Cmdr. Thomas Alan Bryce of Wichita Falls, a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon E. Moore, 501 N. Hazel, Pampa, will be commander of the nation's newest Polaris submarine, The Henry Clay SSD(N) 625, which will be commissioned in ceremonies at Newport News, Va., Friday.

Cmdr. Bryce, who has visited in Pampa numerous times, formerly resided in Amarillo. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alan T. Bryce, now reside in Wichita Falls.

Bryce and several community leaders in Wichita Falls will be present at the commissioning day. Sponsor will be Mrs. Green B. Gibson, a descendant of Henry Clay, for whom the new nuclear submarine is named.

Cmdr. Bryce graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1945 and was assigned to the battleship USS Nevada, which he boarded while it was in Philippine wa-

He was born in Electra. circumnavigated the globe in a 33,000-mile voyage in 1957-58.

In 1959 he became executive officer of the USS George Washingon, the Navy's first fleet ballistic missile submarine.

The third group of Volunteers to go to the Dominican Republic will depart for that country. Tuesday, November 27, to work in the field of rural community develop-

At the present time there are 39 Peace Corps Volunteers in the Dominican Republic: 18 men and women who departed October 30 to teach English, and 21 men who have been there since July working on rural development.

The 25 Volunteers (all men) in the departing group will actually augment this first group. One of the main purposes of the project is to assist the Ministry of Agriculture to implement the Rural Development Service as a forerunner of a professional agricultural extension service. Some of the major programs planned and underway are: elementary agricultural education, reforestation, rural youth organization, agricultural cooperatives and community activities.

The Volunteers will mostly be located in the fertile Cibao Valley. They will stress the use of improved agricultural practices and techniques through extension

The Volunteers were prepared for their tasks by a month of ceremonies set for 11:30 a.m. Fri- vigorous physical conditioning at the Peace Corps Camp in Puerto Rico last August. This was followed by two months of intensive training at the University of Puerto Rico studying Spanish, courses on the Dominican Republic, American studies, health, and technical studies in agricultural extension.

They can and do sometimes wreck an industry that provides the work and wages for members of their union. The case of a small steel company in Buffalo is an example. Because the boss of the local labor union refused to adjust the wage scale so it could operate, the plant shift down and 450 emplayes were out of work. Another steel plant in the same city, with 350 workers, tried to negotiate a contract with the union on a scale that would permit the continuance of operation. The union refused. All those employes were then jobless, because the plant closed. These are but a couple of many such cases. In most instances the workers, as individuals, would have gladly accepted some small reduction is pay, rather than be thrown out of work by the closing of the industry. But no. That is not the "policy" of the bosses in the union offices. Rule or wreck the plant, seems to be their creed. In fact the state director of the steel workers union, in the Buffalo area said "a man should not have to pay dues to a union to get his wages cut." So instead of a minor cut, they get nothing.

The head of a clerks union for supermarkets in California says he will demand a 30-hour week, in the next contract he negotiates with the markets. Of course he will demand the same pay as at present. If the Federal Labor Relations Board compels the markets to accept such extortionate demands, it will affect the pocketbook of everyone who buys food. Again the dollar will be on the toboggan. Many of us work 48 to 60 hours a week and more, with-

out finding it too exhausting. There is a tendency for some workers in the newer industries to reject the proposals of greedy labor bosses. More than 50,000 geles area voted to disregard President Kennedy's biased urging for a union shop. The efforts of the AFL-CIO to get bargaining power, was voted down by those employes. 

AUSTIN (UPI)-Some hunters are still confused about the use of this year's "bonus deer" tag Fish Commission said today.

Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the commission, gave hunters today the following outline of using the tags:

-"First of all, a bonus deer tag can be used only on antlerless or doe deer. It cannot be used on buck deer.

-"Before you can use this tag you must have an antierles deer permit. The permit can be obtained only from the landowner on whose land you are hunting. -You must have this antierless deer permit before you can kill
