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# Wedge-Shape Lipstick Outlines And Colors

For the girl who finds it difficult to use a lipstick brush, yet can never achieve a clear lip line with her regular lipstick, there should be a pleasant surprise awaiting on the cosmetic counters.

For the first time in a long time, there is a major change in the design of lipstick. A unique wedge-shape case will give the support you need for perfect application. And the precision angle at which the case and lipstick are matched, maintains the wedge-shape down to the last application.

All you have to do is swivel the lipstick a little above the wedge top of the case and hold the flat surface against your lips. It will outline and color your lips at the same time.

The makers claim that, because of the design, there will be no need to reapply the lipstick to achieve the desired shade depth. One application will do the trick. And its creamy smoothness provides protection against chapping and dryness during the winter months.

The tall, slender gold-tone case is decorated with elegant fluting, which serves a double purpose. It makes the case scratch-resistant, and also makes it easy to hold and manipulate.

Anyone who has had trouble wielding a lipstick brush, should find this new-shaped lipstick a simple way to an uncluttered lip-line.

## A Jersey Dress For The Holidays

The dress shown is one you can dress up or down—with jewelry,

scarves, stoles, capes or glamorous aprons made of lace, print or velvet.

The body lines of such a dress must be good and you must be buxom. If not, be sure it fits easily through the midriff so that the bolges do not show.

Tubular jersey in a medium weight, not too light, silk or wool, is ideal for such a dress. It darts well, facings are easy and hems not too difficult, especially if you use a lining throughout. Lightweight China silk is the best choice for lining fabric.

Notch all seams and edges, and turn seams of the lining toward the dress-fabric so that the inside of the garment will appear nicely finished. Lining can be whipped to the proper fitting position at the neckline and armholes with no stitches showing.

Some dresses, such as the one shown here, have darts in the front with an all-around inside belt attached at front and under arms. Darts are omitted in back; back is allowed to hang free. Zipper then is used at underarm.

Neckline can be V in back as shown and high in front, or at normal neckline in back and oval in front. If you prefer, a collar can be added, one especially becoming to you. Whatever the style, just be sure it fits well at the neckband.

If you choose a straight-line dress, make the hem 2 1/2 to 3 inches deep. Clip seams at the waistline, and 2 to 6 inches above, so when the seams are pressed they will lie flat and open. One-inch seams will help hold the dress shape and give you a better figure fit.

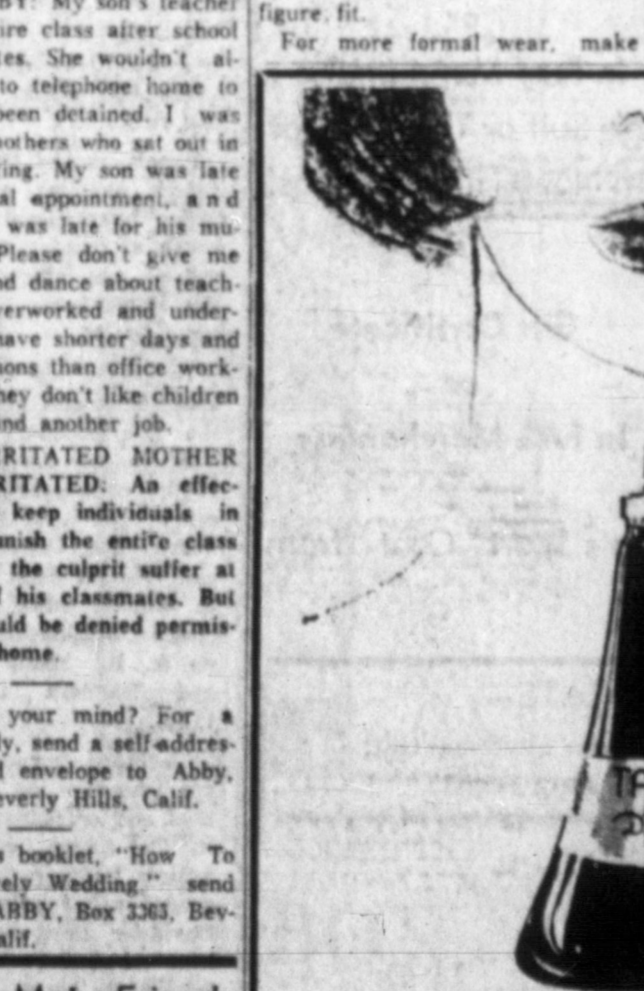

# Harvesters Stun Blackhawks

## Pampans Sparkle In First Tussle, 98-39

Pampa's Harvesters gave the Panhandle early notice of why the coaches of Dist. 3-AAAA picked Pampa as the team to beat in the district as they demolished Phillips, 98-39, yesterday afternoon in a season opener for both schools.

The Harvesters, jumping off to an 8-0 lead before the visitors scored, made a route of the Thursday afternoon fracas as the hapless Blackhawks never threatened to upset the Pampans.

Stuns Phillips  
Pampa stunned Phillips in the first quarter as the Harvesters surged for 30 points while holding the Hawks to a scant six. Stolen passes, blocked shots, and numerous traveling violations plagued Phillips throughout the first quarter of action and most of the game.

Wayne Kreis, scoring 29 points on nine field goals and 11 free throws, paced the Harvesters in scoring with Gary Sikes swishing 18 points and Randy Matson 16. Gordon Balch was the only starter not scoring in double figures as Keith Swanson tallied 10 points, but the 6-1 forward paced the Harvesters' defensive efforts. He scored six points.

Pampa's Game  
The contest belonged to Pampa all the way as the Harvesters' lead swelled as the game progressed save for the closing minutes.

The second unit of Donny Ayres, Kenny Hebert, Charles Price, C. E. Cantrell, and Dannie Heil played over 10 minutes in the contest, going in the game in the second, third, and fourth quarters.

With a 92-41 (the biggest of the afternoon) 5:15 in the contest, Coach Terry Culley sent in the second unit for the third time. The reserves were able to score only six points in the closing five minutes, leaving the Harvesters two points short of the 100 mark.

Phillips, trailing throughout the contest, was unable to muster a sustained scoring drive or stop the Pampa scoring barrage except for the final minutes of play. With the Pampa reserves battling the clock and scoreboard in the closing minutes, Phillips launched a scoring spree that accounted for 13 of their 39 points.

Larry Lewis was the only Blackhawk scoring in double figures with 13.

First Unit  
The first unit of Matson, Kreis, Balch, Sikes, and Swanson played not quite three quarters of the lop-sided battle and accounted for 79 of the 98 points.

The halftime score was 58-15 with Phillips scoring six points in each of the first two 8-minute quarters. Pampa scored 11 points in the third quarter and 18 in the final stanza.

Leading rebounder for Pampa was Matson with 12 and Sikes second with five.

Next game for the Harvesters is tonight in a six o'clock contest with Pampa hosting the Vernon Lions in Harvesters Field House.

Shockers  
The Shockers, playing catch-up throughout most of the tussle, lost its season opener, 55-52, to Phillips "B" team yesterday afternoon following the varsity contest.

High scorers for the Pampa "B" team were Robert Howard, 15, David McDaniel, 14, and Carl Harnsburger, 10 points.

Jerry Smyrhl paced the Phillips "B" team with 16 points followed closely by Joe Bill Hayes with 14.

## Play Vernon Tonight At 6 In Home Game

With an impressive 98-39 victory launching the 1962-63 season in fine fashion, Pampa's Harvesters have little time to bask in the victor's circle as the Pampans host the Vernon Lions in a 6 p.m. game in Harvesters Field House this evening.

The Harvesters, living up to pre-season expectations in the season opener against Phillips yesterday afternoon, will be out to spoil the untied Lions' initial debut of the 1962-63 hardwoods campaign.

Coach Terry Culley will probably go with the same starting lineup of Keith Swanson, 6-0, and Wayne Kreis, 5-11, at guards; forwards Gary Sikes, 6-3½, and Gordon Balch 6-1; and center Randy Matson, 6-6½.

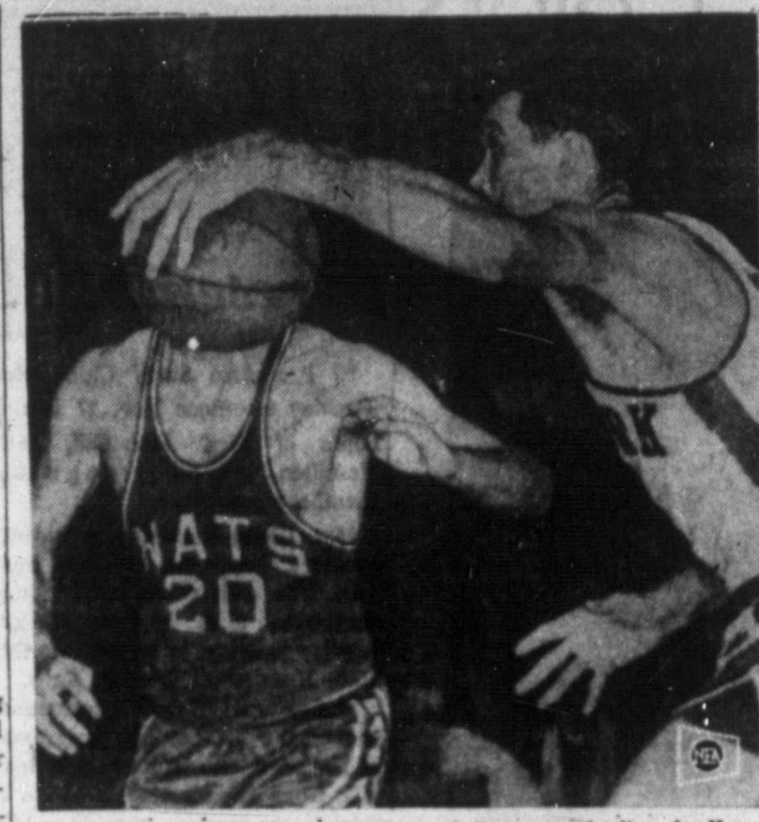
The Vernon Lions, with Coach Aubrey Wilson making his debut as the head mentor, are short on experience this year.

The Lions are a taller team than Pampa's first opponent, Phillips. Dana Keesee, 6-7, is the probable starting post man with Larry Appleby and Dick Fortune, both 6-2, starting at forwards.

Likely starters at guards for the visitors will be Larry Moore, 5-7, and 6-0 Johnnie Eggleston.

The New York Giants, needing only one victory in their final three games to wrap up another Eastern Division crown in the National Football League, will invade Chicago's Wrigley Field for the first time in 14 years Sunday for a meeting with the ever-dangerous Bears.

## Baseball Players Vote For One All-Star Game

NEW YORK (UPI) — Bowing to public pressure, major league player representatives returned to the old system of one All-Star game a season today in a move that amounted to a clear-cut victory for the club owners.

The vote by the players to go back to one All-Star game beginning with the 1963 season came as the owners gathered here for the start if the two-day major league meetings.

"We didn't want to buck the press and the public by pushing two All-Star games down their throats any longer," explained Pittsburgh pitcher Bob Friend, who also serves as the National League player representative.

"We originally put in the two games only to meet our pension fund payments, and now that we are able to meet the obligations another way, we are perfectly happy with the compromise."

Scraping the second All-Star game will cost the players approximately \$50,000 each year.

To Receive 95 Per Cent  
Under the two-game arrangement, the players received 60 per cent of the All-Star receipts. The owners' central fund got 35 per cent and the office of baseball Commissioner Ford Frick 5 per cent.

Now the players will receive 95 per cent of the receipts from the one game played each year.

Judge Robert Cannon, the players' legal representative, said the players were "happy" with the compromise.

Frick said the owners were even happier inasmuch as they showed little enthusiasm for two All-Star games ever since the inception of the practice in 1959.

There had been criticism of the two All-Star games not only from the public and the press, but also from some of the players who took part in them. Pitcher Bob Turley of the Los Angeles Angels, who is the American League's player representative, admitted as much.

"I will honestly say that some of the players who participate in the All-Star games were dissatisfied with the second game anyway," Turley said.

AA Out Of Business  
The decision to return to one All-Star game was reached here by the players during a two-hour meeting.

It followed the conclusion of the minor league meetings in Rochester, N.Y., where the American Association went out of business after having operated continuously for 61 years and where the Pacific Coast League and International League each expanded to 10 teams.

## 'Dark Horses' Pace Golfers

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — Two dark horses held the lead over goldfom's big names today as the second round got underway in the \$20,000 West Palm Beach Open golf tournament.

Rod Funseth and Butch Baird ignored chilly winds and overcast skies whipped up by a fierce Atlantic storm Thursday and fired four-under-par 68's over the 7,000-yard Beach Country Club course in the opening round to steal the thunder from such touring purse grabbers as Jack Nicklaus, Gay Brewer and Bo Winingar.

## College Basketball Season Underway

College basketball dribbles its way back into the national sports picture with a big bounce this weekend as inter-sectional clashes highlight Friday night's program and the five top-ranked teams swing into action the following day.

Illinois, ranked 13th in the pre-season balloting of the United Press International board of coaches, heads the lineup of schools who officially inaugurate the 1962-63 season Friday when it hosts Butler.

The other top matches scheduled for tonight are indicative of the inter-sectional games which will dominate the first few weeks of the campaign. In these openers Oregon is at home to Brigham Young, Denver is at UCLA and Georgia Tech engages Rice at Atlanta. Other leading games include Washington State-Colo. St. U.; Miami (Fla.)-Florida and Southern California-Santa Clara.

Cincinnati, winner of the NCAA championship the last two seasons and currently ranked No. 1 in the nation, opens at home against DePaul (Ind.) Amateur War Grows Hotter  
DETROIT (UPI) — The Amateur Athletic Union's peace offering to the National Collegiate Athletic Association's track and field coaches was shot full of holes and appeared today to have started a new war between the rival bodies.

The AAU's 35-member executive committee endorsed a coalition plan Thursday which would give NCAA coaches "equal representation" in international track and field policy-making. Token representation also would be granted to high school, colleges, armed forces, AAU and other track and field organizations.

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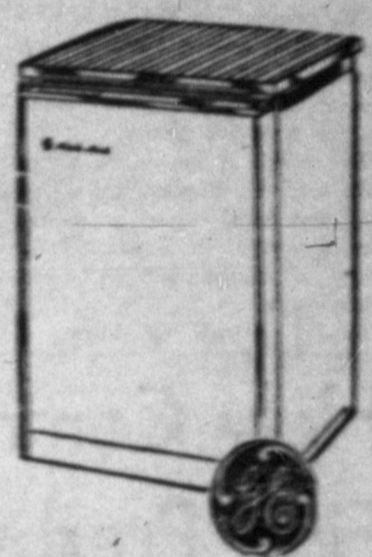

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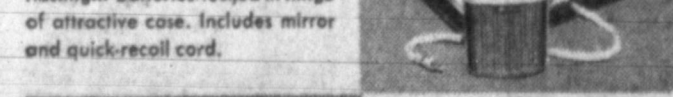

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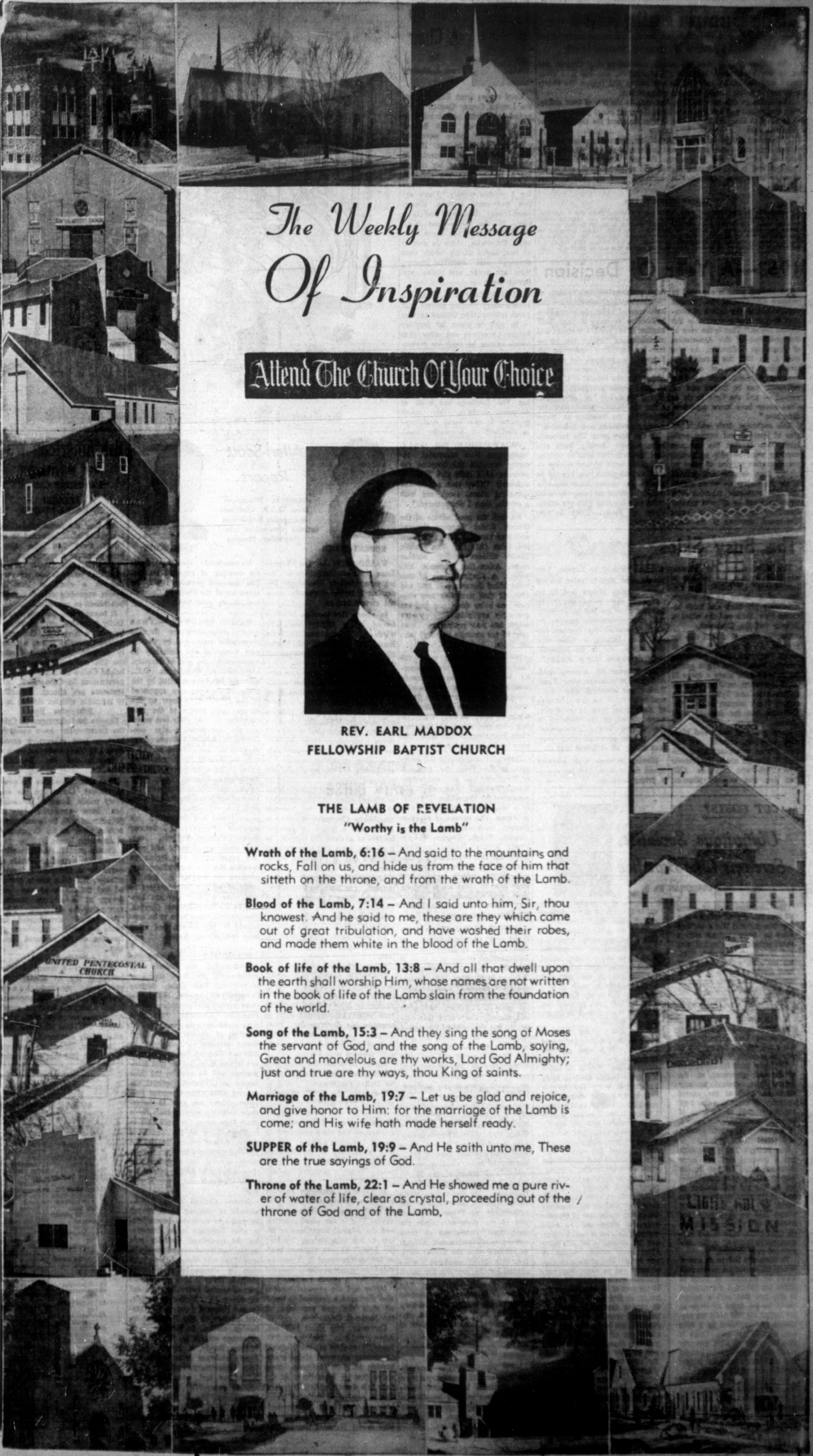

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**1963—A Year Of Decision**

The coming year is expected to produce decisions of the "utmost significance" to the future of common carrier transportation in the United States. That is the view of the president of the Association of American Railroads. As he sees it, in 1963 the steadily deteriorating position of essential common carriers, such as the railroads, can be halted and reversed — and the time to do so "has never been more opportune than now."

This authority dealt with a series of specific and urgent problems. One is that the common carriers must be able to furnish transportation service at rates no higher than shippers can provide it for themselves — which means that the regulated transportation agencies must be allowed greater flexibility to adjust their rates downward. Another is the work

rules problem — the source of "featherbedding" which costs the hard-pressed railroads a needless half-billion or more a year. Still another is to expedite mergers and consolidations "where the potential for increased operating efficiency is perhaps the greatest of all." In this connection, he added that the refusal of Congress to heed union proposals for delaying legislation "in effect has given the ICC a green light for expediting the handling of those merger proposals now before it."

So the story goes. The railroads have, almost literally, been studied to death. But next to nothing has come from all the studies — and, to compound the gravity of affairs, the unions have shown a suicidal refusal to bring the work rules into keeping with the conditions of today. Time is running out.

**The Busy Skies**

The skies above the Atlantic are busy in this, the jet age of international air travel. The airlines of a dozen or so nations constantly ply back and forth between New York and the cities of Britain and the Continent.

We are coming to take this for granted. So it is worth-while to recall that the first passenger carrying commercial flight across the Atlantic took place a mere 23 years ago when, on June 28, 1939, a Pan American flying boat left a New York airport bound for Marseille, via the Azores and Lisbon.

Many years of work and planning were represented on that day. Within two years after Colonel Lindbergh made his historic New York-Paris flight in 1927, Pan Am was actively planning

a broad skyway to Europe. This meant that larger, safer, and longer-ranging planes had to be designed; that bases and maintenance facilities had to be built; that communications had to be vastly improved; that meteorology until then largely a hit-or-miss proposition, had to be painstakingly developed into a science.

But it was all accomplished. And just 30 minutes after Pearl Harbor was attacked Pan Am's worldwide facilities, the only ones of their type then in existence, were placed at the disposal of the United States government. Its planes provided vital services during all of World War II.

History is made with amazing speed these days. The jet age is a prime example.

**CUT COSTS?**

**Ubiquitous Socialist Screams Like Banshee**

The ubiquitous socialist — and all socialists are ubiquitous — is a guy who screams like a banshee when he hears anyone talking about reducing the size and cost and power of government. "But-but-but," he wails, "We must have plenty of money to support our government and we should all be glad we are able to pay taxes for such a wonderful purpose!"

Let us now all join in hoisting the ubiquitous socialist high on his own petard. Let's agree to settle for a tax bite for the support of our government, if he will.

Right now taxes for the support of our own government, at the federal level, amount to only about one third of the annual budget. Our taxes are also used for the support of hundreds of corporate activities which are not, in any sense, a proper function of government.

Our incomes and phone calls and a thousand and one other items are taxed not just for the support of our own government but for the aid and comfort of most of the other countries of the world. Of course the socialist whines that we must help our friends but when your friends are all dead beats, whiners and beggars, you're better off in the company of your enemies.

To those who believe an annual budget for the federal government would be negligible at about 35 billion tax dollars, I call attention to the fact that such a budget would be ten times as large as the budget for 1932 while the population has increased by a little less than 50 per cent. There is also the fact that FDR correctly stated the case when he insisted that a 3.5 billion tax dollar budget would bankrupt the country.

We could also use the staff of Mr. Boardman, as a yardstick, since a lot of bread now sells for 10¢ when it was 15¢ in 1932. Using this measure, which is undeniably accurate, a 1962 paper

dollar is worth 1-7 of the value of a 1932 dollar which could be redeemed in gold. Multiply the 1962 budget by seven, round out the odd billions and we find that a 28 billion dollar annual budget would be spendthrift. But let's be reckless and let the politicians steal ten times as much as they wanted in 1932 to provide government for half again as many citizens and we are back at 35 billion tax dollars.

If you think a 2-3 cut in government waste and spending would leave us with a worn and torn flag flying over the White House, you're wrong. With a 35 billion tax dollar budget the flag could be changed every day for the next hundred years without even emptying the petty cash drawer. I believe it was Rep. Joseph Martin Jr. who did a little soul searching one day when FDR was insisting on increasing the tax bite and remarked that raising taxes was the easiest thing a politician could do while getting a reduction was the toughest thing a taxpayer could possibly imagine.

There doesn't seem to be much chance of shaking the American tax-paying sucker out of his lethargy and stupor but he could certainly do a lot of good for himself by making a lot of noise about being entirely willing to pay for the cost of his own government and no more. Sure government would continue to spend 90 per cent of its time and energy trying to find ways and means of parting the tax payers from more and more of their earnings but a 2-3 cut in the size and cost and power of government would give us a chance to take a breath and look for a way to get on to the road to freedom.

Speaking of the cost of government, why do the House and Senate majority and minority leaders have automobiles furnished at "the taxpayer's expense?"

**Pull Up A Chair**

Word comes from England that the London County Council is engaged in a bold new crash program to provide much needed housing. They have developed what are called Instant Homes which are now being erected in 20 minutes. The house, big enough for a family with two children, consists of five rooms and rents for 3 pounds weekly. There are two bedrooms, kitchen, dining-room-lounge, bathroom and lavatory. If the connections are ready the family can move in at once. Otherwise, there is a wait of two weeks during which time drainage and electrical connections are made, and walks and fences built.

All of England is watching this revolutionary housing project with great interest. The Council expects to be able to place 300 families before Christmas and other sites which cannot be used for permanent building for sometime will also be utilized. The 20-minute house is a prefabricated job constructed in two sections and complete with decorations and plumbing. The dwellings are built of fireproof timbers. This crash program is also being duplicated in Sheffield on a smaller scale.

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**Allen-Scott Report**  
 Move by Mississippi State G.O.P. Chairman Stampedes Republican National Committee into December Meeting

**WASHINGTON** — The Republican National Committee is being summoned to Washington December 7 under extremely unusual circumstances.

In effect, this meeting is being forced by a jolting move by Wirth A. Yerger, bustling State Republican Chairman of Mississippi and a militant opponent of desegregation.

Yerger's jarring maneuver consisted of sending a letter to all state GOP chairmen inviting them to a conference in Dallas December 13 to discuss party policies and strategy. While there was no mention of the explosive civil rights issue in the letter, its consideration was virtually inevitable in view of Yerger's sentiments and the location of the proposed meeting.

His unannounced plan had a bombshell effect on the November 19 conference held by National Republican Chairman William Butler and a group of regional leaders to analyze the outcome of the recent state and congressional elections and to formulate future plans.

Among the regional leaders present were National Committee and State Chairmen Judson Morhouse of New York, Ray Bliss of Ohio, and John Wood of Wyoming.

All these party chiefs were vehemently against Yerger's project.

No conclusion was reached at the meeting of regional leaders. The question probably will be taken up at the National Committee session next week.

**MAKING HEADWAY** — That giant communications satellite corporation authorized by the recent Congress will definitely be organized by the end of January, Lloyd Cutler, Washington, D.C., attorney, has been selected by the President to draw up the incorporation papers of the new company. . . . At their last meeting, the incorporators also considered a number of prominent possibilities for officers of the concern. Among those mentioned were Defense Secretary Robert McNamara, Eugene Black, who retired several months ago as head of the World Bank, and General Lauris Norstad, NATO commander who has announced his intention to retire. . . . Senator Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., longtime anti-trust crusader and militant opponent of the legislation creating the communications corporation, is making a detailed study of all the incorporators to determine whether any are subject to conflict-of-interest charges. The incorporators have to be confirmed by the Senate, and some may face strong dissent.

**The American Way**

HOW MANY MORE "VICTORIES" CAN WE AFFORD?

By HARRY BROWNE

All over the nation, Americans are asking what happened to the "firm stand" on Cuba they'd been promised a month ago.

Actually, this latest reversal of official policy is just one more link in a chain of incredible events regarding this Communist beachhead on our doorstep.

It began when, perhaps through faulty judgment, our government helped a known Communist named Castro to unseat a friendly dictator. Since then—through the UN, and our allies—we have helped Castro maintain a socialist government in Cuba. Such governments are almost impossible to maintain without outside help.

**Subversive Base**  
 Despite food shortages in Cuba, the Communists have used this base to send subversive expeditions to other countries, such as Venezuela and the Dominican Republic.

Even though we have the power to unseat Castro on our own, every public demand for action has been answered by our government with futile and unsuccessful pleas to the Organization of American States.

Finally in 1961, the American government agreed to provide air cover for a Cuban exile invasion attempt. But faint hearts prevailed and the air cover was withdrawn at a strategic moment, sabotaging the invasion. That "firm stand" deteriorated into pleas for funds to purchase the freedom of the captured liberators.

**Public Support**  
 With such a record of failure behind it, it's no wonder the government received hearty cheers when it finally announced it had drawn the line last month. Americans, more relieved than afraid, felt that Castro's days were finally numbered.

But now, instead of removing Castro, we find that the adminis-

tration has guaranteed his safety. This in exchange for the removal of "offensive" weapons. And for proof of that removal, we are accepting the promise of a man the President admitted was a notorious liar only 30 days ago.

How many more "victories" like this can we afford?

The only way to be sure that Cuba is not an "offensive" threat is to return it to the free world. We have the ability and the resources to do it—without war.

**Isolate The Enemy**  
 No Communist government has ever survived without aid from the capitalist world. A full embargo, backed up by a naval blockade, will either force Castro to flee or inspire his enlashed subjects to overthrow him. We should see to it that nothing—absolutely nothing—is allowed to reach Cuba from the outside world. And we should promise the Cuban people that should they rebel, we will guarantee that no outside troops will come in to put down the rebellion.

Once Castro is through, we should oversee free elections within 30 days—and then get out.

That kind of victory we can afford. It could be the beginning of a real turning point in the cold war. And it would be the American way.

**COUNTER MANEUVER** — After caustically assailing it among themselves, they telephoned the aggressive Mississippian in an urgent effort to persuade him to abandon his disconcerting plan. National Chairman Miller and a number of the regional leaders earnestly pleaded with Yerger.

But to no avail. He stood pat, insisting on going through with his Dallas conference.

Thereupon, the G.O.P. chiefs resorted to two counter moves:

(1) Miller was directed to immediately urge all national committeemen and state chairmen to ignore Yerger's meeting; (2) to hold a meeting of the National Committee December 7, a week before Yerger's proposed gathering.

A National Committee meeting had been contemplated in January after the new Congress convenes. This is the usual practice, and the original intent was to follow it. But with Yerger "rocking the boat," as one regional leader irately expressed it, it was decided to summon the National Committee a month earlier.

Miller and the regional leaders also discussed a proposal to make all state chairmen members of the National Committee.

Currently, only about half are. After President Eisenhower's 1958 landslide re-election, the National Committee approved giving membership to state chairmen from states that go Republican. At the time this drew plaudits. But since then a number of excluded states have protested and are demanding that all or none be incorporated in the National Committee.

**Information Cops**  
 NEW YORK (UPI) — Caterpillar Tractor Co. is using paper cups dispensed by its plant vending machines to plug benefits to workers. The cups carry messages on the firm's pension, retirement and hospitalization plans.

**Question:** Why are the news and radio newscasts slanted with the red-tinged tidbits on every station? Example: "Will Russia put on the pressure in Berlin to make up for what they've lost in Cuba?" I'm sure we've all heard this one dozens of times since Cuba got HOT. P.M.

**Answer:** We are not in position to say that all news and newscasts are slanted with red-tinged tidbits. Some may be. Some are not, in our opinion. If some are, we are not in the position of mind readers to say what is in the background of an individual to cause him to slant a news account.

From observation of years of news accounts, it is our opinion that most reporters honestly are attempting to report the news, but are affected by their backgrounds. Most of them slant their news in favor of government, because most of them have been trained from earliest days to rely on the government for schooling. It naturally follows that they will come to believe the government can provide all sorts of goodies.

It also is our experience that most reporters who are assigned to report the activities of a governmental agency tend to absorb the ideas advocated by the politicians with whom they associate daily. Unless they are blessed with an unusual amount of skepticism, or unless they are fortunate enough to have a more discerning (and questioning) editor, they have little chance to learn to be truly objective.
