### 4,000 Killed In Similar Blight Ten Years Ago Mayor Says Bonds Not

LONDON (UPI) — The worst English smog since a "kil-fog" that claimed 4,000 lives 10 years ago blanketed this ind nation today in an opaque shroud of moisture and dirt. Metropolitan police said at least 32 deaths had been re-ported since midnight Monday, most of them due to fog. The normal death rate for the 700-square mile area is six to eight.

Tas coming of the Pilgrims to the New England coast in 1620 forms a glamorous chapter in American history. The fact that is generally ignored, overlooked and unknown about this landing at Massachusetts Bay 342 years ago is that it marked the first communist settlement in America. The main lesson about this settlement that is generally ignored, overlooked and unknown is that this experiment is communism failed within three years' time, and - for their very survival - the Pilgrims had to turn to what we know as the free enterprise system.

Through the years, it would have been - and it still woulda valuable lesson to the pupils in the classrooms studying American history if this lesson in the failure of Communism - some people call it socialism; there is no real difference - were em-

phasized. Before landing, the Pilgrims entered into what is known as the Mayflower Compact. Under this Compact, Plymouth was set up as a share-the-wealth community. Nobody owned anything. Whatever was produced belonged to the community as a whole. They called this system "the commone course and condition." They lived under this system from the desperate, disease - ridden first win-






