OXFORD, Miss. (UPI)—James H. Meredith's federal guards said today they believe "we'll be over the hump" if the weekend passes without further racial incidents involving the Negro's admission to the University of Mississippi.

The 29-year-old former Air Force sergeant winds up his first week as an "Ole Miss" undergraduate today and, along with most of the student body, will leave the campus for the week-end.

His destination was not announced, but it was learned he plans to visit relatives. Meredith will have an adequate force of U.S. marshals with him at all times.

Mass Polio Immunization Project Set Here Sunday

Pampa and Gray County will be a part of a huge polio inoculation project Sunday which is aimed at the total obliteration of the dread disease, poliomyelitis.

Nineteen Panhandle cities will conduct the first of a series of three Sabin oral type polio vaccine programs Sunday and authorities in the area said they have 250,000 doses of the Type I vaccine for the drive, 150,000 of which will be used in Amarillo and approximately 40,000 in Gray County.

The drive will be held in Pampa, Lefors, McLean, Canyon, Dalhart, Perryton, Canadian, Dumas, Fannin, Groom, White Deer, Skellytown, Borger, Stinnett, Sunray, Fritch, Clarendon and Vega.

De Gaulle Stays In Office But President Out

PARIS (UPI)—The French National Assembly, haunted by the ghost of Napoleon III, revolted against the growing power of President Charles de Gaulle today and toppled the government of Premier Georges Pompidou by a crushing vote.

De Gaulle himself remained in office by virtue of the constitution despite the angry deputies arrayed against him. The rebuff came on a censure motion over De Gaulle's plan to bypass parliament and ask the people to make a constitutional change on the method of electing future presidents.

Expect Resignation Soon
Pompidou, as required by law, is expected to submit the resignation of his government to De Gaulle today or Saturday.
He will be asked to remain on in caretaker status until an "acceptable compromise candidate is found to form a new government pending the new national elections.

Cuban Refugee Will Address Knife, Fork Club

Under the title "Cuba—Uncle Sam's Headache," Dr. Nicolas Gonzalez Mendoza, a refugee from Castro's Cuba who arrived in the United States in November, 1960, and who since that time has been telling American audiences the story of what goes on behind the scenes in the island that threatens our Florida coast line, will be the guest speaker at the next meeting of the Knife & Fork Club Tuesday evening at 7:30 in the Robert E. Lee Jr. High School.

Dr. Mendoza is a native-born Cuban. His family is one of the oldest, and was one of the most prominent in the industrial, professional, business and social life of Cuba. His grandfather was the first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Cuba in 1902. Dr. Mendoza's father was commissioned an army captain by the United States Congress on appointment by President McKinley. He served as Adjutant to both General Shafter and General Leonard Wood during the Spanish-American War.

Dr. Mendoza has been living in Cuba almost all his life. He is a Doctor of Civil and Administrative Law and practiced his profession diligently. He received a part of his education in the United States at Manhattan Military Academy in New York and at the Wharton School of Business, University of Pennsylvania. He speaks excellent English.

French Government Felled By Assembly

The Soviet Foreign Ministry today ordered the immediate expulsion of the U.S. assistant naval attaché here, charging he was engaged in espionage.

Cmdr. Raymond Smith was accused of making observations on an unspecified military object while on a trip to Leningrad Tuesday. It was understood he plans to leave the Soviet Union Monday.

The Soviet action followed last week's expulsion by the United States of two Soviet officials at United Nations headquarters who were accused of bribing a U.S. sailor for American defense secrets.

Schirra Asked For 'Quiet Time'

(UPI)—Astronaut Walter Schirra Jr. complained today that he did not have enough "quiet time" during his sixth orbital flight around the earth.

Schirra met with fellow astronauts and U. S. space officials aboard the aircraft carrier Kearsarge to discuss the technical aspects of the flight, which ended triumphantly when Schirra landed about four miles away from the carrier in a pin-point display.

The other difficulty in the flight occurred when Schirra cut his right hand while hitting the plunger which activates the hatch blower mechanism. Two other astronauts, also bruised their hand on the plunger, which has to be struck with great force.

Three of the four Americans who helped blaze the space trail which Schirra extended Wednesday arrived aboard the Kearsarge as the huge vessel cruised off Wake Island Thursday.

Review would cover all phases of all five of America's manned probes into space. The outcome will determine final decisions on a proposed 18-orbit flight and the endurance limit for the Mercury capsule used on all five previous tests.

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—With the World Series on television this week, ABC-TV had the clever idea of starring James Stewart in a story of baseball bribery Thursday night in the season premiere of Fred Astaire's anthology.

The thought was timely, but unfortunately it was executed with the subtlety of a baseball bat and the efficiency of the Los Angeles Dodgers. In words of one syllable it was a ball, but foul.

The extraordinary thing about this massive error is not merely that a man of Stewart's stature would stoop to star in it, but that it was directed by the formidable movie creator, John Ford. And it was the direction, aided by an unintentionally comical script, that was guilty.

Accused Of Bribery
In the story, "Flashing Spikes," Stewart played a former big leaguer barred from baseball for allegedly taking a bribe years before. He is a friend of a young player. The youngster makes a costly error in a World Series game, and a nasty columnist-television commentator who saw them together accuses Stewart of corrupting the boy with more bribery.

On the surface, a workable plot. But what came out—at the adult time of 10 to 11 at night—was

a child's view of baseball, the sort of stuff that used to fill the 10-cent sports pulp magazines. Ford's direction, in addition to being just plain ragged, presented an obnoxiously saccharine attitude toward a sport that deserved better. It was cheer-the-hero and hiss-the-villain all over again.

There was an idiotic scene—badly done to boot—in which a large group of grown men looked ready to beat up Stewart on a baseball field when they recognized who he was. In addition, the columnist could only make one double up with laughter: he spoke like Laurence Olivier, wore an ascot-like tie, flicked ashes from a long cigarette holder and looked more like a 19th Century Mississippi riverboat gambler.

A fan, either of drama or baseball, could only flinch. Needless to say, in the end the youth was found innocent. And on top of that it turns out Stewart never did commit that old crime. And on top of that—well, naturally—the youngster hits a home run in the last game of the series.

Father, Son Team
The accused player was portrayed by Pat Wayne, son of actor John Wayne, an old Ford sidekick. And papa Wayne showed up briefly as an umpire, telling off Pat in one scene. It was cute, if you know what I mean. The most notable supporting actor, however, was Don Drysdale, real-life Dodger ace, who would have appeared in the series on NBC-TV today if Los Angeles hadn't blown the pennant to San Francisco Wednesday.

Obviously, everyone concerned with Thursday night's show figured on a timely Drysdale series appearance as a grand coup. But Hollywood and baseball heroes

have been rough on each other. Ba Belinsky, of the Los Angeles Angels, flipped over filmtown and became a Hollywood character. Doris Day suffered daily at the Dodger games. Danny Kaye recorded a song about the Dodgers which is now being broken all over town. And Milton Berle signed a whole flock of Dodgers for an upcoming nightclub act, never figuring they'd collapse, as they did, before a nationwide video audience.

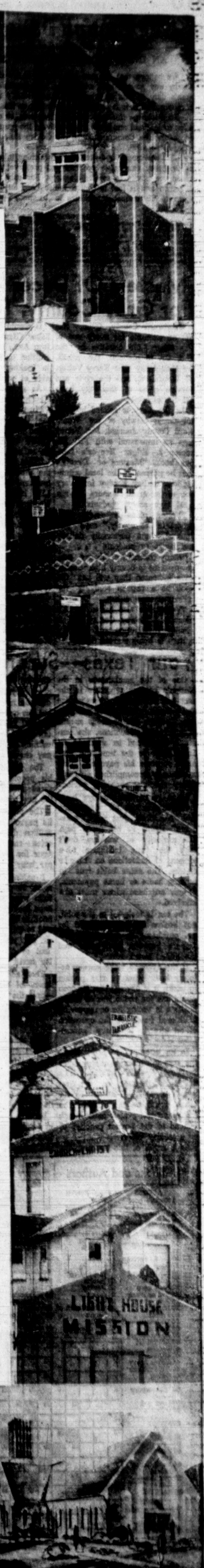
THE NECESSITY, MEANS AND TESTS OF CONVERSION SCRIPTURE: ACTS, 16:30-34

I. Its Necessity.
If I go overland to California, I must scale the Rocky Mountains. If I ever get sight of Europe, I must cross the ocean. If one ever sees the light, he must have eyes. So there are some "musts" in religion. Christ used the word "must" frequently. He applied it to this thing of conversion, "Verily, verily, I say unto you. Ye must be born again." There are some people who do not like that doctrine. We know a woman who left the church she had been attending, saying that her reason for doing so was to get rid of hearing about conversion. But Christ makes the necessity of conversion as plain as any teaching. He taught that regeneration, or conversion, is necessary if we are to enter the Kingdom of God. The method is mysterious "The wind bloweth where it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh or whether it goeth; so is every one that is born of the spirit." We can understand how necessary the new birth is when we consider our sinful state by nature. We are dead in trespass and in sin. We are not simply sick, and able, with effort, to cure ourselves. We are not entirely well, and able to save ourselves; but we are dead, and can only live by divine grace placing within us and fanning a spark of life.

II. What This Change Is.
1. From the divine side it is called regeneration. It is the result of an act, by a power outside of ourselves. It is due to God's choice of us. It is due to God's bringing His truth to bear upon us. It is due to God's working by His Spirit within us. It is a new birth, a regeneration — beginning to live over again.
2. From the human side it is spoken of as conversion. Conversion is simply turning about. It is walking along the road in one direction, then turning and walking in the opposite direction. In the evening the Philippian jailer was most cruelly treating Paul and Silas. Before morning he was washing their stripes and showing them every attention. That was conversion — a turning about. Conversion is man's surrender to God. It is, "right about face." It is, of course, usually the direct result of regeneration.

III. The Means of Conversion.
1. In this case there was, first the praying and singing of the Apostles. The prisoners were listening. Conversion usually comes about in the same way still. It is as some sound is heard, such as the praying of a body of God's people, or their singing, or as someone preaches or teaches the WORD that the Spirit applies the truth to those who hear.
2. There was, secondly, the shock of the earthquake. So it is still. The soul is arrested by some circumstances — loss of property, severe disappointment, a death in the family, or something that brings a shock. It is when our attention is riveted that the Spirit takes hold of us and conversion results.
3. Faith. Faith is the assent of the intellect and the consent of the will. It is the yielding to Christ as Lord.

IV. Tests Of Conversion.
1. Rejoicingly hearing God's WORD. A man having turned to the Lord will want to hear all he can about Him. This was one indication of the jailer's conversion. He invited the Apostles to speak to him freely in regards to the way of life.
2. An immediate change of life. This was noticeable in the jailer, for he was transformed at once from a cruel jailer to a merciful nurse "He took them the same hour in the night and washed their stripes."
3. Immediate confession to Christ. "And was baptized." He did not delay to make known that he hoped for salvation through Christ. He did not wish to be a disciple secretly. One of the best indications of conversion is that a person should desire to make an open confession of his faith in Christ, or love for Him and a purpose to strive to serve Him. "O, that men everywhere would hear the Word of God, and live."
4. Helpfulness. "And when he had brought them into his house, he set meat before them." When people begin to feed others it is a good sign. When they begin to be helpful to those about them and promote the cause of Christ, you may be pretty sure that they have experienced the converting grace of Christ.
5. Joy in the new life. The record is that the jailer "rejoiced." Christian joy is a good sign of a possessing Christian heart.
6. The man's home was changed. The change reached the conduct of his household. A blessing came to others besides himself that day. This is the way sound conversion affects the lives of people. We may test our ground for hope by this incident of the Philippian jailer.

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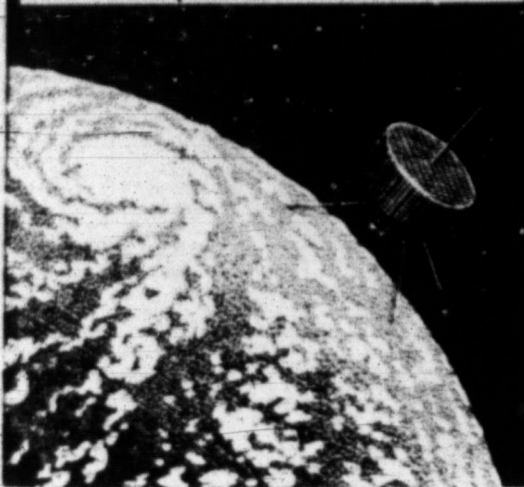

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Sputnik Plus Five

The U.S. led off 1960 in space in March when the Pioneer V interplanetary probe set a long-distance radio transmission record of 23 million miles. Even more successful was Tires I, launched in April. World's first weather satellite, it relayed thousands of pictures of the earth's cloud patterns.

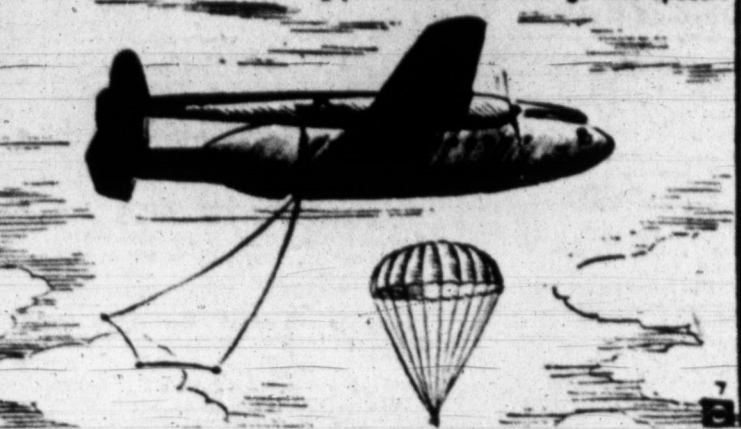


(7) Parade of Satellites



April also saw the launching of Transit 1-B, the first navigational satellite. In August, Echo I became the largest satellite put into orbit. The 100-foot-diameter reflecting balloon paved the way for a world-wide communications system.

In preparation for manned space flight, Russia announced in May the launching of its first "space ship." A malfunction (first ever admitted by them) sent it into a higher orbit instead of bringing it back to earth. On Aug. 11, the U.S. was first to recover a satellite from space when divers retrieved the 300-pound Discoverer XIII capsule from the Pacific. A week later, Discoverer XIV was snagged in mid-air, a feat which became routine. On Aug. 20, Russia recovered another spaceship containing two dogs and other animals after 17 orbits. Clearly, the coming year would see man go into space.

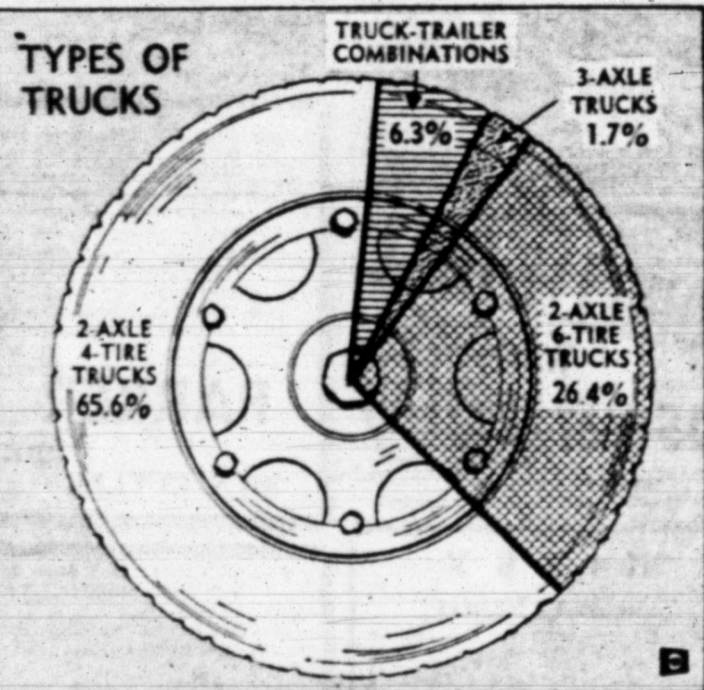
