Airliner 'Ditches' In North

'Flying Tiger' Plane United Fund 'Kickoff' Is Carried 76 Americans

SHANNON, Ireland (UPI) - A crippled four-engine airliner carrying 76 Americans to Germany ditched in the galewhipped seas of the North Atlantic before midnight, and early today 49 survivors were plucked from bobbing life rafts.

The plane was a Flying Tiger Lines Super-Constellationcarrying 68 servicemen and dependents and a crew of eight. Two of those aboard were reported to be children aged 9 and 11.

Shortly before noon the Royal Air Force rescue center near Ply-mouth, England, said the 9,040-ton Swiss freighter Celerina had picked up 49 survivors and two dead—a total of 51.
