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Oil Industry Is Likely Target For New Legislation

AUSTIN (UPI)—The oil industry in Texas likely will be the target of a barrage of new regulatory bills in the 58th Legislature because of the slanted-well scandals in East Texas, a United Press International Survey shows today.

More than half the members of the new legislature which meets in 18 questioned definitely favor new laws to tighten well drilling regulations. A few members of the house wanted a complete reorganization of the Railroad Commission.

But about one third of those in the poll believe present laws, if enforced, are adequate. Some indicated they likely will oppose any new statutes designed to further regulate the oil industry.

Favor New Laws
Legislators from East Texas, where the scandals broke last spring, almost to a man favor new state laws. But Rep. John Allen, on the other hand, pointed out that "we already have laws against stealing and bribery."

"We need a complete overhaul of the Railroad Commission, including its chairman," Allen said.

Sen. Grady Hazelwood, Amarillo, said he felt that new legislation "definitely" was needed, and said it would be a general bill. Several other legislators favored new laws as long as they applied to the entire industry.

Rep. Forest A. Harding of San Angelo said he felt stealing oil "is stealing anything else," and said he failed to see why "we would make it deviated appropriation just to make it sound better."

Wait for Requests
"We have more laws, more times and more crooks than any other nation on earth," Harding, second-term legislator, observed. "The persons responsible for the prosecution of these cases may deem it necessary to clear some of our laws, and if they do, I think it is our duty to give them tools to work with. But we would have their requests first."

Some 17 per cent of those surveyed were undecided in the slanted-well issue and most of these referred to wait until they receive a copy of the House General Investigating Committee's report on the issue.

The committee held a series of public hearings during the past year on slanted wells and is expected to have its report ready all before the legislature convenes.

Several members of the new legislature appeared to feel that the new regulations covering drilling rules should be adopted.

Rep. Herbert Shutt, Houston, said "Louisiana's pooling laws have some good points that could be adopted in Texas."

Rep. Ronald W. Bridges, Corpus Christi, said he believed new legislation covering drilling rules "is probably way overdue."

State Property Tax Abolishment Urged

AUSTIN (UPI)—The Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy has recommended that Texans abolish the state property (ad valorem) tax, the state's eighth largest source of tax revenue.

"The tax is poorly administered and inequitable in its application," the commission's report said. The commission suggested the tax revenue be replaced with bond issues and new tax sources.

Sen. George Parkhouse, Dallas, chairman of the commission, said today in a press conference that the main obstacle to throwing out the tax "is these teachers colleges that have grown into universities."

He said the colleges have been using the money largely without restriction and are reluctant to have the funds put under the review of, for example, the commission on higher education.

Parkhouse said the money lost to the available school fund through abolition of the property tax "is a problem for future legislation and this commission, if its life is extended, to wrestle with. We have got two sessions of the legislature to resolve that problem."

At a Nov. 9 hearing, several groups recommended the state get out of property taxation and leave that source of revenue to local governmental agencies.

Among the commission's duties when established by the last legislature was to study and report to the 58th Legislature on the feasibility of the state's tax sources. It reported last week its 20 recommendations for changing the state sales tax, designed to bring in \$10.5 million more in revenue.

State's Oldest Tax
In today's report, the commission pointed out the statewide ad valorem tax is the oldest tax in the state revenue system, dating back to the earliest days of statehood. Until recently, the tax was the leading source of state revenue. In addition, the state, county and local property taxes combined bring those governments more money than any other sources—around \$735 million in 1960.

Local and county property taxes continue to be a major source of revenue, the commission pointed out, but the statewide property tax has slipped to the eighth most important source of state taxes, bringing in \$40.8 million in the 1961-62 fiscal year.

It is overshadowed by the motor fuels, sales, oil production, motor vehicle registration, cigarette, natural gas production and corporate franchise taxes.

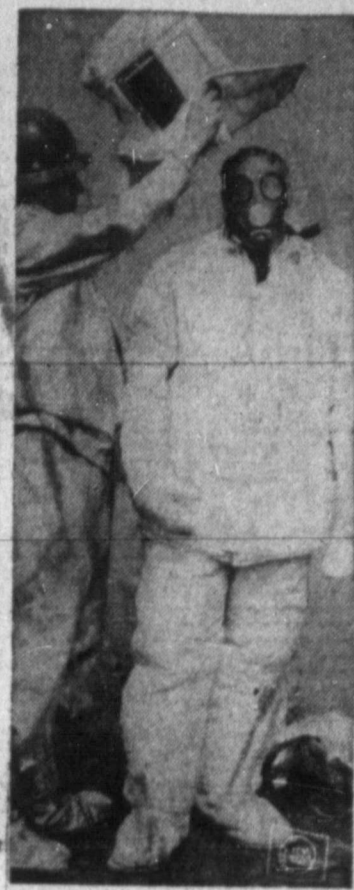
Accordingly, the commission recommended the 58th Legislature approve a constitutional amendment to be submitted to the voters in 1964 to abolish the tax effective Jan. 1, 1968. Delinquent taxes owed at that time would be still collected under the commission

recommendation.

The commission did not mention specific revenue sources to cover the entire loss of revenue from state property tax, but suggested partial compensation through various means. They included:

- Providing that the free textbook program financed by the property tax be made a first claim against revenues of the available school fund.
- Setting a \$77.10 minimum per scholastic to be paid by the minimum foundation school program, to avoid loss of funds to 124 school districts that would be affected by discontinuation of the property tax revenue.

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William Scranton, New Pennsylvania Governor

EDITOR'S NOTE: Here is the exclusive interview by UPI national reporter with one of the new faces on the national political scene.

By HARRY FERGUSON United Press International HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI) — William Scranton, the new governor of Pennsylvania, is being hailed about across the nation as the possible Republican presidential candidate in 1964. If he makes it, his official biography should be titled "How to Succeed in Politics Without Really Trying."

Scranton has won two smashing victories at the polls in the last two years, but it never occurred to him to enter politics until someone else suggested it. He ran for governor only because he was sure into it by a determined group of men headed by Dwight Eisenhower.

Scranton violates most of the professional politicians' live with a cheerful disregard for whether he sinks or swims. Ask a blunt question and you get an answer. Are you a wealthy man? ("I'm worth between \$8 and \$10 million"). What was your reason when you were drafted to Congress two years ago? ("I honestly don't know").

Not An Act When a reporter remarked upon Scranton's candor, Scranton said: "Well, I know lots of people think it's an act. But I am what I am. I'll leave it to you to decide whether I'm putting on an act or not."

Then came the inevitable question as to whether he planned to run for president. "I don't know," he said. "I don't know if I'm going to run or not. I don't know if I'm going to run or not. I don't know if I'm going to run or not."

Scranton is 45 years old and a member of a new breed in American politics—the wealthy aristocrats. Unlike John F. Kennedy and Dwight D. Eisenhower, he did not come into the political pool. He was pushed. That happened when he was in Washington working in the State Department. One day he got a telephone call from a Republican chairman of his congressional district. The news that the chairman of all six districts wanted him to run for governor, and all other possible candidates had agreed to withdraw and support him.

Scranton never occurred to me I was running for president. My own county was 60 per cent Catholic.

Scranton said he accepted because he thought that if he won there would be a chance to do something for his home territory, including the city of Scranton. Democrats had a 34,000 margin over Republicans in registered voters in the district. Kennedy carried the district for president by a narrow margin.

Pressure Gets Heavy Scranton said he decided he would run for re-election to Congress because he thought he needed four years to accomplish the things his district needed and then return to politics. Pennsylvania Democrats, impressed by Scranton's survival against a Democratic tide, began to think of him in bigger terms. In August of last year they approached him to run for governor. He said No. In August he made another pitch. Again

the answer was no. In November Scranton got word that Eisenhower wanted to see him at Gettysburg.

This time the heat apparently caught up to furnace temperature, and Scranton asked for two weeks to think it over. Then he said no again. That might have been the end of it except for the fact that a civil war broke out among Pennsylvania Republicans and by February of this year it had become so bad that the GOP cause looked hopeless.

The heat was turned on Scranton again, hotter than ever. This time he accepted subject to conditions he laid down. All factions in the Republican party must make peace and agree to work together, and those conditions were met.

Beat The Odds Scranton's opponent was Richardson Dilworth, mayor of Philadelphia. Democrats had held the governor's chair for two straight terms, eight years. They had a bulge of about 160,000 over the Republicans in registered voters.

Scranton won by a whopping 47,000. Asked to explain it, he said: "Partly it was a matter of personalities. People sometimes get so interested in power politics that they forget about service to the public. My opponent started striking out in all directions pretty hard toward the end of the campaign. I think it was premeditated and just an act he was putting on."

Scranton hammered away during the campaign at the problem of Pennsylvania's 321,000 unemployed and the decline of heavy industry in the state. He is an advocate of economy in government rather than increased taxes and already is going over the state structure, department by department, to see what can be cut out. He is quick to admit that he won thousands of votes because of Eisenhower's active support and the fact there had been a city hall fiscal scandal during Dilworth's administration in Philadelphia.

Goes All Out Scranton is slow to make up his mind about being a political candidate, but once the decision is taken he goes all out. He won his seat in Congress because he and his wife, Mary, tramped the streets ringing door bells day and night. He worked out every cranny of Pennsylvania when he was running for governor.

Scranton inherited a fortune. His family settled in Pennsylvania in 1840, and the city of Scranton was named for them. They developed extensive mining and real estate holdings in the area and in addition to that Scranton has a lucrative law practice.

The future? The calendar doesn't favor Scranton in the presidential sweepstakes. He is in his second year for a four-year term and cannot run for re-election under a state law. That leaves him halfway through his first term in 1964 and two years out of office in 1968. It may be that 1968 will find him back in Scranton looking after his law and business interests and finished with politics. If so, it is unlikely Scranton will shed any tears or mourn lost opportunities.

"My wife says 'I'm happy doing anything,'" he said, "and I guess she's right."

Washington Window

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — The
 ord in the political jungle today
 that someone better armed
 an most is gunning for Ambassa-
 dor Adlai E. Stevenson.

The word persists despite a
 shower of denials. These were de-
 als of a story in the current
 Saturday Evening Post accusing
 Stevenson of proposing during the
 recent Cuban crisis that the
 nited States trade Turkish,
 reek and British missile bases
 or the bases established by the
 Soviet Union in Cuba.

An official, unidentified, is
 quoted in the story as having said
 Adlai wanted a Munich, and
 men to have outlined the missile
 trade proposal. Thus accused of
 eing an appeaser in the deadly
 rade of the British Neville
 Chamberlain, Stevenson instantly
 plied that the story was in-
 accurate and untrue. Some hours
 later the White House issued a
 statement on the story.

White House Denial
 Press secretary Pierre Salinger
 said Stevenson strongly had sup-
 ported President Kennedy's hard
 missile base policy. In any event,
 these denials were predictable.
 Stevenson scarcely could have re-
 mained long as U. S. ambassador
 to the United Nations if the Pres-
 ident had failed forcefully to deny
 that his ambassador had wanted
 to appease the Communists.

To permit such an indictment
 to stand against Stevenson un-
 challenged would have invited a
 powerful campaign to drive him
 out of public life. There would be
 no place in any U. S. administra-
 tion for a man successfully tag-
 ged as an appeaser.

The Saturday Evening Post
 story was written by Stewart Al-
 sop, Washington editor of the
 magazine, and Charles L. Bartlett,
 Washington correspondent for
 the Chattanooga Times, a pair of
 skilled and experienced newsmen.

More than that, Alsop and Bart-
 lett enjoy unusual connections,
 news sources and such. Bartlett
 long has been an intimate of the
 President's family, a close friend.
 Their connections, their standing
 in the community and their long
 experience in the ways of the
 political jungle combine to give
 a story under their joint byline a
 very substantial claim to cre-
 dence.

Prominent Hoaxer
 If their story was a phoney, as
 claimed by Stevenson, then Alsop
 and Bartlett have been taken in
 by a shrewd hoaxer. If so, then
 the hoaxer must have consider-
 able standing in the community,
 himself, and be in some way
 identified with the Kennedy ad-
 ministration. Else the experienced
 newsmen would not have been
 hoaxed because they easily could
 check the facts as presented to
 them.

Stories such as the Alsop-Bart-
 lett piece do not just happen. The
 source of their information and
 the magazine writers themselves
 certainly were aware of the fact
 that the story would jeopardize
 Stevenson's position at the United
 Nations. Aware, also, that it
 would have to be denied from the
 top down if Stevenson were to
 survive.

Correct or not, the information
 had to come to the writers from
 what they would regard as a
 solid, reputable, well informed
 source. Such a source would have
 to have administration connec-
 tions.

The jungle folk will expect fur-
 ther developments in the Steven-
 son story. It must be killed, dead,
 or else.

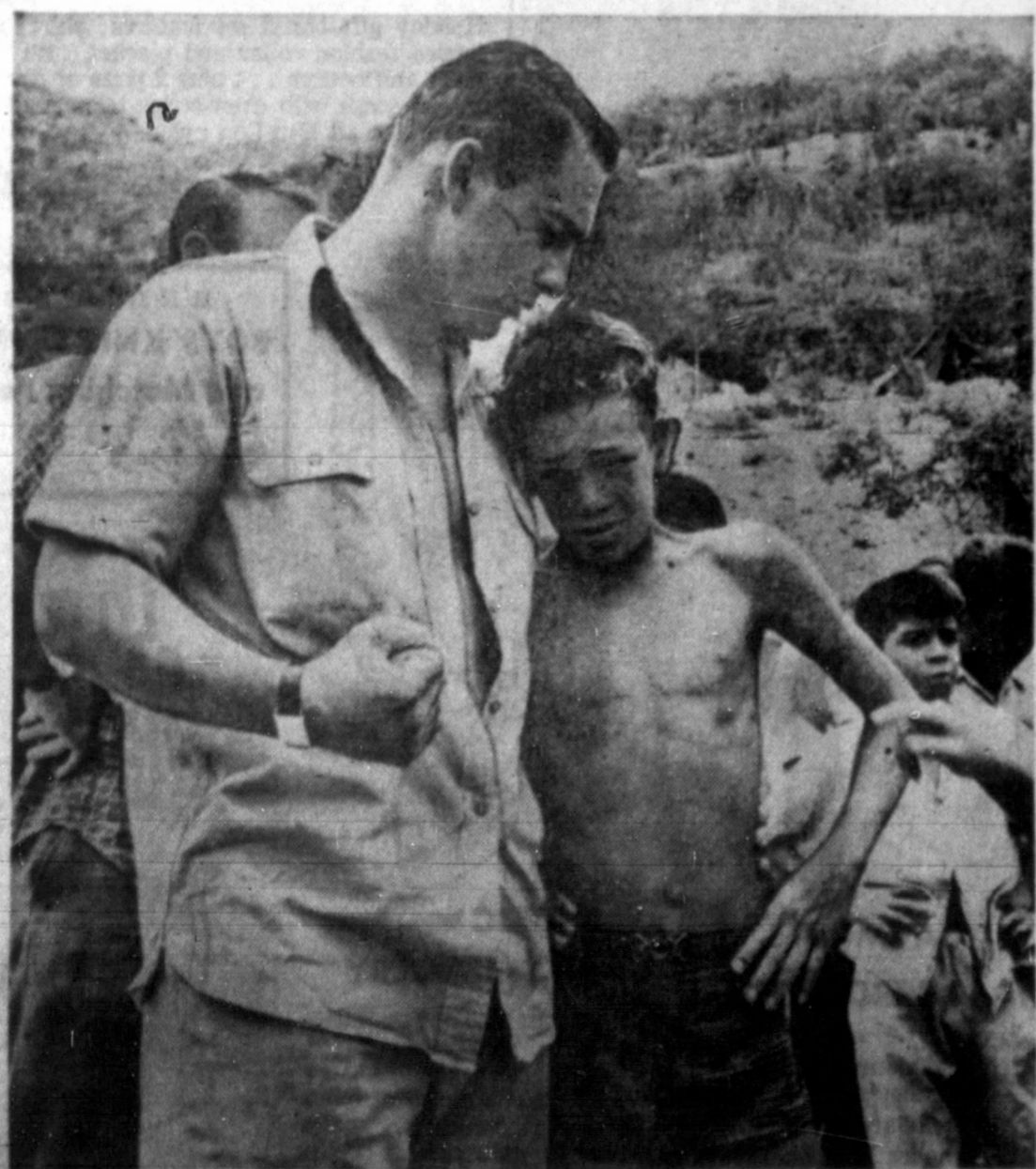

Dallas Cowboys Sign 3 Draftees

DALLAS (UPI) — The Dallas Cowboys announced Wednesday had signed Texas Christian's giant quarterback, 6-foot-7 Guy (Sonny) Gibbs, to a National Football League contract.

Gibbs was drafted by the Cowboys last year as a "future," being their No. 1 pick although he was taken in the second round of the 1951 draft. The team had traded away its No. 1 choice that season.

The 230-pound Gibbs also was drafted by the Denver Broncos of the American Football League in the 14th round—the first in which teams of that league may bid for a "future" choice.

Gibbs' signing was the third announced by the Cowboys since the NFL draft Monday. Tuesday they announced they had signed Marvin Clother, a 6-4, 225-pound guard from Kansas picked in the seventh round, and Bill Perkins, a 6-2, 220-pound end-fullback from Iowa picked in the 12th round.

Gibbs closed out a three-year career at TCU last Saturday, ranking second in the league among the passers and third in total offense.



TERRY BAKER "NFL... greater challenge"

Heisman Winner Prefers NFL

NEW YORK (UPI) — Heisman Trophy winner Terry Baker of Oregon State would prefer to play in the National Football League because it offers the "greater challenge."

The Beavers' triple-threat All-America quarterback was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams as the top choice in the NFL and by the San Diego Chargers of the American Football League.

"However, I won't make up my mind until the end of the basketball season and then I'll play for the club that presents the best deal," the southpaw passer said when he accepted the Heisman Trophy at the Downtown Athletic Club Wednesday night.

Westminster Rated No. 1 Small College

NEW YORK (UPI) — Westminster, a lukewarm choice to win the 1952-53 national small college basketball championship, showed early strength today in the weekly United Press International board of coaches ratings.

The Titans of New Wilmington, Pa., the choice of only seven coaches on the 35-coach UPI rating board to repeat as national champions this season, swamped Alliance, 71-40, in their first start of the new campaign, and as a result took a commanding lead in the first weekly ratings.

Fourteen coaches named them No. 1 today, and with points distributed on a basis of 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 for votes from first through 10th places, the Titans drew a total of 261 points. Southern Illinois, which lost to Gannon but upset major power St. Bonaventure, drew four first-place votes and 198 points.

Next came Mt. St. Mary's (Md.), a loser to Hofstra in its first start, followed by Grambling (La.), Tennessee State (2) (1-0) 150, Prairie View (1-0) 147, Evansville (1) (1-1) 124, Hofstra (1) (1-0) 82, Pan American (1) (2-1) 80, Wittenberg (1-0) 83.

Ohio State, Texas Win College Tiffs

By United Press International Although Cincinnati and Ohio State aren't scheduled to meet during the regular college basketball season, the Bearcats already own a "victory" over their rivals from the Big Ten conference.

The triumph was gained by comparing the scores of their games against their first mutual opponent of the new campaign.

The top-ranked Bearcats walloped Virginia, 91-42, Monday night at Cincinnati. The touring Cavaliers then moved on to Columbus Wednesday night for a game with Ohio State. The Buckeyes didn't come close to matching Cincinnati's 49-point bulge against the same team but they showed enough to gain a 70-46 victory.

Cincinnati, meanwhile, chalked up its third straight triumph by turning back Miami of Ohio, 58-36.

Boast Impressive Figures The Bearcats' statistics for their first three games are mighty impressive. They have totaled 246 points for an average of 82 per game and have allowed only 117 for an average of 39.

North Carolina, led by the second-half heroics of sophomores Billy Cunningham and Ray Respass, rolled to a 64-48 victory over Clemson.

Elsewhere, Holy Cross opened its season with an 84-68 victory over American International, Fordham whipped Yale, 73-54; La-

Salle outclassed Lafayette, 95-59; State, 71-38, and Oklahoma Mississippi bounced Sewanee, 78-50, soared to a 65-47 victory 64; Texas walloped East Texas Montana State.

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Bell, Stovall Head UPI All-America Selections

NEW YORK (UPI) — United Press International today presents its 1962 All-America football team, chosen by the nation-wide ballots of 368 sports writers and broadcasters.

They selected as the finest players at their positions in the land:

Ends — Pat Richter, Wisconsin and Hal Bedsole, Southern California.

Tackles — Bobby Bell, Minnesota and Jim Dunaway, Mississippi.

Guards — John Treadwell, Texas and Jack Cvercko, Northwestern.

Center — Lee Roy Jordan, Alabama.

Quarterback — Terry Baker,

Oregon State.

Halfbacks — Jerry Stovall, Louisiana State and Mel Renfro, Oregon.

Fullback — George Saimes, Michigan State.

With 11 points awarded for a first place vote and 6 for a second, Bell led the balloting with a total of 3,627 points out of a possible total of 4,048. Stovall was the leading point getter among the backs with a total of 3,239.

Richter of the Big Ten champion Badgers is the only repeater from the 1961 All-America team. He was the only junior on that mythical eleven. Bell and Dunaway were second team choices last year while Saimes was on the third team.

There are three juniors on the 1962 team — Cvercko, Bedsole and Renfro. All the rest are seniors.

The Midwest, with four players, dominates the 1962 all-star aggregation, which reflected the return of the Pacific Coast, led by undefeated Southern California, to the top football power sections of the nation for the first time since before World War II.

The Pacific Coast placed three players on the first team as did the South, with the Southwest getting the other berth.

It marked the first time since 1936 that the Pacific Coast placed three players on the team. The last time the Pacific Coast placed a player on a UPI All-America team was back in 1938 when tack-

le Ted Bates of Oregon was selected.

South Places Nine*

In the personnel of the first three teams, the South led with a total of nine players, followed by the Pacific Coast and Midwest with eight players each.

The balloting this year bore out the well-known fact that there was a wealth of star quarterbacks with the left-handed passing Baker leading the parade.

The voting also reflected the increasing number of players, outstanding in both offense and defense. For instance, Dave Behrman of Michigan State, the second team center, also received votes for guard and tackle as did Don McKinnon of Dartmouth, the third team center and Roy Mans-

field of Washington, who led the list of centers receiving honorable mention. There also were a number of players who received votes for both guard and tackle positions. In all cases the players were chosen for the position for which they received the most votes.

This year's all-star eleven features a heavy, hard-charging line which averages 220 pounds in weight and six feet three inches in height and a swift, shifty backfield that averages 150 pounds and six feet and a half inch.

Dunaway, at 260 pounds, is the heaviest of the linemen while the two ends, Richter and Bedsole, each stand 6 feet, 5 inches. Treadwell at 154 is the only lineman under 200 pounds.

Stovall at 195 is the heaviest of the backs while Saimes is the lightest at 186. Baker, the south-paw passing wizard, is the tallest at six three.

Each player selected on the first team had substantial point margins over the players named to the second team. The closest contest — if it could be called close — was for the fourth backfield spot in which Renfro beat out Roger Kochman of Penn State by a margin of 337 points.

Ends — Hugh Campbell, Washington State and Dave Robinson, Penn State.

Tackles — Steve Barnett, Oregon and Bob Vogel, Ohio State.

Backs — George Mira, Miami (Fla.), Eldon Fortie, Brigham Young and Kermit Alexander, UCLA.

Guards — Dave Watson, Georgia Tech and Damon Bane, Southern California.

Sure, You Have More Freedom, Mr. Bachelor, But You'll Die Quicker!

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gloat no more, you bachelors. Sure, you don't have all the nit-pickery and hen-pecking that your married brethren must deal with. You have more freedom.

But a new report shows married men tend to live longer and healthier lives. The suicide rate also is lower for the married men than it is for bachelors.

The report's enough to make a bachelor contemplate the big question: "Better wed than dead?"

The statistics were compiled by the Health Insurance Institute. They are based on several studies, including parts of the U.S. national health survey, the U.S. census for 1960, and insurance company mortality tables.

Some of the facts:
—The average stay for hospitalized husbands is 9.8 days versus 19.2 days for bachelors.

—The incidence of illness requiring hospitalization is 20 per cent lower for married men than for single men.

—Bachelors of different age groups have mortality rates ranging from 37 to 136 per cent higher than married men. For example, out of every 1,000 single men between the ages 24-34, there are an average of 3.6 deaths a year. The death rate of married men of the same ages is only 1.7 per 1,000. Divorced and widowed males have respective mortalities of 5.8 and 8.6 in the same age group.

—One explanation medical doctors offer for the apparent healthier state of the married is the general constancy of care and healthful advice married people extend to respective spouses in

time of illness or threat of illness," the institute said.

"People living alone are not apt to get this kind of attention. Furthermore, married people probably are more attentive to diet and are more likely to take preventive measures against sickness than are single people."

Females also are better off married than single, the report showed.

The rate of hospitalization of wives on the one hand and single women on the other are almost the same—139 to 141 per 1,000— notwithstanding that the figures for wives include maternity.

"Eliminating the childbearing years, mature married women experience considerable less hospital confinement than do single women," the institute reported.

Among women in the 24 to 35 age group, wives have a 1.2 per 1,000 mortality rate compared to 2.2 for single women, 2.6 for divorcees and 4.1 for widows in the same age group.

The report, in a capsule: —Married people of both sexes experience less illness and fewer and shorter periods of hospital confinement than bachelors, spinsters, widowed persons and even the divorced.

—They live healthier and longer lives.
