to have one of its U.S. Senators on the Senate Public Works Committee. This is dramatically highlighted in the committee's own report to the Senate detailing how the \$3.5 billion in federal highway funds will be divided among the 50 states for the year beginning July 1, 1963. The committee document, which accompanies the authorizing legislation now before the Senate, discloses that nearly \$1 billion of the federal highway money for fiscal 1964 will go to 16 states which have Senators on the Public Works Committee. Population of these states total slightly less than one-fourth of the country's total. States represented by the eleven democrats on the committee will receive \$706,922,000 and include: Oklahoma, Michigan, New Mexico, West Virginia, Ohio, Maine, Utah, Massachusetts, Montana, Alaska, and Hawaii. States represented by the six republicans on the committee are allotted \$272,769,000 and include: Kentucky, Delaware, Iowa, New Hampshire, Kansas, and Hawaii. Four of the biggest states—none of them represented on the Public Works Committee — will get just short of one-third of the total authorization. California, the biggest of all, is allotted \$305,606,000 worth of federally aided highway projects; New York \$177,875,000; Illinois, \$175,145,000; and Texas, \$172,677,000. The remaining 30 states, which are not either represented on the committee or in the "Big State" category, received the remaining one-third of the funds — or an average of \$56 million apiece. This amount is approximately \$10 million less than the \$65 million average for the states with senators on the committee. SLICING THE MELLON — The chief slicer of this multi-billion dollar mellon was Senator Robert Kerr (D-Okla.), who is running the committee in the absence of ailing Senator Dennis Chavez (D-N.M.), chairman. Senator Kerr handed out the extra large authorizations of the regular highway funds to the 16 "favorite sons" and then furnished five of them — including himself — a little bit extra. He won the committee's approval for \$24 million worth of public lands highways — roads to be paid for entirely by federal funds. Of the eight projects in this category, five are in states which have members of the committee — Oklahoma, West Virginia, New Mexico, Montana and Utah. Seven million dollars of that must be familiar, it is enough to say that in France, as in every country where the protective principle is active, the government has established a monopoly which worst kind, a monopoly which comes home to the business and bosoms of men, follows them in their daily avocations, troubles them with its petty, meddling spirit, and, what is worse than all, diminishes their responsibility to themselves, thus depriving them of what is the only real education that most minds receive the constant necessity of providing for future contingencies, and the habit of grappling with the difficulties of life.

Just Leading Us On?

Through the use of the tried and true old Washington expedient of declaring a half-holiday for civil servants and letting out the schools, managers of President Kennedy's "non-political" missile junkie into Florida, Texas and Missouri were able to fill an estimated 40,000 of the 73,000 seats in Houston's vast Rice University Stadium with listeners for the President's pledge that we will some day lead the space race. Mr. Kennedy noted that of the 45 satellites that have orbited, some 40 were ours and have "supplied far more knowledge to the people of the world than those of the Soviet Union". He likewise praised the Mariner, now on its way to Venus, as "the most intricate instrument in the history of space science", mentioned the practical value of our navigation and weather-reporting satellites and then said: "To be sure, we are behind, and will be behind for some time, in manned flights." This reiteration of our delinquency, commented on by various observers before the Houston speech, "remains," as the Washington correspondent of National Review has said, "one of the darker Washington mysteries". Writing on this subject before the Presidential journey, this same reporter further said: "To date... there is not one iota of evidence that the Soviet Union simultaneously orbited two men in space. Contrary to reports published in the New York Times and elsewhere, US tracking stations picked up not a single sound or picture during the time that the two capsules were in space. Everything seen by American TV viewers came from the Soviet Union. Reporters in Moscow have yet to be shown a newsreel shot of the blast-off or the descent. Film from domestic Russian consumption are admittedly studio shots." Nor does it relieve this particular "Washington mystery" to go back to the transcript of the NASA press conference just after Russia announced the successful landing of the cosmonauts whose capsules had been so close together in orbit at one time that they could see each other! Dr. Hugh L. Dryden, deputy chief of NASA was asked by a newsmen: "Has our tracking system confirmed the Soviet version of the flight of the two cosmonauts?" "They have done," replied Dr. Dryden, "what they say they did." In our \$5.4 billion (this year) search for knowledge, perhaps we should make a little greater effort to find out whether our costly space race may not be with two little men who weren't there!

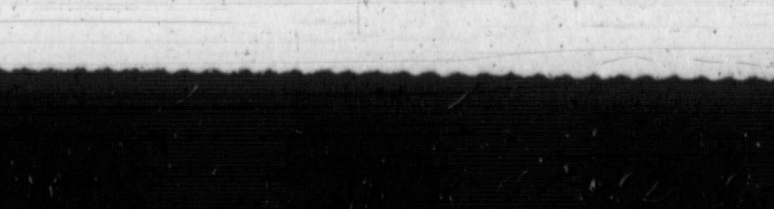
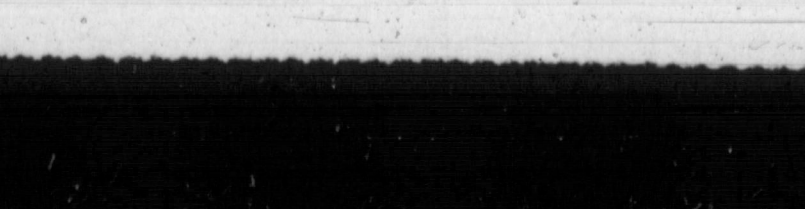
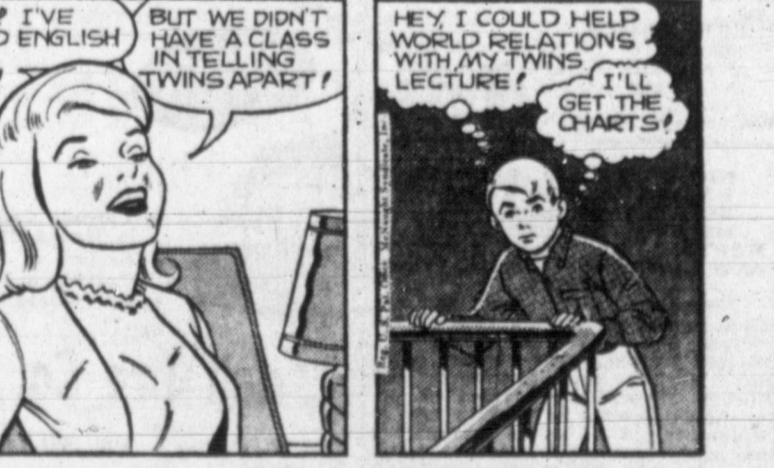
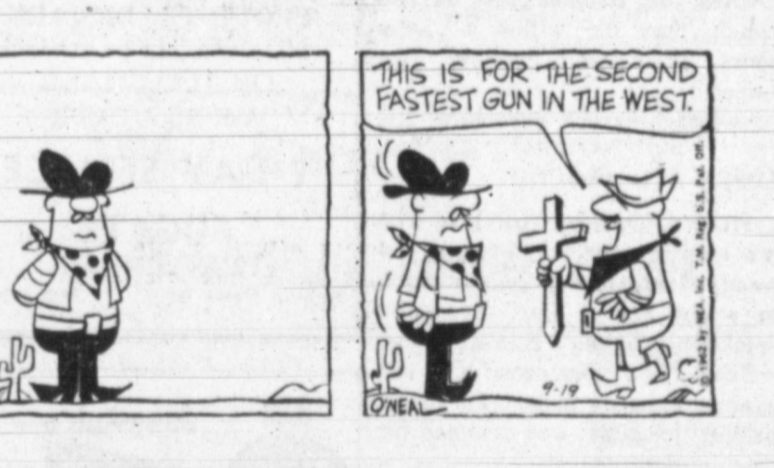
Innocents Abroad

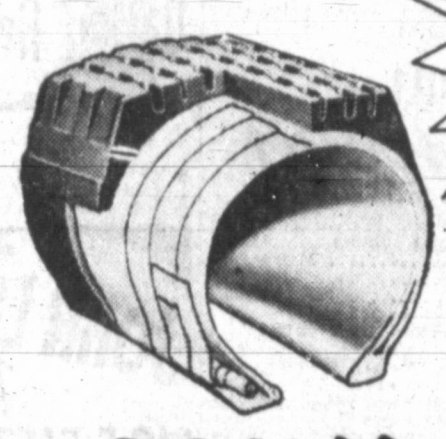
