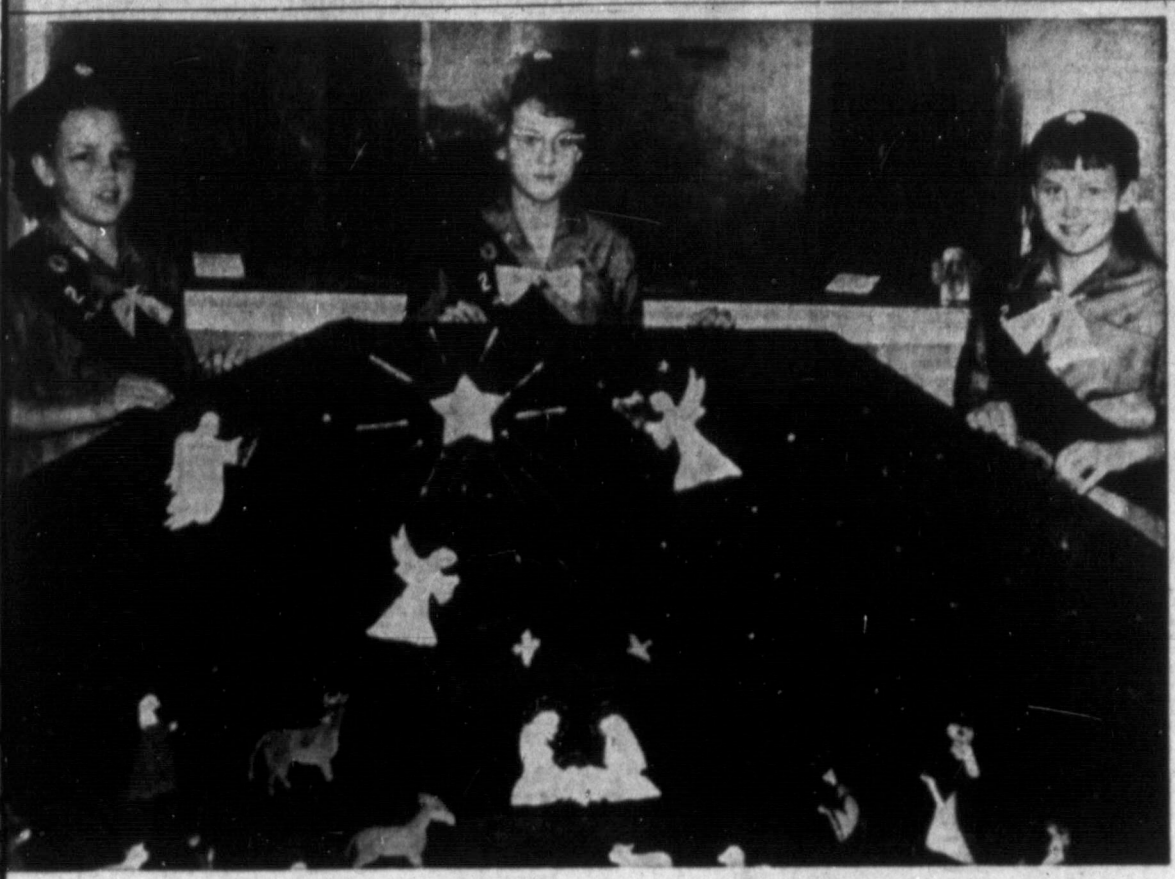

Smog Blankets England; 32 Fog Deaths Reported

4,000 Killed In Similar Blight Ten Years Ago

LONDON (UPI) — The worst English smog since a "killer fog" that claimed 4,000 lives 10 years ago blanketed this island nation today in an opaque shroud of moisture and dirt.

Metropolitan police said at least 32 deaths had been reported since midnight Monday, most of them due to fog. The normal death rate for the 700-square mile area is six to eight.

The British Medical Association urged outdoor workers to wear masks, bronchitis sufferers to stay indoors, and the burning of smokeless fuel to keep down smog.

Visibility over England-Wales and Scotland escaped the fog — was cut to nil in many places. All planes were grounded. Hundreds of minor auto accidents were reported.

Ten persons were hurt in Birmingham when a bus driver hit waiting passengers he could not see.

The Weather Bureau predicted the smog, mixed with treacherous

front, would last another 48 hours. Druggists issued "smog masks" and doctors urged old people, children and persons with weak chests to stay indoors.

Carrier Of Death
The fog was not the wings, creeping kind that calls up sinister images of Limehouse, Jack the Ripper and Mack the Knife, but a grim carrier of potential death.

It hugged the smoke from a million chimneys and the exhaust from a million autos to the ground in a suffocating pall that recalled the four-day killer fog that started Dec. 5, 1952.

Four thousand Britons died of bronchitis — "the British disease" — during that fog. Many more are believed to have died months or years later of lung damage caused then.

The fog first formed early Tuesday, cutting daylight visibility to nine feet in many areas. It lifted slightly during the day, then fell again at dusk with an impenetrability that turned pedestrians into blind men bumping into lightposts and stumbling over curbs.

People Walk
Empty buses crept through the streets, deserted by passengers who could walk quicker. Girls on dates walked ahead of their boyfriends' cars, watching for intersections and warning them of curbs they could not see.

Streetlights were mere pinpricks of yellow.

The fog probed under doors to fill homes with a faint mist.

Barnett Facing Contempt Action By Government

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Department plans to file criminal contempt proceedings next week against Gov. Ross Barnett as a result of the University of Mississippi integration riot of Sept. 30.

The action, ordered by the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans last month, will set in motion legal procedure that could oust Barnett's term of office. If so, any punishment ordered in the case would be brought against a former governor rather than one still in office.

Barnett's four-year term expires in January of 1964. Under the Mississippi constitution he cannot succeed himself.

U.S. attorneys will file in New Orleans a brief charging Barnett with criminal contempt. The case will be given time to answer the government's charges before a hearing is set and the case is subject to other delays. A similar contempt proceeding against Theron Lynd, registrar of Forney County, Miss., filed last May, has not been decided.

The Justice Department is expected to contend that Barnett is not entitled to a jury trial, that the case should be tried by the appeals court itself.

U.S. Gov. Paul Johnson, who is expected to run for governor next year, also was included in the criminal contempt proceedings as ordered by the court, but he is not directly involved in the main government charge against Barnett — that he failed to maintain law and order on the campus and cooperate with federal officials after promising Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy he would do so.

Cites Lack Of Cooperation From CoC

Mayor Says Bonds Not Opposed, Commission Is

Mayor E. C. Sidwell declared in a statement read at last night's City Commission meeting that there is no great opposition to the \$1,750,000 bond issue to be voted on in next Tuesday's election, but that there is opposition to the City Commission that favors it.

The mayor brought the point out in answering the question: "Why is there so much under-recovered opposition to the bond issue?"

Mayor Sidwell also stated that the commission has not had full cooperation from the Chamber of Commerce in matters vital to Pampa's progress and welfare.

"I do not mean to say that we have not had cooperation from individual members of the chamber of commerce," the mayor said, "but as an organization we have not had its cooperation."

Commissioner Will Graham said he recently talked with a number of young businessmen about the bond issue.

"I am appalled," Graham said, "that most of these men with whom I have talked are in favor of the bond issue, but they are afraid to say so publicly."

"I don't understand what they are afraid of. I don't know what sort of monster we have stalking about in Pampa that would cause this."

Mayor Sidwell said it also was amazing to him that many of the people who had come to him and donated money to promote the passage of the bond issue did not want it known that they had contributed.

"There is no apparent open opposition to the bond issue," the mayor said, "but the opposition comes from those who are against the commission which favors the bond issue."

The mayor's statement follows in full:

"More than a year ago your City Commission asked our City Manager and Engineering Department to give us a plan for inter-city highways. We were advised that the main obstacle in maintaining present highways and providing new, safe, modern inter-city highways was the existing drainage problems. We, therefore, asked the engineers to present us with a program for handling the drainage program: This report was furnished us about the first of April of this year. Since that time we have consistently conferred with State Highway engineers and local consulting engineers, and it is history that an election was held on October 30th to provide sufficient funds for the program. It is also history that the bond issue failed by a total of 43 votes.

"It was called to our attention before this election was held that we should include in our program the drainage problem presently existing around Highway 70 on Hobart Street effecting the area around the Robert E. Lee School. After the election was held and it failed by such a small majority, and the fact that we were contacted by so many people asking to call another election, it was decided to call an election for December 11th and include in the program the drainage of the Robert E. Lee area.

"We have had an open door policy in our City Hall deliberations and have consistently sought advice from all taxpayers, including organizations (this includes the Chamber of Commerce as an organization) that should be vitally interested in Pampa's progress and welfare. The time, energy and expense in connection with promotion of the bond election held October 30th was entirely donated by interested taxpayers and likewise the promotion, advertising and education for the election to be held December 11th. Adlai Hits Back, Says He Won't Be Asked To Resign Over Article

NEW YORK (UPI) — Adlai Stevenson, under fire as a result of national magazine article concerning his role in the Cuban crisis, said today he did not know whether President Kennedy would make a public statement supporting him.

"I have had no discussion with the President," Stevenson said on a television show (NBC's "Today").

Asked if he thought he might be requested to resign as U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations as the result of an article in the Saturday Evening Post, Stevenson snapped: "On the contrary."

He said the article, by Stewart Alsop and Charles Barrett, is "as classic an example of irresponsible journalism as I have ever witnessed."

"It is untrue as to what I proposed. It is untrue as to what I opposed."

Favored Blockade
Stevenson said that in the executive committee of the National Security Council he emphatically supported an armed blockade of Cuba and "equally emphatically opposed an invasion of Cuba at the risk of world war until peace-keeping machinery of the United Nations had been used. This was the policy approved by the President," he said.

"I hope the time has not come in the United States when it is considered better to advocate war to settle disputes rather than use peaceful means."

Stevenson deplored the breach of NSC security evidenced in the article and said Kennedy had taken the position that consultations with his top advisers must always remain private.

"Because I agree with the President's position, I am somewhat inhibited in telling you more

Man Arrested After Shooting At Hoffa

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — A man dressed in a trench coat ran into the federal courtroom where Teamsters' chief James Hoffa is being tried today and fired several shots at Hoffa with what appeared to be a pellet gun.

Hoffa jumped up and knocked the man down as federal marshals ran to his assistance and beat the man to the floor with pistol butts.

As the man was dragged bleeding from the courtroom, Federal Judge William Miller called a recess and said he wanted a full report on who the man was and what he was doing.

Hoffa said, "I saw the gun as he ran and I jumped up and knocked the s.o.b. down."

Hoffa asked Miller to have the blood on the floor mopped up so the jury would not see it. The jury was out of the room at the time.

Hoffa told newsmen he did not know who the man was.

"He is just some jerk," he said.

The man, escorted by two U.S. marshals, was taken from the federal building to General Hospital for treatment. He was wearing a grey suit and a white shirt which was clotted with blood.

As the man fell to the floor, one of the spectators rushed through the gate separating the spectator's section and kicked him in the face. Marshals immediately ordered everyone back behind the railing.

Miller had excused the jurors just a few minutes before while attorneys argued a legal point.

Hoffa is being tried on charges that he violated the Taft-Hartley law by accepting \$1 million in payments from a truck leasing firm with which his union held labor contracts.

'We Supposed They Were Headed For Cuba'

US Customs Agents Grab Boatload Of 'Guerillas' In 'Training Exercises'

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) — The leader of a battle-garbed band of guerrillas arrested by U.S. customs agents in a boat in the Florida Keys Tuesday said the group was holding "training exercises" and had no intention of invading Cuba.

"We have been doing this for several months. It has never been anything but training exercises," said Gerald Patrick Hemming, a 6-foot-7, bearded former Marine.

"We supposed they were headed for Cuba," customs agent Wallace Shanley, a U.S. commissioner, said at a preliminary hearing for the men. He said the 31-foot boat the men were aboard "was capable of the voyage."

Hemming, 25, and his 12 followers were held in lieu of \$1,000 bond each. A U.S. marshal was to bring them to Miami for federal court action.

The men all pleaded innocent to a charge of violating U.S. neutrality laws by "an attempt to form an expedition to invade a foreign country."

Lay In Wait
Six customs officers had lain in wait for two days and two nights while the warriors worked to get the motor started on their rented boat. The officers moved in and arrested the men early Tuesday just as the motor finally cranked up at a dock at Sombrero Key, near Marathon in the Florida Keys.

Found aboard the boat, named Saily, were 15 rifles, five pistols, several boxes of ammunition, blood plasma and first aid supplies, one hand grenade and two plastic bombs.

The group included one Cuban, a Canadian and 11 Americans. They said they had been training for six months on No Name Key, a dense island accessible only by boat and located about 40 miles northeast of Key West and less than 100 miles from Cuba.

The group, which calls itself "interpen" for intercontinental penetration force, was formed by Hemming in early 1961 for an assault against Cuba, but the fortunes of the group rose and fell with political developments. In recent months, Hemming and his men have staged a number of training demonstrations with live ammunition for newsmen visiting the Keys to write about the Cuban situation.

Several Practice Landings
The group has also made several practice landings.

Russia Pressing For UN Council Wrapup Of Problem Over Cuba

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) — The Soviet Union was pressing today for a Security Council meeting to wrap up the Cuban crisis although U.S. demands still have not been fully satisfied.

Deputy Soviet Foreign Minister Vasily V. Kuznetsov late Tuesday gave U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson a detailed schedule for the shipment of Russian IL28 bombers out of Cuba.

Cuban Ambassador Carlos Lechuga submitted to Secretary General Thant a draft of what informed sources said was the Castro government's conception of a crisis statement to be made at a Security Council session.

U.S. Unimpressed
The United States, which does not favor a formal council meeting, was reported "unimpressed" with the Cuban draft.

Stevenson said he and Kuznetsov had "further discussion of our differences" after the Russian gave him the shipping schedule. There was no change in the basic positions.

The United States insists upon adequate verification of the removal of Soviet offensive weapons systems from Cuba and fool-proof safeguards against their reintroduction.

Withheld No Invasion Pledge
Russia ostensibly has been unable to persuade Cuba to give such assurances, and until they are forthcoming the United States refuses to pledge that there will not be any invasion of Cuba.

The United Nations was more directly concerned with its financial crisis, which was not helped when France joined Russia Tuesday in refusing to accept responsibility for costs of the Congo operation.

Both France and Russia challenged the General Assembly's authority to levy such assessments despite a World Court opinion that could make them binding.

Burglar Gets \$207 From Billfold Theft

A burglar broke into the home of C. L. Ennis, 815 E. Albert, sometime during last night and stole a billfold containing \$207, according to a report filed with police this morning.

The billfold was taken from the pocket of a pair of trousers which were removed from a chair in Ennis' bedroom, the report said.

Police Captain Denny Roan, who investigated the case, said the trousers and the billfold were found on the ground outside the kitchen window.

Captain Roan said the theft apparently occurred while Mr. and Mrs. Ennis and their four children slept.

Bobby McWhirter, 624 E. Foster, reported to police that \$100 worth of sheet metal tools were stolen from a truck parked in front of his home. He said the theft occurred between 12 and 1 p.m. yesterday.

Police were called to McCrley's Jewelry Store, 108 N. Cuyler, at 2:30 p.m. yesterday when it was discovered that someone had attempted to cut a small hole in a plate glass display window.

Police said apparently a glass-cutter was used but the would-be burglar was frightened away before he could complete the job. The marks on the glass were directly in front of a valuable ring in the window display, police said.

Roan Named Police Captain; City Charter Committee Is Considered

Denny Roan, Pampa police captain who resigned from the force early this year and then returned to the force last Aug. 13 as a patrolman, was re-instated to his captaincy by unanimous action of the City Commission last night.

The re-instatement was given upon the recommendation of Police Chief Jim Conner and City Manager Harold Schmitzer.

Roan has been a member of the department for 16 years. The vacancy left by his resignation never had been filled.

The commission also voted to build a 21 by 11 feet concrete block comfort station and auxiliary police office at the northwest corner of Oklahoma and Octavus streets in Pampa's Negro section. The building will be erected at a cost of \$2,000. The action was approved unanimously on the recommendation of Ward 4 Commissioner L. P. Fort and City Manager Schmitzer.

In other business the commission decided to consider names for appointment to a five-man advisory board to work in conjunction with the chamber of commerce to study proposed changes in the Pampa city charter which may be submitted to city voters late in January.

The commission also received bids from five firms on a rubber tired tractor with Backhoe attachment. Public Works Director R. B. Cooke and City Manager Schmitzer were asked to study the bids and announce the letting of the contract at next week's meeting. Bids were received from the Caprock Equipment Co. of Amarillo, Pitts Farm Equipment Co. of Pampa, Tom W. Carpenter Equipment Co., Hatcher Equipment & Supply Co. of Pampa, and International Harvester Co.

A motion was approved to authorize for payment \$17,218.34 to Ray Boswell Contracting Co. for paving projects approved by Acting City Engineer Wayland Merfman.

An ordinance was given first reading by the commission to authorize the installation of one-hour parking meters on the west side of N. Somerville between W. Falls and W. Kingsmill streets. The meters will be installed in front of the new Hughes Bldg. among

"The program consists of two months basic training at one of several military installations such as Fort Polk, La., along with other locations, which is followed with eight weeks of advanced individual training and is climaxed with basic unit training," Captain Hurdle added.

He emphasized there are no restrictions in regard to race, religion or creed in becoming a member of the storied T-Patch outfit. A young man is required to pass the AFQT and physical examination.

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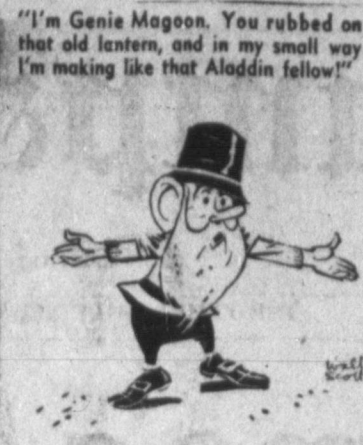

Inhabitants of Island Want To Go Back Home

LONDON (UPI) — Thirteen months ago, all 260 inhabitants of Tristan da Cunha, "the loneliest island in the world," plunged suddenly into the mainstream of 20th century life.

For the first time, they were exposed to television and telephones, neon lights and nylon stockings, buses and barrooms, juke boxes and traffic jams.

Today they said they've had enough. The people of Tristan da Cunha have voted to go home.

Home is a tiny British-owned island in the South Atlantic, midway between Africa and South America and a thousand miles from anywhere.

Rugged Life
A few hardy seafarers, joined by shipwrecked sailors, made Tristan da Cunha their home 150 years ago. Their descendants grew up knowing nothing but the rugged life of fishermen, shepherds and potato farmers.

That life, religious and extremely simple, was brought to a halt when the island's volcano erupted last year. The British government brought the people to England to live.

They were housed in an unused Royal Air Force camp and began to learn the ways of modern England. Most of the men took jobs as laborers. Three of the islanders died of pneumonia during the first English winter.

Back home, the volcano gradually subsided. Two days ago, the British government passed out ballots to all adult Tristanians. One choice said, "I want to stay in England." The other said, "I want to return to Tristan."

Wide Majority
It wasn't even close. By secret ballot they voted 148-3 to go home.

Willie Repetto, 50, the island's leader, told why: "Everything here is so bleak, desolate and meaningless," he said. "Everything here freezes a man's soul." "Back home, sir, we don't know none of this constant fight to get your bread and butter. It is like living in heaven permanent out there. "Television? We won't miss it."

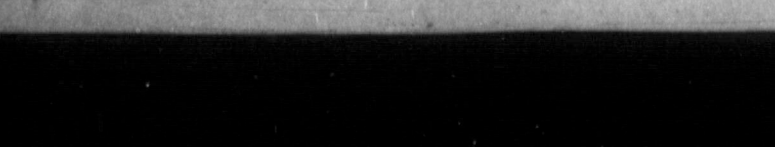

New this year is a calendar that is comparable but different. This is a quaint hand-screened Belgian linen wall hanging with a Christmas tree as the central motif, and tiny numbered packets across top and bottom.

Included in the package are a

supply of Christmas miniature ornaments. They are tucked into the pockets at one.

Each day, the honored child takes one ornament from its pocket and hangs it on the tree, which has tiny holes for the purpose. When Christmas finally arrives, the hanging serves as a gay decoration through the holidays.

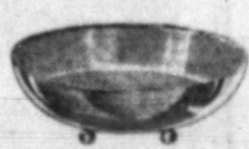

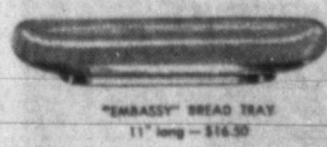

Stock Betters 'Pokes In Rodeo Series Action

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The best of the ranges of Canada and the United States try for the upper hand tonight over rough riding and hard-to-throw livestock in the second go-round of the "World Series of Rodeo"—the National Championships.

An enthusiastic and surprisingly large first night crowd of 8,719 turned out Tuesday night to watch championship stock take the measure of championship cowboys.

Typical of the comeuppance given the outstanding cowhands was the ride a big 2,000-pound Brahma bull named "Nitro" gave Ronnie Rossen of Broadus, Tex.

Perfect Tossing Record
Nitro had been out 38 times this year going into Tuesday night's opening session and 24 times he had tossed his rider.

Rossen, the 1961 championship bull rider, became victim No. 27—slamming down on the dirt-covered floor of the huge Memorial Sports Arena.

However, some cowboys were able to remain astride their animals—though the number was small—and picked up prize money in the first performance of the six-day, eight-session event.

There are 98 competitors, who are the best of 2,000 that competed in more than 500 Rodeo Cowboy Association (RCA) rodeos. And the ones who didn't earn loot Tuesday night will have many more chances in the \$65,000 championships, which for the first time in its four-year history is being held outside of Dallas.

New York Mets Need Everything

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Mets need "everything" to climb out of the National League cellar, but they're not interested in acquiring such fading stars as Duke Snider and Early Wynn.

"We had a lot of big names last year and we didn't win," club President George Weiss said Tuesday at a news conference.

"We have to start thinking in that (winning) direction," Snider, the 36-year-old Los Angeles Dodgers outfielder, was one of New York's most popular players before the team left Brooklyn. He reportedly can be had now for the right price.

Weiss, though, insisted that Snider "never has been offered to us in a cash deal," and added that "with the hope that we'll be in our new ballpark next season, I doubt if he (Snider) would have as much value to us as in the Polo Grounds."

As for the 42-year-old Wynn, Weiss said he was offered to the Mets by General Manager Ed Short of the Chicago White Sox with the suggestion that "he'd be worth a lot of publicity value to you when he wins his 300th game."

However, Weiss explained that Manager Casey Stengel isn't interested in Wynn, who closed out the 1962 season with 299 major league victories and has been given permission by the White Sox to make a deal for himself.

Asked what the Mets, who lost a record 120 games last season, needed most, Weiss smilingly replied, "Everything."

Turning serious, the veteran baseball executive said the team still is seeking a couple of left-handed hitting outfielders, pitchers ("You never have enough of them") and a regular shortstop.

"We still have hopes of swinging a deal," Weiss added. "There are nine days left to the inter-league trading period. We have a couple of things on the fire."

Duke, West Virginia Take Easy Victories

Art Heyman of Duke is confronted with an unusual obstacle in his bid for All-America honors—he tries too hard.

The chief charge leveled against the sharpshooting senior is that he sometimes gets too enthusiastic about his chores on a basketball court. As a result, he has gotten into occasional jams ever since his sophomore year for throwing punches instead of the ball.

But when Heyman devotes his many talents to basketball, there are few collegians who can rank as his equal. The 6-5, 205-pounder from Rockville Centre, N. Y., proved this once again Tuesday night when he scored 28 points to lead second-ranked Duke to a 95-63 romp over South Carolina.

West Virginia Wins
The two other nationally ranked teams which saw action Tuesday night also came through with expected victories. West Virginia, No. 4 in the first weekly United Press International rating, trounced VMI, 100-74, and sixth-ranked Mississippi State opened its season with a convincing 90-55 triumph over Arkansas A&M.

Although Heyman scored twice as many points as anyone else on his team, the Blue Devils still showed a well-balanced attack with five men hitting in double figures. Joining Heyman were Dennis Ferguson and Fred Schmidt with 14 points each, Jay Buckley with 13 and Jeff Mullins with 11.

Grab Early Lead
Duke got off to an early lead and South Carolina never was able to present a serious threat. The Blue Devils stayed hot throughout and hit on 67.3 per cent of their shots.

Heyman has a good chance to replace current baseball star Dick Groat as the leading scorer in Duke history. Groat, who finished his collegiate career in 1962, totaled 1,886 points. Heyman entered his final season with 1,237 points and is third on the Duke all-time list.

West Virginia also had all five of its starters score in double figures, with guard Jim McCormick leading the attack with 22 points. Gale Catlett followed with 17 points, Rod Thorn had 15, Tom Lowry 12 and Mike Wolfe 11.

Long Beach Pads ABL Lead

The Long Beach Chiefs are threatening to make a complete runaway of the American Basketball League pennant race.

The Chiefs, who were finally beaten after winning their first 10 games, got right back on the winning track Tuesday night with an easy 121-100 victory over the second-place Pittsburgh Rens. The triumph boosted Long Beach into a 4½-game lead over the Rens.

Bill Spivey, the 7-1 center, and Ben Worley led the Long Beach attack with 23 points each and Jerry Grote added 22.

In the only other ABL game Tuesday night, the Philadelphia Tapers routed the Chicago Majors, 113-87. The Tapers, who led by only three at halftime, rallied for 33 points in the third quarter while holding Chicago to 11. Cy Clye had 35 points for Philadelphia and Tony Jackson had 19 for the Majors.

Nebraska Meets Miami In Gotham

NEW YORK (UPI)—Nebraska mauled the last time it met a Southern team in a bowl game, hopes to present the university with its first post-season college football winner in the Dec. 15 Gotham Bowl against Miami (Fla.) at Yankee Stadium.

Nebraska has appeared in two previous bowl games, losing to Duke in the Orange Bowl in 1953, 24-7, and to a Frankie Albert-led Stanford team in the 1941 Rose Bowl, 21-13.

The Cornhuskers took 11 seconds to decide on the Gotham trip Tuesday after receiving a firm invite from bowl director Bob Curran.

Miami got the nod by beating Florida last Saturday night. Hurricane Coach Andy Gustafson was elated over the bid because it gave his players a chance to play in New York and cut down the practice period required for a late December bowl game.

The March of Dimes will be the principle beneficiary of the game, with the competing schools receiving mutually acceptable fees as contracted between the Gotham officials and the NCAA.

Curran said the game will be nationally televised by the American Broadcasting Co., which has a two-year contract for the Gotham and an option clause for further agreements.

Convicted Fixers Face Sentencing

RALEIGH, N.C. (UPI)—Two convicted St. Louis basketball game "fixers" were to be sentenced today after their conviction on a total of 32 counts of conspiracy and bribery to rig college scores.

Superior Court Judge Heman R. Clark was to hand down judgments in the case of Dave Goldberg, found guilty of 18 counts, and Steve Lekometros, convicted of 14 counts.

The two defendants faced a maximum penalty of five years imprisonment on each count.

Five other defendants who have entered either no contest or guilty pleas will be sentenced in Wake County Superior Court Thursday.

Deliberate Two Hours
An all-male jury deliberated two hours late Tuesday evening after hearing four and one-half hours of instructions from Clark.

Following a county-by-count poll of the panel, Clark dismissed two defense motions—to set aside the verdict as "contrary to the evidence" and for a new trial on the grounds of "errors committed" during the 12-day trial.

If appeals are to be filed in the case, they would come after Clark handed down his judgment.

Prosecutors Lester V. Chalmers paraded four former N.C. State basketball players to the stand

but the major portion of his case revolved around the testimony of two admitted "payoff" men in games involving State College from Dec. 5, 1959 through Jan. 7, 1961.

Testify For State
Joseph Greene and Aaron (The Bagman) Wagman testified as state witnesses and told of their participation with Goldberg and Lekometros in an alleged nationwide conspiracy to rig college basketball scores by bribing players to "shave points."

In addition to Wagman and Greene, Paul Walker, Lou Barshak and Mike Siegal, all of New York, testified for the state. Walker has also pleaded guilty and Barshak and Siegal have entered no contest pleas.

Former Wolfpack players testifying were Don Gallacher, Stan Niewierowski, Anton Muehlbauer and Terry Litefield. Goldberg and Lekometros did not take the stand during the trial.

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Mailing Early Can Help Make Holiday Happier

If you are hoping to make this Christmas really merry, Postmaster O. K. Gaylor may be your Santa Claus.

The postmaster says that for most people, mailing is one of the heaviest chores at Christmas. By making the job as simple as possible, a happier holiday is likely to result, he observed. Virtually all Christmas mail can be disposed of now, Gaylor stated, by observing the following five suggestions:

1. Do your shopping for your Christmas parcels now.
2. Check and revise mailing lists.
3. Mail Christmas parcels promptly. Don't worry about being early — just mail them marked "Do not open until Christmas."
4. Buy Christmas cards and address them soon, separate cards into Out-Of-Town and Local bundles. Hold them for early mailing.
5. Buy plenty of stamps now while post office windows are uncrowded.

For Christmas cards, the post office department recommends its attractive new first-time 4 cent Christmas stamps. Their use insures first-class mail treatment.

To speed Christmas card handling, letter carriers and the post office has available free supplies of "local" and "out-of-town" labels. In most areas, postal patrons will find that a supply of these will be left in their mail box, or they may be had from carriers or the local post office for the asking. And—just as an additional peace-of-mind safeguard about parcels this Christmas—the Postmaster urges senders to insure them.

Postmaster Gaylor noted that—despite the department's efforts over many years to promote good packaging and addressing—the postal service each year has been unable to deliver, or return, about half a million parcels, including many lost because of poor packaging or incorrect addressing.

"Sensible mailing practices, including early shopping and mail deposit, make Christmas so much better I can't see why everybody doesn't do it," Gaylor said.

In binding the men over to federal court, U.S. Commissioner W. V. Albury told them:

"The United States government is attempting to settle the Cuban situation and it doesn't help when isolated groups interfere with its plans. You men could upset the whole apparatus."

Cities that are not dominated by a favored few enjoying the benefits of safe, modern, efficient highways while our highway programs have been stagnated for years?

"The answer to this is that the cities that have progressed have had imagination, energy and a cooperative spirit. I regret to state that this has not been the case in our city.

"Your Commission has consistently worked to reduce expenditures and at the same time provide the best working conditions for our employees. I invite the taxpayers to our new city garage and warehouse installations, and then ask them to refer back to the squalor and mismanaged conditions under which our employees worked prior to this administration. These improvements have been paid for without a bond issue. Last year we reduced the budget \$92,000.00 over the prior year and inaugurated some future plans whereby we can continue to reduce our general operating costs and tax rate.

Government Adopts Tough Housing Stand

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The government has adopted a comparatively tough set of rules for applying President Kennedy's anti-discrimination order to public housing and urban renewal projects.

The rules, announced Tuesday, appear to contemplate closer application of the order where direct federal subsidy is involved than where government assistance takes the form of mortgage insurance.

For example: —When a city sells land in an urban renewal project to a private developer, it must attach a perpetual covenant prohibiting future discrimination in sale, rental or use of the property.

—A public housing project, operated in violation of anti-discrimination clauses in the federal aid contract can be seized and operated by the government. These projects normally are owned by local housing authorities.

—Privately owned facilities in an urban renewal project, such as a lunch counter or barber shop, must be open to all project residents without discrimination.

This would apply also to public facilities, such as schools and parks, outside the project if their construction by the city were counted towards the community's one-third contribution to the project. Again, however, the non-discrimination requirement would apply only to project residents. The federal government pays two-thirds of the net cost to the city

of an urban renewal venture. An exception to this "facilities" rule would be granted, according to William L. Slayton, head of the Urban Renewal Administration, if the city showed that "the facility is either city-wide in character or not necessary to provide convenience goods and services" to project residents.

The executive order is binding only for projects on which final local-federal contracts were entered into after Nov. 20, the date Kennedy signed the executive order.

But Robert C. Weaver, the U.S. housing administrator, implied that pressure may be brought to end discrimination in older projects. He noted at a press conference that there is "a continuing relationship" between federal and local authorities. The implication appeared to be that discrimination in projects not covered by the order may influence federal approval for future projects.

Indian Tribe Gives In To 'Progress'

MIAMI (UPI)—"The hunting is beginning to go. Our children will not be able to live off the land." Buffalo Tiger spoke sad words, but his eyes showed pride in the new one-room school the county and the federal government built for his Indians off the Tamiami Trail about 40 miles west of Miami.

Buffalo Tiger, head of the tribal council of the fiercely independent Trail Indian branch of the Miccosukee Seminole tribe, came out of the Everglades Monday to see 19 Indian children, ranging in age from 7 to 16, start their first formal schooling. For years his Trail Indians resided life on the reservations, where schools have long been in operation. They preferred to build their chickees in the Everglades, live off the land and sell trinkets to the tourists. But hardships softened the attitude of the tribal leaders. They asked for the school. "There is a feeling we can trust the white man more. We have been promised some things and the promises kept," said Buffalo Tiger. "And we know the hunting is beginning to go. We can't live off the land much longer as well as we used to. The old people didn't like the idea of the schools, but they know the children must go. They must learn English, learn to get along so they will be able to live when they grow up. We can still be Indians and don't have to adopt the white man's life... but the old life is gone. "Maybe five years the hunting is all gone."

Dr. Bright is a member of the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers, for which he was sponsored by Fred Waring. Recently he was a guest conductor at one of the Fred Waring Workshops in Delaware Water Gap, Pa. A prolific composer of choral, piano, band, and instrumental music, Dr. Bright will conduct a number of his own selections for the concert tour. Among these will be his liturgy, "De Profundis (Psalm CXXX)" and "Sailor's Alleluia."

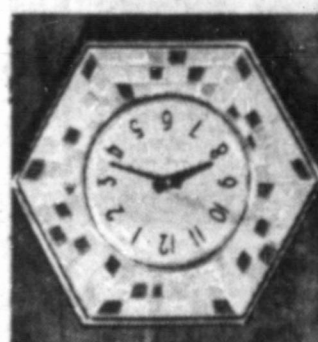
