UNITED NATIONS (UPI) - Cuban President Osvaldo Dorticos' today asked the United Nations to condemn President Kennedy's projected embargo on ships of all flags carrying cargos to Cuba.

Dorticos, speaking under heavy security precautions and interrupted from time to time by shouts from the public gallery, called the projected embargo an "act preparatory for war.

tension is normal but when it is severe enough to require shock treatment it has usually exceeded the normal degree and indicates some deep - seated fear of anxiety. If your doctor cannot cure you with the ordinary remedies, you would probably do well to consult a doctor who specializes in nervous diseases. Your doctor could refer you to a reliable one.

Excessive nervous tension can be improved in many persons by their learning to relax. I shall devote a column to this subject soon.

It is not unusual for a very nervous person to get a low fever or chills when she is very tense, but it is not normal to get that tense. If the fever or chills do not subside promptly you should see your doctor to find out whether or not something else is causing them. A very nervous person can be completely cured only if the cause of the nervousness is found and removed.






