Meany-Reuther Feud May Boil Again In Meet

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The AFL-CIO executive council meets today with signs that the feud between president George Meany and vice president Walter Reuther may boil up again.
The 29-member council was called into closed session to fill a vacancy in its membership. Meany and Reuther, long at odds on union policy, have disagreed on a choice for the job.
Reuther, head of the United Auto Workers, has been insisting on a selection from the ranks of the industrial, or former CIO, unions. Meany has refused to go along.

Wary Of Showdown
There were indications, however, that neither Meany nor Reuther wanted to push for an unconditional showdown. A union source said someone from the CIO camp, other than Reuther's first choice, probably would be selected.

Meany has enough votes in the council to beat Reuther. But if he pushed for a showdown, the highly influential Reuther might resign or pull the 1,260,000-member UAW out of the federation.
The council vacancy was created by the resignation of Leland S. Burkmaster, former president of the United Rubber Workers. The former CIO group on the council chose United Packinghouse Workers president Ralph Heistein to succeed Burkmaster.

Meany Balks
The Meany side balked. Meany was said to contend that while the industrial unions had a right to nominate their own man for the council, the nominee must be acceptable to the majority.

Mississippi Grand Jury In Session

OXFORD, Miss. (UPI) — The Lafayette County grand jury was scheduled to begin considering evidence today in the deaths of two men during bloody rioting on the University of Mississippi campus the night of Sept. 30.
Dist. Atty. Jesse Yancy Jr. said he expected the grand jury session to last at least two days, and that no report would be issued until the jury completes its work.

He said the grand jury would hear evidence gathered by state investigators and Sheriff Joe Ford's office. Information gathered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation was also being sought by the district attorney.

French newspaper Paul Guillard and Ray Gunter of near Oxford were victims of the riot which broke out after Negro James H. Meredith's arrival on campus.

The Justice Department is in the process of checking the guns it says were used by U. S. deputy marshals at Oxford. Marshals have said the only shots they fired were to puncture a fire hose which had been turned on them.

Norstad Tells NATO's Needs

PARIS (UPI)—Supreme Allied Commander Lauris Norstad warned today that NATO forces in Europe are "critically short" and suffer from "deficiencies of serious proportions."

Norstad expressed confidence, however, that Europe can be defended. He disclosed he has ordered a mobile forward defense in most of central Europe rather than holding rear positions.

Norstad addressed the eighth annual conference of parliamentarians of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries.

The supreme commander was to have retired from his post Oct. 31 but he was asked to stay a few months longer because of the Cuban crisis.

"The fact is, and I have made no secret of it, that our forces are critically short in a number of ways—there are deficiencies of serious proportions," Norstad told the 15-nation conference.

Lag In Equipment

"We are still short certain major units. Many of those which we have are seriously short in combat and service support. There are notable deficiencies in available supplies and there is a general lag in furnishing the modern equipment without which our forces would have to fight at a great disadvantage."

Norstad added, however, that "within the limits and for the purposes of our directive from the political authorities, NATO Europe can be defended."

"What remains to be done is relatively small compared with what has already been accomplished. We have only a short distance to go but this is critical."

Norstad said he has ordered the commander-in-chief in central Europe, Gen. Pierre Jaquot, "to prepare his forces to conduct a mobile defense in most forward areas rather than to hold rearward positions."

He said he recognized that the area of moving NATO defense lines forward in this fashion involves a risk.

Old Plan Worse

"But I also feel that on balance the effectiveness of our effort will be far greater than if we remain in a position that has been dictated by our plans up to recent months," he said.

French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville told the NATO conference earlier that Europe would have been involved if a war had broken out over Cuba.

"Everyone here understood that if it had developed further all would have been involved quickly," Couve de Murville said.

Speaking at the opening session of the 8th annual meeting of 200 members of parliaments and congresses, the French foreign minister said it would have been difficult to keep a conflict over Cuba confined to just the United States and the Soviet Union.

"We all realize that the moment would have arrived rapidly when all would have had to face

very serious responsibilities," he added.

U. S. Stand Justified

Couve de Murville described the Soviet nuclear weapons in Cuba as "both offensive and provocative." He said the United States had the "perfectly justifiable feeling that its national security was directly menaced by the Soviet Union."

Couve de Murville added that a "dramatic confrontation" of the type that occurred between two great nuclear powers like the United States and Russia showed that in such a situation "nothing else matters but the nuclear question."

Collection Of Pearls Is Stolen

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—Detectives said today they believe a "professional gang" stole a 70-pound, \$1 million pearl collection from a hotel room Saturday night and that both thieves and pearls are now far from Fort Worth. The FBI joined the investigation.

Det. Lt. W. Matlock said the thieves left not a single clue. One man was believed to have jimmed a lock on a door to a Japanese pearl exporter's room and made off with the bag the pearls were in. But Matlock spoke of a gang.

"Sometimes these gangs will follow a collection around for a year before they see a chance to move in for the kill," he said.

Matlock said he expects the gang to dispose of the pearls in the East or on the West Coast. He said it would arouse immediate suspicion if anybody tried to sell 70 pounds of pearls in the Southwest.

The stolen pearls included a golden yellow pearl, worth \$18,000 and one of the largest and rarest of its kind.

Question Japanese Woman

Investigators questioned a 30-year-old Japanese woman living in Dallas and married to a retired sailor. She had worked for the Japanese owners of the collection, modeling oriental clothing at places the pearls were exhibited.

The woman had spent more on a taxi fare to Fort Worth than she got for the modeling. But she convinced police she knew nothing. (See PEARLS, Page 3)

3 Pampa Youths Defy Locomotive

Three Pampa boys defied a Santa Fe switch engine Sunday morning by walking on the railroad tracks and refusing to budge as the engine approached.

After police were summoned the three boys were found nearby and taken into custody. Later they were turned over to their parents and were to be given a chance to explain their actions to Juvenile Officer Bill Leonard this afternoon.

Temperature Falls To 27 At Dalhart

Temperatures plunged 5 degrees below freezing in the upper Texas Panhandle early today. Freezing weather extended as far south as Lubbock and Alpine.

The mercury dropped to 27 degrees at Dalhart, 32 at Lubbock and 32 at Alpine. Readings were generally in the 30s across the northern and western third of the state.

Forecasters said central and eastern portions of the state will be cooler today and tonight, with a slight warmup beginning in the west Tuesday.

Skies all across the state are generally fair, and the Weather Bureau said little change is expected through Tuesday.

Burglars Hit Library For Coin Cases

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (UPI)—Burglars who apparently broke exactly what they were after, broke into the Truman Library here today and stripped two large cases containing a collection of coins dating back to 1789.

Dr. Philip Brooks, head of the library staff, said it was impossible to set a value on the stolen items because "you cannot express historical values in terms of money."

"But they were very valuable and it would be my guess that the burglars knew exactly what they were after," he said.

The coin collection, on loan to the library, was the property of John Snyder, Toledo, Ohio, former secretary of the treasury. It was reported that Snyder valued the coins at about \$50,000.

Brooks described the collection as "one of the most valuable things in the library," which houses the personal papers and documents for former President Harry S. Truman, along with gifts received during his administration. The latter include some showy pieces of obviously great monetary worth, among them several knives heavily encrusted with jewels. These were untouched, Brooks said.

JFK Calls In Aides To Talk Verification

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy called in his U.N. aides today to discuss negotiations for on-site verification of Soviet missile removals from Cuba.

The President, returning from a week end at Middleburg, Va., scheduled a White House meeting with the executive committee of the National Security Council and his top Cuban negotiators.

Deputy Defense Secretary Roswell L. Gilpatric said Sunday that 42 Russian missiles had been removed from Cuba. This was the number the Soviet Union claimed it had sent to the island.

But Gilpatric said the United States had no proof that all such missiles had been removed and would never be sure unless on-site inspection was permitted.

Bombers Remain
He said all offensive weapons had to be withdrawn before this country would lift its naval blockade or promise not to invade Cuba. He noted that Soviet IL28 jet bombers still are in Cuba and are considered offensive weapons by Kennedy.

Stevenson, McCloy and Yost were expected to report to the President on the progress of their talks with Acting U.N. Secretary General Thant and Soviet First Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily V. Kuznetsov.

The three U.S. negotiators have met three times with Kuznetsov since their last conference with Kennedy a week ago Saturday.

Gilpatric indicated the United States would not accept any Soviet argument that Cuban Premier Fidel Castro would give up the nuclear-capable jet bombers, which have an 800-mile range.

Held Responsible
"We hold the Soviets responsible for the types of military equipment which it has furnished to Castro and as of the present time we regard removal of those bombers as within the capacity of the Soviets to bring about," Gilpatric said.

Gilpatric's remarks were recorded for a television interview after U.S. warships made visual checks at sea Friday and Saturday of Soviet freighters taking missiles away from Cuba.

Typhoon Karen Lashes Guam With Winds Up To 175 Miles Per Hour

TOKYO (UPI) — Typhoon Karen lashed Guam with winds up to 175 miles an hour late Sunday, killing at least one civilian, injuring hundreds and causing an estimated \$100 million damage.

Thousands of persons were reported homeless.

The U.S. Navy's Pacific headquarters in Honolulu described the huge storm as "the worst typhoon in Guam's history." However, the

Navy said there were no casualties among U.S. military personnel or their dependents.

U.S. Air Force officials at Fuchu weather station near Tokyo said damage was particularly heavy to structures at Anderson Air Force Base, Anderson is the only Strategic Air Command base in the vast western Pacific.

A Navy spokesman in Honolulu said every four out of five civilian homes lost their roofs as the eye of the storm passed over the island, the western most United States possession.

The Navy said Guam's hospitals were being swamped with a steady stream of injured civilians.

The U.S. military newspaper Pacific Stars and Stripes quoted the U.S. Navy radio station at Agaña, the capital city, as saying that "many buildings at Agaña were totally destroyed and many others badly damaged."

The report said powerful storm winds topped at least 30 per cent of utility poles in Agaña and at least half of Guam's natives were left homeless. The island has about 87,800 residents.

Typhoon Karen was described as slightly larger than the average typhoon in the Pacific. It was said to be moving west into the open sea at about 15 miles an hour and did not pose an immediate threat to any other land area.

Nehru Asks For U.S. Airplanes

NEW DELHI (UPI) — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru said today that India has asked the United States for military aircraft to bolster Indian defenses in the border war with Red China. He also asked for American machinery to produce arms in India.

The U. S. embassy here confirmed that both requests were under consideration.

On the fighting fronts, India reported its troops had driven back two new Chinese Communist probing attacks in the northeastern frontier area during the weekend.

A Defense Ministry spokesman said the engagements took place a few miles northeast of Jang, in the region of the monastery

town of Towang, and in the far eastern stretch of the frontier near Wangong.

The spokesman said two Indian patrols contacted Chinese troops near Wangong and fire was exchanged. He said the Chinese "were forced to withdraw."

Four Indian soldiers were wounded in the weekend engagements but Chinese Communist casualties were not known.

Transports Needed
Nehru declined to say what type or how many planes he asked for. However, India is known to be in the market for transports and high altitude helicopters.

Nehru also said he had received firm assurances "recently" from Moscow that Soviet su-

perior MIG21 fighters would be delivered on schedule and that Russia would fulfill its promise to establish a MIG factory in India.

Both announcements seemed certain to create an uproar in Peiping. Communist Chinese officials already have denounced American small arms aid to India and have been feuding with the Soviet Union over the conduct of the cold war.

Nehru spoke to a group of visiting American and other foreign newsmen who arrived Saturday.

There were no immediate details on what type or how many planes India wants from the United States.

Himalaya Mountains has been limited to ground action, but it would be likely to take to the air if one side or the other finds itself driven too far back.

Sunday Nehru warned that such teeming population centers as Calcutta, Bombay and New Delhi must prepare for the possibility that they "might be bombed by the Chinese."

New Delhi Mayor Huruiddin Ahmed announced that air raid precaution committees would be formed shortly. Officials were reported considering 1,100 shelters for the capital.

Homemakers Might Enjoy Skills As Part-Time Employee

Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Part-time work can be a pleasant and profitable interest for the homemaker who has time to spare. When the youngest child goes off to first grade, suddenly we have quiet and leisure we haven't enjoyed for years.

After they soak up the luxury of this state of affairs for a bit, many women I know polish up old skills and put them to work for personal profit.

What to do? Office and teaching skills are in demand. From now till Christmas, many individuals and professional men will pay for extra help addressing cards or special mailings. Check the newspaper ads or run an ad yourself.

Scout likely prospects and send an announcement on a double postcard with return address on which a time and date for a telephone interview can be noted. If you can take some shorthand and offer a home typewriter, offer to take dictation and transcribe it at home. I know several busy club women and professional men who "share" a secretary-homemaker

in this fashion. Part-time office work at home will require nook, corner or desk where all work can be kept neatly organized. If you decide to invest in a typewriter, you may want a good reconditioned stand-sized machine, especially if you expect to do much correspondence involving several carbons.

Often, this "businesslike" machine isn't needed — and it does lack eye appeal. Small portable typewriters, budget-priced as low as under \$50 for the scholar's purse, are solidly built to handle normal correspondence with one, perhaps two, carbons.

How much to charge? Inquire around cautiously where fees aren't fixed. In our town, the homemaker-secretary charges \$1.75 an hour (she's fast and neat). An ex-mathematics teacher tutors at home for \$3 per half hour. An ex-Latin major but not accredited teacher tutors for \$1.50 a half hour. An ex-interior decorator charges \$10 an hour for a consultation — this sound high but she may visit a home two or three times and the elapsed time is only an hour. Remember, too, that Uncle Sam takes a deep interest in your work and will want to know just how profitable it is.

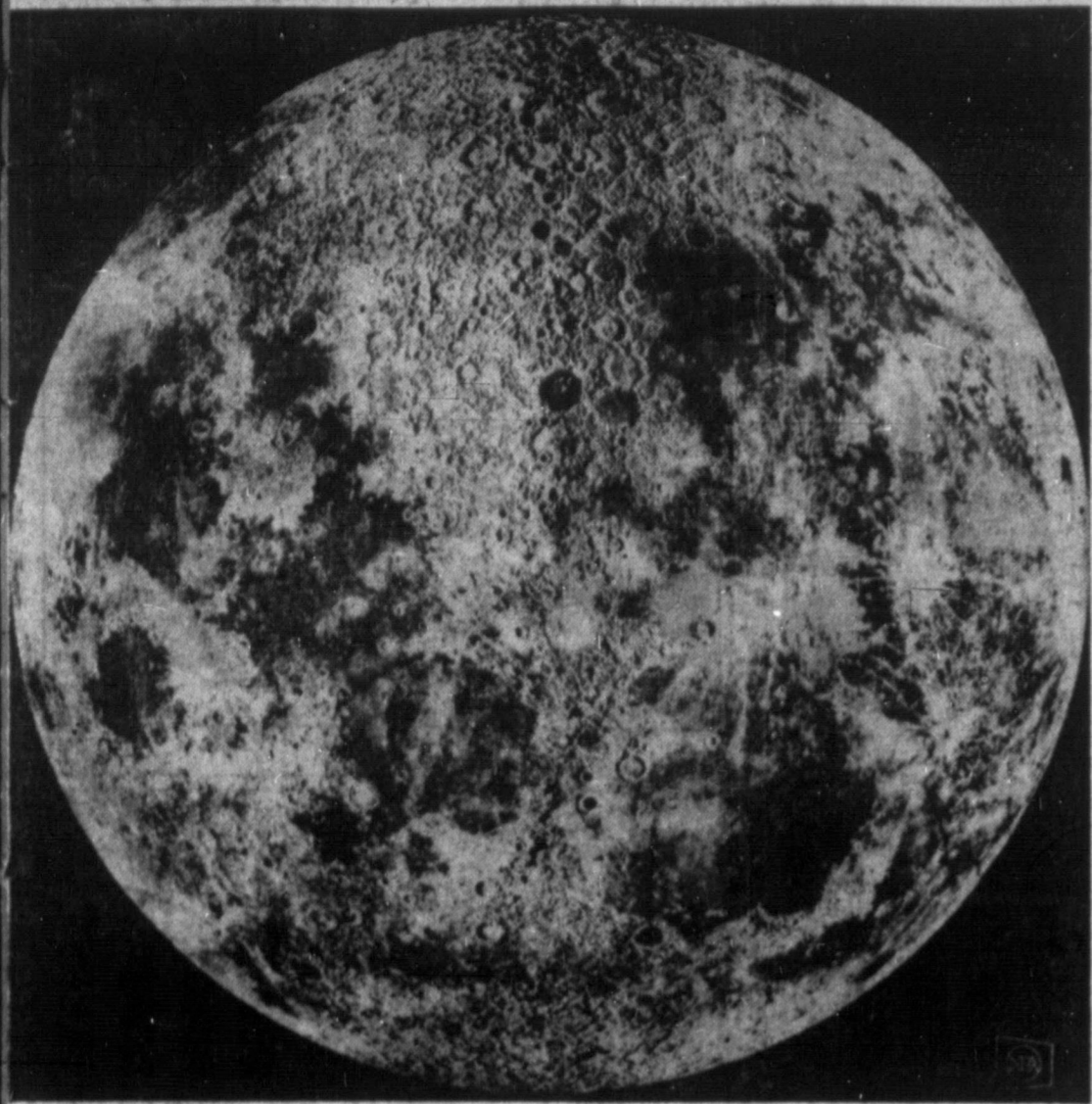

"Putting On Ice"

Sam Snead, Arnold Palmer Win Canada Cup For U. S.

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Sam Snead, coming to the end of the golfing trail, did it again in the International Trophy and Canada Cup golf matches with the aid of Arnold Palmer, but the ice-slick greens of the Argentine course cost Uncle Sam the individual championship.

That went to Roberto de Vicenzo of the host country, who at 39 is 11 years Snead's junior.

But the old Stammer and Palmer, golf's richest golfer over the past four years, teamed to keep the team championship in the U.S. It was Uncle Sam's fifth triumph in the 10 International golf tournaments which have been played and Snead has shared four of these triumphs.

He won with Ben Hogan in 1956, with Palmer in 1960 and with Jimmy Demarest last year.

Age Catches Up

"I only wish I could have won the individual title again," said Sam sadly, "but you just have to admit it — at 50 you start coming apart at the seams."

Snead had a two-shot lead going into Sunday's fourth and final round under a hot sun which seared the 6,746-yard Jockey Club course with its concrete-like greens, but he couldn't make it stand up.

Still suffering from a painful right foot, he shot a final round 74, four over par, and it wasn't good enough.

For the balding De Vicenzo,

three shots back, came home with a two-under-par 68 for a total of 276 — two strokes better than Palmer and Peter Allis of England and three strokes better than Snead.

Tries But Fails

Palmer made a late charge at it, with a one-under-par 69, but he just couldn't conquer those greens, which Snead described as "putting on ice."

But that 69, coupled with Snead's second straight over-par round, was good enough to give the U.S. the team championship with a total of 557 — three under par and two strokes better than Argentina.

Allis shot a final-round 66 to tie Palmer at 278, while Snead came in at 279. Then it was Alfonso Angelini of Italy at 281, Kel Nagle of Australia and Fidel de Luca of Argentina at 283, Mario Gonzalez of Brazil with 284, Gary Player of South Africa with 285 and Peter Thomson of Australia with 286.

No team was close to the U.S. and Argentina. Australia came in third with 569 and then came England with 572 and Brazil at 584.

Green Bay Stuns Eagles In NFL

The Green Bay Packers are gaining ever-increasing support as the greatest pro football team of all time, although one National League brain strangely reluctant to climb on the bandwagon is their own coach, Vince Lombardi.

After trampling their first nine opponents of the 1962 season, the Packers are attracting favorable comparison with the Chicago Bears "monsters" of the early 1940s and such post-war powerhouses as the Philadelphia Eagles, Detroit Lions, Cleveland Browns and Baltimore Colts.

One of the strongest of Packers' back-ers is Nick Skorich of the Eagles, who suffered through "the longest and worst day of my coaching career" as Green Bay annihilated Philadelphia, 49-0, Sunday.

"I think Green Bay is the greatest team of the past two decades with its depth and perfect balance in running and passing," commented Skorich. "Their secret is great blocking and play execution. And with their depth, they can lose players like Paul Hornung and Boyd Dowler without suffering."

And what does lugubrious Lombardi have to say about that?

"It would be impossible to go all the way undefeated in this league. Every team is up for us. I thought the Eagles would be inspired and a lot tougher."

Ignoring Lombardi, the Packers appear headed for the first undefeated season in the NFL since the Bears went 11-0 in 1942. Counting the last regular-season game of 1961 and the championship playoff, the Packers now have won 31 in a row, and 24 of their last 28 NFL games dating back to 1960.

Jim Taylor, the league's leading rusher, scored four touchdowns and gained 141 yards in 35 carries to help hand the Eagles their worst defeat since 1933. Taylor, with 14 touchdowns and 1,875 yards, appears headed for league records in both departments.

The Packers lost the ball through an interception on their first series of downs, but the next seven times they gained possession they scored on sustained drives of

Robert Kennedy To Meet With NCAA, AAU

NEW YORK (UPI)—Officials of the nation's two governing amateur sports bodies will meet again today with Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy in an effort to end their feud and concentrate on a united effort for the 1964 Olympics.

Kennedy will sit in as an unofficial mediator during the conference between representatives of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) at the Olympic House starting at 11 a.m. EST.

The attorney general called the same groups together in Washington last month because the government felt that continued strife between the NCAA and the AAU would ruin the U.S. Olympic movement for the 1964 games in Tokyo.

During the Washington conference, which lasted two days, Kennedy suggested that the NCAA and the AAU invoke a truce in their battle for the control of this nation's amateur sports at least until the end of the 1964 Olympics.

When reports of the "secret" Washington conference were revealed exclusively by United Press International last week, representatives of both bodies indicated they would accept the government-proposed truce.

Dallas Texans Ride Herd In AFL Western Division

When the Dallas Texans add the thunder of rookie Curtis McCClinton to the lightning of Abner Haynes and a torrent of touchdown passes by Len Dawson they stir up a lot of storm weather for their American Football League rivals.

The Haynes-Dawson-McClinton hurricane caused quite a disturbance in New York Sunday, wiping out the Titans, 52-31, and blowing the Texans into first place in the Western Division of the AFL.

The Texans' ascent was made possible when the Boston Patriots, clinging to their Eastern Division lead, knocked off the Denver Broncos, 33-25. In two other Sunday games the Houston Oilers

beat the Oakland Raiders, 28-25, and the Buffalo Bills walloped the San Diego Chargers, 40-20.

The results boosted the Texans into first place in the West with a 7-2 record and dropped the Broncos (7-3) into second place. These two teams meet in a showdown next Sunday at Denver. In the East the Patriots lead with a 6-3-1 record while Houston is 6-3.

Haynes gained 107 yards in 24 carries — which wasn't exactly a new feat — and Dawson threw three touchdown passes against the Titans — also to be expected. But the 102 yards in 19 carries by the 230-pound McCClinton was something new for Dallas rivals to ponder.

"McCClinton has a great future," coach Hank Stram of the Texans lauded after the game.

"There's no telling how good he can be. He has all the natural attributes and he has the intelligence to go with his physical ability."

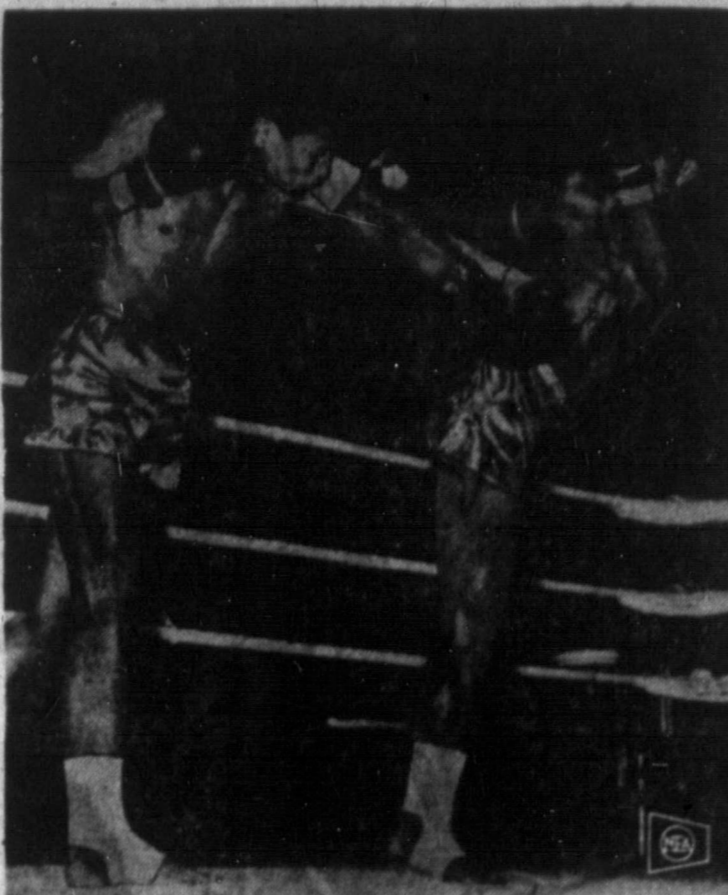
Another Hanging In SWC Action

'Bama, Southern Cal Top Unbeaten Ranks

Alabama, Southern California and Mississippi are the big three of college football today—unbeaten, untied and almost certain bowl participants.

The trio closed ranks on the national championship Saturday as Northwestern plummeted from its No. 1 ranking when it absorbed a 37-4 pasting by Wisconsin. The defeat may also cost the Wildcats a Big Ten title and send the winning Badgers to the Rose Bowl against Southern California.

Second-ranked Alabama, with only Georgia Tech and Auburn in the path of its second straight perfect season, trampled Miami of Florida, 36-3. Quarterback Joe Namath passed for one score and ran for another as Alabama remained a good bet for the Sugar Bowl.

Southern California, ranked third, dive-bombed Stanford, 39-14, as the Trojans scored twice on passes and set up four other tallies the same way. The West Coast whiz kids expect to use the same tactics to torpedo Navy next Saturday.

Mississippi, the No. 4 team, added to its defensive rushing lead by holding Chattanooga to 21 yards and one touchdown in a 32-7 victory. Ole Miss meets Tennessee Saturday in its drive toward a probable Cotton or Sugar Bowl engagement.

Wisconsin, ranked seventh, closed the only upheaval among the top 10 as Ron VanderKelen outgunned Northwestern's Tom Myers in the air. VanderKelen completed 12 of 22 passes for 181 yards and three touchdowns, while his rival connected on 14 of 26 for 182 yards and one score.

Dartmouth, the only other major school with a perfect record, won its seventh straight by clobbering Columbia, 42-8. Bill King set an Ivy League record of 71 completed passes in a season as he tagged receivers 14 times in 16 attempts, including four touchdowns.

Fifth-ranked Texas, currently linked with Mississippi as possible Cotton Bowl rivals, retained its Southwest Conference lead by beating Baylor, 27-12, on Tommy Wade's two touchdown passes. Arkansas, the No. 8 team and a step back of Texas in the SWC race, ripped Rice, 28-14, when Bill Moore quarterbacked three scoring drives.

Minnesota and Louisiana State, ranked ninth and 10th respectively, recorded shutouts. The Gophers, best total defense team in the nation, defeated Iowa, 18-0, and LSU edged Texas Christian, 14-8.

Battle Foreseen Over Selling Surplus U.S. Grain To Poland for Resale to Communist Bloc; Red Trade

WASHINGTON — Resumption of U.S.-Polish surplus wheat negotiations, due to be announced later this month, poses a serious dilemma for the Kennedy Administration.

The heated controversy, scheduled for another round in the new Congress, led to the passage of legislation directing President Kennedy to withdraw favored tariff treatment from Poland and Yugoslavia "as soon as practicable."

Ammunition for this assault is being compiled by a special House investigating committee headed by Representative Paul Kitchin, D-N.C.

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For every \$4 of aid received from the U.S. during the past four years, the Communist dictator has granted \$1 in economic credits to Yugoslavia, Ghana, North Korea, North Vietnam and Cuba.

Specifically, he has extended \$110 million in short and long term credits to these five nations while receiving \$400 million in food shipments and industrial credits from the U.S.

Industrial plans, including an entire sugar refinery, were furnished Cuba this year under a four-year trade agreement that Gomulka signed with Castro's Communist regime.

HELPING GOMULKA — Secretary Rusk's argument for going ahead with the new negotiations is that a deal will help Gomulka increase his autonomy from Russia in internal and foreign affairs.

"This includes maintaining and developing more normal and active relations with the Eastern European governments of the Soviet bloc. We see increased trade, including foreign currency sales of surplus farm commodities, as important ways of expanding Western contact and influence."

NOTE: Polish agents are quietly purchasing Turkish lira in Switzerland for the Kremlin. This operation usually indicates that Russia is preparing to try to stir up trouble within a country.

FOREIGN FLASHES — The Castro regime is having trouble with another important crop. This time it is coffee.

Little Known Yet on How To Improve Human Stock

By DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT

A question often pondered: Can the study of heredity (eugenics) save mankind from his own folly by improving racial stocks, as is done with certain domestic animals, in order that he may live of greater service to himself and his fellow creatures?

As yet no effective and acceptable means of improving human stock has been devised. One great difficulty is the fact that even in those men and women who most nearly approach physical perfection we cannot tell what hereditary determiners or genes are present in the reproductive cells.

It can safely be said that in any given couple's offspring, not all of the parents' best features are reproduced. It has become an axiom among those who have studied the laws of heredity that the more genes involved in the hereditary transmission of a characteristic, the less chance that it will be passed on to one's children unchanged.

Advances in medical science have resulted in the saving of persons with certain hereditary conditions such as some forms of allergy, a tendency to diabetes, severe nearsightedness, and some types of impaired hearing.

As these persons are saved, they pass these weaknesses on to succeeding generation. In an earlier, less enlightened, day many of these persons would have died in childhood or would have been so handicapped that they would not have married or, if married, would have had few if any children.

I would be the first to declare that many of the people with these defects are our finest and most public-spirited citizens but their presence in ever increasing numbers places a great burden on our economy, one which, for the most part, these persons themselves have had to bear.

Measures advocated to prevent deterioration of human stocks include segregation of the sexes to prevent reproduction of the physi-

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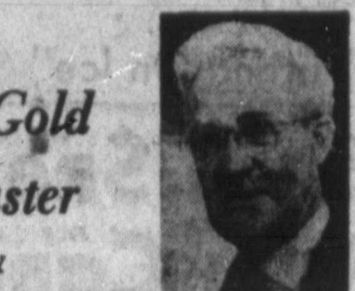
