Three Crewmen Killed

Train, Crude Oil Truck Hit, Burn

CHANDLER, Tex. (UPI) — A Cotton Belt freight train hit a truck loaded with 6,000 gallons of crude oil today, setting off an explosion and fire that destroyed the locomotive and truck and killed three train crewmen.

State Highway Patrol said the truck — a tractor-trailer affair — was owned by the Permian Corp. Fire engulfed the engine and cab of the train and spread to at least three box cars. There were six diesel units pulling the train and one exploded.

The train was on the Cotton Belt's main line. It originated in St. Louis for a run to the west coast. The three dead crewmen had joined the train in Tyler. It was carrying mixed freight.

The train was traveling west and the truck north when they collided in downtown Chandler.

Rescue squads had to wait until the locomotive cooled to search for bodies.

Luce, the driver of the truck, was reported in good condition at Tyler Medical center.

402 Traffic Accidents This Year

Pampa has had 402 traffic accidents with one fatality and 136 persons injured during the first ten months of 1962, according to a report made public today by Police Chief Jim Conner.

In preparing figures for the National Safety Council, Chief Conner reported that for the same period last year there were 407 traffic mishaps with no fatalities and 99 injuries.

For the month of October there were 45 accidents and 11 injuries in auto accidents inside the city limits. In October, 1961, there were also 45 accidents but twice as many injuries, 22.

Failure to yield right-of-way and following too closely were the chief causes of the October accidents with a total of 18 mishaps attributed to these two causes. Three were caused by speeding, three by improper turns, one to drunken driver and 18 others to miscellaneous causes.

Red Chinese Report Aerial 'Provocation'

NEW DELHI (UPI) — The Indian army is still patrolling and still "in contact" with the Chinese along the cease-fire line established by the Communists on the northeast frontier, a Defense Ministry spokesman said today.

The spokesman refused to say whether there was any shooting by the Indian patrols, continuing the policy of not revealing the Indian stand on the cease-fire.

But it was apparent that the uneasy truce put into effect by Peking Wednesday still stood as United States and British fact-finding missions arranged defense aid talks with Indian officials.

Communist China, in a Peking Radio broadcast heard in Tokyo, charged that two Indian air force planes took "provocative action" over Communist positions Thursday in the western sector of the border, but said the Chinese did not fire on the planes "in accordance with their orders to cease fire."

Avoids Taking Stand
Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru avoided taking a stand on the Chinese cease-fire and offer of talks, but it was apparent that Indian as well as Chinese troops were observing the truce. Nehru warned in a speech Thursday night, however, that "the war with China will be a long drawn-out affair and it may take years."

Nehru today told parliament there had been no firing and no movement, either to retreat or advance, by Chinese forces since the proclamation of the cease-fire. But he still left unanswered whether Indian forces have been ordered to hold their fire.

To War Veterans Insurance Dividends To Be Distributed Earlier

WASHINGTON (UPI) — More than five million war veterans will get their government insurance dividends in January under a plan designed to help them with the Christmas bills and at the same time give the economy a needed boost.

President Kennedy announced the plan Thursday.

He said the Veterans Administration had been ordered to pay \$327.6 million worth of dividends in advance, instead of spreading them out over the whole year.

The sum includes \$222 million in the regular 1963 dividend for World War II policy holders, a special dividend of \$90 million to the same group, and \$15.6 million in dividends to World War I veterans who hold government life insurance policies.

Council Talks Of Getting Into Communications

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — The Ecumenical Council discussed today ways of moving into the field of modern communications so that "such a vast force will not be abandoned to evil."

The council, discussing the press, radio, television and films, heard suggestions that it set up an "official organization" to deal with such matters on an international, national and local basis.

In addition, the oral communique following today's 25th plenary session said "references were made to the institution of an international news agency."

Until the council opened, there had never been any official Vatican office to deal with the press. The Vatican City newspaper, *Osservatore Romano*, has an unofficial press office that sometimes distributes limited information.

In 1948 a special pontifical commission was established to deal with the movies and four years later it was expanded to cover radio and television. However, its function was not the distribution of information to these media.

The commission is headed by Bishop Martin J. O'Connor, a native of Scranton, Pa. Bishop O'Connor, rector of the North American College in Rome, also is head of the group which worked out the draft currently under study in the council.

The communique was the first to mention specifically what was contained in a draft before the council.

"Repeated agreement," it said, "was given to the proposals contained in the text for the institution of an office in the holy see or for the enlargement of the already existing pontifical commission which will have the task of creating an official organization on an international, national and diocesan basis for the communications media and for the purpose of informing and forming public opinion."

It said some of the 17 council members who spoke "stressed the necessity to study the theme, which is of primary importance, so that such a vast force will not be abandoned to evil because of the positive and negative influence on individuals and society."

JFK Reviews Cuban Situation

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — President Kennedy reviewed the Cuban situation today with key military and diplomatic advisers who were called to the chief executive's Cape Cod home from their posts in Washington and at the United Nations.

The conference brought together members of the National Security Council executive committee, a high level consultative body which has met with Kennedy almost daily since the presence of a Soviet nuclear threat was discovered in Cuba.

Four Confess Murder Of Lieutenant

TAIPEI, Formosa (UPI) — Chinese police said today they have arrested four Chinese thieves who confessed the murder of U. S. Army Lt. Col. Tom E. Glover last Oct. 3.

Glover, 51, Brownwood, Tex., was found dead in the burned-out ruins of his house on the outskirts of Taipei. His nose had been broken and his jaw dislocated.

The four suspects were arrested even though they had taken an oath in a Buddhist temple never to reveal how the officer was killed, police said.

They said the first break in the case came Oct. 24 when Pan Kao-shung, 21, was arrested in Keelung as he tried to sell loot from a burglary. Under police questioning Pan implicated himself and three others in the killing of Glover. They were identified as Hsueh-pao, 20, Lo Wen-chi, 19, and Chung Chen, 20. All four have criminal records.

Youth Shot In Hunting Mishap

AUSTIN (UPI) — Ben Harbour, 19, Austin, told sheriff's deputies Thursday he fired at what he thought was a "turkey or some kind of large bird" sitting in a tree 500 yards away.

"I heard a scream," Harbour said.

He said he then ran to the tree and found Billy Ed Nixon, 17, lying dead near the tree.

An autopsy showed Nixon was killed by a bullet from a .30-06 hunting rifle. The bullet struck just above the kidney.

19 Texans Killed During Holiday

A series of multiple-death highway accidents sent the Thanksgiving holiday death toll in Texas soaring.

At least 19 persons died violently in Texas during the holiday period starting at 6:00 p. m. Wednesday and ending at midnight Thursday. Sixteen of the deaths were caused by traffic accidents.

Two Area Youths Are Hurt In Gun Mishap

Nine-year-old Charles Audelman of Lefors, one of two children wounded in a shotgun accident while playing on a bridge just west of the Lefors city limits yesterday afternoon, was reported in good condition in Highland General Hospital today.

Hospital attendants said young Audelman, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Audelman, suffered shotgun wounds in the left leg and right foot.

Evelyn Jean Cullion, 9, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Cullion of Lefors, also suffered a shotgun pellet wound behind the left ear. It was removed and she was released from the hospital shortly after arrival.

Deputy Sheriff D. L. Day of Pampa and Deputy Bill McBee of Lefors who investigated the accident said two 14-year-old Lefors boys, Charles Day and Eddie Clemmons, had gone hunting and the Day youth had the shotgun.

The young hunters stopped on the bridge where the two children were and saw a deer hide in the creek bed below. Young Day leaned his gun against the side of the bridge and leaned over to watch while Clemmons went down to get the hide.

Investigating officers said the Day boy's hat blew off and the Cullion girl and Audelman boy ran after it. The gun apparently fell to the ground and was discharged.

The two children were brought to the Pampa hospital in the Lefors fire department ambulance.

Hospital authorities said young Audelman probably would be able to leave the hospital in a day or two.

Bandits Hit Packing Firm For \$50,770

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (UPI) — A gang of bandits wearing black hoods obtained \$50,770 in cash in a daylight holdup today at the Armour meat-packing plant here.

Police said the apparently well-planned robbery required only a few minutes.

The money was to be used by the Armour Credit Union in its operations today.

William M. Gilliam, credit union manager, and a Pinkerton guard, Louis Leimen, obtained the cash at the nearby Kaw Valley State Bank. Gilliam said they left the front door of the bank and walked about 100 feet to a side door at the Armour plant. As they entered, they noticed another Pinkerton guard, John Holzappel, lying on the floor.

When they started toward the prostrate guard, they were surrounded by three or four hooded men. Gilliam said. One of them threatened him with a pistol and whispered, "Let's have it."

He removed the canvas bag from Gilliam's shoulder. Then one of the bandits fired from 8 feet at Leimen, but missed. However, police said the gun may have contained a blank cartridge, as there was no evidence of a bullet.

ID Of Skeleton Up To Dentist

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (UPI) — Authorities today awaited confirmation from a Spearfish, S. D., dentist that a skeleton found four years ago in Arizona was that of a young girl who disappeared in Connecticut in 1952.

Officials here were nearly certain that the remains were those of Connie Smith, granddaughter of former Wyoming Gov. Nels H. Smith. The 10-year-old girl disappeared July 15, 1952, from Camp Sioane near Salisbury, Conn.

After studying the remains and a dental chart, Dr. John Spilley, a dentist here, said there was "only one chance in a million that they are not those of the same person."

The remains were being taken to Spearfish for positive identification by Dr. Floyd B. Ward, who said he did "a considerable amount" of dental work on the girl.

Connie was last seen on a highway near Lakeville, Conn. She was reported trying to thumb a ride near the Y' CA camp from which she disappeared.

Skeleton Found Later
Six years later the skeleton was found in a remote area near the Grand Canyon by two Yuma, Ariz., deer-hunters.

The case had nearly been forgotten when Sheriff Lee Echols of Yuma County mentioned the unexplained case in correspondence with Connecticut authorities.

When she disappeared she was 5 feet tall. The remains were believed to be those of a girl three inches taller.

Authorities asked:
"If the remains found in Arizona were those of Connie, does it mean the girl lived for five years after disappearing in Connecticut as indicated by the difference in height? And, if so, how did she live and what is her story?"

18 Die In Crash

SAO TOME, Portuguese West Africa (UPI) — A Portuguese air force transport exploded shortly after taking off from this equatorial island off West Africa today, killing 18 of the 32 persons aboard.

Authorities said the dead included servicemen and six women entertainers who apparently were on service tours for forces in Portuguese Angola farther to the south of the mainland.

Fourteen survived, including a badly injured policeman whose young daughter was among the victims.

Car Strikes Seven Waiting To Watch Aggie-UT Parade

AUSTIN (UPI) — A car ran out of control in an Austin parking lot Thursday, jumped across a curbing and a sidewalk and struck seven persons.

The most seriously injured was John Christian, 20, of Austin. Christian, a student at Texas A&M, was knocked down and caught under the car. Police said he was dragged about 150 feet by the roaring automobile. He was in serious condition early today.

Christian and his date, Vickie Green, 20, of Houston, were waiting for a parade featuring the band and marching units of Texas A&M, an annual event preceding the football game between the University of Texas and A&M.

Miss Green was knocked aside by the automobile. She suffered hip and leg injuries.

Police said parking lot attendant Joe Lloyd Stegall of Austin told them the car's accelerator apparently stuck.

The auto, dragging Christian beneath it, hit two parked cars and came to rest against a parking meter.

The parade had not started.

Key Club Gets \$523.54 For MD In Pampa Drive

Pampa Key Club members — 34 of them — gave up several hours of their Thanksgiving holiday yesterday and collected \$523.54 in the fund drive to aid the battle against Muscular Dystrophy.

DALLAS (UPI) — Motion picture theaters would go out of business if all theaters showed 'family-type' movies, Tim Ferguson, chairman of the board of the Texas Drive-In Theater Owners Association said. 'There is a definite lack of family-type films,' Ferguson said. The reason, he said, is that Hollywood producers consistently have taken a financial drubbing on family-type pictures. The only low key pictures that consistently do well at the box office are the Walt Disney productions, Ferguson said. One studio, he said, lost \$20 million in 1960 on eight films of the kind parents like to take their children to. 'I played every one of them,' he said. 'The attendance was very poor.' Ferguson was replying to a Dallas group which claims its objective is promotion of more non-offensive films.

The 'Toughest' Moral Problem

By LOUIS CASSELS United Press International The bishops of the Episcopal Church have taken a man-sized swing at the toughest moral problem confronting Christians today. The problem is defining an attitude toward modern war which is consistent both with the teachings of Christ and with the realities of the world situation. Its difficulty is attested by the large number of people who have despaired of satisfying both requirements. Some have retreated from realism by espousing unilateral disarmament. Others have retreated from Christian teachings by condoning a policy of massive retaliation.

war over Cuba, the Episcopal bishops insisted on facing both horns of the dilemma. The result was a down-to-earth statement outlining the principles which the church must uphold in approaching nuclear war on the basis of "Christian realism." Deserves Wider Attention The bishops' statement received relatively little news coverage at the time it was issued, because the papers were full of the Cuban crisis. Now that things have quieted down a bit, it deserves wider attention, not only from Episcopalians, to whom it was directed, but from all Americans who want their country to preserve its freedoms without forfeiting its soul. Rejecting the pacifist argument that it is sinful even to possess nuclear weapons, the bishops said forthrightly that "the United States must remain strong militarily" as long as the threat of aggression hangs over the world. "The church recognizes," they said, "that a strong military posture does serve as a deterrent to an aggressor nation intent upon military conflict."

influence to insure that any war which breaks out anywhere in the world is limited. "In any armed conflict, we must set clearly defined objectives and cease to wage war when they are achieved." "When world disarmament is feasible, the weapons of war, including all nuclear weapons, must be abolished." Although they accepted limited war as a possible instrument of national policy — and did so at an hour when the issue was far from theoretical — the Episcopal bishops stressed the obligation of Christian individuals and nations to preserve peace by every honorable means available. War Always Evil War, they made clear, however limited in scope and however just in motive, is always an evil which Christians must try desperately to prevent, and to which they may resort only when there is sound hope of thereby avoiding an even greater evil. "For a Christian," the bishops said, "there is no loyalty which transcends his loyalty to the will of God... We are citizens of our own nation and fulfill its civic obligations; yet we are part of a universal brotherhood which God wills for His people, and under a demand to make this evident in all that we do. "Our Lord died for Russians, East Indians and Chinese as well as for Americans."

Telegram ratings, ranked fifth by the Dallas News, and UPI rates them seventh.

The most dangerous offensive threat in the Panhandle, John Mark Worst of Sunray, will be at the helm leading the Bobcats. Worst has compiled over 2300 yards offensively this year. The senior quarterback, 147-pounder, has connected on 70 of 112 passes for over 1200 yards this season. He has gained over 1100 yards rushing.

One of the fastest Bobcats, halfback Johnny Johnson, has gained 1260 yards rushing and caught 44 of Worst's aeriels this season. Johnson has accounted for 194 points this season.
